

Babcock trial moved to Hall County

The trial for accused child killer Robert Babcock will be held in Hall County instead of Donley County following a pre-trial court hearing in Clarendon last Tuesday.

December 20.

Babcock is accused of beating his son, who died on January 5. According to previous reports, preliminary results of an autopsy conducted the next day revealed that the boy died from blunt force trauma to the head and that he also suffered internal injuries from

District Judge Stuart Messer last week partially granted the defense's request for a change of venue. Defense attorney Dale Rabe argued for moving the trial to Vernon or Wichita Falls, but District Attorney Luke Inman said he did not agree with moving the trial out

Judge Messer said the court would first try to impanel an impar-tial jury in Hall County before it would consider moving the venue

Babcock's attorney also sought permission to prepare ques-tionnaires for potential jurors, and Messer allowed that request but asked the defense to collaborate with the DA's office in the preparation of the questionnaire.

Messer also granted the defense's request to independently verify the results of tests the state had performed of damage to a wall at the crime scene.

The defense also sought to sup-press three statements – interviews of the defendant conducted by the

Donley County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Rangers – totaling 6½ hours of recordings. During the hearing, Sheriff Butch Blackburn and Texas Ranger Jamie Downs testified about interviewing Babcock last January. Both men testified that Babcock had been properly read his rights, that he never asked for an attorney, and that he remained calm throughout the interviews.

Judge Messer himself will review all 6½ hours of recordings before making a ruling on whether to allow them to be admitted. to allow them to be admitted as evi-

ing autopsy photos that the state intends to use in its prosecution of Babcock.

Also on Tuesday, the court invoked a rule prohibiting potential witnesses in the case from being in the courtroom while other witnesses testify and from discussing the case with anyone except the attorneys in the case

Babcock remains in the Donley County Jail with bond set at \$1 million. His trial is set to begin January 17.

A Donley County man is facing a capital murder charge tonight in the death of his 4 1/2-year-old son.

Robert Monroe Babcock, age 38, will be arraigned tomorrow for the crime, which occurred yesterday morning. ing.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said his office received a 911 call from Babcock Tuesday at 9:40 a.m. reporting that his son was unresponsive.

When emergency personnel and when emergency personnel and law enforcement arrived at the resi-dence southeast of Clarendon, they found Chance Mark Jones on the floor in a bedroom, Blackburn said. "It was obvious that he was unre-

sponsive and evident that he had been assaulted," the sheriff said. "He had trauma to his head and torso."

The child was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital via Life-Star, and Babcock was taken in for an interview and held on a family violence



Greenbelt Lake is not likely to run dry, but steps need to be taken now to insure the lake's customers have an adequate water supply in the future. That's the result of a study pre-

sented to the Greenbelt Water Authority Board last week by engineers from the Ft. Worth firm of Freese & Nichols, who spent much of the summer tigating the reliability of the Gre

"They started in June, and they assessed the reservoir and looked at other water sources," Greenbelt Gen-eral Manager Bobbie Kidd told the Enterprise

A Draft Assessment of Potential A Draft Assessment of Potential Water Supplies presented to the Green-belt board found that "the reservoir will not go dry at current demand levels if the historic hydrology (inflow) is repre-sentative of future hydrology." Kidd said springs which feed Greenbelt Lake were found to be pro-ducing about 1.5% over-freet of water-

ducing about 3,850 acre-feet of water ducing about 3,850 acre-feet of water per year, but he also says evapora-tion has to be taken into account. And it is uncertain what effect the current drought will have on the local streams. The engineers found that deple-

tion of the reservoir has slowed in the last several weeks, which may indicate that the spring flow is returning. However, if the springs were to stop running ever, it the springs were to stop running and the drought was to continue, the report says Greenbelt Lake "has one to two years' supply remaining." "The long term solution is ground-water," Kidd said.

Treatment for Difficult-to-Control Epilepsy

According to study results published in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Academy of Neurology, a specific combination of medicines appears to be the best for resistant or hard-to-control epilepsy. According to the study, over 30 different prescription drug combinations were evaluated. Only one of the combinations produced a significant reduction in the number of seizures for those with this difficult-to-control type. That combination consisted of lamotrigine (Lamictal) and valproate (Depacon). Researches associated with the study indicate that this combination reduced seizure frequency by about half when compared with the other combinations u

According to one report, more than 3 million Americans have epilepsy and of that number, about one million have the torm that is called difficult-to-control. The Epilepsy Foundation defines the goal of epilepsy treatment is to have no (zero) seizures with little or no drug side effects. Health experts add that good seizure control is a ture-fee period of at least 12 consecutive
