

Clarendon College officials outlined ambitious plans for growth last week with a focus on new and home expanded workforce programs in Clarendon and Pampa and a possible move into the Amarillo market.

Generally, that includes properties facing Kearney Street from First to Fifth streets as well as properties facing Sully Street from First to Fifth and properties on the west side of Gorst Street from Second Street (US 287) to Fourth Street.

Second Stroke Prevention: New Approach

Researchers in China may have found a solution that may reduce second strokes after a person has had a minor stroke. Currently, the risk of having a second stroke after a minor one may occur within up to three months of having the first stroke. Many doctors advise the taking of aspirin everyday to help prevent a second stroke from happening. The results of a clinical trial in China shows that having a second stroke may occur less in people who take clopidogrel (Plavix) in addition to aspirin than taking aspirin only. These results may change the traditional method of care for those who suffered a minor stroke. There is ongoing research in the United States to help confirm or deny these findings.

Aspirin helps prevent platelets from sticking together which may lead to a blood clot. Plavix also helps prevent platelets from sticking together by blocking a chemical that causes platelets to clump together. Genetic testing may be performed before a person starts Plavix to ensure that the medication will work properly. Both of these medications can cause bleeding inside







2013: State lets contracts for city bridges

Trustees met in regular session June to the old one on the south side. 18 with a full agenda that included school safety issues and using an online solution to teach high school

Roger and Ashlee Estlack led a discussion about the safety issues and communications at the school district during times of severe weather and crisis situations.

Mr. Estlack suggested the district review its emergency plans and offered suggestions to improve the plan, and Mrs. Estlack encouraged the board to adopt the same automated crisis communications system currently being used by the sheriff's office and Clarendon College. Superintendent Monty Mr. Hysinger and the board will explore the options and present a resolution at a later date.

July 17, 2013 State lets contract for bridges

More than half a million dollars of bridge improvements will be made in the City of Clarendon following action taken by the Texas Transportation Commission last

State officials authorized \$553,081 to construct a new bridge on Seventh Street at City Park and repair the bridge on Rosenfield Street. Gilvin-Terrill, LTD of Amarillo was awarded these projects for approaches and bridge work.

"Safety is the top priority at TxDOT and the basis for planning, building, and maintaining our transportation systems," said Marty Smith, Childress District Engineer. "Keeping travelers moving safely and efficiently will continue to be an ongoing priority in Texas."

The Seventh Street bridge was closed in 2008 after Texas Department of Transportation officials determined it was unsafe for travel. The pony truss bridge was built in 1908, and TxDOT says it will leave the historic bridge in place but closed to traffic, and the new



The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) has approved a base rate increase for Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO), a unit of American Electric Power (AEP).

In Texas, the bill for a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) will increase approximately \$7.00 per month, or 8.9 percent. The PUCT approved this increase in base rates to recover costs associated with two major power plants and for vegetation management to maintain and ensure reliability.

The difference between the amounts billed under the former rates and the new approved rates from February 2013 through November 2013 will be billed to customers through a surcharge implemented at the same time as new rates go into effect. This additional 7.8 percent surcharge (about \$6.00) will continue for about 10 months through September 2014.




