Runoff election for Howard, Bond

Ford wins election for commissioner

The four-way race for Donley County Judge came down to Dr. John Howard and Randy Bond after no candidate received more than 50 percent of the vote in the Republican Primary Tuesday.

Howard and Bond will square off in a May 27 runoff election, and the winner will have no Democratic

opposition in November.

Howard was the top vote getter with 353 but only got 40.4 percent of the total votes. Bond was second with 230 followed by Jack Craft with 152 and Gary Campbell with 138.

In the race for the Republican nomination for Precinct 2 County Commissioner, Daniel Ford was the clear winner and avoided a runoff with 178 votes compared to 96 for Mitchell Martin and 26 for John Grady.

Counting went into the wee hours of the morning Wednesday; and ironically it was the "early" votes that came in last just before 1:00 a.m.

Thirty-three people voted in the Democratic Primary in Donley County, which featured no locally contested races.

An official total of those voting wasn't available at press time, but the ENTERPRISE estimated 918 people cast ballots altogether, which would

be a turnout of about 38 percent.

Two Republican candidates faced no primary opponents but will have competition in November. Precinct 4 Commissioner Dan Sawyer will face Democratic challenger Ricky Ratten, and Pam Mason will face incumbent Democrat Connie Havens for Precinct 1&2 Justice of the Peace.

Republican candidates with no opposition this year were Precinct 3&4 Justice of the Peace Denise

Bertrand and County Treasurer Wanda Smith.

County & District Clerk Fay Vargas ran on the Democratic ticket and has no Republican challenger this fall.

Katherine Williams won as a write-in candidate for Republican County Chair.

Also of local interest, Clarendon Congressman Mac Thornberry fended off two Republican challengers in his re-election bid.

City finalizes street project

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen are expected to consider bids on a street curbing and paving project next month after they approved the scope of the project last Tuesday, February 25.

City engineer Clayton Scales reviewed plans for the project, and the board discussed curb placements and street widths. Officials will likely place bid notices for the project next week with bids tentatively being due back to City Hall by April 1 for board consideration on April 8.

The project calls for city employees will do the base work on the streets and for a contractor to perform the curbing and double-pass chip seal on most of the

designated streets.

Clarendon voters approved a \$700,000 bond issue for the project in May 2012, but the project was delayed after city leaders decided to replace water lines under most of the affected streets.

The project will include Sixth Street from Koogle to Goodnight Street; Third Street from Allen to Bugbee Avenue; Allen Street, from Third to Fifth; Sims Street from Third to Fourth (west side of Bronco Stadium); Carhart Street, from Sixth to Hwy. 287; and Wood Avenue.

The project also calls for seal coating Clarendon Avenue from Bugbee to its west end (along the south side of the Clarendon

College campus) and Regent Avenue from US 287 to Clarendon Ave. (which winds up the middle of the CC campus by the Bulldog Gym).

In other city business last week: Aldermen listened to a presentation from Mica Owens-Weary of First Southwest Company regarding utilizing municipal investment pools as a financial alternative to traditional bank certificates of deposit but took no action on the presentation; voted to renew the Minor Curfew Ordinance; and approved a proposal to separate the animal control and code compliance job descriptions and make code compliance a contract position for the time being.

Hedley city, HSD plan elections

Hedley will be the site of the only boards holding elections this May after the filing period closed for candidates last Friday, February 28.

The Hedley Independent School District will elect three members of its Board of Trustees. Incumbent Ted Wright will be joined on the ballot by Troy Monroe, Michelle McCann, and Holly McCleskey. Two other incumbents - Tonja Ruthardt and Karen Watt - are not running.

Hedley Mayor Leon Ward is unopposed for re-election, but there will be a three-person race for two seats on the Board of Aldermen. Challenger Diana Postma will join Aldermen Lonnie Roby and Carrie Butler on the ballot.

Elections for the City of Hedley and Hedley ISD are scheduled for May 10.

Five other local governments will be canceling their elections for this spring as candidates for each of those boards are unopposed.

The City of Clarendon will, however, get a new face on its board. With three seats available this spring, Aldermen Beverly Burrow and Larry Jeffers both signed up for re-election, but Alderman Will Thompson is not seeking another term in office. John Lockhart will take Thompson's seat on the board.

Howardwick will lose two current aldermen, but they will be replaced by two former mayors, H.L. Baird and Sam Grider, who joined incumbent Alderman Robert Brewster in signing up for three available seats. Aldermen Gene Rogers and Corrine Loggan did not seek re-election.

It will just be familiar faces on the Clarendon College Board of Regents where incumbents Dr. John Howard, Dr. Bill Sansing, and Jack Moreman were the only ones to sign up for office.

The Donley County Hospital Board will also have no changes as incumbent Directors Jan Farris, Jeannie Owens, Mark C. White, and Lori Howard are set to return.

There will also be no changes on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees where incumbents Weldon Sears and Renée Betts were the only ones to file.

According to CHS coach Brad Elam, the game turned into a pitching duel and both runs were scored in the fifth inning.

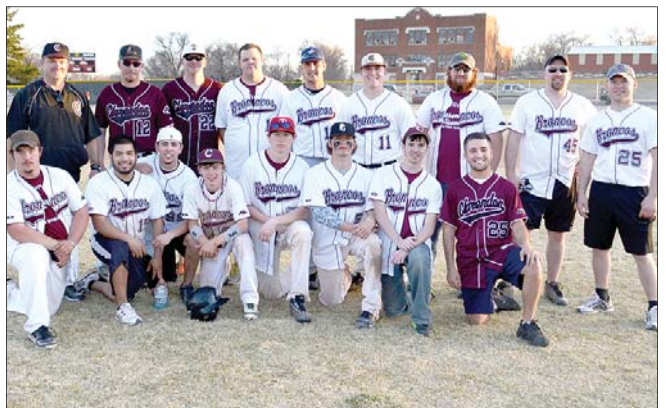

State GOP should work on real issues

A busy primary season is coming to an end... hopefully... as this issue of the Enterprise goes to press.

Locally, the announcement that Donley County Judge Jack Hall would be retiring rather than seeking another term in office set up a four-way race for his office; and likewise, a similar announcement by Precinct 2 County Commissioner Donnie Hall brought on a three-way race to replace him.

As this column is being written, we're still not sure how all that's going to shake out, but what really gets under the skin of your humble editor is the statewide races and even some regional races.

Just like Judge Hall, Governor Rick Perry is not seeking another term (praise the Lord), and that has caused a fruit basket turnover in state politics. Interestingly, there doesn't seem to be much of a fight in the primary to succeed Perry. Attorney General Greg Abbott appears to be far and away the likely Republican nominee, and State Sen. Wendy Davis is the presumptive Democratic nominee at this point. And given our state's record, Davis has her work cut out for her.

But for all the other state offices, the primary has turned into a political feeding frenzy among the members of the ruling party. Take the Republicans... please.

Candidates for lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, and agriculture commissioner have all been working very hard to "out conservative" each other to secure the votes of hard-working Texans. One candidate believes in God, but another believes in a "loving" God, and still another acts like he single-handedly put prayer back in schools when we all know that students have prayed as long as tests have been given.

When they aren't thumping Bibles, they are thumping President Obama. And while I don't have a problem bashing B.O., a candidate's dislike of the president tells us very little about how he will handle his state duties.

Dan Branch, for example, toots his religious horn pretty loudly while running for attorney general, but that tells us nothing of what – if anything – he would do to go after deadbeat dads for child support or enforce the Texas Open Meetings and Open Records laws. The AG has important state duties to perform, and coming up with Sunday school curriculum isn't one of them.

Todd Staples came to Clarendon several months ago in his quest to be the next lieutenant governor and spent a lot of time talking about his writing and research on securing the Texas border with Mexico, but how that relates to his current job as ag commissioner or the bigger job that he's pursuing remains a mystery. The lieutenant governor is a powerful position, but he doesn't oversee border control.

This frustration with state Republicans is something I've had for a long time. Twenty years ago when I was in College Republicans at Texas Tech, I found a lot of like-minded individuals in CRs and in the Lubbock County party who wanted limited government and low taxes. But then there were the Eagle Forum types who couldn't think of any issue other than abortion and the Moral Majority types who only looked at things in terms of their religion.

There were also those who couldn't separate state issues from federal issues. The federal government, for instance, has no business trying to set, fund, or ramrod education; but schools are one of the state's most essential duties. Cutting school funding doesn't impress me in the least at the state level. It impresses me even less when a state politician brags about cutting state spending (on the back of education) and works even harder as advancing a social agenda.

To paraphrase what one level-headed politician told me a couple of years ago, "the guys don't keep me up at night," but worrying about whether community colleges and public schools are fully funded does get my attention because those issues have real, immediate, and lasting consequences for this community and our entire state. The fact that you never raised taxes just irritates the fire out of me if it meant Clarendon College had to lay off six employees.

Wouldn't it be nice if political discussions for state office could focus on real issues facing Texans that the state can do something about? Wouldn't it be lovely if we could hear real ideas on the fair and equitable way to fund public schools or how we can address water and transportation issues for all Texans? How about we do something to fix services for children so that abused kids don't fall through the cracks and end up further abused or worse?

Instead, we get inundated by robo-calls at dinner time from Republicans telling us how they love God and oppose Obamacare. Great. I do, too. But unless you're running for Congress, shut up about it and talk about how we can make Texas better.

The federal government should be small and limited. It is over-reaching and abusive and should be cut down to size. But the state government has a much broader responsibility. It's time Texas Republicans understood that and started taking care of business.

Make social programs work better

Guns up! Give me an "amen!" Let me hear it loud and clear. Yes, indeed, I'm back. The surgery to reconnect my "plumbing" was a success, and I'm slowly regaining my health. Even though it was painful, I'm grateful that my surgery was performed by the excellent team of surgeons from Texas Tech University Health Science Center in Amarillo. Things went great, and Mother Nature, aided by the passage of time, is steadily healing my body.

Meanwhile, while enduring the horrible medical crisis that almost took my life, I have had some quality time to contemplate and ponder the mysteries of the ever increasing American social and economic inequality. There is little doubt that our social and economic inequalities are increasing with each passing year. Not surprisingly, the Republican mindset continues to cast aspersions upon federal efforts to alleviate poverty and inequality.

For example, recently Paul Ryan, the House Budget Committee Chairman, once again provided the Republicans with the intellectual foundation needed to belittle many of our antipoverty programs. I have little doubt that LBJ is spinning in his grave. Unfortunately, most Congressional Republicans still desperately want to eviscerate federal

programs like Medicaid, Head Start, and food stamps.

Just yesterday Mr. Ryan submitted a 200 page report that finds flaws with almost every attempt that the government has made to relieve poverty and its effects since the 1960s, way back when I was in college. This report will like become the Magnus Opus for his budget proposal to cut financing for these programs, and the Republicans are incredibly grateful that they can now refer to a written document when their votes are challenged on the campaign trail. As Oklahoma Representative Tom Cole said, "Paul Ryan remains our big-ideas guy."

It makes no matter to them that Mr. Ryan's ideas are small, stale, and depleted. This report actually says that there are scores of duplicative antipoverty programs, and since poverty still exists they are obviously wasteful and ineffective. "Federal programs are not only failing to address the problem," it says, "they are also in some significant

respects making it worse."

Unfortunately, in order to fit that broad and unsupportable argument, Mr. Ryan then begins to distort the facts to fit his position. For all of Medicaid's billions, the report claims, its recipients are less healthy than people on private insurance or Medicare! It is true, but not exactly surprising because Medicaid cares for the nation's poorest residents, many of whom come from troubled backgrounds and have trouble attending to their own needs. Even so, that is no reason to dump the program onto the states in the form of a block grant. Medicaid has actually made millions of low-income people healthier, and its expansions have dramatically reduced infant mortality and childhood deaths.

Sure, it's easy to find flaws or waste in any government program, but the proper response is to fix those flaws, not throw entire programs away, as Mr. Ryan the his party have repeatedly suggested. Republicans complain ad nauseum about the flaws in health care reform, but their sole solution is to repeal the entire program, not improve it. Republicans have shown no interest in making social programs work better. That attitude needs to change if they wish to remain relevant.



Let's hear it for the butterflies

Let's face it. When national leaders agree to attend summit meetings, we don't expect many tangible and/or desirable results. More likely, whatever proposals are on the table will cost billions, take great chunks of time and eventually run off the tracks.

Additional probable results include ill will, insincere apologies and/or posturing, not to mention much media window dressing. Often, leaders wish they hadn't even called the summit. It's rare indeed when biblical admonition gets much traction. One that comes to mind immediately is Isaiah's quote from the Lord: "Come, now, let us reason together..."

Hope springs eternal that reason and common sense will prevail. Both seem to be infrequently applied—wherever we live or wherever summits occur.

How refreshing, then, is the current announcement that should set our hearts aflutter. At the recent confab in Toluca, Mexico, that country's President, Enrique Peña Nieto; US President Barack Obama and Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper seemed to have unanimous resolve to tackle a problem faced by all three countries.

We're flat out running out of monarch butterflies. The leaders didn't meet initially to talk about butterflies. But the subject came up when they reviewed the North American Free Trade Agreement, which created the world's largest trade zone a couple of decades ago....

Citing monarchs as the species that "symbolizes our association," the leaders wedged in the "butterfly alert" on an agenda that included weighty pronouncements on energy, immigration, border security and job creation.

Population of the monarchs, hibernating in Mexico annually from

December until March, has plummeted from a high of 1.1 billion in 1996 to a pitiful 33 million this year.

Butterflies covered 45 acres of forests in Mexico two decades ago; now there are enough to cover just 1.65 acres....

Experts say relentless spraying of herbicides in North America is wiping out once-plentiful milkweed, the only plant monarch caterpillars can eat. This is the opinion of more than 100 scientists, Nobel Prize winners and environmentalists.

The scholars are calling on the three nations to establish a "milkweed corridor" that could put an end to what, in effect, amounts to starvation for many of the world's most beautiful creatures. They advise massive planting of milkweed along roadsides—and in toxin-free buffer zones—in all three countries. Thus, when butterflies make their 3,000-mile migrations, there should be plenty of milkweed to sustain them—if they stay on course....

In just five years, we'll observe the 50th anniversary of a long-running Broadway hit (later a heralded movie), Butterflies Are Free.

Perhaps a worthy goal to coincide with that milestone would be the announcement that monarch butterfly numbers are soaring, maybe even nearing the one billion mark.

Sure, we've got problems with border crossings, but they shouldn't apply to butterflies. If they, in "butterfly talk," ask, "Got milkweed?," each country should have a "yes" answer. Maybe wives of the presidents will

take this project on; Lady Bird Johnson would have!

If the leaders piddle around on this problem, international landscapes could one day be barren of monarchs. How sad.

I guess it's too late for the experts to help restore fireflies. (OK, "lightning bugs" if that's what you called them.) Maybe that can be considered at a later summit. (And no, we don't want the leaders squabbling over whether to offer little government-provided feedbags for the monarchs to eat from during their migration. What we do want is for them to take the problem seriously. At an earlier summit, upon learning the whooping crane population had dipped under 100, one wisecrack suggested gathering up regular cranes, and teaching them to whoop.)

Humankind remains fascinated by God's creatures, particularly, I think, the ones that fly, with feathers or otherwise....

I don't know very many butterfly stories, but a boiler plate, garden variety and well-worn yarn comes to mind. It is worth recalling, reminding us of the importance of a commitment to openness.

Two caterpillars, crawling slowly along the ground, heard flapping wings of butterflies above them. "You'll never get me up in one of those things," one said to the other.

Finally, there was the youngster who feared somehow swallowing caterpillars and winding up with butterflies in his stomach....End of the lines; everybody off!

City Hall News

It's that time of year again to get your pets City Tags. The 2014 tags are available at City Hall for \$1.00. The City tags are valid from January 1 to December 31 every year. You must bring proof of current rabies vaccination. If you have livestock in City limits, you are required to have a livestock permit. The livestock permit is \$20 and is valid for one year from date of purchase. Come by City Hall to get an application and a copy of the livestock ordinance.

Come in and take advantage of our draft program. You will receive your bill on the first and the draft will automatically come out on the seventh of each month. That gives you a week to review your bill. All you need to do is to fill out a draft approval. Many have taken advantage of this option. You can have it removed from draft with a simple phone call. Call City Hall at 874-3438 if you have any questions.

Be sure to keep your contact information current with us so that if we see problems with your account, like excessive usage caused by a leak, we can notify you.

Last Tuesday, City Council finalized the Street Project plans and gave approved to the engineer to start the bid process. We will be doing the base work ourselves and contracting the curb and chip seal keeping all of the original widths of the street. We recently purchased a street packer and along with the zipper we will be able to complete the base work in-house. This is the project that was approved by the citizens through a bond election. The bond was for \$700,000 and the City has other funds available if needed. We are very excited to get started on this project and are hoping for a start date of April 1 and completion by fall. The plans are available at City Hall for citizens to review at any time.

The Water/Sewer line replacement project has been completed. It didn't fix all of the problems but it made a substantial improvement. We still have a project we will be starting soon on Fifth Street. It will go from Collinson to Bugbee and will replace 6" cast iron water lines with 6" PVC. We are also adding two fire plugs to this line. The City recently purchased a boring tool called a "Hog" that will go under the bricks and pavement which will save time and improve the appearance of repairs under the streets.

City Council meetings are the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at 7:00 p.m. in City Hall. All citizens are welcome to attend and are given the opportunity to address Council on City matters. Call City Hall for details. The City Council meeting scheduled for March 11 has been cancelled due to Council Members being out of town for spring break.

Beware bank phishing scam uses ‘local’ number

Hi, gang! Local area residents are alerting the BBB to calls and text message they receive from what appears to be a local phone number.

The text message or call alerts the customer that their cards are blocked and they must call the number to “re-activate” the card. The number they are told to call is 806-576-0877 – but could be a variation of numbers as the scam continues. Don’t let the fake automated scare tactic which is being used to commit this fraud scare you into giving up your personal financial information. Calls are spoofed to appear from a local area (806 area code), but can actually be from anywhere in or out of the country. “When you give up your financial information, you’re giving up access to your accounts,” said Janna Kiehl, BBB CEO.

When calling the number provided, a recorded message states “due to recent changes debit card reactivation is required”. You are then directed to enter a card number, expiration date and PIN number. A

BBB investigation revealed that the automated system will accept any number, even a month and year that would otherwise be invalid, such as 4400. A bank automated system does not ask for a PIN number and typically asks for a zip code tied to the card – and that’s only when YOU call the bank. When a bank automated system calls you, exercise caution.

BBB provides the following tips to avoid becoming a victim of this scam: No bank or financial institution will contact you to ask for your bank information, they already have it. A bank will never ask for your PIN. Do not give out account information to anyone who calls you – even if the call is automated. Do not allow these thieves to take advantage of you. Don’t do business with them – don’t respond to them. What comes out of your checking account is your responsibility. Protect your accounts and call the bank if you have any questions about what appears to be a communication from your bank.

If you have given your personal information out in relation to this or any other scam, call your bank immediately.

A l s o contact the BBB and the Sheriff’s Department to report the fraud.

Pinterest Users Fall Prey to Hacking Scams.

Just like Facebook, Twitter and Instagram before it, Pinterest is becoming a new outlet for scammers. Watch out for art artists who access users’ accounts and pin spammy products. How the Scam Works: You get an email from Pinterest. It says a friend has shared a “pin” (the term Pinterest uses for a digital scrapbook image) with you. The email and link seem legitimate, so you click on it. The image is different from what your friend typically pins, but it looks real. Common scam pins

include celebrity and beauty photos, giveaway offers, before and after diet pics and even infographics. The images always have tantalizing captions that urge you to click. But when you click on the image, you aren’t taken to an article or the real business’s website. Instead, you find yourself at a site selling counterfeit products, featuring a bogus news story or promoting work from home opportunities, among others. Scammers use many techniques to gain access to your account. They may take advantage of security holes in third party applications that connect to Pinterest (such as those that automatically post your pins on Twitter) or insert malicious code into the “Pin This” buttons on other websites.

How to Keep Your Pinterest Account Secure: Report the pin: Spot a spam pin? Report it to Pinterest by clicking the flag icon at the bottom of the image. Change your password. If you suspect someone hacked your account or you used a malicious app,

be sure to reset your password. Do this by clicking your name at the top of Pinterest. Then, click Settings. Follow the prompts to create a new, complex, password. Log out of your account: Don’t stay logged into Pinterest when you aren’t using it. Watch where you log in. Only log in on Pinterest.com and the official mobile app. Avoid look alike sites that use a domain name like www.pinterest.something.com. These are not affiliated with Pinterest.

Be careful about linking your account to other social media. If scammers get in, they can easily share spam pins on your Twitter and Facebook feeds too. Check before you pin. Before you re-pin, take a second to hover on the image and check that destination link corresponds with the info on the pin. Scammers have been replacing the links in popular pins with links to websites housing malware. For More Information. Check out Pinterest’s tips for keeping your account secure. Be Safe Out There.

Happy Independence Day Texas

On March 2, 1836, sixty men signed the Texas Declaration of Independence from Mexico at Washington-on-the-Brazos, which is at present an unincorporated area in Washington County.

On February 28, 1836, forty-two delegates convened at the tiny settlement for the Convention of 1836. The purpose was to state their grievances: Mexico had “ceased to protect the lives, liberty, and property of the people from whom its legitimate powers are delivered” and complained about, “the arbitrary acts of oppression and tyranny.”

The 1824 Constitution of Mexico had been changed to a dictatorship by Gen. Santa Anna, the Mexican government had invited settlers to Texas and now reneged on promises of constitutional liberty which included the right to bear arms, a trial by jury and freedom of religion because everyone must practice

the Roman Catholic faith.

T h e President of the delegation was Richard Ellis who named a committee of five to draft the Declaration, led by George Childress and included Edward Conrad, James Gaines, Bailey Hardeman and Collin McKinney. The draft, based on the writings of John Locke and Thomas Jefferson, was presented to the delegation in about 24 hours and officially established the Republic of Texas. With no debate those sixty men signed the document on March 2, 1836.

In reading the names of the signers the number one was Sam Houston, but many others also rang a bell because they are names of

counties in the Panhandle. George Childress was the one who wrote the Declaration along with Bailey Hardeman (both counties). The signers I spotted were Andrew Briscoe, Samuel Carson, James Collingsworth, John W. Moore, William Motley, Martin Parmer, Robert Potter, James S. Roberts and James G. Swisher. If you live in one of those counties remember the history that goes along with that name and without those brave men we might be part of Mexico. More next week on the Texas Revolution.

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Drugs in the News This OTC Drug: Less Heart Problem Risk Officials at the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have reviewed pain medications and suggest that naproxen may have a lower risk of heart attacks and strokes compared to other pain medications. The safety review looked at an analysis from 2013 that evaluated thousands of individuals who took different pain medications. The results suggested that naproxen has less risk to the heart than other NSAIDs. It is suggested that this finding may lead to relabeling of naproxen packaging if the FDA approves of this decision. Naproxen (Aleve) is a medication that is commonly found in many over-the-counter medications and prescription medications that are used to help relieve pain. They all belong to a class of medications called nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs). Other medications that belong to this class include ibuprofen (Motrin, Advil) and meloxicam (Mobic). NSAIDs are primarily taken to help reduce pain, fever and inflammation. Naproxen should be taken as instructed because it can cause harmful side effects such as bleeding inside the stomach or throat, upset stomach, and gaining water weight.
