Shirley to retire as CC president this year

Clarendon College President Phil Shirley announced April 18 that he will step down at the end of 2013, wrapping up a 40-year career in higher education.

Shirley made his retirement plan public at the close of Thursday's meeting of the CC Board of Regents, and another longtime college employee, Darlene Spier, also submitted her retirement to the board.

"I can't praise the board enough, especially Chairman John Howard, who accepted everything I

recommended," the president said. "I'm indebted to their support, and my memories of Clarendon College will be nothing but sweet and endearing."

The president also praised the staff, faculty, and administration for their support of him and of the ideas he said they had collectively embraced.

"There is no one on this campus that I do not hold in the highest regard," he said.

Shirley has served as CC's president since January 2011. His career began with six years in

teaching before he went into college administration 34 years ago. He served as CC's Dean of Instruction from 1986 to 1990 and later served as the president of Southeast Arkansas College in Pine Bluff, Ark., for 11 years before returning to Clarendon.

His retirement comes at a time when Clarendon College is embarking on new ventures and developing new programs that will expand the college's offerings in the area — particularly Amarillo — and ultimately boost the economy of Donley County through growth at the home campus.

"It is difficult to leave at a time when Clarendon is experiencing rare opportunities and achievements," Shirley said. "We're planting the seeds for someone else to reap, and I'm content with that. I am confident that Clarendon College will continue to be led by people of the highest integrity and moral character."

Shirley will rejoin his family in Arkansas when he steps down, but he will continue to have fond feelings for Clarendon and said he was honored to end his career at CC.

"I love the people of Clarendon," he said. "They are of

such high character that it is hard to compare with any other group. I love the college and it is a great honor to retire here."

Shirley says he will spend his retirement serving as an interim president when needed around the country and has been offered a job with "Building the Dream," a grant-funded project which helps colleges re-tool their curriculums to focus on student success.

"I will not sit down in a rocking chair and piddle away the days, but rather I will put my 40-years'

Balloting to begin next week

Early voting by personal appearance begins Monday, April 29, for four local governments holding elections this spring.

Balloting for the City of Clarendon and Clarendon ISD will be at the Donley County Courthouse Annex. Howardwick residents can vote at the City Hall there, and early voting for the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees will be at the school office.

In all 24 candidates are seeking elected offices this spring.

Clarendon Mayor Larry Hicks is being challenged by Alderman Tommy Hill, and four people are running for two positions on the board. Alderman Debbie Roberts, who was appointed in December, is seeking a full term, and she is joined by former alderman Janice Knorpp, Sandy Skelton, and Trevor Leeper.

Clarendon ISD has four candidates for three positions on the Board of Trustees. Current school board members Robin Ellis and Jim Shelton are seeking re-election and challengers Linda Rowland and Chuck Robertson are also running.

Six candidates seek two positions on the HISD Board. Incumbents Bonnie Brown and James E. Potts are being challenged by Michele McCann, Kevin Smith, Aaron Harper, and Lana Ritchie.

The City of Howardwick leads the candidate count at eight with David P. Cafferata and former alderman Mike Rowland running for mayor; William R. Jordan, Gail Leathers, and Jim Cockerham running for two vacant full terms on the Board of Aldermen; and Alderman Gene Rogers, Cory Longan, former mayor H.L. "Buster" Baird, and Sandy Sanders vying for two unexpired terms.

Early voting by personal appearance runs through May 7. Election Day will be Saturday, May 11.

Plans progressing for Mulkey Block Party

Plans continue to take shape for next month's official lighting of the historic Mulkey Theatre in downtown Clarendon, and there are several opportunities for the community to get involved.

The Mulkey Block Party will be held Memorial Day Weekend on Saturday, May 25, and organizers say they still have plenty of room for volunteers, sponsors, and non-profit vendors.

"Insufficient Funds" of Amarillo will set the mood for the evening, playing music from 6 to 9 p.m. The group was named the Best Band in Amarillo for 2012 by

readers of the Amarillo Globe-News. Whether you're a fan of country or classic rock, there's a good chance you'll hear your favorite tune when "Insufficient Funds," led by Chuck Alexander with Mary Lyn Hailey, Vic Richardson and Dean Yates, hits the stage.

Howardwick musicians and singers Steve Hall and Jesse Lincycumb will open for "Insufficient Funds" at 5 p.m. and to start a great evening of family entertainment, and folks will be encouraged to bring their lawn chairs to sit and enjoy the music and the celebration.

Kids' activities will be set up by at 5 p.m. and local non-profit food or activity booths will be available for \$20 per space.

A classic car show is being sponsored by Herring Bank and will feature vehicles from the 1940s to the 1980s, the years the Mulkey was in operation.

Interested business and organizations can also sign up now to sponsor Mulkey commemorative T-shirts for \$50 per sponsor.

The next step to "Bring Back the Mulkey" will be to undertake interior renovations, but officials plan to have the theatre itself open

during the Block Party for tours so folks can have a peek inside the building before work begins.

Amidst preparations for the Block Party, the CEDC is disposing of more than 600 theatre seats that were moved into the Mulkey as part of an aborted renovation in the 1990s. The seats are free to anyone that wants them, but the offer only lasts until next Monday.

HISD board elects new president

Hedley school board president Ted Wright was removed from his leadership position last week when trustees voted to reorganize the board ahead of this spring's elections.

The decision came during a called meeting of the Hedley ISD board on Tuesday, April 16. Trustee Karen Watt said she didn't believe the board was getting sufficient communication and moved to reorganize the board with Bonnie Brown as president. Watt, Tonja Ruthardt, James Potts, and Dana Bell voted in favor of the motion, Mark Howard opposed the measure, and Brown and Wright abstained.

Boards usually reorganize after an election, and sources tell the ENTERPRISE it is unusual for such a move to take place unless the board make up has changed, such as board officer dying or resigning.

The change of leadership followed a vote last month in which Watt, Ruthardt, Potts, and Brown voted against the superintendent's recommendation to renew the contract of Athletic Director Darrell Wallace. That prompted concerned citizens on both sides to address the board on April 2, and last week two citizens again addressed the issue. Linda Naylor spoke in support of the board's decision on Wallace, and Troy Monroe spoke against it.

Both Wallace and his wife, teacher Suzanne Wallace, submitted their resignations at last Tuesday.

The board met in closed session to discuss the contract of Superintendent Bill Sanders, but no action was taken after the closed session. Relations between Sanders and some board members appeared strained as the meeting progressed.

The board voted to table the District Improvement Plan because they felt it did not included changes requested at the March 19 meeting. The board also noted changes requested had not been made to the District Needs Assessment.

Watt asked several questions about the district's Compensatory Education Plan, and Sanders said, "We can't nipitick this all day long."

Watt turned her attention to certain salaries she felt should be included in the report, but Sanders said those figures didn't belong in that particular report.

"Are you refusing to show us that information?" Watt asked. "No, ma'am," Sanders replied and said he just wasn't going to report it there.

The board then also tabled a review of documentation of UIL concussion recognition training because some board members felt information was missing.

In discussing the district's fund balance, Watt noted that HISD ended FY 2009 with \$390,000 and that, after budget cuts and a loss of enrollment, the district ended FY 2012 with \$722,218. This was done without a tax increase, and she wanted people to be aware of it because she had heard rumors that the Hedley school would have to close next year.

"This doesn't mean we're safe forever," she said, "but we're alright."

CHS students advance in UIL

Three CHS senior students are advancing to compete in four events at state competition in Austin as a result of their placements at the Regional UIL academic meet.

Maritta Brady placed 1st in Computer Applications with a perfect score and placed 3rd in Spelling, Lydia Howard placed 3rd in science and was alternate top biology, and Samantha Sanderson placed 3rd in Lincoln Douglas debate at the meet hosted by South Plains College in Levelland April 19.

All girls have been serious UIL competitors since their freshman years.

Maritta will compete at state UIL for the 3rd time. She qualified in spelling her freshman and sophomore years and will compete again in Spelling. She is a first time state qualifier in Computer Applications. Lydia Howard will also journey to state for the third time to compete in Science. She qualified in that event as a sophomore and a junior. Last year she was Headline

The girls will compete at the University of Texas May 21, 22.

Keep shining the light on local officials

One of the duties of a newspaper is to serve as a watchdog and a check on the government, and for this newspaper, it has been a busy month in terms of standing up for open records and open meetings.

Last week's column was given over to the explanation of the Texas Open Meetings Act in light of the behavior of the Clarendon Board of Aldermen; and while we were busy speaking out against an improper closed meeting of that board, we neglected to report on the results of the previous week's editorial.

Readers will remember that in the April 11 issue, this column reported that the ENTERPRISE has filed a formal open records request with the Hedley Independent School District. In a letter dated April 9, we requested copies of all board agendas and minutes (whether approved by the board or not) as well as a list of contracts renewed during the contentious March 19 meeting in which the athletic director, Darrell Wallace, was not renewed.

After the paper went to press that week, there was a brief back-and-forth between the district and the ENTERPRISE. Ultimately, we submitted a legal opinion from the Texas Attorney General's office to the district, and by Friday afternoon, April 12, we were in possession of all that we had requested.

Subsequently, when we called the school this week to ask for copies of upcoming agendas and last week's minutes, they were faxed to our office in less than 24 hours.

It should also be noted that following last week's meeting, board members thanked the paper's representatives for coming and voiced their continued support for open records. They have also begun audio taping their meetings to add even more sunshine to the process.

We applaud that effort and expect that Hedley ISD will continue to cooperate on future open records requests. We also hope that all involved understand the importance of operating above board, without hidden agendas, and in the best interests of the taxpayers and the children of the Hedley school district.

The ENTERPRISE is still pouring over the minutes obtained by our request, but we have learned a few things. The board actually took two votes on Mr. Wallace. The first was to renew his regular contract, but that failed on a 3-4 vote. There was then a brief executive session, which was followed by a second vote to extend him a probationary contract for one year, but that also failed 3-4.

The minutes also reflect what appears to be an ongoing schism between the board – or some board members – and the school administration with several references to board members wanting more and more information on a variety of topics.

What this all means is still unclear, but the board will hold its next regular meeting April 25, and we intend to be there. We would recommend that other interested parties attend as well to observe for themselves prior to the upcoming school board election.

Meanwhile...

Taxpayers in the Clarendon Independent School District will have a chance to find out more about a proposed tax increase next week during a public meeting on Tuesday, April 30, at 7 p.m.

School officials are proposing increasing the district's ad valorem tax rate from \$1.04 per \$100 valuation to \$1.17. Because the state has capped the district at the \$1.04 rate, the increase would have to be approved by voters in a June 1, 2013, election.

If approved, the new rate would increase taxes on a \$50,000 home by \$65 per year.

School officials say they need this increase because of a deficit they are facing due to declining enrollment and cuts in state funds, but do they really need it? Superintendent Monty Hysinger says the district will have to "cut programs" if voters don't approve the measure, but which programs?

Clarendon ISD needs to lay it all on the table before voters go to the polls. What are all the options? Are we really doing all we can to trim spending? Maybe. Maybe not. We don't yet know the answers to all those questions, but they need to be addressed. Next week is as good a time as any to start looking for answers.



We need to vote in this election

Donley County is blessed with many hard working, creative, talented, and intelligent people. Unfortunately, with a few notable exceptions, that vast reservoir of talent and intelligence is not adequately represented on two of our most important boards, namely the Clarendon Board of Aldermen and the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees.

Currently, with one or two exceptions, both boards are blessed with a mixture of arrogance and naiveté. For the most part they seem to have a unique ability to crank almost every problem they address into a mind-bending crisis. Additionally, both boards could be characterized as rowdy, raucous, ill-mannered and ill tempered. Changes in both boards need to be made and pronto!

Let's start with our Board of Aldermen. They have, usually with a static 3-2 vote, made several decisions that are not in the best interest of Clarendon. First of all, they allowed their personal angst against Lambert Little to negatively affect their evaluations of how well he was performing his job. Secondly, they dismissed him without first checking with the city attorney. Thirdly, they fired him without cause, thereby costing the city more than \$30,000. Finally, they fired him in a cold-blooded and merciless manner just before Christmas. We are better people than that. They did not reflect our values of fairness and compassion.

Moving on, let's review the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees. That board has lost contact with reality. Again with a few exceptions, they have behaved in a disgusting and ill-mannered way. When the board didn't renew Coach Darrell

Wallace, it was not for cause, regardless of what they may claim. Sure Coach Wallace made mistakes while coaching the team, both in regards to tactics on the field as well as in his interactions with his players. All coaches make mistakes. If they aren't making mistakes, then they aren't trying. If they aren't trying, then they are useless.

However, when they fired Coach Wallace, they also forced the resignation of his wife, Suzanne, who also happens to be a first rate teacher. Both of the Wallaces represent values and ideas that are far superior to the values and ideas that were represented by the majority of the board that voted to get rid of them. He was a good man who was treated with disdain and disrespect by people who don't have a clue about grace and good manners. As importantly, they ran off two really good teachers. Good people are hard to find, and I find it abhorrent that a board could run off such talented people so callously.

As the Enterprise goes to press, that same board is currently in closed session, "evaluating" the contract and employment performance of their superintendent of schools, Bill Sanders. I'm certain that when they come out of closed session and hold the subsequent evaluation of Mr. Sander's employment

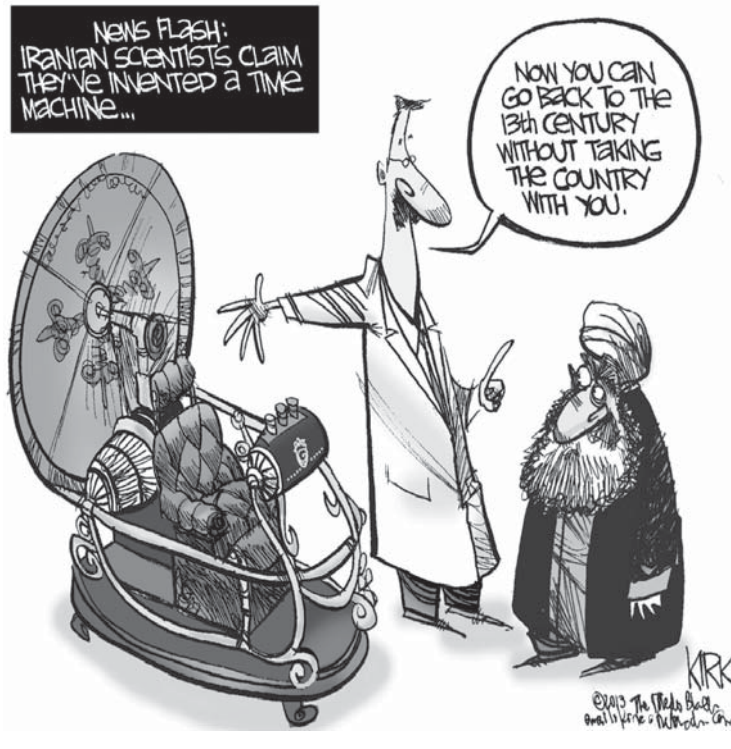
performance, a group hug will not follow the meeting. Again, the board appears to be prepared to run off a very talented and skilled administrator, an administrator who cares first and foremost about his students and his staff. Bill Sanders is a man of great skill, integrity, and emotional stability.

Lastly, the board, in a surprising and insensitive manner, removed Ted Wright as its president, again without cause. Ted Wright served Hedley with distinction, honor, and integrity. He deserved to be treated better – much better.

The Hedley ISD Board of Trustees has apparently not learned a vital element of success. Namely, that you nurture and do everything you can to retain good teachers and staff. Any organization is only as good as its people.

Luckily, we have elections coming up soon, with early voting starting next Monday, April 29, a great day to be a Texan. We, the people, can make the necessary changes in these boards by exercising our right to vote. In the big picture, local elections are vital to maintaining our way of life, remaining true to our values, and nurturing a strong democracy. So let's all get out and vote. These elections may be the most critical elections we've held in a very long time.

Therefore, we need to go the extra mile, and learn about the candidates and the issues – then vote! The future of Donley County, Hedley, and Clarendon will largely be determined by the decisions we make in the upcoming elections.



Courage and grace in West, Texas

Last week, the small town of West, Texas suffered a terrible tragedy when an explosion at a fertilizer storage facility ripped through the community. Approximately 200 people were wounded, and at least 14 lost their lives. Among these are many of the volunteer first responders who bravely sacrificed their own lives in order to protect the lives of others. I traveled to West last Friday to meet with local officials and make sure the community was not wanting of anything in the ongoing relief effort. The devastation was heart-wrenching and the images of destruction will be with me forever. Yet I will also carry with me the uplifting scenes of grace and humanity that I witnessed in West.

Make no mistake: the people of West are resilient. The town traces its roots to the 1840s, as settlers migrated from the east across the young Republic of Texas. Blessed with fertile soil and fresh spring water, the community grew. Like many Texas towns, West has thrived through the years because of a citizenry that emphasizes both self-sufficiency and the importance of community. I can report that these traits are alive and well, and they have been on full display to the world in the wake of last week's tragedy.

Upon feeling the explosion and seeing the mushroom cloud billowing into the sky, people's immediate concerns were not for themselves, but for others. We saw this both in the actions of first responders and ordinary citizens, who instinctively ran towards the danger, not away. Residents could be seen loading their cars with victims and making trip after trip to the hospital. At the local nursing home, located just a couple of blocks from the site of the explosion, the quick-thinking and heroic disregard for personal safety demonstrated by the staff saved the lives of scores of elderly residents.

In the aftermath, businesses stayed open around the clock and neighbors threw open their doors to help support victims. Restaurants and cafes refused to charge for meals, and people from all over descended on West with food, supplies, and a simple question: "How can I help?"

In the face of devastation, the

people of West and countless other Texans from the surrounding area have come together in a truly awe-inspiring outpouring of goodwill and community strength. We are commanded to love our neighbors, and the people of West are showing us how.

I know I join all Texans in mourning the tragic loss of life in West. We pray for comfort to come to the grieving and for healing to come to the wounded. For those wishing to contribute to the relief effort, I encourage you to visit my website for information on ways to help.

I have no doubt that West will recover from this tragedy. The abundance of love, faith, and selflessness that exists in this town would sustain it through any disaster. The best of the Texas spirit is embodied by the people of West. As one resident put it to me, "Being a Texan doesn't describe where you're from, it describes who your family is."

Let us strive to embody these words. Let us not forget West in her time of need. And when we find ourselves in our time of need, may we be blessed with the same courage and resolve that this small town has shown the world.

For those wanting to donate items, here is the latest supply needs: List of High Priority Items for West, TX Disaster Relief:

Gift cards will be very useful and monetary donations can be made through a number of relief organizations

The following will be in high demand once cleanup starts: Gloves (work and sanitary), Dust masks, Sunscreen, Socks, Sports drink mixes (dry is more efficient to haul than sports drinks), Wet wipes, Hand sanitizer, Beef jerky and other non-

perishable snacks that are easily carried, Duct tape, Tarps, plastic sheeting, and cleaning supplies

General supplies that were listed:

School supplies (portions of the school were leveled), Bottled water, Toiletries, Blankets, towels, Baby formula, Baby diapers, Adult diapers, Cots, Urinals, Peroxide, rubbing alcohol, Gauze, medical supplies, Toys, Air mattresses, and pillows.

Pet supplies that were listed: Dog/cat food, Food/water bowls, and Pet crates

Tech support scams are now in Clarendon

Hi, all! Just a reminder that we have local elections coming up. Please check out all of the candidates. We need good solid people that will look out for us who elected them and not to their own interest. A person running for office now must realize that they must go to training. In today's world, not to receive training can cost the entity a lot of money (our tax money) if they don't follow the rules. While serving as a County Judge, working for a Council of Governments and serving as an alderman I have observed cities and counties paying heavy fines for not following the law, especially the Open Meetings Act.

When you are in the Post Office pick up one of the purple folder from the table, they are from the U.S. Postal Service on scams.

We have a report of the following type of scam happening in Clarendon so be careful. In a recent twist, scam artists are using the phone to try to break into your computer. They call, claiming to be computer techs associated with well-known companies like Microsoft. They say that they've detected viruses or other malware on your computer to trick you into giving them remote access or paying for software you don't need. These scammers take advantage of your reasonable concerns about viruses and other threats. They know that

computer users have heard time and again that it's important to install security software. But the purpose behind their elaborate scheme isn't to protect your computer; it's to make money.

How Tech Support Scams Work: Scammers have been peddling bogus security software for years. They set up fake websites, offer free "security" scans, and send alarming messages to try to convince you that your computer is infected. Then, they try to sell you software to fix the problem. At best, the software is worthless or available elsewhere for free. At worst, it could be malware – software designed to give criminals access to your computer and your personal information.

The latest version of the scam begins with a phone call. Scammers can get your name and other basic information from public directories. They might even guess what computer software you're using. Once they have you on the phone, they often try to gain your trust by pretending to be associated with well-known companies or confusing you with a barrage of technical terms. They may ask you to go to your computer and perform a series of complex tasks. Sometimes, they target legitimate computer files and claim that they are viruses. Their tactics are designed to scare you into believing they can help fix your

"problem."

Once they've gained your trust, they may ask you to give them remote access to your computer and then make changes to your settings that could leave your computer vulnerable. Try to enroll you in a worthless computer maintenance or warranty program.

Ask for credit card information so they can bill you for phony services – or services you could get elsewhere for free. Trick you into installing malware that could steal sensitive data, like user names and passwords. Direct you to websites and ask you to enter your credit card number and other personal information. Regardless of the tactics they use, they have one purpose: to make money.

If You Get a Call:

If you get a call from someone who claims to be a tech support person, hang up and call the company yourself on a phone number you know to be genuine. A caller who creates a sense of urgency or uses high-pressure tactics is probably a scam artist. Keep these other tips in mind: Don't give control of your computer to a third party who calls

you out of the blue. Do not rely on caller ID alone to authenticate a caller. Criminals spoof caller ID numbers. They may appear to be calling from a legitimate company or a local number, when they're not even in the same country as you.

Online search results might not be the best way to find technical support or get a company's contact information. Scammers sometimes place online ads to convince you to call them. They pay to boost their ranking in search results so their websites and phone numbers appear above those of legitimate companies. If you want tech support, look for a company's contact information on their software package or on your receipt. Never provide your credit card or financial information to someone who calls and claims to be from tech support. If a caller pressures you to buy a computer security product or says there is a subscription fee associated with the call, hang up. If you're concerned about your computer, call your security software company directly and ask for help.

Never give your password on the phone. No legitimate organization calls you and asks for your password.

Put your phone number on the National Do Not Call Registry, and then report illegal sales calls. Scammers have been making phone

calls claiming to represent the National Do Not Call Registry. The calls claim to provide an opportunity to sign up for the Registry. These calls are not coming from the Registry or the Federal Trade Commission, and you should not respond to these calls. To add your number to the Registry, you can call 888-382-1222 from the phone you wish to register.

If You've Responded to a Scam: If you think you might have downloaded malware from a scam site or allowed a cybercriminal to access your computer, don't panic. Instead: Get rid of malware. Update or download legitimate security software and scan your computer. Delete anything it identifies as a problem. Change any passwords that you gave out. If you use these passwords for other accounts, change those accounts, too.

If you paid for bogus services with a credit card, call your credit card provider and ask to reverse the charges. Check your statements for any other charges you didn't make, and ask to reverse those, too. If you believe that someone may have accessed your personal or financial information, visit the FTC's identity theft website. You can minimize your risk of further damage and repair any problems already in place. File a complaint with the FTC at ftc.gov/complaint.

Be safe out there.

AgriLife Extension Agency taking donations for those in West

After defeating the Texans at the Alamo and Goliad and massacring the survivors, Mexican Gen. Santa Anna had followed the Texas Army and volunteers to San Jacinto in Harris County.

Santa Anna was so sure his 1,400 troops could win the battle over the 900 Texans he declared April 21, 1836 as a day of rest, failing to post sentry's around the encampment. Around 2:00 p.m., Gen. Sam Houston ordered his army to strike, which they did with the war cries, "Remember the Alamo" and "Remember Goliad." Eighteen minutes later the battle was won by the Texans. The Mexicans suffered 630 killed and 730 captured. Santa Anna escaped that day but was captured the next, April 22, wearing a regular uniform and was not recognized until the troops began saluting him and calling him "El

Presidente." He was not shot but was kept as prisoner of war for six months where he was disowned by the Mexican government then sent to Washington, DC, where he met with President Andrew Jackson. He returned to Mexico in 1837, a disgraced man.

The independent Republic of Texas received diplomatic recognition from the United States, France, Belgium, The Netherlands, and Yucatan but not Mexico until the Mexican-American war ended in 1848. Today we still "Remember the Alamo."

Last week our country suffered two great tragedies, the first in Boston and the second in West, Texas. There is nothing I can add to the information about Boston except to say the bickering by the news media about what it should be called, terrorism or mass killing is silly. It should be

called what it is, pure evil and the work of the devil. I am sure there will be a big government check written for the victims and the man with the boat will be compensated well.

What about the people from West, Texas? You know it was a farming community of about 2,500, much like Clarendon. It had a fertilizer distribution plant, much like Clarendon, and the explosion leveled about four city blocks with extensive damage over 20 blocks.

This little blimp on the map known as West, Texas, has 15 people dead and over 200 injured. Can you imagine if it had been Clarendon?

Sopapilla Cheesecake Dessert: 3 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened,

1½ cups white sugar, 1½ teaspoons vanilla extract, 2 (8 ounce) cans crescent roll dough,

1/2 cup melted butter, ½ cup white sugar, 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, 1/4 cup sliced almonds. Preheat an oven to 350 degrees F

(175 degrees C). Beat the cream cheese with 1½ cups of sugar, and the vanilla extract in a bowl until smooth.

Unroll the cans of crescent roll dough, and use a rolling pin to shape the each piece into 9x13 inch rectangles.

Press one piece into the bottom of a 9x13 inch baking dish. Evenly spread the cream cheese mixture into the baking dish, then cover with the remaining piece of crescent dough. Drizzle the melted butter evenly over the top of the cheesecake. Stir the remaining½ cup of sugar together with the cinnamon in a small bowl, and sprinkle over the cheesecake along with the almonds.

Bake in the preheated oven until the crescent dough has puffed and turned golden brown, about 45 minutes. Cool completely in the pan before cutting into 12 squares.

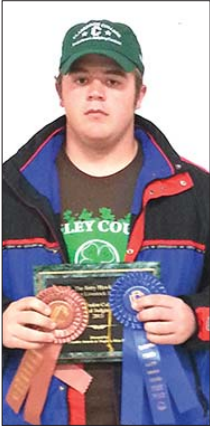

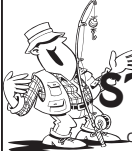

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Drugs in the News

No Reason to Stop Statin Medication

Recent research published in the medical journal Annals of Internal Medicine indicates that mild side effects from cholesterol medication may not be a reason to stop the medication permanently. This research focused on the most commonly prescribed class of cholesterol medications, commonly referred to as "statins". Examples include Simvastatin, Atorvastatin, and Lovastatin. People who stop taking a statin due to mild side effects such as muscle pain can safely be started on a new statin or the same statin at a lower dose. Ninety percent of those studied with mild adverse events who tried the same statin at a lower dose or a new statin continued the statin without return of side effects for over a year. Those who experience mild side effects should not stop taking the statin. Instead, they should contact their physician about possible medication changes.

Increased cholesterol levels are associated with an increased risk of heart attack and stroke. Statins work to lower LDL (so called bad cholesterol) and provide protection against heart attacks and stroke.



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Clarendon Church of Christ IS THERE ONE DOCTRINE?

If we ask that question in the world of religion, we know that the answer is no. There are many doctrines in the world or there wouldn't be THOUSANDS of different denominations. If you ask the question about one doctrine to God through His word, the answer is YES. Yes, there is only one doctrine taught in the Bible. Go to the Bible for your answers. I know that sounds simple but let the Book be its own commentary. It was written for non-college educated and simple people to understand. When someone studies with you, make sure the things he or she says agree with the Bible. Its kind of like the commercial when buying a car, "Show me the car fax!" When someone brings you a doctrine or studying your own, go to the Book!

Be careful of false teachers. There are many who will tell you what you believe is fine. They want to remain popular or make a buck. Some have lost the moral courage to tell you the truth or they never had the truth or courage.

If you have the truth, then don't compromise it. Don't "tweak" it to make it more pleasing to others. There is only One we are to please and He's the judge of us all. Make sure you have His words that you will be judged by. Be assured, there is one doctrine or God is a liar. God would not give us doctrine that changes or can't be understood. There may be 3,000 religious groups with their different doctrines. The fact is, only one could be right and it could be all 3,000 are wrong, but it isn't logical that all 3,000 are right and acceptable to God.
