Comptroller giveth and taketh away

City's refund gets reduced

of Clarendon fell more than 50 per-cent when State Comptroller Susan Combs made her April allocations last Friday, but the drop is due to accounting errors by both the city and the state and not a reflection of the local economy.

City Hall received \$11,011.40 for the month, which is a drop of 50.35 percent compared to the \$22,181.70 during the same period

But city officials say the comptroller's office actually withheld \$12,853 from this month's payment to the city because of an overpay-ment to the city by the state earlier this year. The city's annual audit revealed an overpayment to the state in sales taxes on sanitation services, but state officials said Tuesday that the comptroller's office had refunded too much money to the city when it returned about \$54,000 earlier this

Clarendon's actual sales tax revenue for this period should have been \$23,864, which would have been an increase of about 7.6 percent

over the same time last year.

With the state's deduction of funds, however, Clarendon's yearto-date sales tax collections dropped

Also in Donley County, Hedley's sales tax revenue for the month was also down 20.61 percent to \$321.66, bringing that city down 25.22 percent for the year at \$1,651.25. Howardwick, which increased its sales tax rate in October, posted increased collections of 27.8 percent at \$1,274.35 for the month and was up 17.43 percent on the year at \$5.016.22.

Statewide, Combs announced that sales tax revenue in March was \$1.87 billion, up 16.9 percent com-

pared to March 2011.

"The latest sales tax revenue numbers mark a continuation of recent trends we have seen in sales tax receipts," Combs said. "Strong collections continued in oil and gas-related sectors, while growth in revenue from the retail sector and restaurants also accelerated."

Combs will send April local

sales tax allocations totaling \$488.7 million to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 17 percent compared to April 2011

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in February and reported to the comptroller's office in March

Early balloting to begin April 30 for bond election

The City of Clarendon is publishing notice this week for the \$700,000 bond election on May 12 to fund street improvements.

If approved by voters, the funds would be used to make improve-ments on the following streets: Sixth Street (Koogle Street to Goodnight Street), Third Street (Allen Street to Bugbee Street), Allen Street (Third Street to Fifth Street), Sims Street (Third Street to Fourth Street), Carhart Street (Sixth Street to Highway 287), Clarendon Avenue (Bugbee Avenue to the west end). Regents Avenue (Clarendon Avenue

to Highway 287) and Wood Avenue (Jackson Street to Faker Street). Earlier this month, the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation Board said it would contribute \$10,000 to the street improvements this fiscal year if voters approve the bond election next month.

The Enterprise will print a map

of the proposed streets to be worked on in next week's edition.

Early voting on the bond question will begin April 30 and continue through May 8 at the Donley County

Bridge fate still unknown

bridge near City Park will not be decided until later this year, according to information presented Monday night, April 16, in Childress.

At a Transportation Improvement Program meeting, Texas Department of Transportation officials said they are waiting on results of a "condition survey" that will determine the usable condition of the Seventh Street truss bridge and a similar bridge on Rosenfield Street.

The Seventh Street bridge was closed by the state in December 2008, and both bridges are scheduled to be replaced under a TxDOT

ram next year.

TxDOT says it will hold public hearings later this year to deter-mine what local citizens would like

done with the bridge at the park. One option that has been discussed is relocating the bridge for use as a pedestrian bridge.

TXDOT says replacement of

the Seventh Street bridge will cost \$250,000, not including any work to repurpose the existing bridge, and replacing the Rosenfield Street bridge will cost \$230,000.

Other transportation projects planned in Donley County this year include overlaying Hwy. 70 from Howardwick to Interstate 40 and reconditioning some of the driving lanes on US 287 in Clarendon.

TxDOT will also let a contract for overlaying the southbound lanes of US 287 from the Armstrong County line to the west city limits of Clarendon next spring.

The GOP: A **Party in Flux**

With Rick Santorum having dropped out of the race, Mitt Romney is apparently the Republican nominee for POTUS, barring a "black swan" event swooping down out of nowhere.

Why has the Republican Party taken so long to decide upon its presidential nominee? The two most common explanations given have been the structure of the primaries and the absence of an "ideal" candidate. Those are valid reasons, but there is one more that generally has been overlooked: The Republican Party itself is in a state of flux, and its new identity has not yet gelled.

The Tea Party message of smaller government has been dominant in the GOP primaries. However, even though the old guard, moderate, country club, establishment – choose whichever cliché you prefer – wing of the party was eclipsed in the nominating process, it remains a formidable force in Washington This was evident in the recent Senate vote on repealing all subsidies to all private energy companies (conventional and renewable): 19 Republicans voted with every single Democrat against abolishing the subsidies. Also, the very fact that the most conservative budget proposal put forth in Congress by Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) – a plan that, while obviously superior to the Obama alternative, will increase federal spending and debt - shows the present limits of the Tea Party's

The Republican Party may indeed be evolving into a truly conservative party, but the transformation is far from complete. Many rank-and-file Republicans have been becoming more conservative at different rates, so it is not surprising that the candidates strug gled to find the "sweet spot" where one could establish himself as the ideal 2012 Republican.

Although many Republicans were dismayed and

disheartened as the primary race dragged on, there is an excellent chance that this sense of malaise will quickly dissipate now that the race is essentially over. The bickering between the candidates was

unpleasant and cast a pall over the nominating process. but that was a passing phenomenon that will soon be forgotten. Mitt Romney, Rick Santorum, and Newt Gingrich took turns pointing out each other's past flirtations with interventionist government, while trying to outdo each other in professing to repent of those earlier missteps and emerging as the one genuine, born-again, true-blue conservative.

Ron Paul, meanwhile, who remained un-nomi-nate-able due to his noninterventionist foreign policy (and perhaps even his uncompromising free-market principles), must feel vindicated that his three opponents (in some cases) staked out positions much closer to his consistent, constitutionalist, limited-government philosophy than would have been conceivable four

The Republican program in 2012 became clear even before Romney emerged as the standard-bearer The last four men in the primary race - Romney, Paul, Gingrich and Santorum – all agreed: The federal government is too big, the country is in deep trouble, and the presidency of Barack Obama has been disastrous. All four advocated less federal involvement in educa-An total advocance less feuter in Movement in Custa-tion, effective control of national borders, lower taxes, fewer bureaucracies, repealing Obamacare, greater freedom to develop domestic energy resources, less

Social engineering by Washington, etc.

Choosing between Romney, Gingrich, and Santorum was, for many, like choosing between vanilla, chocolate, and strawberry ice cream. Their personalities, pasts, and priorities had different flavors, but their philosophies were of the same general type. The presidential election campaign will generate far more enthusiasm among Republicans than the primary race did, because voters will now have a clear-cut choice between Republican ice cream or another helping of Barack Obama's spinach.

Barack Obama has already laid the groundwork for a very challenging economic environment in 201: Whoever is president will have to cope with a bruising debt-ceiling battle, the scheduled expiration of the Bush tax cuts, a weak job market, unresolved systemic problems with Social Security and Medicare, a badly deteriorated power grid, and degraded military capabilities - not to mention possible complications result-

of the control possible complete of the control of who is completely prepared to an the chantenges and not chantenges and convinced, though, that if Romney is elected, he will devote himself unreservedly to trying to solve those problems, while Obama would just make them worse. Tea Partiers, moderate Republicans, independents and anyone else hoping for a change of direction in our country, can either unite behind Mitt Romney or concede defeat to Barack Obama. That is the choice

before us.

Obama hitting GOP below the belt

In early April, President Obama made a speech to some of the nation's most influential newspaper editors. In that speech, the president took aim at Representative Paul Ryan's budget. The gist of his speech was either incorrect o a fabrication, just to scare the American people

Now, it should be noted that the Ryan budget has some worrisome wer points, which the Democrats have the right to question. For example, discre tionary spending cuts under the Ryan plan may be too deep. This could lead to damaging cuts in health care for poor children, scientific research, and programs that boost social mobility.
Additionally, the Ryan plan would tax
the lower and middle classes too heavily, while lowering the tax burden on the wealthy. His tax ideas are blatantly unfair, which would further reduce the shrinking middle class. They make cuts for the rich explicit while hiding loop-hole closings that could hurt rich Republican donors

Obama's less-than-stellar deficitreducing record casts doubt upon the sincerity and veracity of his claims.

Even though the Republicans have been very entertaining this primary season, repeatedly embarrassing themselves with absurd claims and counterclaims, the president, in one fell swoop, managed to sink even lower than the Republicans did, which is not easy to do. Furthermore, Obama fraudulently

cast himself as a fiscal moderate who embraced the bi-partisan Simpson-Bowles program, which is an absolute joke. Heck, my ex-wife and I embrace each other more than Obama embraced Simpson-Bowles, and we aren't par-ticularly fond of each other. The president, sinking even lower, then spewed forth every stupid liberal cliché in the book, calling the Republicans a bunch of trickle-down, Trojan horse-bearing Social Darwinists.

For those who don't know, Social Darwinism was a commonly accepted philosophy back in the 1800s. It held, in part, that Arvans and Northern Europeans are racially superior to African, brown, and Mediterranean peoples. Theodore Roosevelt, along with most of the prominent leaders of that era, used its precepts as justification for Manifest Des-tiny, slavery, the destruction of our Native Americans, and stealing half of Mexico.



Thankfully,
Social Darwinism has long been proven false and repudiated by scientists and society. Normally, calling Republicans Social Darwinists is not the best way to promote cooperation and encourage bipartisan efforts to solve our fiscal

Obtusely thinking he was doing well, Obama then exaggerated the differences between his budget and the Ryan budget. Even though there are real differences, in the short term they are not widely at odds. In 2013, Ryan's budget would be about 5 percent smalle than Obama's budget, and it would grow a couple of percent slower each year. After 10 years, government would be smaller under Ryan, but it would still consume a larger share of national output than when Slick Willy left office.

Obama exaggerated these modest differences into a Grand Canyon sized chasm. Obama misleadingly charged that under Ryan's budget, 10 million college students would get their financial aid packages cut by \$1,000, Alzheimer's research would be slashed, and 200,000 children would lose their chance to enter Head Start.

Where did the President get these numbers? He made them up. He also used some assumptions that are not found in the Ryan budget. Regarding Ryan's Medicare pro-

posal, Obama, once again resorting to scare tactics, said that it "will ultimately end Medicare as we know it." When Ryan first proposed a ver-sion of this budget in 2011, Politifact,

the truth-checking organization, honored this claim with its "Lie of the Year" award. Since then Ryan has modified his Medicare program, and it has

phase in a premium support option, in which the government would give people money to buy insurance. This part of the plan's effectiveness is unproven. However, experts claim that it is a time-tested and respectable proposal, and has their support. I'm pretty sure the tea party types may look somewhat askance upon

budget as some sort of hideous beas from the lunatic fringe, even though there are a few scattered, hither, and yon, throughout both parties. He made a series of accusations that have been effectively parried by supporters of Ryan. He claimed that the Ryan plan would allow the insurance companies select the healthiest seniors (actually there is specific verbiage in the plan that prevents this); and, the plan would mean lower benefits for seniors, when the plan would guarantee seniors the equivalent of current benefits - and give them addi-tional options.

Although I find Representative Ryan to be as tasteful as a plateful of fire ants, and have some issues with his plan, he has taken a big step toward finding a solution to our fiscal problems. He has proposed vital entitlement reforms which the Democrats refuse to do. He has proposed meaningful tax reform nething the Democrats seem unwill-

ing to do.

If we are to avoid a fiscal disaster of epic proportions, we have to do these things. The reality is that there is no one-party solution. There has to be a merger of practical ideas from both parties, which is about as easy as herding

Stupid, ignorant speeches, like the one the president made to the newspaper editors, make it seem as if he doesn't fully understand the seriousness and scope of the existential threat facing us



JOBS Act step in right direction

In a rare moment of bipartisanship in Washington, The Jumpstart Our Busi-ness Startups (JOBS) Act beat the odds and was signed into law recently, after passing both Houses of Congress by overwhelming margins.

The JOBS Act reduces burdensome and outdated regulations, and will help small businesses, entrepreneurs, and start-up companies to do what they do start-up companies to do what they do best: innovate, grow, and create jobs. I authored one of the key sections of the JOBS Act. My JOBS Act provision will enable community banks to raise more capital that can be loaned to small businesses, by increasing the number of bank shareholders permitted to invest from 500 to 2,000, without costly approvals by the Securities and Exchange Com-

When President Obama signed the JOBS Act into law a couple weeks ago, he emphasized the importance of America's entrepreneurs and small busi-nesses, saying, "America has always had the most daring entrepreneurs in the world... when their businesses take off, more people become employed." And he pledged that, "We're going to have to keep working together so that we can keep moving the economy forward."

Nevertheless, five days later, the President went off in the wrong direct tion – championing the so-called "Buf-fett Rule" tax, and pushing the Senate to approve that tax as soon as possible. Ironically, the Buffett Tax would punish the very job creators that the President said we should encourage to expand and hire **comment** more people.



Ünlike the JOBS Act, which encourages more opportunities for start-up businesses and entrepreneurs, the Buffett Tax would do just the opposite. If the Buffett Tax becomes law, what could be the next Google, Dell Computer, or Facebook might never get the chance to move

beyond a business plan or mom's garage
The Buffett Tax is a roundabout way of raising the capital gains tax on investors who are willing to take the risk of providing seed money for early-stage start-up businesses, particularly for tech start-ups. If and when one of these new enterprises becomes successful enough enterprises becomes successful enough to be acquired or go public, the Buffett Tax would take a much bigger bite out of investors' profits. This would discour-age risk-taking, and drain away private investment capital that entrepreneurs and start-up businesses must have

The President argued initially that the Buffett Tax is needed for deficit reduction. But the U.S. Treasury Department estimates that the Buffett

Tax would raise no more than \$5 billion annually. That's less than one half-percent of this fiscal year's \$1.2 trillion deficit, and barely a drop in the \$15+ trillion dollar ocean of national debt. But it's a crucial \$5 billion that the President would drain from the pool of private

capital available to help entrepreneurs.

Even after the President conceded his tax proposal would have no impact on deficit reductions, he has continued to argue the Buffett Tax should be enacted as a matter of "fairness." In other words, big tax increases on small businesses and on investors who fund start-up companies – the same businesses that he described when signing the JOBS Act as responsible "for almost every new job created in America." That doesn't seem "fair" to the millions of Americans who are looking for jobs

Our economy has been the most dynamic job-creating machine in world history. One of biggest problems holding it back now is an incredibly complicated, inefficient tax code that impo some of the highest taxes in the world on businesses and job creation.

Bipartisan cooperation is needed to enact comprehensive tax reform. Lower, flatter tax rates and a fairer, simpler tax code would unshackle job creation in the private sector. That's what we should be working on now, not an election-year ploy that would make our economy

Renew your drivers license or ID early

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is advising residents to avoid the summer rush at driver license offices across the state by renewing their license or identification card early or online. Residents can beat the rush and avoid longer lines during the summer – the busiest time of year at driver license offices – by renew-ing their driver license or identification card before the summer begins. Residents who are eligible can skip the trip to the office completely by renewing their license or identification card online - or changing their

address – at Texas.gov.

"Summertime is the busiest time of year at our driver license offices with more residents than

or identification card," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "These busy months typically lead to longer wait times for customers, so we're encouraging Texans to come in early to beat the rush or they can skip the trip to the office altogether by renewing online.

To be eligible to renew online, the expiration date on the card must be within one year. When a resident renews their card, the expiration date on the new card will be six years after the current card's expiration date, whether customers renew early or not.

Additionally, in order to renew

usual renewing their driver license Requirements for renewing onli are available at Texas.gov, the offi-cial website of the State of Texas. (Licenses must be renewed in person every 12 years, so an updated photo

can be taken and eyesight tested.)

The renewal fee is the same for online, in-person, and telephone renewals. Through Texas.gov, residents can also renew their vehicle registration, apply for a concealed handgun license, request a copy of their birth certificate or driving record, and link to additional official state government websites. Customers may obtain a replacement driver license or identification card online if they are able to provide the 20 character code on the front of their current license or card.

Prairie chicken conservation funds available

TEMPLE – Private landowners and operators in the Southern Plains and Panhandle regions of Texas have an opportunity to apply for a new conservation funding source announced recently by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar.

Texas agriculture producers may sign up to manage and restore high-priority habitats for the lesser prairie chicken within the eligible Texas counties. The targeted Texas counties include: Ochiltree, Lip-scomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth,

Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Bailey, Lamb, Cochran, Hockley, Yoakum, Terry, Gaines and Oldham.

The announcement of the Working Lands for Wildlife partnership creates a \$33 million partnership with farmers, ranchers and forest landowners to use inpovative. forest landowners to use innovative approaches to restore and protect the habitats for wildlife, including seven at risk species and other vulnerable game species.

The targeted at-risk species in Texas, the lesser prairie chicken, is a ground-nesting bird native to the a ground-nessing bird harve to the rangelands of Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas. In the spring during the lesser prai-rie chickens' breeding season, the birds gather on leeks or "booming" grounds to display unique court-

Lesser prairie chicken populations declined dramatically during the past several decades due to loss of native prairie, habitat fragmentation, and degradation of habitat on

both private and public lands.

With more than 90 percent
of the lesser prairie chicken habitat occurring on private lands, the USDA Natural Resources Conserva-tion Service (NRCS) and its partners, which include Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, have taken a proactive and targeted approach to

In 2011, NRCS launched the Lesser Prairie Chicken Initiative (LPCI) to focus technical and finanresources on improving lesser rie chicken habitat. Working Lands for Wildlife will complement the existing LPCI by providing addi-

tional targeted funding to help farmers and ranchers enhance, restore and protect habitat for lesser prairie chicken, and increase landowner confidence that the conservation practices they volunteer to imple-

ent will not harm the species or its

habitat.

"The aim of the program is to lars and wildlife expertise on the recovery of this at-risk species," says Salvador Salinas, state conserva-tionist for the NRCS in Texas. "Our mission is to provide financial and technical assistance to help private landowners and other producers voluntarily restore or enhance their land to create a more sustainable habitat for the lesser prairie chicken, while ensuring the viability of farming and

ranching in Texas."

Through the LPCI and Working Lands for Wildlife, NRCS offers landowners up to 75 percent financial assistance for the installation of conservation practices that promote healthy grazing lands and are also beneficial for the lesser prairie chicken. These practices include prescribed grazing, upland wildlife habitat management, brush management, prescribed burning and range planting, and obstruction removal.

"While we have had the LPCI program available in the past through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), we are eager to let private landowners know of this new opportunity for focused conservation planning and funding through the Wildlife Habitat Incen-tives Program (WHIP)," Salinas

says.

"We are excited about this

improve habitat for the lesser prairie chicken," says Don Wilhelm, State Coordinator for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's Partners for Fish and Wildlife Programs in Texas.

"We are pleased that Texas landowners, working with the part-ners in this effort, have an opportu-nity to make some improvements on their land that will also benefit the lesser prairie chicken," says Ross Melinchuk, Deputy Executive Direc-tor for Natural Resources, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Our hope is that many landowners will take advantage of the extra funding available to create more contigu-

ous habitat for this special bird."

Interested persons should visit their local NRCS office to fill out an application. A cutoff date of Monday, April 30, has been set to rank eligible applications for funding in the first sign-up period. If funds remain, a second sign-up period will be held through Wednesday, May 30, 2012. The unique circumstances and concerns of interested historically underserved ranchers are also addressed by offering a higher pay-ment rate for them.

Applications within the prior-Applications within the profit ity habitat areas will receive highest consideration (maps are available on request). Interested producers and landowners in targeted areas can enroll in EQIP and WHIP on a continuous basis at their local NRCS field office. NRCS funds from EQIP and WHIP will share the cost of con-servation practices with landowners and other potential partners in areas known to support the selected spe-

cies.



A lot of folks are getting text

messages that their account has been frozen, or hacked. Also, the same with your computer. Some to watch out for: "You have won a \$1,000 gift card from Wal-Mart or Best Buy or any other "you have won". Watch out for "The Facebook International Lottery;" it's a scam.

Have you received a call from Microsoft claiming that errors or warnings have been found on your account? If so, it's a scam. Hang up the phone. Microsoft doesn't need to fix your computer.

The email contains a dangerous link and bogus sign in information. This is a phishing email and is not from your BBB. Like many financial institutions and government agencies, BBB's visibility and reputation for trust makes it an ideal vehicle for scammers. Consider that bbb.org receives over six million visits every month which makes it an attractive decoy for fraud and malicious activ-

The BBB's computers or email systems are not involved in this hoax and the attack has not affected the computer system of the BBB or compromised any BBB-held data. No BBB information shared with BBB by businesses or consumers has

been compromised or caused these phishing emails. "We want to assure the commu-

nity that the Better Business Bureau has played no role in this process, nor has information you've shared with us caused you to become the target of these emails," said Janna target of these emails," said Janna Kiehl, BBB CEO. "Despite our best efforts to stop these fraudulent emails these phishing attacks may continue." BBB is working with law enforcement to find out who is behind the bogus emails and will lake all anyongite action to ston the take all appropriate action to stop the fraudulent campaign and protect its

The emails also purport to be from BBB about a complaint con-cerning an "unauthorized transac-tion; an investigation, a complaint or a number of different scenarios.

BBB recommends all domain owners set up a sender policy frame-work (SPF) and set their spam filter to use it. Using the SPF standard helps fight spam and phishing attacks by allowing email servers to verify whether an email is legitimate. Microsoft offers a simple, process for setting up an SPF: www.micro-soft.com/mscorp/safety/content/ technologies/senderid/wizard/.

You can whitelist the BBB email address so that you will receive legitimate and important emails from BBB: @txpanhandle.bbb.org

If you receive an email saving

with BBB: Look for typos, gram-matical errors, etc. in the text that could indicate it originated overseas. Check to see who it says it is from. Complaints go out from the local BBBs, not from the headquarters office. If you "whitelisted" the address above, this may eliminate your problems. Hoover your mouse over the link to see if its destination

is really a bbb.org address.

Copy and paste the link into
Notepad (not Word). Notepad does not support html, so if the link is a fake bbb.org address, the real link will show up. Combination Offers New Acne Treatment

Recent findings from the Acne Combination Evaluation Study in Severe Patients (ACCESS) showed that treating individuals with topical Epiduo gel (adapalene and benzoyl peroxide) plus an anti-inflammatory dose of the oral antibiotic doxycycline was more effective than other treatment regimens at decreasing acne lesions. Those treated in the study had severe facial acne Treatment lasted for 36 weeks. Before the end of the 36 week period, those who were treated with the combination regimen reported significant improvement in acne symptoms and self esteem. Treating acne is challenging. People with severe acne may try multiple over the counter and prescription medications unsuccessfully. This combination drug regimen provides a new treatment option that may benefit these individuals.

Acne is the most common skin disease. It occurs when hair follicles become plugged with dead skin cells and oil. Acne not only affects the skin, but it can also cause serious psychological effects including depression and low self-esteem especially if severe. Early treatment decreases the likelihood of scarring


CHS FFA takes first

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



 Pay essential family living expenses:
- Reorganize the farming opera-

Refinance certain debts.

Emergency loans can be made to farmers and ranchers who own and operate lands in a county or contiguous county declared by the President or designated by the Sec-



Ag producers can get relief on property tax

Texas farmers and ranchers can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to the Donley County Appraisal District for agri-cultural productivity appraisal and for a lower appraisal of their land based on how much they produce, versus what their land would sell for in the open market.

The Texas Constitution autho rizes two types of agricultural pro-ductivity appraisals, 1-d- 1 and 1-d, named after the section in which they were authorized. For 1-d-1 appraisal, property owners must use the land for agriculture or timber but the lands use must meet the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area. Owners must also show that the land is being used for at least five of the preceding seven years. 1-d-1 appraisal does not restrict ownership to individuals and does not require agriculture to be the owner's primary siness. Most land owners apply for

the 1-d-1 appraisal.

Under 1-d appraisal, the land needs to be in use for at least three vears and the owner must be an individual versus corporations, partner ships, agency or organization. The land must also be the owner's primary source of income.

Penalties in the form of roll-

back tax, or the difference between the taxes paid under productivity appraisal and the taxes that would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value, will be imposed if qualified land is taken out of agriculture production.

A rollback tax occurs when a

land owner switches the land's use to non-agricultural. These rollback taxes under 1-d-1 are based on the five tax years proceeding the year of change. Under 1-d appraisal, the rollback extends back for three years.

Texas law also allows farmers

and ranchers to use land for wildlife management and still receive the special appraisal, but the land must be qualified for agriculture use in the preceding year. Land under wildlife management must also meet acreage size requirements and special use qualifications.

The deadline to apply for productivity appraisal is April 30. Owners of land qualified as 1-d must file a new application every year. Owners of land qualified as 1-d-1 need not file again in later years unless the chief appraiser requests a

new application.
