& Lambert told the Board of Aldermen at their regular meeting last Tuesday, March 13, that the city's audit was otherwise very clean and that made the error stand out this year.

City Secretary Machiel Covey said City Hall had been double paying sales taxes collected on sanitation services since 2008 due to an error in entering figures on the comptroller's website. With Ms. Lambert's help, the city asked the comptroller for a refund of the overpayments and received a refund of more than \$53,600 plus \$1,000 in interest.




### Aspirin May Reduce Liver Cancer Risk

A recent study reported in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute indicates that aspirin alone or when used with other nonaspirin drugs, called NSAIDs (nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs), resulted in a greater than 40 percent reduction in the risk of persons in the study developing liver cancer and an even greater reduction in the risk of death from liver cancer. Aspirin appeared to lower the risk of liver cancer to a greater degree than did the other NSAIDs that were evaluated. Cancer of the liver is often linked to viral hepatitis B and C infections

It is thought by some cancer experts that NSAIDs such as aspirin and ibuprofen provide an anti-inflammatory and possibly a cancer protective action for liver cells in the body. While it may be too early to say, further research may later show that aspirin and these related medicines may indeed have a broader cancer preventative effect in the body. Aspirin has been studied extensively in persons who are carriers of hereditary colorectal cancer for its protective role. A dose of 600 mg per day has been associated with a significant reduction in such individuals.

If you're an average home owner in Donley County you will likely be paying almost a dollar a month more in taxes to support the county's budget for fiscal year 2013.

That tax increase will help support a \$2 million budget that is \$61,879 less than the one approved by Donley County Commissioners last year.

The new budget will require a total property tax rate of \$0.598656 per \$100 valuation, which is up from \$0.573253 alst year. The proposed rate would levy taxes of \$299.33 on a \$50,000 home. The Donley Appraisal District reports the average county homestead is valued at \$32,717 this year.

The budget does not include any raises for county employees but does anticipate a 3.7 percent increase in health insurance premiums for employees.

Local veterinarian Dr. Guy Ellis reports that there have been several cases of neurologic disease in raccoons recently in and around the Clarendon vicinity that has been diagnosed as

Dr. Ellis urges everyone to reduce

Dr. Ellis urges everyone to reduce exposure to wild animals and vaccinate pets to prevent this deadly disease.

Canine distemper is a highly contagious and sometimes fatal disease that is seen in dogs worldwide. Though its nici-dence has diminished greatly due to vaccination, distemper cases and outbreaks are still seen sporadically.

Canine distemper is caused by the canine distemper species including ferrets and wild animals such as coyotes, foxes, wolves, skunks, and raccoons. Animals usually become infected by direct contact with virus particles by direct contact with virus particles from the secretions of other infected animals (generally via inhalation). Indirect transmission (i.e., carried on dishes or other objects) is not common because the virus does not survive for long in the environment. The virus can be shed by dogs for several weeks after recovery

### City sales tax revenue increases

Clarendon's sales tax revenue ticked up for the second month in a row when Texas Comptroller Susan Combs delivered September allocations last

week.

The city showed an increase for the month of 10.21 percent for a total of \$26,327.62 compared to \$23,886.43 for the same period one year ago.

The September allocation keeps the city just slightly abead for its year-to-date figure with \$274,415.32 collected since January, which is up 0.97 percent since January, which is up 0.97 percent from this same point in 2011. Howardwick, which increased its

sales tax rate last fall, posted an increase of 26.28 percent for the month with an allocation of \$1,555.09; and that city is running 25.22 percent for the year-to-date at \$14,134.31.

General Manager Bobbie Kidd said

General Manager Bobbie Kidd said the Greenbelt Board awarded the final contracts last week after the authority received confirmation that \$1.5 million in bond funds had been deposited in Greenbelt's account.

Bids on the project came in well below estimates that OJD Engineers had projected. The pipeline was expected to cost \$770,000 and came in at \$588,481 and will be built by Amarillo Utility Construction. 4M Drilling from Claude will dig the wells at a cost of about \$130,000, which was expected to be \$152,000. And electrical work will be done for \$170,000 by Ray Electric of Amarillo.

With the extra funds available Kidd

With the extra funds available Kidd said the authority will consider increasing the size of some piping connecting five new wells to the new 14-inch line, and the authority is also exploring secur-ing some water resources in addition to the city's groundwater.


