Local Shopping Challenge

et's cut to the chase. By now you've heard the statistics.
Almost \$75 of every \$100 you spend locally stays in your community. Local entrepreneurs spend exponentially more money on community programs than their larger counterparts.

All impressive, indeed. So then why are millions of Americans driving away or logging on to their computers for their Christmas shopping this holiday season? Some cite convenience or busy schedules without realizing just how much impact they can have on their local community by spending a few dollars locally.

BUY EVERY OTHER PRODUCT LOCALLY

Breaking the habit can be tough, so start small. Challenge yourself to buy one locally sold product for every other gift you purchase. And try to make the prices comparable so about half of your total holiday budget is spent locally.

Encourage your friends to do the same and you could be making a monumental difference in your community. If 10 of you spend \$300 on local gifts this year, about \$2,250 of that \$3,000 would be pumped right back into your local community. Comparably, your community will see \$0 of your online spending at retail giants.

BUY ALL GIFTS CARDS LOCALLY

Gift cards are becoming an increasingly massive portion of holiday spending. More than 80 percent of holiday shoppers will buy at least one. More than \$28 billion will be shelled out on gift cards this year, according to the National Retail Federation.

Many people will spend their gift cards on food or everyday items if you buy them for traditional retailers. Don't you want your present to be more meaningful? A gift card to a local specialty shop or boutique will ensue that your gift card is spent on exactly what it is intended to – a gift.

Try to personalize each gift card by choosing a local business that has special meaning to the recipient, or maybe one that you have shopped at before with that person.

Save Money With Christmas Cash

any people finance their holiday shopping in the big city with credit cards and then have to spend much of the New Year paying off high interest charges. That's not the case when shopping in Clarendon where a local program can help you shop on credit interest free.

Yes, holiday shopping at home is easy and affordable thanks to the Donley County State Bank and the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce. The bank and the Chamber have teamed up to provide zero-percent interest "Christmas Cash" loans for the 18th season.

As in the past, anyone can make application for a loan up to \$3,000 interest free with the Donley County State Bank. Eleven local businesses are participating in the Christmas Cash program this year.

The program has proven popular in the past with many consumers and is seen as way to encourage folks to shop at home.

Once a Christmas Cash loan has been approved, the borrower will be issued Christmas Cash Dollars, which may be spent like US currency toward new purchases at all of the participating businesses.

Christmas Cash must be spent by December 31, 2014.


The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce is currently signing merchants up to participate in Christmas Cash. Chamber members in good standing may register to take Christmas Cash for \$25. The merchants then redeem the cash certificates at the Donley County State Bank for 95 cents on the dollar.



hile you're making your list and checking it twice this holiday season, don't forget to include your local business owners. They're not asking for much this year, just a little support. And you'd be smart to give it.

A substantially larger percentage of your hard-earned money stays in your community when you choose to shop locally for Christmas instead of leaving the area.

Recent studies have shown that as much as \$75 of every \$100 you spend at a locally owned businesses remains in your area, versus \$40 at non-locally owned establishments.

PUT YOUR MONEY TO WORK

More money staying local means increased funding for the schools, roads, and services that you and your friends, family and co-workers depend on.

Since local business owners hire local workers – about half of all private sector workers are employed in small businesses, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics – money for taxes and wages stays in the community, too.

EVERYBODY WINS

Small business owners are also more likely to make social investments in the community by volunteering at their child's school, donating to charities and hosting fundraiser events.

Doing so allows these entrepreneurs to integrate themselves into their communities and make it known that they are receptive and sensitive to the needs of those around them.

From little league teams to theater groups, small business owners are quick to offer their sponsorship and money to help support local groups.

RIPPLE EFFECT

Small business owners have a tendency to buy supplies locally and to use local services for their business needs.

When an independent business owner requires accounting services or help with building repairs, they are more likely to spend their money on local accountants or contractors, respectively.

SHOP LOCAL - HOME COOKING

Cook Up Christmas Cheer

a tradition that stretches through time. What person doesn't look forward to the treats the season brings? Cookies are often gifted to friends and family members, and they usually help complete the dessert offerings after the holiday meal.

Sugar cookies are an ideal holiday cookie because of their

versatility. They can be dressedup however you see fit, whether iced, covered in sprinkles or enjoyed as they are dunked in hot cocoa. To make successful sugar cookies, try this triple-tested recipe courtesy of Monica Buck and Good Housekeeping.

SUGAR COOKIES

Yields 5 dozen cookies

1. Preheat oven to 350 F. In large bowl, with mixer on low speed, beat butter and sugar until blended. Increase speed to high; beat until light and creamy. On low speed, beat in egg and vanilla. Beat in flour, baking powder and salt until blended.

- 2. Divide dough into 4 equal pieces; flatten each piece into a disk. Wrap each disk with plastic wrap and refrigerate 1 hour or until dough is firm enough to roll. (Or place dough in freezer 30 minutes.)
- 3. On a lightly floured surface with a floured rolling pin, roll 1 piece of dough 1/8 inch thick. With floured 3-inch to 4-inch cookie cutters, cut dough into as many cookies as possible; wrap and refrigerate trimmings. Place cookies, 1 inch apart, on ungreased large

cookie sheet.

- 4. Bake cookies 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Transfer cookies to wire rack to cool. Repeat with remaining dough and trimmings.
- 5. When cookies are cool, decorate with frosting if you like; use along with sugars and candies to decorate cookies. Set cookies aside to allow frosting to dry completely, about 1 hour. Store in tightly covered container (with waxed paper between layers if decorated) at room temperature up to 2 weeks, or in freezer up to 3 months.

INGREDIENTS

1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened ½ cup sugar

1 large egg 1 tbsp vanilla extract 3 cups all-purpose flour ½ tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt Frosting (optional)

Support Small Business

n 2010, American Express founded Small Business Saturday to help businesses get more customers. The day encourages shopping at small businesses on the Saturday after Thanksgiving.

The first-ever Small Business Saturday was held on Nov. 27, 2010. It encouraged people across the country to support small, local businesses, and started a holiday shopping tradition.

In 2011, from Washington, D.C., to Washington State, governors, mayors, senators, and even President Obama all voiced their support for Small Business Saturday.

Small businesses owned the day in 2012 when American Express encouraged small business owners to take charge of the day, helping them

promote their business through free, personalized ads, which appeared millions of times across the web.

In 2013, more than 1,450 neighborhoods celebrated Small Business Saturday, with individuals and local organizations pledging to support the day as Neighborhood Champions.

The nationally recognized movement to celebrate and shop small businesses was created as a counterpart to Black Friday and Cyber Monday. This year's event is slated for Saturday, Nov. 29.

The Man Behind The White Beard

bed eagerly anticipating a visit from Santa Claus. This merry gentleman is purported to visit the home of every good girl and boy, delivering gifts and cheer along the way.

Before the modern evolution of Santa Claus lived a very real and generous individual named Nicholas. In the third century, Nicholas served as the Bishop of Myrna in present-day Turkey. He had a reputation for secret gift-giving, believing that giving should be done secretly and sacrificially in Jesus Christ's name rather than one's own.

Stories tell of Nicholas paying the dowry for poor daughters to enable them to get married. He reportedly put coins in the shoes of those who left them out for him. It is believed Nicholas helped to restore the hope of hundreds of people in his community, making him a beloved and revered Bishop. Throughout his ministry, Nicholas fervently shared his life and fortune with others.

Nicholas continued to be revered and commemorated by many Christians even after his death. His charity and unselfish works helped inspire generations of the faithful, and he eventually was named the patron saint of everyone from merchants to sailors to pawnbrokers. No one really knows what St. Nicholas looked like. But in 2005, a forensic laboratory in England reviewed historical data and photographs of the remains taken from St. Nicholas' grave in the 1950s. Researchers concluded that he was a small man, perhaps no more than five feet in height, with a broken nose.

This image certainly does not fit with the robust frame and other imagery awarded St. Nicholas in more modern years. St. Nicholas is believed to be the inspiration for Santa Claus, which was a name taken from the Dutch Sinterklaas, a contracted form of Sint Nicolass, or St. Nicholas.

Tales of the real St. Nicholas' giving spirit were blended with a fictional personification by New York-based newspaper writers who blended the St. Nicholas name with the appearance of a Dutch town citizen. The goal was to reach out to the primarily Dutch immigrants living in New York at the time. This jolly elf image was given a boost

by the publication of "A Visit From St. Nicholas," which was published around the same time.

Eventually, the merry Santa Claus portrayal began to outshine the more accurate St. Nicholas version as a religious man, fostered by political drawings and caricatures that depicted Santa as a chubby sort in a red suit. That image prevails to this day.

Beneath the Christmas symbolism, the beard and the presents associated with Santa Claus lies a tale of generosity that originated with St. Nicholas.

Although you may have a general idea of the items you have packed away, some things may be


forgotten. Keep an informal inventory of decorations and supplies so you don't purchase any duplicates.

Not Just For The Holidays

ure, Christmas is a great time to shower your loved ones with locally bought gifts. But what about the other major holidays throughout the year?

Extend your yuletide joy to Mother's Day, Father's Day, birthdays and anniversaries for maximum impact on your local community and business owners.

Your effort in doing so may make more of a difference than you realize. A recent collaborative study by the Small Business Administration, United States Department of Labor and other major organizations found that small businesses employ about 77 million Americans and account for 65 percent of all new jobs over the past 17 years.

So by spending your money locally, you are helping keep your friends and neighbors employed during the holiday season and beyond!

Here are some of the other notable findings from the study:

- Eighty-nine percent of consumers agree that independent businesses contribute positively to local economies.
- Residential neighborhoods served by a successful independent business district gained, on average, 50 percent more in home values than their citywide markets.
- Independent retailers return more than three times as much money per dollar of sales than chain competitors. Independent restaurants return more than two times as much money per dollar of



• If just half of the United States employed population spent \$50 each month at locally owned independent businesses, it would generate more than \$42.6 billion in revenue.
