Amarillo boy dies at Lake Greenbelt

An Amarillo teen drown at Greenbelt Lake Sunday afternoon, April 22, becoming the 25th person to drown at the lake.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said 15-year-old Samairon San Inthavongsy was reported as possibly drown at 6:01 p.m., and his body was recovered at 6:56 p.m. by the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department Dive Team. Justice of the Peace Connie Havens pronounced the boy dead at 7:01 p.m. and ordered an autopsy.

Blackburn said Inthavongsy died north of Sandy Beach near an area known as The Bluffs. He said the boy had gone to the lake with his family and that it was known by them that he could not swim.

"He was playing in the water, got in too deep, went under, and never came up," the sheriff said.

Local man charged with molesting boy

A Donley County man is in jail this week on charges of Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Larry Mario Jaramillo, age 37, was arrested last Wednesday, April 18, following an investigation that began two days earlier when a report was received by authorities.

Jaramillo is accused of molesting a 13-year-old boy, the sheriff said. His only prior criminal history is some misdemeanor charges.

Jaramillo was arraigned on the felony charge but Justice of the Peace Connie Havens, and bond was set at \$50,000.

Lubbock teen dies near Alanreed

A Lubbock boy lost his life in a fatal two-vehicle accident near Alanreed last Friday.

Texas DPS Trooper Daniel Hawthorne said 15-year-old Donald Waldenmayer was west-bound on Interstate 40 on a 1995 Honda motorcycle when he attempted to pass a 2012 Peterbilt tractor trailer rig driven by Tonie Gail Norris, age 53, of Cave City, Ark. The truck drifted into Waldenmayer's lane, forcing him into the center median, and both vehicles came to rest in the center median.

Waldenmayer was pronounced dead at the scene.

City's groundwater topic of public meeting

Almost 50 citizens attended a public meeting to discuss selling groundwater from the City of Clarendon to Greenbelt Water Authority last Tuesday night, April 17, at the Bairfield Activity Center.

City Administrator Lambert Little welcomed those in attendance and introduced Clarendon's representative on the Greenbelt board, Gary Campbell, who gave a brief history of Greenbelt and discussed the problems facing the lake as well as a possible solution.

Campbell told the crowd that Greenbelt Lake has only about six or seven months of water remaining if rain doesn't replenish the reservoir or the area experiences another summer like last year's.

"We've got to do something, and we've got to do it quickly," Campbell said.

Campbell outlined some options for the water authority - water from a gravel pit below the dam, acquiring water rights from

the Ogallala Aquifer miles from the reservoir, or buying other water rights. But another option, Campbell said, would be cheaper and easier - re-opening Clarendon's municipal wells and buying water from the city.

"There is water here in abundance if Clarendon will allow Greenbelt access to it for a price," Campbell said, noting that by grandfathering the permits for those wells and using an existing easement for a pipeline back to the filter plant, Greenbelt could be pumping the city's groundwater in a matter of four or five months.

If Clarendon chooses not to sell its water to Greenbelt, the water authority will likely just buy rights from nearby farmers, and pump the same underground pool of water anyway.

"We're giving Clarendon first right of refusal to sell its water," he said.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd said the authority has

been studying alternative water sources since 2007, and he said alternative solutions are more expensive and would require funding through the state water development board, which doesn't have money currently. The Clarendon option, he said, would be good supplemental water when mixed with surface water from the lake.

Kidd also said other Greenbelt member cities do not have as good or as plentiful a water source as Clarendon does.

In responding to questions from the public, Kidd said the Clarendon Aldermen would set the price for selling water to Greenbelt, and Campbell said using the city's water is only a supplemental solution and that the water authority would continue to explore other longterm groundwater solutions.

Asked about sending the water out of Clarendon or across the state, Greenbelt representatives said the water could only go as far as their

pipeline, which is five counties. Greenbelt serves Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quannah, and Crowell and also provides water to Red River Water Authority, which provides the water to rural systems such as Estel-

line.

Members of the public expressed concerns about equitable conservation measures among the Greenbelt member cities and a desire

FSA allocates 400k acres for Wildlife Enhancement

COLLEGE STATION - USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director, James B. Douglass this week announced that FSA has allocated an additional 400,000 acres nationwide to the State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) program that improves habitat for high-priority wildlife species.

"SAFE is a voluntary conservation initiative that provides an opportunity for grassroots conservation partners to develop related projects to address high priority wildlife needs through habitat restoration," said Douglass.

SAFE project area proposals are being accepted for the purpose of improving habitats for the designated wildlife species in new areas as well as possibly expand-

ing current SAFE project areas by requesting additional acreage. SAFE project sponsors must submit all project proposals as soon as possible as the State Technical Committee is scheduled to complete the proposal review process on May 23, 2012.

The Texas FSA State Committee will complete the final review and submit recommended proposals to the National FSA Office for final evaluation no later than June 1, 2012.

Various conservation practices currently offered under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) are fine-tuned through the SAFE proposal to improve, connect or create higher-quality wildlife habitats by promoting healthier ecosystems in the project areas identified as essen-

tial to the effective management of high priority wildlife species.

Douglass added, "Once a project proposal is approved and acreage allocated, the SAFE program is implemented through a continuous CRP sign-up allowing USDA to accept producer acreage offers year-round."

As with other Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) initiatives, the land and producer must meet certain eligibility requirements. Once approval of the SAFE project is announced, interested landowners can submit offers to voluntarily enroll qualifying acres in a SAFE project/CRP contract for a term of 10 to 15 years. In exchange, SAFE/CRP program participants receive annual rental payments, project incentives and cost-share assistance

to establish habitat-enhancing natural covers on eligible land.

According to Douglass, Texas currently has 76,376 acres across the state enrolled in existing SAFE program project areas benefitting targeted wildlife species including the Lesser Prairie Chicken, the Ocelot and the Mottled Duck as well as other wildlife species that are present in the enhanced habitat.

Concert series to be held in City Park

The Clarendon Concert Series and second annual Battle of the Bands will be held in City Park this weekend, and organizers are expecting a big crowd for the three-day event.

Trevor Leeper of Digi-Pro Events says the first Battle of the Bands drew between 200 and 300 people to City Park last year, and he expects a much bigger crowd this time.

Activities will begin Thursday, April 26, with a citywide talent show at 6 p.m. Leeper said ten people are signed up for the talent show, but others can enter just by showing up at 5 p.m. The talent show winner will get a cash prize of \$100.

Five bands are lined up for the second Battle of the Bands on Friday, April 27, and will be featuring country, blues, and classic rock music with groups from Amarillo, Clovis, Lubbock, and other area communities. Each band will get to perform for 25 minutes, and fans will judge who wins.

"Last year was our guinea pig," Leeper said, "and we were impressed by the number of people who attended. We've had amazing support this year from businesses and everybody in town."

The Battle of the Bands will begin at 5 p.m., and the winner will get a \$500 cash prize.

Saturday's concert series will feature "A Road Less Traveled," a Lubbock band which was named the 2008 Contemporary Christian Music's Number One Independent Artist. Opening for the group will be "No Sugar Added" from Borger, who finished second in last year's Battle, followed by "Product" featuring Clarendon native Jeff Heam.

Gates open at 1 p.m. on Saturday, and there will be booths and activities each day of the events in the Park.

Extension Service to hold applicators' class

Texas AgriLife Extension Donley County will be conducting Private Pesticide Applicator License training on April 26, 2012, at 8:30 a.m. in at the Courson Ranch & Feedlot Operations Center at Clarendon College.

Landowners who need to utilize restricted use pesticides on their properties must be licensed certified to purchase restricted use chemicals to control unwanted pests. The training will begin at 8:30 and end around noon.

Following the training por-

tion a representative from the Texas Department of Agriculture will be present at 1:00 p.m. to administer the certification test in which individuals must pass with a 70 or above to qualify for an applicator's license.

The cost of the required certification training will be \$10 made payable to the Donley Ag Program. Those that pass will then receive the proper forms to apply for a license that must be accompanied with \$60 payment fee sent to TDA in Austin Texas.

The License is good for five

years and within that time frame the License holder must obtain 15 hours in Continuing Education unit hours to reapply for the License after five years.

Interested landowners that wish to obtain M 44 Restricted use chemical license for predator control will also have the opportunity to attend a training and certification to be held at the Courson Center at 5:30 p.m. on April 26.

Obama looks to Roosevelt in 2012 vote

The 2012 presidential election is shaping up to be one of the most significant elections in American history. The outcome of major political issues such as Obamacare, carbon regulations, and our looming fiscal calamity hang in the balance.

In a larger sense, however, this year's election sits in the shadow of a presidential election that occurred a century ago: The 1912 presidential election featured many of the same elements—and arguments—we are likely to see in the months leading to November.

In fact, President Obama has already framed the upcoming contest in the same terms as those of the 1912 election. When he traveled to Osawatimie, Kansas to give a major economic address, he intended to stake his claim as the heir to Theodore Roosevelt's "New Nationalism," the platform which would help define the 1912 election as a major turning point that put America on the path towards progressive-liberalism. It was during the 1912 election that Roosevelt led the creation of the Progressive Party, after he was rejected by his (former) Republican Party. That election, more than any other, offers important insights into the contemporary party struggle and the importance of the upcoming election.

Roosevelt gave his "New Nationalism" speech at Osawatimie in 1910 as the first signal that he was running for president in 1910, and that he would be willing to confront his own party for the sake of leading a progressive revolution. When the leaders of the Republican Party, such as Henry Cabot Lodge and Elihu Root, supported incumbent William Howard Taft over Roosevelt, the creation of the Progressive (or "Bull Moose") Party was inevitable.

During the election, Roosevelt primarily argued for radical constitutional reforms, designed to permanently transform our republic into a direct democracy. He not only advocated direct primaries and the direct election of senators, but also supported the recall of the president and popular elections to overturn judicial decisions. (Obama's recent comment that the Court will not take "an unprecedented, extraordinary step of overturning a law that was passed by a strong majority of a democratically-elected congress" is just another example of Obama's significant intellectual debt to Roosevelt.)

As Sidney Milkis has eloquently explained in his recent book "Theodore Roosevelt, the Progressive Party, and the Transformation of American Democracy," Roosevelt's proposals—most of which were enacted shortly after the election—inaugurated "a new form of politics" in America. This new form of politics replaced party-centered elections (in which candidates stood for principles espoused by party leaders) with candidate-centered elections (in which the cult of personality prevented the discussion of real issues).

Roosevelt himself exemplified the power, and the danger, of this new approach to political campaigns. The 1912 Progressive Party convention was more of a spiritual gathering than a political meeting. Roosevelt delivered his "Confession of Faith" to the convention on the second day of its meeting, and ended by claiming that the party needed to "stand at Armageddon" and "battle for the Lord." The audience responded by singing spiritual hymns, including one hymn in which they replaced the name of Jesus with Roosevelt! The religiosity of Roosevelt's 1912 campaign helps explain the peculiar kind of fervor so many of Obama's supporters expressed in 2008 (and likely will express in 2012).

In spite of its quasi-spiritual devotion to Roosevelt, the Progressive Party was hardly bereft of actual policy recommendations. The party's platform in 1912 is nearly a carbon copy of the progressive-liberal playbook over the past 100 years.

In addition to Roosevelt's plan for direct democracy, the platform called for "a more easy and expeditious method of amending the federal Constitution," federal occupational safety standards, the minimum wage, "strong national regulation of inter-state corporations," "the policy of conservation" (including public control of all national resources), the ratification of the 16th Amendment giving the federal government the power to levy an income tax, and "a single national health service." In short, most of what progressive-liberalism has sought to achieve over the past 100 years was laid out by Roosevelt and his allies in the Progressive Party in 1912.

As Obama deliberately positions himself as the intellectual heir to Theodore Roosevelt, Americans would be wise to examine the transformative election whose centennial anniversary occurs this year. Despite all of the promises of "change" we heard four years ago, the truth is that very little about contemporary progressivism is novel. Barack Obama's appeal today was foreshadowed a century ago by Roosevelt. In a profound sense, we are living in the world passed down to us by those 1912 progressives.

A Mormon president with one First Lady

Now that Mitt Romney is the presumptive Republican candidate for President of the United States of America, perhaps it's time to clear up a little misinformation about Mormons, a peculiar people indeed. Members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints — the preferred name of the Church, affectionately refer to themselves as a peculiar people.

Folks in Salt Lake City, as well as the mission field (everywhere outside of Utah) are either really excited or really bummed about Mitt's successful primary campaign. Mormons, hereafter referred to as Latter-day Saints, or LDS, consider his candidacy to be an answer to prayers, for a righteous leader of this righteous land. Non-Mormons, on the other hand will probably look somewhat askance upon the possibility of having a Latter-day Saint president.

Surprisingly for many, Mitt is not the first Mormon to run for President of the United States of America. Joseph Smith, Jr., the founder of this uniquely American religion, ran as an independent in 1844. His candidacy actually began to take form in 1839, when President Martin Van Buren turned down the Prophet's entreaties for protection from the mobs in Missouri, who were ravaging the Saints. Van Buren told Smith that if he helped the Mormons, he would lose the Missouri vote in his campaign for re-election.

As one would expect, Joseph Smith, Jr.'s candidacy did not go well. Perhaps the fact that he had married the sweet, young daughters, and more than a

few wives, of the locals dampened their enthusiasm for a president who had multiple wives, some of whom who were married to two or more men. His penchant for taking multiple wives, some of whom who were very young, may have also led to his murder, putting a rather abrupt end to his candidacy.

Of course, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints repudiated, under extreme duress, the doctrine of multiple marriages back in the 1890s. Since then, the Church has become a bastion of conservative cultural values. Unfortunately, the Church's acceptance by the rest of America has not been complete. Uneasiness, if not outright mistrust, with the claims of the LDS Church continues to prevent acceptance by the mainline Christian denominations.

This is unfortunate because the LDS people may be the most industrious, intelligent, and virtuous group of people in the country. Due to their past unpleasant encounters with mobs and other anti-Mormon activities, Mormons have had to become a very independent group of people.

Very few Mormons are recipients of public welfare and assistance programs. The LDS Church has perhaps the best private welfare system in the world. The

Church not only provides for its own members who are temporarily down on their luck, it provides enormous amount of emergency aid to victims of calamities worldwide. The Church's welfare system is so effective that many governments, including the United States, use it as a model their public welfare systems.

While vast theological differences divide the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and the rest of Christendom, there are many cultural similarities between Latter-day Saints and social conservatives. These similarities include attitudes towards gay marriage, illegal immigration, tax policy, economic policies, and the need for a strong military.

While Mitt may not be as conservative as he claims to be, he is a successful, pragmatic executive, who appears to have a much better grasp of economic theory than President Obama. Romney reflects his church's strong social conservative values, integrity, and deep patriotism. The tea party folks who don't know him will probably come to embrace him. Actually, a strong root of the tea party movement originated with the social conservatives of Utah.

So, non-Mormons need not worry about Mitt's Mormon roots. The LDS people may be the most conservative political group in the land.

Of course, I was a Mormon for 18 years, and may be a less than completely objective in my deep admiration for the LDS people. Moreover, if he happens to win the presidency, we'll have only one first lady.

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Clarendon ISD Board cancel May election

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session April 19 with a full agenda.

After the meeting was called to order and the consent agenda was approved, the board members proceeded to the elementary building to view an Instructional Technology Demonstration with Amy Kidd, Jamie Jeffers, Leslie White, Jayne Starnes, and various elementary students.

Among other items of business, the trustees reviewed a certification by Mary White that the candidates for school board election are unopposed was presented by Mr. Hysinger, and the board canceled its May election and declared Wayne Hardin, Wes Hatley, and Richard Gribble as elected.

The board accepted bids on delinquent tax property in Howardwick and Clarendon as presented.

Trustees voted in favor of a resolution to suspend the district's policies on the End of Course Testing 15% provision for the 2011-2012 school year.

A motion was approved to increase the school breakfast and lunch prices for the 2012-2013 school years by 10 cents as required by the Texas Department of Agriculture and Federal Free and Reduced

Lunch Guidelines.

The board accepted the proposal by Texas Kids First for the 2012-2013 Student Accident Insurance and Zurich American Insurance Company for Catastrophic Coverage.

A report was given to the board by Superintendent Monty Hysinger on the possible facility repair and improvement projects for this summer.

The board acknowledged the resignation of Heather Downer.

to focus on conservation – such as rainwater harvesting. The city using the water for its own consumption was discussed, but officials said the city is bound to Greenbelt through 2026 and doesn't have the resources to develop its own wells and treatment facilities and hire the people needed to run such a system.

Mayor Larry Hicks said the city should sell Greenbelt its groundwater in order to help neighboring cities and also to bring the city some needed revenue, which would be put back into the infrastructure for its water system.

Addressing concerns about selling water downstate, groundwater board member Jason Green said he sells his own groundwater downstate every day... in the form of hay, and he urged people to stick together so people all down the line can have good water.

Beware of fake of popular apps and roof repair fraud

Before downloading the popular Android apps "Angry Birds Space" and "Instagram," make sure you have the right version. These games are the latest victims of malware.

What do the scams look like? Scammers added fake editions of "Angry Birds Space" and "Instagram" to unofficial Android app stores. When downloaded to your smartphone, these Trojan apps work by installing malicious codes that will infect the device. It's not easy to spot the infected versions because they look and play just like the real "Angry Birds Space" and "Instagram." Tips to avoid the Scam:

•Before downloading Android applications, make sure to read the user reviews.

•Download the real "Angry Birds Space" and "Instagram" through Google Play, the official Google Android app store.

Avoid Contractor Disaster

Hail season is upon us. We have been lucky for the last few years. Hail storms will come again and we need to be prepared for the problems that also come with roofing contractors. The following advice will help us:

Get more than one bid. It's a good idea to get two or three bids, and compare materials, service, and guarantee, not just price.

Know the company you're dealing with. Ask for – and check out – customer references. Check out any business with the BBB at <http://txpanhandle.bbb.org>. A BBB Business Review on a business lists basic information as well as the BBB rating, which ranges from A+ to F.

The BBB rating is based on 16 elements, including whether there have been customer complaints and if so, whether complaints are resolved. In addition, businesses that meet BBB accreditation standards are shown as BBB Accredited Businesses.

Be alert for unreliable contractors who solicit business door to door with vague information; have no local physical address or phone; or use scare tactics ("That chimney's about to fall") or high pressure ("This price is good today only").

Read and understand the contract and guarantee. The contract should include a written description of the work to be done, and the price of labor and materials. If the company makes any verbal promises (such as "We'll take away the cut tree limbs"), make sure they are in writing. The guarantee should describe what's covered by the guarantee, for how long, and what the company will do to honor the guarantee.

Ensure the company is insured. Ask for proof of liability and worker's compensation insurance. To protect yourself even further, ask to be listed on the policy as an additional insured.

An owner of a locally accredited roofing company says that he routinely does this for his customers. Companies that balk at such a request don't need your business.

Avoid companies who say you won't have to pay your deductible. Doing so, constitutes insurance fraud. Not only is it illegal, but we often see that companies who engage in this practice are also the ones that get the most complaints and are most likely to suddenly go out of business — meaning that your warranty could become worthless.

Put down as little money as possible. The less you can put down, the better. We've seen some repair contractors take upfront deposits and disappear.

It's ideal to pay in stages, but do so until some work has been completed to your satisfaction.

Don't sign a completion agreement until all the work is done to your satisfaction. Don't fall for high pressure or promises to return and take care of final details. It may be difficult to get the company to return once the job is paid for and signed off.

Try BBB's "Request a Quote" service. Ask for bids on the service you need from BBB Accredited Businesses. Start at www.bbbssouth-texas.org. In the section "BBB For Consumers", click on "Request a Quote From BBB Accredited Businesses."

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Reporting Child Abuse

Apart from the anger, dread, and anxiety the reporter of abuse/neglect experiences, there is usually a lot of confusion about what to do or where to report the suspected abuse/neglect. There are a number of steps one can take that may make this unsavory experience a little less daunting.

TAKING THE FIRST STEP

Deciding whether or not to report suspected child abuse can be a difficult and confusing process, yet it is the important first step toward protecting a child who might be in danger. Professionals who work with children are required by law to report suspected neglect and abuse.

CALL 1-800-252-5400 TO REPORT SUSPECTED ABUSE/NEGLECT.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER I MAKE THE DECISION TO REPORT SUSPECTED CHILD ABUSE?

Several events take place after the initial complaint is filed. First of all, depending on where you live, you might report suspected abuse and/or neglect to your local child protective agency. The person responding to the call may ask you several questions about what you are reporting. This is done to ensure that enough information is available for the investigative team to be able to make decisions concerning whether or not abuse/neglect has occurred. You might be asked to give names of the family and child, your reasons for suspecting abuse, the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of other witnesses, your relationship to the alleged victim, any other previous suspicious injury to the child, or for your name and address and telephone number.

WHO INVESTIGATES COMPLAINTS OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT?

The state or county agency that provides protective services has the legal authority granted by law or charter which gives them an obligation to provide services when needed. This also grants them the right to explore, study and evaluate the facts. Child welfare workers then base their decision on whether or not to remove a child from the family on two issues: 1. What is the immediate danger or risk to the child? 2. What is the motivation, capacity and intent of the alleged perpetrator?

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE CHILD AND FAMILY?

With the enactment of Public Law 96-272, it is legally mandated that child welfare workers make all "reasonable efforts" to reunite the family whenever possible. If, after a thorough investigation, it is determined that the child is in need of substitute care, then the child is placed in temporary foster care until the immediate danger has passed and services can be provided for the child and family. Sometimes criminal child abuse charges have to be filed depending on the nature and severity of the abuse/neglect.

WILL I BE ABLE TO FIND OUT WHAT HAPPENS TO THE CHILD?

Persons who have reported suspected child maltreatment should be allowed to know whether or not their suspicions were founded and what steps the investigation agency took to protect the child. However, there is a great deal of confusion over whether or not information from the child welfare cases should be shared. Legally, there is no impediment to providing general feedback to the child abuse/neglect reporter. The most difficult confidentially issue is to resolve concerns of the reporting individual's right to know versus the family's right to privacy. The child welfare agency may give feedback that indicates that the reporter was right in making a referral and the agency will be working with the family.

WHAT HAPPENS IF I REPORT AND THE CASE IS UNSUBSTANTIATED?

All states have laws that protect the reporter of suspected abuse or neglect from legal liability as long as the report was made in "good faith" and not maliciously. If you are unsure of what the legal and societal definitions of abuse and neglect are in your community, contact your local child protective service office for information.

Drugs in the News

Osteoporosis Drugs and Endometrial Cancer

A study conducted by the Henry Ford Health System in association with the National Cancer Institute (NCI) recently reported that medications used to treat osteoporosis (low bone density) may have the added benefit of protecting against endometrial cancer. Women in the study taking bisphosphonate medications such as Fosamax, Boniva, and Actonel had half the rate of endometrial cancer than those who were not taking them. Additionally, those who got cancer while on these medications, tended to get less aggressive cancer. The bisphosphonate type drugs are the most common medications prescribed for osteoporosis. More studies are needed to evaluate the extent of protection offered by this class of medications on endometrial cancer.

Endometrial cancer is the most commonly diagnosed gynecologic cancer, a type of uterine cancer that affects almost 50,000 women each year in the United States. It is typically diagnosed in women in their 60's, but it can occur before the age of 40. There are currently no medications available for the prevention of this type of cancer.

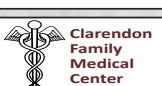

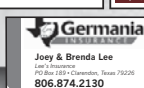
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Burcham team wins scramble at CCC

Shall the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$700,000, with the bonds of each such series or issue, respectively, to mature serially within not to exceed 40 years from their date, and to be sold at such prices and bear interest at such rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council, for the purpose of constructing, improving, extending, expanding, upgrading and developing streets and roads, as follows: 6th Street (Kogge Street to Goodnight Street), 3rd Street (Allen Street to Bugbee Street), 4th Street (3rd Street to 5th Street), Sims Street (3rd Street to 4th Street), Carhart Street (6th Street to Highway 287), Clarendon Avenue (Bugbee Street to the west end), Regent Avenue (Clarendon Street to Highway 287) and Wood Street (Jackson Street to Falker Street), with any remaining bond proceeds to be used for other streets and roads as the City Council may determine, including bridges and intersections including utility relocation, landscaping, sidewalks, traffic safety and operational improvements, the purchase of any necessary rights-of-way, drainage and other related costs, and shall said City Council be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes in an amount sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay said bonds at maturity?

Section 2. Precincts and Polling Places.

The election precincts for said election only, and the polling place for each such precinct on election day, are set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof for all purposes.

Section 3. Early Voting.

The Main Early Voting Polling Place, the Branch Early Voting Polling Places for conducting early voting by personal appearance, the dates and hours for early voting by personal appearance and the address for early voting by mail for said election are hereby designated as set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto.

Section 4. Election Officers.

The election officers designated by the Donley County elections office are hereby appointed and confirmed to hold said election at said polling places. As determined by the Donley County elections office, the Presiding Judges shall appoint not less than two nor more than five qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; providing that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks. An early ballot board is hereby created to process early voting results, and the individual designated by the Donley County elections office is hereby appointed the presiding judge of said board. The presiding judge shall appoint at least two other members of the board. Fay Vargas, Donley County Clerk, shall serve as early voting clerk for the election.

Section 5. Ballots.

The official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION, with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROVISIONS to be expressed substantially as follows:

THE ISSUANCE OF \$700,000 TAX BONDS BY THE CITY OF CLARENDON FOR STREET AND ROAD IMPROVEMENT.

Section 6. Conduct of Election.

(a) All resident qualified electors of said City shall be permitted to vote in said election.

(b) The election materials enumerated in Secs. 272.001, et seq., V.T.C.A., Election Code, shall be printed and furnished in both English and Spanish for use at the polling place on election day and for early voting.

(c) All respects said election shall be conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code.

(b) Such notices, as posted and published, shall be printed and furnished in both English and Spanish for use at the polling place on election day and for early voting.

(c) The location of each temporary branch early voting polling place for said election, the election precincts served by each branch polling place and the dates and hours that temporary branch voting will be conducted at each location, dates and hours for any extended time for early voting by personal appearance.

Section 8. Joint Election. Said election shall be conducted as a joint election, including early voting, with Donley County pursuant to the Joint Election Agreement, to be administered by the Donley County Election Administrator pursuant to the Joint Election Agree-

ment.

Section 9. Effective Date. In accordance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Government Code, Section 1201.028, this Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its adoption by the City Council.
