### Two Veteran's Day services set Friday

Two public Veterans Day services have been planned for this Friday to honor the men and women who have served America in the armed forces - one near Hedley and another at Clarendon College.

The Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion in Hedley will hold its annual service at the Rowe Cemetery at 10 a.m., and 18th District Commander Harold Lehnick.

Lehnick graduated from Groom High School in 1944 and was inducted in the US Army the following spring and served at Ft. McPherson in Georgia and Ft. Bragg in North Carolina.

The Rowe program will also include honoring Prisoners of War and those still Missing In Action.

The Clarendon College program will be held Friday at 7 p.m. in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Auditorium. The guest speaker for the evening will be Dick Bode, and the service will include a Roll Call as well as a recognition of those serving in the military and their families.

The Clarendon College baseball and men's basketball teams will be canvassing the town this Saturday, November 12, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. for a canned food drive. Team members will be going door to door to collect food for the food pantry at Panhandle Community Services.

## Lady Broncos make history Clarendon cross-country team is statebound

For the first time in school history, the Clarendon Lady Bronco cross-country team is headed to the State meet in Austin next weekend.

Junior Audrey Shelton, who has had a stellar season on the course, will lead the team.

After advancing to state last year, Shelton finished third in this year's Regional meet with a time of 12:25. The Lady Broncos are cur-

rently ranked fifth in the state and have set themselves up to have a great run at the state meet.

Sarah Luttrell finished 24th with a time of 13:24, and Abby Johnson took 30th at 13:29.29. Deborah Howard was right behind Johnson with a time of 29:56, and Trevela Dronzek was 44th at 13:41. Haley Ferguson finished 47th with a time of 13:46, and Phara Berry was 64th with a time of 13:59.

Jessica Cenicerros and Maci White are also part of the cross-country team. They are coached by Molly Weatherred and Shanna Shelton.

Coach Weatherred is very pleased with their accomplishments this year.

"I am very proud of these young ladies," Weatherred said. "They have worked extremely hard this year."

Gruver won the meet with 30 points, and Sunray was second with 44 points.

Clarendon posted 105 points, and fourth place Sundown had 137 points. Abrianna Carrasco from Sanderson was first at 12:15.97, and Shelley Gibson from Gruver was second at 12:23.32.

The ladies will run in Round Rock this Saturday, November 12, at 11:40 a.m. in Old Settlers Park.

## New food rules hit seniors' lunches

Centers providing meals to the senior citizens of Donley County this month are struggling to follow new regulations impacting what food they serve and how it is prepared.

"We have to comply; that's all we can do," said Mary Shields, Director of the Donley County Senior Citizens Center in Clarendon. "We're going to do this as best we can as long as we can."

In the past, Shields, with the assistance of a nutritionist, prepared the menus for the 145 plates she serves each week either at the center or through Meals on Wheels. But now a nutritionist from the state is providing a fall/winter menu and a spring/summer menu consisting of 20 meals each, and Shields is not allowed to vary from what has been planned for each meal.

"I can substitute an entire meal for another, but I'm not allowed to change items specifically in each menu," Shields said.

The menus are provided by the Area Agency on Aging, which Shields said is funded by the state and federal funds. The agency funds the senior citizens centers in Clarendon and Hedley, which serve meals to the elderly free of charge but ask for a suggested donation.

The new guidelines are federal

standards and are meant to be more nutritious, cutting out fried foods and canned foods. Pies and cakes for desserts are also out, Shields said.

Seniors in Clarendon have met the new menus with an open mind, Shields said, and so far most have been complimentary of the meals. But Shields worries about costs associated with the changes.

"The main thing is that everything has to be homemade and we can't use canned vegetables anymore. Everything has to be baked in the oven, and veggies have to be either fresh or frozen."

Shields says she worries about

space constraints, the need for additional equipment, and that it will cost her more to purchase everything fresh. She figures she needs about \$5,000 right away for additional ovens and a stand-up mixer.

Shields says she's trying to keep a positive attitude and is busy working on grants to help purchase equipment. And she's also preparing to take suggestions to meeting of other senior centers with the Agency in December.

Joseph and Mary Giesler, who have eaten at the Donley County Senior Citizens Center for 18 years, say the new food has been good so far, but they don't like the way

the government has imposed new guidelines on the center.

"We haven't been on it very long, but ain't nobody gonna do better than Mary (Shields)," Joseph said of the new menu.

Mary Giesler said the ban on cakes and pies is "not fair" and also said, "It's not good when the government sticks its nose in."

The couple did agree that value of the meal was still excellent, and they plan to continue eating at the center five days a week and making the suggested donations.

"There's no way you can prepare a meal like this for \$4," Joseph said.

## Local man faces drug charges

A Clarendon High School student is out on bond this week facing drug-related charges after a canine unit alerted on his vehicle during a random search last week.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Mason Lowrie, age 17, was charged with a felony possession of a controlled substance and with misdemeanor offenses of possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Blackburn said his office was contacted by the school last Thursday, November 3, after a drug dog alerted on Lowrie's vehicle in the school parking lot and after it had been searched by the company providing the canine service.

Lowrie was arraigned Friday and released on bonds totaling \$6,500, the sheriff said.

CHS Principal Larry Jeffers would not comment on this case specifically, but he did say the school has contracted with Interquest for about 10 years.

Jeffers said the company makes about nine unscheduled visits to the school each year and can detect illicit drugs as well as prescription drugs, alcohol, and gunpowder residue. He said when a dog alerts on a vehicle, the school is notified and then the owner is located to get permission to search the vehicle. If a search turns up something ordinary - such as aspirin or a medication prescribed for that student, then there is no problem.

If a search turns up possession of drugs, Jeffers said policy is for the student to be automatically placed in the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program (AEP). A felony case can result in automatic expulsion to AEP, Jeffers said.

CHS has only had about three AEP placements in the last ten years as a result of a canine search, the principal said. Law enforcement is called in if a student is found to possess drugs on the school grounds.

## Federal court sets new dates for primary filing

State Democratic and Republican officials have announced that the filing period for next spring's party primaries have changed due to an order from a San Antonio federal court.

The new filing deadlines for the March 2012 Primary Elections have been condensed and pushed back to November 28 through December 15, 2011. These changes apply to all races on the March 2012 Primary Election ballot in Texas - federal, state, county, and local offices.

In a court order this past weekend, a three-judge federal panel in San Antonio overseeing the legislative redistricting trial, issued the mandate of these changes in order to allow for enough time to complete the process of drawing interim legislative maps for the 2012 Texas Primary Elections.

World War II veteran has no regrets

"Just existing became what was important," says 87-year-old Frank Kravetz of Pittsburgh, captive of the "hell-hole" that was Nuremberg Prison Camp. "Yet even as I struggled with the day-to-day sadness and despair, I never once had any regrets that I signed up to serve."

An extended tour of Nazi camps as a wounded POW scratching for survival wasn't what Frank had in mind when he signed up to serve his country in World War II. He refused his parents' wishes to stay home; they already had two sons overseas. Frank was eager to fight for the freedom his Slovakian parents had secured in America. It was the least he could do.

Francis Albert Kravetz was born October 25, 1923, in East Pittsburgh, near the Westinghouse plant that provided income and aspiration for an entire community. Every morning he shoveled soot that drifted onto the porch from the steel mill. He lived a happy life. But then war came. Frank enlisted in the Army Air Corps. If he was going to help Uncle Sam beat the Nazis, he would do it from an airplane—and he did it very well, as a tail-gunner.

Frank's life as a soldier took a dramatic turn on November 2, 1944, in a bomb-run over Germany. He crammed into the tail of a B-17, wedged inside a flak jacket. The target was Merseberg, a major industrial area. He flew amid an armada of 500 heavy bombers—each carrying eighteen 250-pound "general purpose" bombs—escorted by 900 fighter planes.

While the Americans were ready for business, so was the Luftwaffe, which set aside every aircraft to defend Merseberg. Frank's plane came under hot pursuit by German fighters. Frank took them on with a twin .50 caliber machine gun manned from the tail. It was a dogfight, and Frank was shot and badly wounded. His B-17 was filled with holes, the engines destroyed. The crew had to bail, quickly.

Frank was bleeding profusely and could barely move. His buddies tried to get a parachute on him, but it opened inside the plane. They wrapped it around him, taking care not to cross the chords, and tossed him out. To Frank's great relief, the chute opened. Instantly, the deafening chaos quieted, and Frank floated like he was on the wings of angels.

The tranquility halted with a rude thump as Frank hit the ground and tumbled like a shot jackrabbit. German soldiers seized him.

Thus began "a lousy existence," or, as Frank dubbed it—"Hell's journey." Destination: Stalag 13-D. How did he survive? "All I can say is that the good Lord was watching out for me," Frank says today.

Liberation came April 29, 1945, by General Patton's 3rd Army. Grown men wept with joy, embracing their liberators, falling to their knees. Frank was among them; that is, the 125 pounds that remained.

Frank returned home to Pittsburgh, hitchhiking all the way from New York. He unceremoniously arrived at his folks' door, no trumpets, no dramatic background music. He hugged his mom and dad, went inside, and sat down.

Frank soon thereafter married his sweetheart, Anne. They've been happily married ever since. He also got active as an ex-POW, eventually becoming national director of American Ex-Prisoners of War.

I talked to Frank one day last August. We chatted about a friend of his who had recently died, another WWII veteran gone. I told him it was critical that vets like him relay their message to the current generation.

Frank needed no convincing. "The current generation," he said, frustrated, "they don't know!"

To ensure they know, Frank wrote a book, a riveting account of his ordeal, titled, Eleven Two: One WWII Airman's Story of Capture, Survival and Freedom. The title refers to November 2, a date with multiple meanings in Frank's sojourn.

Assisted by his daughter, Cheryl, the book is a vivid account of the nitty-gritty, day-to-day details of an American POW held by Nazis, from the monotony to the terror, from the hunger and wounds that wouldn't heal to the rock that was his faith.

For too long, guys like Frank didn't tell their story. "We didn't talk about it," he explains, "It was too tragic.... So I just moved on. I just moved on."

Frank is now willing to share. There are others like him, and they won't be around much longer. A decade or two from now, they'll be nearly extinct.

If you know a Frank who hasn't told his story, help him. Get a pen, a video camera, whatever, and get him talking. As Frank says, "they don't know."

They need to know. Men like Frank Kravetz have no regrets, but we'll regret not pausing to record their history.

Last year on Veterans Day, I had the privilege of speaking at the National Museum of the Pacific War's annual ceremony in Fredericksburg, Texas. In attendance were veterans and their family members representing virtually every major military conflict in the past seven decades, including the oldest member of the audience, U.S. Navy veteran Sam Sorenson – born in 1916. We were gathered in the museum's Memorial Courtyard, a beautiful space spotted with large oak trees and surrounded by old limestone walls that hold more than 1,000 plaques honoring individuals, ships, and units that served in the Pacific during the Second World War. The program included a musical performance, the Presentation of the Colors and remarks by my good friend General Michael Haged, 33rd Commandant of the United States Marine Corps and current CEO & President of the Admiral Nimetz Foundation. After I delivered my remarks, I had the chance to meet many of the veterans in attendance.

I took in the setting – the dedicated plaques and park benches, the memorials, the veterans and their families, and the many local residents who took the time to attend the ceremony – I was moved by the sense of community, pride and patriotism that marked the ceremony. As the event concluded and I


made my way to the exit, one of the museum's staffers reminded me of the new George H.W. Bush Gallery, which had been completed since my last visit to the museum. With a little time to spare, I gladly accepted the invitation to tour the new wing.

The gallery was exceptional. As the son of a World War II B-17 bomber pilot, I could have easily spent hours there, examining each carefully assembled exhibit in detail. One exhibit, however, caught my attention and stayed with me long after I'd left the museum. It was a battle-worn American flag, which, along with its incredible story, was donated to the museum by Marble Falls resident Pat Spain. In 1942, while serving in the U.S. Army on the island of Mindanao, Spain's husband Paul and fellow soldiers Joe Victoria and Eddie Lindros were ordered to burn the U.S. flag at the Del Monte Airfield to prevent its capture by the approaching Japanese. Before they carried out their orders, however, the three soldiers removed the flag's 48 stars and hid them in their

Veterans Day honors heroic service

This year, Veterans Day falls on a Friday. Many people will take their children to a community parade where proud members of the local veterans' service organizations will march. Some will lay flowers and plant flags on the graves of loved ones who served our nation. Others will just enjoy a three-day weekend or go shopping to get a head start on Christmas. No matter how we choose to celebrate this holiday, we should remember the great debt to those men and women who put their country first and served in our nation's armed forces.

Texas is home to more than 1.7 million veterans, almost five percent of the total population of our state and second only to California in sheer numbers. These veterans are as diverse as the state itself. Young, old; rich, poor; every race, every religion – all raised their right hands and swore to protect and defend this nation and our Constitution. It was their willingness to sacrifice -- their lives if need be -- for our liberty and freedom that sets American veterans apart.

It is that willingness to go wherever the mission called them regardless of the risks, leaving their loved ones behind, that we honor our nation's veterans on this special day. Many servicemen and women paid the ultimate price defending our liberty. There are veterans buried in almost every cemetery in America. Others rest on foreign shores near where they fell. But most veterans came home. They resumed their civilian lives – working, going back to school, raising families.

Veterans are an integral part of the fabric of American society. The family doctor, the school janitor, the mechanic at the corner gas station, the community banker, your insurance agent: these are America's veterans. Your grandfather, your father,

your aunt, your son or daughter: these are America's veterans. They no longer wear a uniform. They are part of our neighborhoods, our churches, our businesses, our communities. And it is because of their service that we continue to live free today.

Sadly, each week, more than 1,800 veterans—mostly those who served in World War II—pass away. Most of these veterans are in their 80s and 90s. The tales of their service are an important part of our nation's history, and there is a way for all of us to help preserve their individual stories, as well as those from all of the military conflicts in which our men and women have faithfully served.

The Library of Congress' Veterans History Project (VHP) is collecting,

preserving and making accessible the personal accounts of America's war veterans so that future generations will be able to learn about the realities of war from those who fought the battles. Whether it is taped oral histories or personal memorabilia such as letters and photographs, the Veterans History Project is adding the material from individual veterans to the Library of Congress' permanent collection. You can volunteer to interview veterans from your family or community and have their stories be part of the Library of Congress' veterans' archives. Simply visit www.loc.gov/vets to learn how.

On November 11th, we pause, collectively, as a nation, to honor the millions of men and women who served our nation. One day each year, the entire country says "Thank you." But every day of the year, these brave men and women deserve our gratitude. God bless the United States of America and those who fought to keep her free. Happy Veterans Day.

**City will collect junk tires as part of tire recycling program**

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) is sponsoring Texas Recycles Day.

This program runs from November 15 thru December 15, 2011. You can bring all of your old computer electronics, (computers, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers and speakers) to the Recycling Center on North Front Street at no charge.

PRPC will be shredding this equipment to protect privacy. This program will divert tons of electronic waste from our landfills.

The City is also sponsoring a Tire Recycling Program.

Citizens can bring their junk tires to the Recycling Center for a minimal fee.

Tires that are considered "junk"

are tires that will not pass a safety inspection.

The cost will be as follows:

Tires 15 inch and less \$3. Tires 16 inch and more \$8. Tractor tires will cost \$30.

This cost can be charged to your City utility bill. Just bring a copy of your utility bill and a picture ID to the Recycling Center.

Remember that this is your best opportunity to dispose of old tires; following this tire recycling initiative, the City of Clarendon Code Compliance Officer will be issuing Notices of Violation to landowners who have junk tire accumulations. This will result in fines as well as the disposal costs.

Please do your part to recycle and help make Clarendon attractive.

**'EMT Alert' is latest scam to hit the state**

EMT Alert scam attempts to get people to pay \$300 for a non-existent emergency medical card.

Residents in Texas have recently been receiving phone calls asking for bank account information for an "EMT Alert Card." The supposed purpose of this card is to ensure emergency medical treatment by ambulance personnel if you find yourself in need. It also reportedly allows emergency medical personnel to have immediate access to information regarding your medical history, medications currently being taken as well as any special medical needs associated with your address. The tag line commonly used is "Isn't your life worth more than \$300?"

Beware... This is a scam! A person who needs emergency help can simply call 911. The Associated Ambulance Authority of Donley County does not recognize, let alone require, an EMT Alert card. This is a scam. It is all the more brazen when you consider that the consumer would not realize it was a scam until he or she tried to use the card in an emergency. Since emergencies are rare, most buyers would never find out the card was worthless.

If you receive a call from EMT Alert, be forewarned that the caller may have your name and address. This doesn't mean anything. Do not give the caller any additional information about yourself, especially not financial information like your bank account number. Don't buy anything.

Just hang up.

"My office has received a report of consumers being contacted by a Phoenix-based company called 'EMT Alert Inc.' The caller says he is calling on behalf of and working with the City of San Antonio Fire Department. The caller says that the City of San Antonio is now requiring everyone to purchase an 'EMT Alert Card,' and that the \$300 card would guarantee fire and ambulance service. Supposedly, the card lets emergency workers know what types of medical emergencies they should be aware of at the consumer's address. The caller then wants the consumer's bank account information 'to process the card.'"

Though this scam is currently being used in the San Antonio area, it is entirely possible that it will make its way around the state. By having knowledge of this scam now, you will be more protected in the event you receive a similar phone call asking for your banking information. If you have received a call from EMT Alert, you can report it by calling the Attorney General at (800) 252-8011.

Veterans Day is an annual

United States holiday honoring military veterans. It is a federal holiday that is observed on November 11. It is also celebrated as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in other parts of the world and falls on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended World War I. (Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 with the German signing of the Armistice.)

The U.S. President Woodrow Wilson first proclaimed an Armistice Day for November 11, 1919. In proclaiming the holiday, he said "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations."

The United States Congress passed a concurrent resolution seven

years later on June 4, 1926, requesting that the President Calvin Coolidge issue another proclamation to observe November 11 with appropriate ceremonies.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U.S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday; "a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day'." In 1953, an Emporia, Kansas man named Alvin King, the owner of a shoe repair shop, had the idea to expand Armistice Day to celebrate all veterans, not just those who died in World War I. King had been actively involved with the American War Dads during World War II. He began a campaign to turn Armistice Day into "All" Veterans Day. The Emporia Cham-

ber of Commerce took up the cause after determining that 90 percent of Emporia merchants as well as the Board of Education supported closing their doors on November 11 to honor all veterans. With the help of U.S. Representative Ed Rees, also from Emporia, a bill for the holiday was pushed through Congress. President Dwight Eisenhower signed it into law on May 26, 1954. Congress amended this act on June 1, 1954, replacing "Armistice" with "Veterans," and it has been known as Veterans Day since. Although originally scheduled for celebration on November 11 of every year, starting in 1971 in accordance with the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, Veterans Day was moved to the fourth Monday of October. In 1978, it was moved back to its original celebration on November 11.



## Drugs in the News

### New Guidelines: Treatment of ADHD

Last month, the American Academy of Pediatrics announced new guidelines for the treatment of attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). The most obvious change is that the age at which children can now be diagnosed with this condition has been expanded. Previous guidelines released in 2000 and 2001 covered children 6 to 12 years of age. The new guidelines include children as young as 4 and as old as 18 years. Along with this, the Academy recommends that physicians caring for preschool children first try individual or group training to manage the child's behavior. Symptoms that do not improve should be treated with stimulants such as Ritalin, Concerta, and Adderall. Antidepressants are sometimes prescribed if stimulants do not help.

Side effects of stimulant medications are considered by most health experts to be mild and short lived. Stimulant medications for ADHD are provided in different formulations. The short acting stimulants like Ritalin and Focalin are effective for 3-5 hours while the longest acting (8-12 hours) include Concerta, Ritalin LA and Metadate CD.
