### City aldermen divide over engineer choice

A divided Clarendon Board of Aldermen voted 3-2 to select OJD Engineering to provide services associated with a \$275,000 project to replace aging sewer lines in the north part of the city.

The project, funded by a Com-munity Development Block Grant (CDBG), will require a \$41,000 match from the city and will replace

lines that are more than 70 years old.

City Administrator Lambert

Little and Mayor Larry Hicks scored proposals submitted by four engineering firms, and recommended

the board select KSA Engineers, mayor and city administrator did not but OJD representative Che Shadle, have all the information about the whose firm provided the engineering services for the grant application at no charge, wanted to know why his firm was not recommended.

In other city business, the board

also divided on how to cast the city's 525 votes for representation on the Board. The board voted 4-1 to cast the city's votes for Wayne Riggs, Mitchell Martin, Rhonda Newhouse, Steve Carter, Dan Hall. Alderman Huey opposed the measure because

she favored the city supporting one person with all of its votes. City aldermen unanimously approved eight separate "housekeeping" motions to meet the technical requirements for the CDBG grant.

The board voted in favor of spending up to \$8,000 from an air-

### FSA urges ag producers to vote in committee elections

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Bruce Nelson is urging producers to vote in the 2011 FSA county committee elections, which began November 4 and will continue through December 5, 2011.
"The role and input of our

county committee members is more vital than ever at a time when our country faces important choices

regarding the funding and operation of our government," said Nelson. "New county committee members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of disaster and conservation programs. With better participation in recent years, we have also seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates helping to better represent the richness of American agriculture."

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs

for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricul-

tural producers in each county sub-mitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended

on Aug. 1.
Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 5, 2011 is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person. Ballots returned by mail must als later than Dec. 5 ist also be postmarked no



### The first time Wall Street was 'occupied'

As the indignation of the Wall Street Occupiers spreads across the nation, it is time to step back and consider the broader historical perspective. What will history books record about the Wall Street Occupation? For starters, what was the start date? The answer to that simple fact alone has some potentially profound meaning.

The Wall Street Occupation began on September 17. How ironic that date is.

If the Wall Street Occupiers could hop into a time machine and read their New York Times from September 17 almost a century ago - specifically, September 17 1920 - they would be struck by this headline WALL STREET EXPLOSION KILLS 30, INJURES 300; MORGAN OFFICE HIT; BOMB PIECES FOUND "

At noon the previous day, a horse-drawn wagon carrying hundreds of pounds of explosives and deadly shrapnel exploded in front of the headquarters of J.P. Morgan at 23 Wall Street, the heart and busiest section of America's financial district. The final death toll was 38, with over 400 injured.

The suspects were surprisingly similar to the spectrum of leftist protestors who are occupying Wall Street right now. They ranged from radical progres sives to socialists to communists to anarchists, from homegrown Bolsheviks to Italian Galleanists to Communist Party USA. No matter their labels, all shared one thing in common: they were anti-capitalist, anti-Wall Street, anti-banker, and generally despised what President Obama constantly refers to as "millionaires and billionaires" who do not "pay their fair share." They saw banks, loan-makers, investors, Wall Street, and the wealthy as sinister forces. They, too, shouted "down with capitalism!"

As the bomb immediately produced million

of dollars in damages and worse still in human carnage, certain wealthy bankers and investors, like J. P. Morgan, braced themselves for a march on their homes by anti-capitalist mobs – a prelude to what hap-pened in New York this time around. The September 17, 1920 New York Times, in a lengthy page-one article titled, "RED PLOT SEEN IN BLAST," noted not only that Mr. Morgan's home was being guarded but - in another similarity to the current Wall Street Occupation – that "many cities" around America were preparing their financial districts "against similar disaster." Mayors nationwide worried about the Wall Street chaos metastasizing to their cities, organized by left-wing ringleaders connected to the New York

It strikes me that today's Wall Street Occupiers. as they go national, have become increasingly bel-ligerent and violent. Reports abound of widespread theft, destruction of property, rampant drug use, sexual assaults from groping to alleged rape, knocking over trash cans, defecating on police cars, clashes with trash cans, derecating on ponce cars, clashes with police – involving rocks, tear gas, riot gear, shouting down police as "Pigs" – stabbing threats, mass arrests, blatant anti-Semitism, refusals to report crimes, and all sorts of other violent outbursts. Incidents have occurred across the country, from New York to Boston to Baltimore to Cleveland to Denver to Oklahoma City to Oakland, California.

Democrats have responded to the Wall Street Occupiers in varying ways, from Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi's strange, "God bless them for their spontaneity," to President Obama expressing empathy with their "frustrations." "I understand the frustrations being expressed in those protests," Obama told ABC's Jake Tapper. "In some ways, they're not that different from some of the protests that we saw coming from the Tea Party.... I think people feel separated from their government. They feel that their institutions aren't looking out for them." Likewise, Vice President Biden has framed the protests as a sort of leftist version of the Tea Party.

More generally, the Occupy Wall Street behavior

is a cautionary tale to President Obama and Democrats: Class-based rhetoric and demagoguery is poisonous and destructive. Once the enraged masses spill into the streets in more and more cities, the chances for violence magnify exponentially. Class envy and hatred engenders an unhealthy rage. I'm amazed that the protests have not gotten much more violent. Gee, Roseanne Barr literally called for guillotining wealthy bankers - and she was deadly serious

The September 17, 1920 New York Times was a picture of that violence. It was at newsstands on Wall Street the exact same day the current Wall Street Occupation took hold on September 17, 2011.

Is the date a coincidence? Yes, I think so, even as the symbolism is jarring. The planners in September 2011, as far as I can tell, have no idea of the irony of the set of dates, being inspired and led by other forces Unless, that is, the devil has a sense of irony.

### Texas' first generation veterans

This week millions of Texans will gather to pay tribute to generations of our bravest Americans – our veterans. Few of them had military training and most carried their own personal weapons. Yet together, they defeated the much larger army of the Mexican dictator Santa Anna. Their victory brought the freedom and independence that Texans enjoy to

Today, in true Texas fashion, a bigger-than-life monument stands at the site of this historic battle. The San Jacinto Monument is the tallest monument column in the world surpassing even the Washington monument by 15 feet - and topped by a massive 220texas times ton Lone Star

of Texas From its observation deck - reached by a 489-foot elevator ride - visitors can see the Houston skyline, the Houston Ship Channel and the Battleship Texas. At the base of the monument is the extremely well appointed San Jacinto Museum of History – a must-see for history buffs and any Texan wanting to learn more about our rich culture and predecessors

This month the San Jacinto Monu-ment will unveil for the first time to the general public a historic wax bust of one of Texas' most iconic veterans and leaders – Sam Houston. The 33-inch-tall wax bust was sculpted by the same hands that fashioned the famous Mount Rushmore National Memorial in South Dakota -

since 1939, the sculpture has not been put on public display due to its fragile condition. Now, after a four-month conservation effort by museum staff, the newly stabilized bust will be put on display beginning November 12 as part of the museum's year-long Making a Mark, Leaving a Legacy exhibit. In include more than 300 artifacts ranging from 19th century formulations used by Texas pharmacists to diagnose diseases to Pressler's Map of the State of Texas, considered one of the state's premier large-scale maps produced in the 19th century. ### US must evaluate overseas bases

The clock is ticking for the 12 abers of the Joint Select Committee on Deficit Reduction, also known as the "Super Committee," to submit their debt reduction package to Congress by November 23. The Super Committee must make tough decisions about our nation's finances in order to put us back on a sustainable and prosperous path. Many Senators, including me, have offered suggestions of ways to trim fed-

measure I have advocated is a thorough reevaluation of our overseas military base needs, with the intention of relocat-ing as many of our military personnel back to America as is prudently possible American Forces have been deployed in Germany and Japan since World War II and in Korea since the Korean War. With mounting pressure to make drastic cuts in the defense budget, we should first look for savings by closing unnecessary overseas bases, rather than by reducing force structure or cutting criti-

cal weapons programs.

We should carefully evaluate the rationale for every single overseas base and, wherever possible, redeploy our men and women to stateside military installations. Aligning our overseas base commitments with projected security needs will enable us to save billions of dollars in construction and maintenance bring thousands of troops back to America and take advantage of high quality training facilities and other resources at existing stateside bases.

According to reports from the Government Accountability Office (GAO) and the Congres-sional Budget Office, it is significantly more expensive to maintain facilities overseas, particularly in Europe, compared to bases in America. In addition to the money that would be saved by closing or downsizing unneeded bases, our troops and their families would spend their paychecks in local communities and contribute to our economy, and billions of dollars in military construction would be performed here by American workers.

My idea has attracted support from a bipartisan group of Senators. For starters, we have asked

a hard look at halting expen-sive overseas military construction projects, especially in Europe, South Korea



and Guam. It makes no sense to build new facilities overseas if the affected bases may be closed or shrunk in coming years.

I've also recently introduced a bill vith Senator Tester from Montana that would require a comprehensive review of the potential benefits and savings security experts to review the United President and Congress. Modeled after the Hutchison-Feinstein 2005 Overseas Basing Commission, this commission would re-examine our current overseas bases in light of the nation's current and what forces could be redeployed to bases in the continental United States.
The Commission would ensure

from closing outdated overseas military bases. Our legislation would establish a blue-ribbon commission of national States' current overseas basing struc-ture, and report recommendations to the fiscal challenges, new military capa-bilities, and evolving security threats to determine which bases could be closed,

### **Donley County voters approve six** ammendments to state constitution

Donley County voters agreed with the majority of voters across Texas November 8 in approving six amendments to the state constitution.

Participation was very low in the election with only 8.6 percent of county voters casting ballots. A total of 207 people took the time to go to

Local voters approved Propositions 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 10. Voters across Texas also approved those measures and Proposition 9 as well.

The amendments approved

1) Authorize the legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation on a homestead; 2) Authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds not exceed \$6 billion; 3) Authorize the Texas Higher

Education Coordinating Board or its successors to issue bonds financing educational loans for students; 5) Allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract; 6) Increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year; 9) Authorize the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication; and 10) Extend the length of the unex-pired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain local elected officeholders if they announce can didacy or become candidates for another office from one year to one year and 30 days.



### Sales tax revenue increases

All three Donley County municipalities posted sales tax reve-nue increases this month when Texas Comptroller Susan Combs made her ember allocations last month.

The City of Clarendon sa

its sales tax revenue increase 2.35 its saies tax revenue increase 2.35 percent in October for a total of \$35,312.88 compared to the same period one year ago. The city is now 6.19 percent ahead for the year-to-date figure with \$307,069.65 commore many with \$307,069.65 compared to \$289,154.97 at this time in 2010.

Hedley's allocation of \$959.53 reflects an increase of 1.73 percent, but that city still lags 0.88 percent behind last year with a year-to-date collection of \$6,978.17.

Howardwick posted a 5.46 percent increase with an allocation of \$1,231.08 this month, which has the city just slightly ahead for the year with an increase of 0.45 percent.

Combs said that statewide sales

tax revenue in October was \$1.87 billion, up 15.9 percent compared to October 2010.

"Strong growth in business sectors such as the oil and natural gas industry boosted sales tax revenue for yet another month," Combs said. "State sales tax revenue has now increased for 19 consecutive months. Sales tax also grew in the manufac-turing industry, as well as consumer sectors such as the restaurant indus-

sectors such as the restaurant indus-try and retail trade."

The sales tax figures repre-sent September sales reported by monthly tax filers and July, August and September sales reported by quarterly filers.

### Shoulder Pain: Steroid Injections Evaluated

Pain in the area of the shoulder is a common complaint seen in doctor's offices. There are many different causes, including rotator cuff tears or tendonitis, a dislocated, separated, or frozen shoulder, arthritis, or a rupture of a biceps tendon. According to the findings of a recent study published in the medical journal Archives of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, low doses of the two most commonly used injectable corticoid steroids were evaluated and found to be just as effective as higher doses of these drugs. They found that both the low and high doses reduced pain and improved the range of motion of the arm and shoulder. The study was conducted among 79 participants who had experienced at least one month of moderate to severe shoulder pain prior to study participation. Those conducting the study suggest that since high doses of steroids may cause complications, a

ver dose is preferred for initial therapy.

Non-medication treatment for shoulder pain includes rest, ice and neat applications, physical therapy, stretching, and specific exercises




