NSA spying on Americans must cease

Finally, our inept Congress has done a little something to reign-in the outrageous spying on Americans by the NSA. Granted, it wasn't much, but at least it was a start. We need to insure that

Last Thursday night, the US House of Representatives voted 293 - 123 to pass an amendment to a Department of Defense appropriations bill that would cut off all funds for two of the agency's most insidious activities: Firstly, using the myriad provisions of the Foreign Service Intelligence Surveillance Act to perform searches of the mass unications data that is collected from all Americans, and secondly, asking hardware manufacturers and software developers to install backdoors into their products designed to give the agency access to their users' communications. On that second item, the amendment specifically forbids funding for any agency attempt "to mandate or request that a person or company redesign its product or service to facilitate electronic surveillance."

This amendment represents a onse against the nefarious behavior revealed from the leaks of Edward Snowden, which have shown that the NSA subverted cryptography standards, redirected hardware shipments to plant NSA bugs in products, and created other vays to gather raw, bulk communication data from companies like Google, Facebook, AT&T, Microsoft, Apple, ad nauseam. These companies, unfortunately, are not our friends. They knowingly cooperate with the NSA.

Of course, this amendment and bill must pass the senate (home of our Texas Senator from Canada, eh) if anything is to be done. Hopefully, the House vote sends a message that there is now the political will to do something about the abusive spying on Americans by the NSA. The point is that these spying programs need money in order to survive, and we can cut off that funding if they continue their dastardly ways.

The bill also represent a remarkable shift from the useless Freedom bill. intended to curb NSA mass surveillance. which passed the House last

month in a

A In the quick, the dead, & fred

paltry effort that disappointed privacy adherent The members of the house only paid lip service to the American people, and passed a Freedom bill that was an absolute joke. Actually, the contrast between the Freedom bill and this bill is a result of political procedure Most of the weakening of the original Freedom bill occurred in the Judiciary and Intelligence committees. However, as an amendment to an appropriations bill, last week's defunding legislation was able to escape the intense lobbying that was present in the aforementioning committees. It did not have to go through the Intelligence Committee, which is basically a puppet of the intelligence

community.

Actually, that powerless surveillance reform bill may have inspired Thursday night's vote by not going far enough to please House members seeking to curtail the NSA's spying on Americans. Due to the diluting of that bill's anti-spying provisions in committee, many House members never had the opportunity to show their wish to drastically limit the NSA's overzealous spying activities.

So, what does this all really mean? Even if the amendment actually becomes law, which is iffy at best, it still wouldn't end all federally mandated backdoors in hardware and software. For example, it will have no effect of the FBI, which drastically limits its effectiveness

However, the passage of the amendment still signals a welcome

shift in the political landscape, thanks primarily to Snowden's spying disclosures. Last year, for example, a similar amendment was put to the vote and it fell seven votes short of passing The lopsided vote this year illustrates that reigning in the NSA has become a popular political cause that crosses party lines. There is now a sense, at least in the House, that if you're not doing something about this issue, it

could result in unpleasant political repercussions, like losing your seat. Now, it is up to the Senate to pass similar legislation. If they don't act satisfactorily on this legislation, then we need to hold them accountable by voting them out of office. In the immortal words of Ben Franklin, "Those who are willing to sacrifice liberty for security deserve neither." I'm not willing to benignly accept a situation in which the federal government is allowed to listen to all my phone conversations, read my emails, or view my other internet communications, whatever the form they

Who knows, perhaps someday I may have a brilliant thought. If so, I would like to keep ownership of it. Or, perhaps an ex-wife or two decides to mistakenly take me to task for some obviously exaggerated transgression that I may have committed in the past. If so, I don't want the government or anyon else to shed undue light on it. In short I want my personal life kept personal. Perhaps even more importantly, I want the personal lives of others to also be kept personal.

Meanwhile, we all owe Edward

Snowden a healthy portion of gratitude. His revealing the reality of the spying on Americans by our own government can only make our democracy stronger. After all, over the years, many Americans have given their lives defending our liberty and freedom. Let's do all we can to make sure their sacrifices were not in vain.

Five things to fix the border crisis

Over the past several months, tens of thousands of unaccompanied minors almost all of them from Honduras, Guatemala El Salvador or Mexico -- have been detained at our southern border while crossing illegally into the

United States. A large percentage have been found in the Rio Grande Valley region of South Texas.

Sadly, this ongoing humanitarian crisis is very much a man-made crisis.

More specifically, it is a direct result
of President Obama's misguided immigration policies.

Two years ago, the president stood in the Rose Garden and announced a unilateral change to US immigration policy regarding children. Between that policy change and his broader refusal to uphold our immigration laws, he created a powerful incentive for children to cross

into the United States illegally.

Don't just take my word for it.

"There is growing evidence," reports the Washington Post, "that a surge of tens of thousands of Central American minors across the Mexican border into Texas is being driven in large part by the perception they will be allowed to stay under the Obama administration's immigration policies.

Consider the numbers. In fiscal year 2011, roughly 6,560 unaccompanied alien children were apprehended at the US-Mexico border. That figure grew to nearly 25,000 in 2013, a year after the ent's Rose Garden Speech, and

US officials estimate that it could reach 90,000 in 2014. before surging to 142,000 (or higher) in 2015.

und week supposedly adopted for humanitarian reasons have produced a humanitarian disaster. Make no mistake: The migration journey from southern Mexico to the Rio Grande is among the most treacherous in the world. In his 2013 book, "The Beast," Salvadoran writer Óscar Martínez documents the horrific violence that is routinely inflicted on migrants by drug traffickers, gang members, and human smugglers. The risks to women are especially harrowing: Experts believ that at least six out of every ten female migrants become victims of sexual

Indeed, migrant women are preyed upon by ruthless Mexican drug cartels such as the Zetas. For example an official from the mayor's office in Ciudad Hildago (a Mexican city along the Guatemalan border) told Martínez that "in Ciudad Hidalgo the Zetas control all trafficking, sending men to recruit women in Central America and sometimes even kidnapping migrant women riding the buses. They sell the

women to truck drivers for a night and then throw them away like unwanted scraps."

There is nothing "humane" about encouraging people to travel through cartel-dominated smuggling routes in hopes of reaching the United States.
Yet that has been the effect of President Obama's policies.

I therefore call on the president to

immediately do five things:

First, he should publicly (and repeatedly) declare that the so-called deferred-action programs he announced in June 2012 will not apply to the children currently arriving at the border.

Second, he should publicly (and

repeatedly) discourage people in Central America and elsewhere from sending their children on such a dangerous journey through Mexico.

Third, he should start enforcing all US immigration laws, not simply the ones he finds politically convenient.

Fourth, he should make sure that Texas and other US border states have the resources they need to handle the migrant influx.

Fifth, he should work with Mexican officials to improve security at their border with Guatemala, which most of

these children appear to be crossing. If the president took all those steps, not only would it help us resolve the current crisis, it would also help prevent a similar crisis from erupting in the

In this application, the time period for SWEPCO's transmission capital investments, to be recovered through the TCRF, is December 31, 2011 through February 28, 2014. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission.

all types of door-to-door salespersons. Summer bring out all of the door-to-door scammers. Beware.

Summer yard maintenance may include hiring someone to spray or trim trees or provide other yard related services. Locally, there are many trustworthy businesses with hard-earned reputations for honesty and quality lawn and tree service. Unfortunately, this is also a type of service that criminals use to take advantage of people especially the senior citizens. Some of the most common frauds originate with doorto-door sales, and we believe that criminals promoting their service in this manner are currently active in Donley County. Before hiring someone for tree or pesticide spraying services, be sure to check them out

Before selling this service door to door, the salesman must obtain a permit as required in the City of Clarendon Municipal Code. They must apply for the permit at the City Hall, and must carry the permit with To check out individuals in Hedley, Howardwick, and in Donley County call the Donley County Sheriff's Office. Also, please cal the Sheriff's Office when Clarendon City Hall is closed.

The Sheriff's Office will come and investigate them.Individuals that offer commercial spraying service must comply with state licensing regulations and must operate under a permit issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture, which provides this information on their web site: Applicators who want to apply any pesticides (regardless of use classification) to plants, trees, shrubs, grass or other horticultural plants for hire must be licensed by either the Texas Department of Agriculture 3A ag category or the Structural Pest Control Service. Why is My Number Calling Me? A Crazy New Scam. Scammers are using caller ID

spoofing technology to impersonate the phone numbers of local busi-nesses, neighbors and even you! Watch out for this wacky twist on the

classic phishing phone scam.

How the Scam Works: Your phone rings, and you look at the caller ID. You recognize the number. It may be from a local busine a neighbor down the street. But in strange twist, you might even see your own name and phone number on the caller ID screen. You answer the phone, and it's a robo call. Victims have reported several different phishing scams. In one common version, a recording prompts you to verify your credit card number under the guise of lowering your interest

With many people reject-ing calls from unfamiliar numbers,

scammers are increasingly posing as familiar businesses, government organizations or people. Scammers purchase lists of phone numbers purchase lists of phone numbers and use spoofing technology to trick potential victims into picking up the phone. Posing as your own phone number is great for shock value and for ensuring the number isn't

What to do is a scammer calls Hang up, don't press any buttons and, if you received a voice mail message, don't call the scammer back. We all like to have the last word, but returning the phone call may just give the con artist information he can use. Don't trust Caller ID.

Scammers have technology that lets them display any number or organization name on your screen. Never give out any financial infor-mation. If you did not initiate the call, do not provide bank account, credit card or Social Security numbers over the phone unless you have thoroughly done your research and verified the caller.

Antipsychotics May Reduce Violent Crimes

A recent study conducted in Sweden reports that prescribing antipsychotics to people with psychiatric disorders may reduce the incidence of violent crimes in that group of people. Through a search of the records, researchers compared the rate of violent crime when individuals were or were not taking an antipsychotic medication. Compared with the period these individuals were not their medication, violent crime decreased by 45 percent when see same individuals were taking their antipsychotic medication. on their medication, violent crir Antipsychotics are commonly prescribed worldwide to manage psychotic conditions such as delusions, hallucinations, disordered thought and in the management of schizophrenia and bipolar disorder. Antipsychotics are known to be effective for prevention of relapse into psychosis and symptom relief. However, prior to the study in Sweden, the effects on violent crime were unknown. Antipsychotic medications fall into two categories, typical such as haloperidol and atypical such as risperidone. Both types block



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USDA authorizes emergency grazing of CRP acres

Donley County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Execu-tive Director, Vance Killian has announced that Donley County was authorized for emergency grazing use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres for fiscal year (FY) 2014.

Unlike previous years, counties are not automatically approved for CRP emergency grazing when they reach the D2 (severe drought) level on the U.S. Drought Monitor. If there is a need for emergency grazing, each local FSA Office must request approval from the Texas FSA State Committee. Currently, 59 counties have received emergency grazing

approval. The 90-day emergency grazing period for these counties will

end Sept. 11, 2014.

Based on a policy decision made by the Texas FSA State Committee, CRP acres grazed during fiscal year 2012 or 2013 will be considered eligible for emergency grazing if NRCS verifies, on a caseby-case basis, that the conservation cover will sustain grazing. FSA's fiscal year runs from October 1 to

"Eligible producers who are interested in emergency grazing of grazing eligible acreage and must obtain a modified conservation plan

from the Natural Resources Conservation Service that includes grazing provisions," said Killian. "Current provisions allow grazing on 100 percent of a field, up to the 75 percent

stocking rate," he said.

There will be no CRP annual rental payment reduction for 2014 emergency grazing authorizations.

To take advantage of the emergency grazing provisions, authorized producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage. The eligible CRP acreage is limited to acres located within the approved county.

Additionally, CRP land located

within the Lesser Prairie Chicken Crucial Habitat Assessment Tool (CHAT) zones I, II and III will only be able to practice managed or routine grazing, managed harvesting, emergency haying or emergency grazing one out of every three years. This frequency regulation resets in 2014, meaning that any land hayed or grazed in prior years that meets the available forage requirement according to NRCS standards will be

eligible for emergency use in 2014.
