## Sheriff's office to get new equipment

Officers with the Donley County Sheriff's Office will soon be sporting bullet-proof vests and a more unified appearance thanks to a grant from an area foundation.

The Texas Panhandle 100 Club is a non-profit organization devoted to protecting the lives of area law enforcement officers and firefighters by paying for training and life-saving equipment.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said his office will receive seven vests and five uniforms per officer as well as a vest and uniforms for the Precinct 3&4 Constable.

The grant, worth about \$3,900, will let all local officers look the same, and the shirts and equipment should be on hand in about a month, Blackburn said.

The sheriff also said his office would soon be receiving seven Benelli shotguns at a cost of about \$475 each. Those guns were purchased by the 100th District Attorney's office, and, along with the uniforms and vests, are things the Donley County taxpayer did not have to pay for, Blackburn said.

## No comments made at city tax hearing

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen proposed no feedback on the city's proposed tax rate during a public hearing last Tuesday, September 16.

Aldermen have proposed a property tax rate of \$0.708915 per \$100 valuation, up from the current rate of \$0.65. There were no comments from the public during the tax hearing.

The board was meeting Tuesday night, September 23, and was expected to approve the tax rate as well as the fiscal year 2015 budget.

## Powder Puff game to be held Oct. 3

The Clarendon High School Student Council will hold its annual Powder Puff football game next Friday, October 3, at 6 p.m. in Bronco Stadium.

Admission to the game is \$1 for students and \$3 for adults. Admission money will be donated to the "Love on Laura" campaign. Everyone is encouraged to come support the CHS girls and Laura Hommel.

## College rodeo team does well in Portales

The Clarendon College Rodeo Team did well this last weekend on the road at Portales, New Mexico.

Sophomore Colton Jackson Placed third Overall in the Saddle Bronc Riding. He also placed 7th in the first round and came back strong in the short round and placed third.

Cooper Kirkpatrick was 8.8 in the steer wrestling in the first round and ended up 12th.

The team leaves this week for competition in Alpine at Sul Ross State University.



# On Top of the World

## Clarendon author finds her true calling

It's been a whirlwind year for Clarendon's Morgan Hysinger, going from a college student to a bestselling author in a short time.

Writing a Scottish time-traveling romance wasn't where Hysinger thought her career path would lead when she graduated from Clarendon High School in 2009. The daughter of two educators, Hysinger first studied broadcast journalism before turning to corporate communications and later to education. She even took on an internship at Disney World, but nothing seemed to fit.

"Writing was always easy for me, and something always made me think I should be writing," Hysinger said.

She had never tried her hand at creative writing until she was in college, and even then it was just on her own to see if she could. But things began to change in 2012.

Hysinger signed up for a writing class under the tutelage of Jodi Thomas, a very successful historical romance author and the writer-in-residence at West Texas A&M University. Hysinger wrote a 20-page story for Thomas' class and was nervous as the well-known writer handed it back to her.

"She wrote: 'This is ready. Send it in,'" Hysinger recalls. "I thought, if she thinks I can do this, maybe I can."

Still, Hysinger continued on her traditional career route and was near graduating in the summer of 2013. She needed to do her student teaching and finish one class to graduate and then find a teaching job. But then a June writer's academy under novelist Alexandra Sokoloff gave her fresh insight on plotting novels like movies and convinced her she needed to leave college and take a new path.

"I was driving home thinking, 'I'm gonna have to tell my parents I want to do this and they are going to die,'" Hysinger said.

But the news went more smoothly at home. Her mother already knew she was interested in writing for a living, and her father backed her plan but gave her a year to make it work or go back to college. Hysinger then withdrew from West Texas A&M and went to an Atlanta writer's conference where she learned about the business of writing, marketing, and independent publishing.

"I went to workshops on traditional and independent publishing," she said. "The indie workshops had ladies who were excited and making a lot of money."

The next week she pulled a pen name out of the air, "Bethany Claire," and by November she was ready to go with her first novel in the Morna's Legacy Series, *Love Beyond Time*.

As an independent publisher, there was not

a big press run for the new book. Instead, the novel was and is printed as people order it off Amazon.com and other online sources. By the end of December, Bethany Claire had made more money than she would have in the two months of teaching public school.

And with that, her career took off with a series of novels set in Scotland and moving back and forth between the present time and the 17th century. The characters in the books are all connected, and the character of Morna is a common thread among them in something of a match-maker role.

The young author took over her parent's garage for her personal office, and by May she

hit USA Today's Bestseller's List.

Now her mother has quit her job at Clarendon ISD and works for Bethany Claire fulltime to help with marketing and formatting her books. An independent contractor in South Africa designs her book covers.

Less than a year after she started her career, Hysinger has now penned four full-length novels and two novellas, and the first book has sold more than 50,000 copies.

The young author says being her own boss is high pressure and scary but also very fun and rewarding.

"I can set my own hours, set my prices,

## King discusses education with constituents

State Rep. Ken King (R-Canadian) addressed the Donley County Retired School Personnel Monday night at the group's regular meeting and visited with local voters.

The representative discussed his freshman year in the State Legislature last session, and touched on several issues of local interest.

Appropriate to the setting, the discussion focused early on education and federal interference with Texas' schools, particularly in terms of mandatory testing.

King said the federal government puts about \$5.5 billion into Texas schools, and that Washington wants to move the state to the

Common Core objectives even though the state has spent years refining its own skills objectives.

"I don't want Common Core," King said. "I don't want the federal government in Texas schools, and I don't want Austin in Clarendon any more than it has to be."

King also said the state needs to fund community colleges to help get high school kids into appropriate career and technical programs.

"I'm going to continue to work for Clarendon College and all the small schools," King said. "I want a level playing field for all our kids."

The representative also noted that it would be great to see the state's education system tailored to suit stu-

dents' interests and skills rather than a one-size-fits-all approach to learning.

King also discussed water issues and specifically addressed the three-person board that is now overseeing water development in the state. That board is appointed by the governor and is currently comprised of a water lawyer, an engineer, and a business representative. King and others want to enlarge that board to include rural and agricultural interests by requiring a board member for each of five regions in the state.

King said a recent poll found that most people in the metroplex believe that groundwater is a state issue and not a private property issue.

## Cookoff to be held Saturday

Western heritage will be the hallmark of the 20th annual Col. Charles Goodnight Chuckwagon Cookoff this Saturday, September 27, on the grounds of the Saints' Roost Museum.

Fourteen wagons are scheduled to compete for top prizes, and other activities include a photographic exhibit focused on Quanah and Cynthia Ann Parker and a public program, entitled "Historic Footprints in Donley County," which is focused on cowboy and Native American culture.

Presentations will center on "Southern Plains Indians," "Cowboy Culture on the Panhandle Plains," and "Rope as a Tool in Developing the West" by Master Rope Maker, Greg Davis, of Tuttle, Oklahoma. More information on these presentations can be found on page three of this week's Enterprise.

The wagon teams will arrive Friday to host area students for a day of learning about the chuckwagon and cooking the cowboy-way over an open fire.

Friday afternoon will also include the junior cookoff, which pairs kids, ages 8-17, with mentors on participating wagon teams to learn the ropes of cooking over an open fire. Junior cooks will be preparing a dish for Friday's Chuckwagon cooks' dinner. The recipe will be left to the discretion of the cooks and their mentors, and prizes will be given to the first, second, and third place winners that night.

The big day for the cookoff will be Saturday when the wagons square off to battle for top prizes. The trade-show starts at 10 a.m., and museum tours will be available throughout the day. Local and area entertainers will also be performing.

The authentic wagons will serve at 1 p.m. with the traditional chicken fried steak dinner, and other activities include raffles for a pair of Kevin Johnson Handmade Spurs and a hay auction.

Admission is free. Tickets for the authentic Chuckwagon meal are \$15 each and can be purchased in advance at, the Museum, Every Nook & Cranny, or the Donley County State Bank or by calling (806)874-2746.

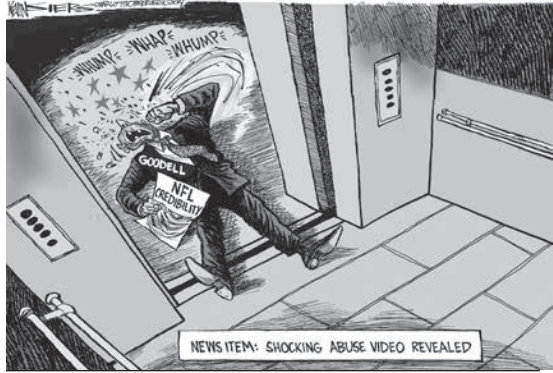
Further, Laura Wattenberg's namewizard.com is a popular resource for name choices. "Lily" is now America's top botanical name.

# Abuse of women, children must end

A couple of weeks ago, when the news that star football running back, Adrian Peterson, had been charged with child abuse, for spanking his son with a "switch," I immediately thought about how absurd it was to charge a parent with such a serious crime just for spanking his son. During discussions with friends about the incident, I took the position that the lack of spanking was the cause for a lot of society's ills today. My friends and I bemoaned the fact that it is inappropriate for the state to intervene in family matters, especially in this case, since Adrian Peterson was such a fine, upstanding man and a great example for today's youth.

We chatted about how we were spanked, when needed, as children. I recalled the time that I received three spankings from three different members of my family (uncle, grandmother, and mother) for the same offense – theft of a candy bar from Clifford's grocery store. I felt that it was terribly unjust to be spanked three times for the same offense. Of course, the first two spankings were mild, a couple of swats on the behind. My third spanking, however, was different - because Mom did the spanking. She may have weighed 100 pounds after a feast, and stood about five feet tall in heels. Even though she was no bigger than a minute, that woman could pack a punch, especially with a switch. Mother nearly always left welts on our naked hamstrings, after making us take down our jeans; and she spanked us with love and great purpose. Ouch!

I still take pride in the fact that I am the only grandchild that my grandfather, Leonard Putman, spanked. I deserved the spanking mainly because I snuck up on him and bit him on the back of his leg while he was enjoying the sweet, cool evening in his favorite lawn chair. I had taken exception to his admonition to leave Mam-ma's flowers alone, lest she become riled and spank my little behind. His spanking, if it could be called that, amounted to a few swats on my behind with his bare hand.

I can say that I never had a spanking that I didn't deserve. Who knows, they may have even helped to mold my character? I did learn early on that crime does not pay, and that it is not a good idea to bite your grandfather, or anyone else for that matter. I fervently hope that my children can say the same thing about the spankings I administered to them. I never left marks (I hope), but they knew that they had been spanked.

Regarding Adrian Peterson, I felt that he was probably of a similar mind about spanking when I first read of the charges against him. Then I saw the photos of his little four year old son. Spanking, regardless of the severity of the behavior that led to the spanking, should never, ever, draw blood and leave horrible bruises. They also should not be administered to the genitals, which was the case with his son. Adrian Peterson horribly abused his son. There is no doubt about that. What he did was inexcusable and he needs to be severely punished for his crime. He deserves to spend many years in prison contemplating the horrible things he did to his little son. The reason he gave for whipping his son was because the boy had pushed a sibling during a childish disagreement over a videogame.

Chance Jones, who was the same age as Adrian Peterson's son when he was beaten to death by his father, Robert Babcock, probably had a similar experi-

# CASA: True heroes for children

The arrests of several celebrated professional athletes who some may call heroes have made national news. With widespread criticism of the way the NFL has handled these initial cases of child and domestic abuse, more incidents are unfortunately surfacing. Until recently, these players have not only escaped accountability and sanctions on game day, but have also somehow retained their images as positive role models.

It seems that the word "hero" is thrown around quite loosely these days. A hero is defined as a person of distinguished courage or ability, admired for his or her brave deeds and noble qualities – someone who, in the opinion of others, has heroic characteristics or has performed a heroic act and is regarded as a model or ideal. Though it's important to remember that there are indeed athletes who are heroic away from their sport and sacrifice time or money to help others, there are many others who are not deserving of the title.

In spite of recent events, many children will continue to view these athletes as heroes. But for more than 46,600 children in the Texas foster care system, their dream is to have a loving, safe and permanent home, and all they need is an everyday hero to fill that role.

CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) volunteers are empowered by the courts to help make these children's dreams a reality. CASA volunteers are everyday community members that are specially trained and appointed by judges to advocate for children in the child welfare system to ensure that children have a voice in court. They get to know a child or sibling group and any relevant contacts in the children's lives in order to gather information about their physical, emotional and educational needs, and they strive to help the children move out of the temporary foster care system and into safe, permanent homes as quickly as possible.

Research has shown that children and youth in foster care who have CASA volunteers spend less time in foster care, perform better in school and are less likely to return to foster care after a permanent placement. CASA volunteers are often the only adults consistently present in these children's lives after they enter state custody.

Each of us has an obligation and an opportunity to break the cycle of child abuse and neglect. If you see abuse, report it to (800) 252-5400 or go to [www.txabusehotline.org](http://www.txabusehotline.org). If a child's life is in danger, call 911.

You don't need to be a sports star, actor or celebrity to be worthy of being called a hero. With 46 children being removed from their homes every day due to abuse or neglect, there's a growing need for heroes to enter into these children's lives. # Museum hosts ‘Historic Footprints’

The Saints’ Roost Museum invites the public to visit the museum on Friday and Saturday, September 26-27, for a special project entitled “Historic Footprints in Donley County.”

This project includes presentations by guest speakers, as well as the current exhibit, “Cynthia Ann and Quanah Parker Photo Exhibit: A Woman OF Two Worlds and A Man IN Two Worlds,” on loan from the Texas Lakes Trail Region.

The project is dedicated to the preservation of Donley County history and designed to provide presentations for the public, adults, college students, and children concerning the cowboy culture of the Panhandle’s historic ranches and the different groups of Southern Plains Indians, their way of life and dependence on the buffalo, and their interactions with major historical figures in Donley County.

The presentations include “Southern Plains Indians,” by Elaina Cunningham of Panhandle Plains Historical Museum, “Cowboy Culture on the Panhandle Plains,” by Michael Grauer of Panhandle Plains Historical Museum, and “Rope as a Tool in Developing the West” by Master Rope Maker, Greg Davis, of Tuttle, Oklahoma.

Friday presentations will begin at 9:00 a.m. and continue through the day. Greg Davis will be on hand Saturday for the Chuckwagon Cookoff with his presentation and rope-making demonstration, and visitors may also view the photo exhibit and tour the museum.

# Howard speaks on constitution

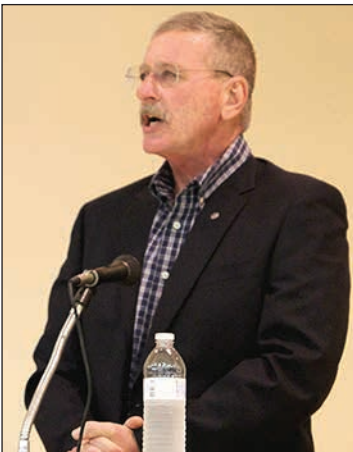
Dr. John Howard provided keynote remarks last Wednesday when Clarendon College’s Student Government Association hosted a Constitution Day luncheon.

Howard, a 25-year Navy veteran and chairman of the CC Board of Regents, discussed the founding of the federal government and its establishment as a republican form of government.

While America enjoys great freedoms, Howard reminded the students assembled that citizens have responsibilities and obligations, which includes voting, and he urged them to be informed “so when you cast that vote it means something.”

The prosperity of the United States, Howard said, is due to the nation having a stable government, and he said freedom is a gift from our nation’s forbearers, a gift paid for by death.

“Each of you have opportunities limited only by yourselves,” Howard

said. “I would ask you each to be a citizen – a good citizen, to vote, and to be informed.”

Since 2004, September 17, has been designated by the federal government as Constitution Day, and education institutions receiving federal funding are required to hold an observance on that day.

# District Court hears one plea

The 100th District Court heard one plea when it met in Clarendon on Thursday, September 17.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the case for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Kendrick Shurone Johnson was placed on probation for a period of three years for the third degree felony offense of possession of marihuana. Johnson pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Johnson, 33-year-old resident

of Oskay, Miss., was arrested in Carson County by DPS Trooper Joseph Shafer for the offense that took place September 12, 2012, and was indicted by a Carson County Grand Jury on August 7, 2014.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Johnson is required to pay a \$3,000 fine to Carson County, \$336 in court costs, \$1,273.68 restitution, and complete 200 hours of community service. If Johnson violates probation, he could face up to 10 years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ.

# Watch out for fake job postings

Hi, gang! It is getting where we can't trust anyone and especially online. Watch out for Craigslist job scams using the names of real organizations to lure in potential job seekers. These posts look just like real jobs, but take precautions before sending your resume.

How the Scam Works: You see a job post on Craigslist.org. It says Clearpoint, a non-profit organization that provides credit counseling, is hiring an "Office Admin Assistant." The ad looks completely legitimate. The business is real, the job description is standard, and the entire post is typo-free. You decide to apply for the job. The "manager" replies to your email, saying that he/she needs further information from you. Unfortunately, this information includes your credit card number!

Job scams especially have many different variations. Watch out for scams using different business names and position titles. Also,

scammers may ask job seekers to pay upfront for training, which never materializes. Or they may "hire" you and send a fake check. The con artists will instruct you to deduct a fraction for payment and wire the rest back.

Tips to Avoid Falling for Fake Job Scams: Spot a job scam before you waste your time and money.

Some positions are more likely to be scams. Use extra caution when looking at ads for jobs with generic titles, such as admin assistant or customer service representative. These often don't require special training or licensing, so they appeal to a wide range of applicants. Check out the business' website to make sure the opening is posted there. If you are still skeptical, call the business to check on the position. Don't rely on websites or phone numbers provided in the advertisement; find the "employer" on your own to make sure it's the real deal. Watch out for

these phrases. Scam ads often contain the phrases "Teleworking O K," "Immediate Start" and "No Experience Needed." Watch out for ads that urge you to apply immediately.

Search for the position in Google. If the result comes up in many other cities with the exact same job post, it is likely a scam. Be very cautious of any job that asks you to share personal information or hand over money. Scammers will often use the guise of running a credit check, setting up direct deposit or paying for training. Stay safe, I know that when we are out of a job we sometimes will try anything to find a job.

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## Drugs in the News

### Medication May Reduce Asthma Flare-Ups

According to research published in a recent issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, two clinical trials show evidence of the effectiveness of mepolizumab in a very specific type of asthma. The research showed that this investigational biologic drug may help reduce asthma exacerbations, or flare-ups, and also reduce the use of steroids in those with a condition called severe eosinophilic asthma. This particular asthma type is characterized by severe damage to the airways from eosinophils. These are a type of white blood cells. The clinical trial further showed that the asthma symptoms were better controlled in people who were taking mepolizumab than those who did not.

Mepolizumab is classified as a monoclonal antibody. It is administered into the veins or under the skin every month to help control flare ups in eosinophilic disease states. Mepolizumab works in the body by blocking chemicals from interacting that may lead to an allergic reaction. It is still undergoing clinical tests before it is approved by the FDA.

# Author Barnett to attend Chuckwagon Cookoff

Author Lana Payne Barnett will be in the Panhandle Tourism & Marketing Council booth during the Chuckwagon Cookoff at the Saints' Roost Museum this Saturday, September 27.

Journalist and novelist Pete Hamill once said, "There is a growing feeling that perhaps Texas is really another country, a place where the skies, the disasters, the diamonds, the politicians, the women, the fortunes, the football players and the murders are all bigger than anywhere else."

That observation proved true in the early years of the Texas Panhandle. Three sensational murder cases made national and international headlines. Each involved a husband murdering his wife. But the similarity ends there. One was a preacher, one a farmer, and the other an attorney. One used poison, another an axe while the other placed explosives behind the seat of the family car.

October 1897: a Panhandle, Texas Methodist minister decides to slip his faithful wife of seventeen years a lethal dose of strychnine the day after their 17th wedding anniversary.

Christmas Eve 1926: authorities in Parmer County discover the worst case of family annihilation this country has ever recorded after unearthing the remains of eight children and their mother.

June 1930: an Amarillo, Texas peaceful summer morning was turned into pandemonium when a blonde colored Durant drove through the gates of the quaint Country Club Addition and suddenly exploded hurling metal and body parts all over the neighborhood.

There was a time when all six subjects' names, husbands and the wives they killed were notoriously famous and news services carried the latest details in each case to newspapers all over the country. Today all lie in Lonely Graves, where only occasional curiosity seekers visit the sites. Barnett has woven a tale of deceit, false pride, rage and the ultimate, murder, into an account

that is a page-turner. She began her research years ago when her father told her about a man who shared his name, a man who had murdered his wife and maimed his son. He was understandably curious about the case and asked her to see if she could learn the details. By the time she did, her father had died and, curiously, was buried in the same cemetery as the murderer who shared his name.

Barnett was born in Memphis and lived her first ten years in Lakeview before moving to Tulia. After marriage she lived in Canyon for several years and worked for The Canyon News. In 1991 she and her husband returned to Tulia where she was Chamber of Commerce President/Director for many years. Until recently she had a weekly newspaper column called Panhandle Tidbits and has a Facebook page by the same name with over 11,000 followers. She has published other books, magazines and a play about the area. Her latest before Lonely Graves was Route 66 Guide to the Texas Panhandle.

The Colts will play Booker at home on Thursday, September 26, beginning at 5:00 p.m.



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
