# **Hicks wins** re-election

### **HISD** voters oust two incumbents

Clarendon Mayor Larry Hicks narrowly won re-election Saturday. beating Alderman Tommy Hill by a 20-vote margin, 244-224; and two longtime incumbents on the Hedley school board were defeated.

A total of 468 voters cast bal-lots in the city election, representing

a 43 percent turnout. Sandy Skelton was the top vote getter among candidates for two posi-tions on the Board of Aldermen with 329 votes, Alderman Debbie Roberts was elected to a full term with 231 votes, and also running were former alderman Janice Knorpp, 187, and

Trevor Leeper, 99.
Challenger Aaron Harper led all candidates with 108 votes in the six person race for two seats on the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees, and former trustee Lana Ritchie was also elected with 82 votes. Longtime trustees James E. Potts and Bonnie

Brown lost their positions with 53 and 52 votes each, and also running were Kevin Smith, 29, and Michelle McCann, 9.

HISD had a total of 170 voters representing a 41.1 percent turnout.

In Howardwick, Mike Rowland

was elected mayor with 57 votes over David Cafferatta with 29. Jim Cockerham and Gail Leathers were elected to two-year terms on the Board of Aldermen with 69 and 54 votes each, defeating William R. Jordan, 41. Gene Rogers and Cory Longan were elected to one-year terms on the board with 61 and 52 votes, defeating H.L. "Buster" Baird, 34, and Sandy Sanders, 18.

Howardwick had a 38.6 percent turnout with 86 people casting bal-

Challenger Chuck Robertson was the top vote getter in the race for three positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees with 455 votes, and incumbents Jim Shelton and Robin Ellis were re-elected with 444 and 376 votes respectively. Also running was Linda Rowland, 153.

Voter turnout for Clarendon ISD was 26.5 percent with 522 people voting.

#### City sales tax income up 23%

Clarendon sales tax collections rmed ahead last month, according information released by State Comptroller Susan Combs.

The city's May allocation of \$42,456.79 reflected a 23.43 percent increase from last year.

Clarendon's sales tax collection is now up 20.64 percent for the calendar year-to-date with a total of \$158,766.95.

Hedley has also performed well this calendar year and saw an 8.27 percent increase for the month with \$749.66 in revenue. That city is up 35.12 percent for the year with \$3,166.88.

Howardwick is lagging with a 5.31 percent drop for the month at \$1,301.42 and is down 5.47 percent for the year at \$6,040.60.

Statewide, Combs said today that state sales tax revenue in April was \$2.15 billion, up 3.9 percent compared to April 2012.

"Sales tax collections were up in a range of sectors from construction and manufacturing to restaurants," Combs said.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in March as well as January, February and March sales by businesses that report tax

## A welcome mat for prosperity

How many new immigrants should the United States allow each year? How many guest workers? These are not easy questions, which is why there is as much fierce debate within the two parties as between

A little history and a few facts are useful in thinking through the problem. The United States did not even have an immigration law until 1875. There were no quotas or passports – people just got on a boat and came here. As a result, America became rich with and came lists. As a result, interface occurrent being with the highest wages in the world. The system worked fine given that the United States was trying to increas the population (at least, of European origin) and had not yet created a welfare state.

The two main reasons given for restricting current immigration are the myths that immigrants take away American jobs and that immigrants are more likely to go on welfare, thus putting an additional burden on the taxpayers. Rather than taking away American jobs good economists understand that immigrants who work create wealth in America, which in turn creates

more and higher paying jobs for everyone.

To explain the economics of this adequately would take more space than this entire commentary, but the truth of the assertion can be seen in the fact that high-wage countries with many immigrants such as Switzerland, Australia and Canada tend to have much higher labor force participation rates and lower unemployment rates than low-wage countries. It has been well documented that there are not enough Americans who are willing to do labor-intensive agricultural work to meet the needs of, in particular, fruit, vegetable and nut producers. At the other end of the wage scale, the United States has a substantial shortage of people trained in computer science and many of the other physical and medical sciences to meet the demands of employers. If employers cannot bring such needed workers into the United States, they will move their operations to other countries or concede the business to their foreign competitors, either of which will depress U.S. employment.

Do immigrants utilize Medicare, food stamps

and other health and welfare programs more than native-born Americans? A recent study by Leighton Ku and Brian Bruen of George Washington University, which is consistent with similar studies, shows that immigrants consistently utilize welfare benefits less than their native-born counterparts. A recent static analysis by the Heritage Foundation concluded that immigrants could be more costly. However, the study assumed that immigrants will fail to move up the economic ladder, and did not account for restrictions in the proposed "Gang of Eight" bill and the benefits of immigration, so the analysis is not relevant for the current debate. What is clear is that immigrants who are working, self-supporting and paying taxes are a net benefit. Laws need to be changed or enforced to make sure that people who are not U.S. citizens do not receive welfare and free medical services (other than in emergencies), including "Obamacare."

Polls show most Americans are in favor of

immigrants who come here to work, particularly those who are willing to do jobs that Americans will not do, or those who are highly skilled and add to the competitiveness and productivity of the United States nerica would be far poorer today if many of our migrant ancestors – even the unskilled ones – had not been admitted.

The proposed immigration bill is flawed by having a quota system for guest workers rather than one based on employer demand. If the quota is lower than the demand for workers, then foreign workers and some employers will have a strong incentive to violate the law (as they now do). The push has been to make "our borders more secure," and it is true that more needs to be done. But it also true that other than by creating a Soviet-style "Iron Curtain" and a police state, our borders can never be totally secure. Fortunately, Helen Krieble, a businesswoman

who faced the problem of not being able to hire sufficient U.S. workers for one of her operations, came up with a very practical solution to the guest worker problem. Her basic concept has been endorsed by leading economists and political leaders, including Newt Gingrich. She understood that many foreign workers do not want to live permanently in the United States or become citizens. They would prefer to be legal and to be able to go home and come back again without difficulty. Under the Krieble proposal, a database that matches workers and employers would be created, which would be open to all who need work permits, including those who are already in the country illegally. Employers would have to show that the need is not being met by U.S. workers. An applicant would have to go through a security check, and then be issued a secure photo I.D. (once a job is secured) as a legal worker. This would not be amnesty for those who are in the U.S. illegally, but would enable them to start the process for a green card and possibly, eventual citizenship on an equal basis with those who are applying to come to the United States for the first time

The beauty of the Krieble proposal is that it is humane without giving an unfair advantage to existing illegal immigrants. It will add to U.S. prosperity – while greatly reducing the incentives for people to come here illegally.

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

## Another group for IRS scrutiny

In a press conference last week, White House press secretary Jay Carney fielded insistent questions from a variety of news agencies regarding the Internal Revenue Service's alleged actions toward tea party organizations. There should be more where that came from because the IRS has cast its net wide enough to catch a pro-Israel group in its haul of organizations that appear not to align with the executive branch's policy preferences.

By now everyone knows that Sen. Mitch McConnell has called out the Internal Revenue Service for its the internal Revenue Service for its "thuggish practices" involving intensive scrutiny and extended delays of decisions in cases where an organization included the words "tea party," "patriot," or "9-12" in its application for federal tax-exempt status. Apparently at McConnell's request, the matter is now being invariented by the Dis Inspatro. being investigated by the IRS Inspector General. The House Ways and Means Committee initiated its own investigation into the agency's policies and practices.

Michigan Rep. Mike Rogers said publically on Sunday that the IRS had "agents who were engaged in intimidation of political groups."

He added, furthermore. "I don't care if you're a conservative, a liberal, a Democrat or a Republican, this should send a chill up your spine. It needs to have a full investigation." Indeed there will be an

investigation. To grant Rogers his "full investigation," however, will require Congress to look well beyond the tax enforcement agency's policies related to tea party organizations. Consider:

In a move that is astounding because it so obviously chills political speech in the United States, the IRS has delayed and may deny the awarding of tax-exempt status to Z STREET because its mission and goals contradict President Obama's Middle East policy.

When the nonprofit, educational Z STREET, a self-described Zionist-organization, applied for tax-exempt status in 2009, the IRS demanded in writing to know "Does your organization support the existence of the land of Israel?" Where the president "strongly supports" the two-state solution, Z STREET was founded to support the state of Israel as currently recognized by the international community.

Court documents filed by Z STREET verify that the IRS maintains a special policy for organizations that are connected with Israel. The IRS informed the nonprofit organization that its application had been forwarded to "a special unit in the D.C. office to determine whether the organization's activities contradict the Administration's

public policies."

Z STREET should be praised for ishing back. The small organization has taken up the cause of defending itself and other organizations that may find themselves at odds with particular political beliefs of a future administration. Z STREET's initial hearing is scheduled for July 2 in federal district court in Washington, D.C.

What is lamentable is that any nonprofit educational or charitable organization would find itself pressured by the federal government to prove that its charitable, religious, or educational goals are not incongruent with the foreign or domestic policy agenda of a sitting president.

#### Thornberry introduces bill requiring oversight of Administration's counterterrorism efforts

"As we work to keep Americans safe from evolving threats, we must ensure that every action is consistent with our civil liberties and freedoms. This balance can only be achieved by proper oversight and accountability. and it is Congress's job to provide and it is Congress's job to provide both," said Rep. Thornberry (R-Clarendon). "This bill can help us meet that responsibility." The "Oversight of Sensitive Military Operations Act" would require the Congressional defense committees be notified of terested

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

over, and we have some new and some returning to our boards. Now let's all pull together and support all our boards. How do I do that you ask? Simple, attend all the board meetings and voice your opinion! That is the way to insure that we all have a say in how our County, City, School, and Hospital Boards operate.

Dreaming of a chance to make it big as an actor, singer or model? Be very careful when responding to casting calls. Scammers are using phony audition notices to fool aspiring performers into paying to try out for parts that don't exist.

How the Scam Works: You for pa

to a website promoting an upcoming casting call. The show's producers

for a brand new TV show. You think this is your big chance! You email your photos and resume to the email address on the website. The "producer" responds right away. He/she invites you to complete an online application and/or attend an audition... for a fee.

Here's the catch. The show may

not exist and your audition tapes will go nowhere. At best, you are out a small amount of cash. At worst, you gave personal information to scammer, who can use that to open bank accounts and credit cards in your

name.

Some producers may have stars

but no contract or see a Facebook page or stumble on in their own eyes, but no contract or money to actually put a show on the air or on the big screen. Others may

There they frequently pose



they also use game shows, scripted shows and movies. Sometimes they claim to be launching a brand new show and are looking for an initial cast. Other times, scammers offer fake auditions for existing shows or movies. They charge a premium, but the directors will never see your audition.

Scammers also frequently use legitimate sources to shore up their

scam. They find details online about a show to make their casting calls sound real. Sometimes, they just steal old casting notices and edit the

How to Spot a Scam: Keep an eye out for the following warning signs. Some quick research will help you figure out a real opportunity from a scam. The business/manager asks for money: As the spokesperson for NBC put it: "Red flag, guys. It's not a real casting call. We're paid to find you!" Also, don't trust a "manager' who charges you an upfront fee. They should only be paid com-mission based on a percentage of the work they book you.

Don't trust a casting call's claims that it is associated with a network or trusted organization: It's affiliated with a network, production company or even BBB. Be sure to check BBB.org to see if the business really has the rating/accreditation

Check out the production company's website and staff: Brand new shows might not have a website yet, but be sure to visit the production company's website to see if the show is mentioned.

Also, do a search for the pro-ducers to make sure they are experienced professionals. Search for the name of the casting website: If it's a scam, chances are there's a warning about it online. Do a quick search and read comments from other aspir-

#### Groundwater district offers water saving tips

According to the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District, single-family residential indoor water use in the United States is an average of 69 gallons per person per

day.

It doesn't take much to realize that that figure can be substantially reduced, mostly with just a change of habits, though serious conservers will want to consider replacing some

fixtures and appliances.

Most residential water use is, not surprisingly, in the bathroom.

Toilets made before 1980 use five to seven gallons per flush (gpf). In the 80s, 3.5 gpf was the standard, and since 1992 new toilets sold in Texas must use no more than 1.6 gpf. And while earlier "low-flow" models often took repeated flushes – thereby negating the advantage - newer dels (some as low as .8 gpf) have addressed that issue and work well.

If you have an older model,

put a plastic bottle or bag filled with water in the tank to displace water, thereby saving 0.5 to 1.5 gpf. (Do not use a brick as they can crumble and damage the fixture.) Make sure the tank does not leak (you can test it with a few drops of food coloring) and don't use the bowl for a trash

Do you prefer a bath to a shower? A 5-minute shower uses only 10-25 gallons. A full bathtub, however, can require up to 70 gallons of water. Pre-1980 showerheads use five to eight gallons per minute. Since 1994, showerheads must use a maximum of 2.5 gallons per minute, and newer models – like the newer toilets – work much better than older models.

Save water by taking shorter showers and take showers instead of baths. Save even more by replacing your showerhead with an efficient

In the kitchen and laundry room, installing faucet aerators on sinks is a simple, cost-effective way to save water. The faucet's efficiency can double without sacrificing performance. Aerators are inexpensive and do not require special adapters.

Run the dishwasher with a full

load to save water, energy, detergent, and money and use the machine's short wash cycle when dishes are only lightly soiled. High-efficiency dishwashers use a maximum of seven gallons per load, some as little as 4.5 gallons. Replacing an older model with a water-efficient model could cut dishwasher water use in

When doing laundry, match the load setting with the amount of laundry to be washed and use the shortest wash cycle for lightly soiled loads. High-efficiency washers use 35 to 55 percent less water and 50 percent less energy. They also require less detergent, rinse more thoroughly, are less abrasive on clothes, and can fit larger capacity

- loads in the same size drum.

  General water-saving tips:

   Leaks should be sto Leaks should be stopped as soon as they are noticed. In any event, place a bowl or cup under dripping faucets. Use the captured water to water plants or pets.
- · When waiting for the water to get hot in a shower or a faucet, place a receptacle to capture the cold water to use in other places.
- · Fill a basin or the sink with soapy water instead of letting the water run when washing dishes by hand. Soak pans rather than rubbing them while the water is
- running.

   Rinse produce in a pan of cold water instead of letting the water run
- Transfer frozen foods to the refrigerator to defrost the night before you need them instead of letting water run over them

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

The most commor side effects noted during OTC treatment are mild and included skin irritation at the patch site, dry mouth and constipation.

OAB is characterized by an increase in both urgency and frequency of urination. It affects over 20 million American women, most between the ages of 45 to 60 years old. Many women who may have waited several years to seek treatment for OAB may now have an alternative treatment Individuals treating overactive bladder with OTC products should contact their physician for additional information n and guidance




