finance system flawed Nearly three years after more

than 600 Texas school districts filed litigation challenging the state's school finance system, a Travis County district judge has ruled in

In an almost 400-page opinion released August 28, District Court Judge John Dietz of Austin said that the state's school finance system is unconstitutional not only because of inadequate funding and flaws in the way it distributes money to districts, but also because it imposes a de facto state property tax. Certain to be appealed by the state, the lawsuit that arose after lawmakers cut roughly \$5.4 billion from state public education funding in 2011 will now continue to the Texas Supreme Court.

Though Dietz made no public remarks on Thursday, his decision is a reprise of an earlier oral ruling in February 2013. From the bench at the time, Dietz discussed what he called the "civic, altruistic and economic" reasons for supporting public education.

"We realize that others provided for us when we were children. We realize that children are without means to secure their education. Just as others provided for us when we were in school, now is the time when we provide for others," he said, going on to describe the societal benefits of a well-educated population: lower crime rates, fewer people who need public assistance and a greater

The judge ruled against the two parties in the lawsuit that did not represent traditional school districts. He held that the issues raised by Texans

Collingsworth case accepts plea deal here

The District Court heard two pleas took place when it met in Donley County on August 29.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

A total of \$1,000 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on August 29. In addition to the fines, the defendant was required to pay a total of \$752 in court costs and \$180 in restitution.

Emily Garcia was placed on probation for two offenses in Collingsworth County. Garcia pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for two separate offenses for four years.

Garcia, 21-year-old resident of Wellington, was arrested on June 10, 2014, in Collingsworth County for the third degree felony offense of prohibited substance in a correctional facility and another third degree felony offense, tampering with evidence.

Garcia was arrested by Collingsworth County Deputy Mike Warren, and was later indicted by a Collingsworth County Grand Jury on August 5, 2014.

Garcia pleaded guilty to both offenses, placing her on deferred adjudication for a period of four years

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Garcia is required to pay a \$1,000 fine to Collingsworth County, \$752 in court costs, \$180.00 restitution, and complete 400 hours of community service. If Garcia violates probation, she could face up to 10 years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ for both offenses.

War on Terror should have had finality

Thursday marks 13 years since the attacks of September 11, 2001; and as the intrepid Fred Gray points out this week, we aren't doing too well in the struggle to win the War on Terror.

This column isn't going to rehash the events of that fateful day. Suffice to say that your editor – and

most Americans – are still angry about what happened. And rightly so.

Unfortunately, we find ourselves less free and less secure than we were on September 10, 2001. In the name of "security," we have seen the size and scope of the federal government expand to the point where we allow ourselves to be violated at airports

and think nothing of it as those we have entrusted with protecting us have turned their attention to collecting data from our own cell phones, making note of who we called, when we called them, and for how long.

The flagrant erosion of our privacy and civil rights have been foisted upon us equally by the Republicans and the Democrats. And while we've made spying on Americans our domestic war policy, the war overseas doesn't seem to be any closer to resolution. Instead, we find ourselves further entangled in the hatreds that have kept the Middle East embroiled in unrest and discontentment for thousands of years.

What's missing is finality. Like so many conflicts, the only way there will be lasting peace is when there is at last a clear and final winner. We've seen it throughout history. The North destroyed the South in the American Civil War. Before that, the United States marched all the way to Mexico City and captured the capital city to end the Mexican American War. And in the best example, Franklin Roosevelt declared that America would accept nothing less than the total and unconditional surrender of Japan in World War II. Clear winners, clear losers. That's how you end a war.

That's what's laughable about Mideast "peace talks" or "truces." They don't solve the basic conflict, and they let smolder the hatred that is the underlying cause until it suddenly bursts back into flames.

For the US, we probably undertook the wrong tactic a long time ago, but we certainly did not react appropriately on September 12, 2001. So let's rewind the clock for a moment, and install your humble editor as President of the United States, and I'll tell you how I wish we had handled those trying times.

Start with the premise that we have a pretty simple foreign policy under the Estlack administration. You mind your business, and we'll mind ours. We'll stand by our allies if you mess with them; and if you ever attack the United States of America on our sovereign soil or our embassies overseas, we will destroy you. And by "destroy you," I mean just that. We will come kill you, your old people, your women, and your children until the death toll reaches a point that you beg us to stop. None of our weapons are off limits to our use, and unconditional surrender is your only option after our Congress formally declares war on your sorry butt.

If that one paragraph had summed up our foreign policy in 2001 and prior, I think 9-11 probably would not have happened. But if it still happened, then our course of action would have become clear.

We'll spend the afternoon and night of September 11 binding up our national wounds and taking care of our own. But when the sun rises on 9-12, a new world order would be in the offing. We knew who attacked us, we knew who planned it, and we knew which country was harboring that piece of human feces. After we ask Congress for a formal declaration of war on Afghanistan and the Taliban specifically and Islamic Terrorists in general, my first call that morning would have been to the leaders of Afghanistan: "You have 24 hours to deliver to our embassy – alive or dead – Osama bin Laden and his top lieutenants. If you don't, then may Allah have mercy on your souls because we are going to unleash nuclear Armageddon on you and your people. The clock is ticking."

The next calls are to Russia and China to tell them we expect to be launching a few "drones" in the form of ICBMs in less than 24 hours; and if they know what's good for them, they just need to stay the hell

The clock ticks down. We probably don't get a delivery, and we hit the button and then watch what

No Americans get cavity searches at airports. The government doesn't look at your text messages. And we don't waste time developing the Department of Homeland Security... instead we just let the Department of Defense do what it was meant to do... kill people and break things.

With Afghanistan a wasteland (not much different really – just fewer people), we would have asked "Who's next?" and then taken appropriate action if Iran or Iraq decided to try something.

It's that kind of action that stops those who would hurt you. The Jihadists want to consider us the "Great Satan," so we should make sure they know they are in hell or on their way there. That would have been easy 13 years ago, now the cancer has spread. Now, a lot more people are going to die... on both sides... and this "war" won't be over anytime soon.

Jihadists must be defeated at any cost

This Thursday marks the 13th anniversary of the 9-11 attack on America. I still remember exactly where I was when the announcements the attacks first came over the radio. I was driving to work in Boise, Idaho. At first, it appeared that an airplane had accidently hit the World Trade Center. Shortly thereafter, the radio announced that a second plane had hit the other tower. I then knew that something terrible was going on. Shortly after I got to the office and turned on my television set, the attack at the Pentagon was broadcast, and a short time later is was announced that a plane had crashed in Pennsylvania.

Meanwhile, back in New York City, a former associate of mine at Lehman Brothers, Kuhn Loeb, Inc., a Wall Street investment banking firm called and told me that most of our associates and friends at Lehman Brothers were killed when their tower collapsed. It was horrific news and I remain angry and bitter to this day. The cowardly attack on innocents by al Qaeda was unforgivable and must continue to be avenged.

Now that the 13th anniversary is upon us, perhaps it is a good time to evaluate how we are doing on "the war on terror." The simple answer is we are not doing so well. However, the war is a long way from its conclusion and there is plenty of time to get it right. We started out okay while Dubya was president, then he lost his way while trying to get even with Saddam, which he eventually did. Unfortunately, his focus on vengeance against Saddam distracted his administration in their efforts to punish al Qaeda and the Taliban for the attacks of 9-11.

As expected, his successor has been an absolute idiot in the war on terror. After the much-appreciated killing Osama Bin Laden, B.O. declared victory on the war on terror and headed for the links. Several years later, the al Qaeda

related group, IS - ISIL -ISISL – better known as the Islamic State has made remarkable gains in the vacuum that was created when we left Iraq. They are

Pesky germs are always with us

In our culture's relentless intent to get more things "right" – at least on paper - we've marched boldly into territory where angels fear to tread. Consider, if you will, our almost unanimous resolve on a topic awash in the rivers of further review: "germophobic correct-

Time was, we talked a lot about germs without really doing much about 'em. Often as not, when moms issued "wash your hands" ultimatums, we were just as likely to race to the bathroom, turn on water in the lavatory for a few seconds and take a few swipes at towels, leaving damp "evidence" that hands actually had been washed.

Germs today are more nearly given their due. They used to seem bigger. Now, we're assured they come in all sizes and are more numerous than we can dream. Some people still believe and you know who you are - that if they squint hard enough at dollar bills - and other oft-handled items – some germs are big enough to be counted....

One little four-year-old guy, back home from the first-ever birthday party where he was dropped off, happily recounted the experience.

"Mom, we sang 'Happy Birthday' and 'Row, Row, Row Your Boat' all the way through without ever washing our hands," he reported breathlessly.

This memory will be resurrected at every birthday party where he's a participant from here to kingdom come....

My old daddy, a wonderful story teller without any awareness of his rare talent, was a "do-everything," fix-it kind of guy at school during my early years. Duties included his driving a bus

route. Even at age four, I was a frequent "guest," tagging along, unbelted in an assigned seat right behind the driver.



He always by don newbury had a good word – usually encouraging, sometimes funny – for the children as they boarded. One day as a kindergartener climbed aboard, Dad noted a yellowed crust encircling his mouth. "Guess you had eggs for breakfast this morning. Right,

young man?"... "Nope, that's what we had yesterday morning."...

Approaching the subject of hygiene no longer is so simplistic, and handwashing is getting "longer shrift." We're learning there are scads more germs than previously thought, and evidence is "fuzzying up" assessment of bacteria. We now know that many of them are "good germs," and that lots of "bad" ones are important, too, bolstering our resistance.

In fact, the National Institute of Health's Dr. Lisa Hebling believes an answer to stopping the spread of infection may be achieved through "cultivating better bugs instead of killing them."

Alas, the topic is not unlike the imponderables in The Wizard of Oz – I mean, the identities of good witches and bad witches – and from which directions they came....

Findings continue to support the importance of campaigns for personal

hygiene. Public facilities seem to be pace-setting, including the introduction of new hand-drying methods. Now, comfort stations feature automated devices into which we thrust our hands – fully trusting the goings-on inside the unseen and cavernous enclosures. That is, we expect to remove them unbloodied from the gale-like whooshes by cycle's end. (I can't help but think of food disposals during the procedure.)

The most forceful dryers may be on cruise ships, where velocity is strong enough to turn turbines on West Texas wind farms from a mile out, as well as re-arrange vein patterns on our hands.

Hygiene concerns are popping up regularly in daily conversations. One guy said, "Life is getting tougher on folks who skip hand-washing these days. With surveillance cameras everywhere, I'm not going to take a chance on management mistaking me for a shirking employee!"...

Yes, cleanliness is tip-toeing ever closer to godliness. Hardliners say trillions of largely beneficial bacteria are being identified in our homes. (One study calls germs "roommates.")

Bacteria – like cholesterol, politics and witches – can be good or bad. Perhaps we'd do best to simply smile and nod knowingly, thus appearing to have at least a semblance of understanding when - truth to tell - we don't have a clue.

We should avoid throwing the baby – or its germs – out with the wash. Further, we ought to avoid "germ jokes." You know, like asking why the germ crosses the microscope: "To get to the other slide." End of the lines; everybody off....





Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would authorize the transfer of certain money from the general revenue fund to the state highway fund and the economic stabilization fund. Money transferred to the state highway fund may be used solely for the construction, maintenance and acquisition of rights-of-way for public roadways.

appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for the use and dedication of certain money transferred to the state highway fund to assist in the completion of transportation construction, maintenance, and rehabilitation projects, not to include toll roads.3

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

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
