## Interest free 'cash' available for 2014

Holiday shopping at home is easy and affordable again as the Donley County State Bank and the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce have teamed up to provide zero-percent interest "Christmas Cash" loans for the 18th season.

As in the past, anyone can make application for a loan up to \$3,000 interest free with the Donley County State Bank. Sixteen local businesses are participating in the Christmas Cash program this year.

The program has proven popular in the past with many consumers and is seen as way to encourage folks to shop at home.

Once a Christmas Cash loan has been approved, the borrower will be issued Christmas Cash Dollars, which may be spent like US currency toward new purchases at all of the participating businesses.

# Clarendon sales tax revenue increases

Clarendon's sales tax revenue this month posted its first positive growth over 2013 since the March allocation from Texas Comptroller Susan Combs' office.

The city showed increased sales tax receipts the first three months of 2014 until April, at which time monthly figures had to compete with numbers from 2013 when an influx of pipeline workers drove sales to unusually high levels.

The November allocation reported last week shows Clarendon receiving \$42,786.39 this month, up 12.35 percent over the same period in 2013. Looking at the two-year record, the city's allocation this period is up 25.7 percent compared to November 2012 when revenue was \$34,037.

Clarendon's year-to-date figure is still off 3.29 percent at \$366,991.99 compared to 2013, but the city is up 18.98 percent compared to this same point in 2012 when the total was \$308,446.79.

Hedley is up 1.58 percent this month at \$848.92 and is also up 5.84 percent for the year-to-date at \$6,673.69.

Howardwick dropped 13.84 percent for November at \$1,237.37, and down for the year 21.53 percent at \$12,529.82.

Across the state, Combs said that sales tax revenue in October was \$2.41 billion, up 12.9 percent compared to October 2013.

"Strong growth in sales tax receipts was apparent across all major economic sectors," Combs said.

The sales tax figures represent September sales reported by monthly tax filers and July, August and September sales reported by quarterly filers.

If actions speak louder than words, then the actions of the women at Howardwick Baptist Church speak volumes about Christian love and compassion as well as the power of prayer.

The ladies, who want no personal recognition, learn through the church about individuals who have special needs, are facing problems, or are battling illnesses. Then someone volunteers to knit a prayer blanket or afghan for that person in need.

Pastor Dave Stout says that over the years more than 300 of these afghans have been prepared for people in need... people like former Howardwick mayor Nancy Davis as she continues her personal battle with cancer and cannot express her thanks enough for what she's been given

# **CISD** should include public in super hunt

A good many local residents were surprised by the recent news that Clarendon ISD Superintendent Monty Hysinger had been named as the lone finalist for the top job at Dumas ISD. The Amarillo Globe-News posted that news online Wednesday night, October 29, and the ENTERPRISE followed the next morning on ClarendonLive.com.

No one begrudges Mr. Hysinger what is certainly

a step up to a larger school with no doubt better pay and benefits that CISD can afford. Some observers, your editor included, had wondered if Mr. Hysinger might make a move soon given that he's had a long tenure here – almost 16 years – editor's and his youngest child is about to graduate from Clarendon

High School. The announcement in the middle of the school year was a bit of a surprise however; and the veil of secrecy employed by the Dumas Board of Trustees, while a common tactic across the state, is a method we hope the Clarendon school board will not follow.

In the search for a new superintendent, Texas law requires school districts to name finalists at least 21 days before a final vote to hire someone. Encouraged by the all-wise Texas Association of School Boards, many school districts keep their superintendent candidates hidden from public view by naming just one finalist, who then not surprisingly gets hired 21 days later.

Compare this to the process used by Clarendon College when selecting a president. In the hiring of former presidents Myles Shelton and Phil Shirley and current president Robert Riza, the Board of Regents appointed a committee of citizens and board members to wade through dozens of applications. The committee narrowed that field to three to five candidates, each of whom were brought in for a public reception and interview before being privately interviewed in closed session by the full board. Later, the board met again to make its final decision.

The college's process demonstrates the importance of community interaction necessary for a successful college president. It also shows a healthy respect for the input from citizens and taxpayers in choosing the person who will lead one of the community's largest groups of employees and a cornerstone of our economy.

Surely the superintendent of Clarendon ISD is on the same level of importance to our community as our college president. He or she will hold great influence of the livelihoods of dozens of citizens and - more importantly – chart the course of the education system that will mold the young minds that are the future of this city. You, as a parent and/or taxpayer, have a high

Zane Sterling understands odds. After all, he rose through the working ranks in Reno casinos, including pit boss duties for 13 of his 20 years in Nevada. And he's lived to tell about it – even gain from it – thanks to extensive "people watching."

The West Texan – back in Snyder near the spread his great-grandfather bought in 1898 - chose "home again" for a specific reason. Cowboy "to the bone," he wants to abide where words flow most easily. Behind him are stretches of work on the farm and ranch, oilfield "roughnecking" and casino man-

His novel describes West Texas in its formative years, when "cowboying" was big, life was raw, and it didn't take much water to make good coffee. He shares the experiences, recollections and yarns passed down by forebears in a genre whose best-known authors have taken their leave. At age 54, Sterling is on his pilgrimage.... \*\*\*\*\*

Debt of Vengeance is a fictional work he hopes will pique the interest of readers keen on the Texas frontier.

He took to writing when much of the luster of Reno was dulled by "big business and its professional bean-counters." He started writing cowboy poetry in 1998.

Soon, he was reciting poetry and telling western stories in California and Nevada, often alongside two well-known personalities - Waddie Mitchell and Baxter Black, whose work spurred him on. He appeared for years in California's longest running poetry event, adding his poems and stories to horse training clinics, funerals, and, well, just about wherever cowboys gathered ....

Out in the land of brilliant sunsets, tall cotton, cattle herds and wind farms, he writes daily. He says much is experimentation, trying to determine what works and where he fits in a profession where technology is off the charts.

He cherishes hardscrabble surroundings, where he'd rather feed the deer than shoot them. In his "wordweaving," he paints vivid pictures of the "way it was." With an appealing style, Sterling is well-studied in reality, using humor in his characters' dialog to soften many tough situations.

Several West Texas newspapers picked up his series of 16 short stories, and a couple of years ago he wrote My Fair Scurry County Lady (an adaptation of My Fair Lady) for Snyder's community theater. It played three nights, 95% sold out. "I 'red-necked' it up pretty good," he said....

He doesn't claim to have much in common with Zane Grey, but he smiles at the mention of their identical first names. He's sorry novelists like Grey, Louis L'Amour and Elmer Kelton are deceased, but happy that Larry McMurtry is still in his literary saddle.

Kelton, a brilliant western writer

watched how he treated people one day during a book signing on the courthouse lawn in Snyder," he said. "Kelton was pure class."...

Sterling is not without help. Wife Kathy points out where he needs to explain more, and his dad, Mickey Sterling, is a great sounding board and "brutally honest."

Sterling also is encouraged by Austin producer Suzanne Weinert and by Barry Tubb, a Hollywood star who was a classmate at Snyder High School.

Sterling's work is filled with more twists and turns than mountain roads in the Ozarks....

My wife and I met the Sterlings for coffee recently. Their zeal for his writing projects is admirable, and it's refreshing to see folks in the "second half" of their lives chasing dreams.

The book is available, both in paperback and as an e-book, on Amazon. With limited arm-twisting, he'd likely "cowboy things up" with western poetry for gatherings so inclined.

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
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
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
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stake and interest in who the Board of Trustees will chose to succeed Monty Hysinger, and every member of our school board has a duty to conduct school business as openly as possible ... regardless of the prevailing veil of secrecy in our state.

We will soon know how our trustees will handle this situation. The board is scheduled to meet tonight (November 13) and three agenda items are directly related to the expected January departure of Mr. Hysinger. In his monthly report, the superintendent will discuss setting a called meeting to name an interim superintendent; and then later, the Executive Director of the Region 16 Education Service Center, John Bass, will discuss the superintendent search process and the naming of an interim superintendent. Mr. Bass' comments are listed under "Personnel," which often means a board will discuss that topic in closed session, away from the eyes and ears of the public.


We hope the CISD board bucks the state norm and sets a high bar for public involvement. Clarendon College has successfully done that, and it's not unheard of for a Texas school to do it. The BEAUMONT ENTERPRISE on Monday said many residents of Beaumont ISD want their board to follow the lead of the Austin Independent School District, which will narrow its own list of superintendent finalists next month and then "hold a public forum at which the community is invited to question the finalists."

The paper quotes Austin ISD board president Vincent Torres as saying, "We're hoping by giving them an opportunity at the end here to weigh in on who we have narrowed the field down to we'll at least have some indication of how well they will be received and supported by the community."

It all comes down to government transparency. The public has a right to know who is being considered to run our school. We are depending on the school board to include the public in the process and conduct this search in the light of day. We don't need the names of every applicant, but we deserve to know who the top candidates (plural) are for the job.



This truly was a world war with over 30 countries involved and introduced many new forms of warfare such as aerial dog fights and bombing, the use of tanks and poisoned gas. More than 70 million military personnel participated with 9 million combatants and 7 million civilians killed making it one of the deadliest conflicts in history. The United States joined the conflict on April 6, 1917, and mobilized more than 4 million but suffered more than 110,000 casualties; 43,000 because of the influenza pandemic. The war lasted over 4 years and on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, 1918, the Armistice was signed. One of the most memorable tributes to the deaths that occurred on the battlefields of WWI was the poem, "On Flanders Fields" written by Canadian field doctor John McCray, after witnessing the burial of a friend. "In Flanders Fields the poppies blow/ Between the crosses row by row." The poem inspired American professor Moina Michael to pledge to wear a poppy every day in remembrance of those killed in battle. She led the campaign to encourage the American Legion to wear and sell poppies to raise money for war widows and orphans, a movement that quickly spread worldwide. A poppy in the buttonhole is still a common sight. In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill eliminating the holiday of Armistice and changing the day to Veterans Day to honor all who have served in the Armed Services. It is a Federal holiday held each year on November 11. Donley County is patriotic. 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

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# A New Weight Loss Drug Approved

Contrave was approved by the FDA recently as a medication that can help with weight management in conjunction with exercise and diet. This is an extended-release formulation of two FDA-approved medications: naltrexone hydrochloride and buproprion hydrochloride extended-release tablets. Contrave can be prescribed to obese adults and overweight adults who have a chronic illness such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, or type 2 diabetes. People who take Contrave will be required to come into the doctor's office after taking this medication for twelve weeks for an evaluation before the drug is continued.

Naltrexone helps treat those who are addicted to alcohol or pain killers. Bupropion is an antidepressant and is also taken to help people quit smoking. The results from the clinical trials showed significantly more people who took Contrave lost more body weight compared to people who were taking a sugar pill. Side effects that have been identified during the clinical trial include fast heart beat, nausea, headache, dizziness, and constipation.



# Should city voters pick the Ag Commissioner?

For more than a century, Texans have elected their agriculture commissioner, unlike more than twothirds of states where governors fill the job by appointment.

But as Texas' urban population inches toward 90 percent, should they? Or is there danger that the obscure statewide position, often seen as a stepping-stone to higher office, could get tied up in political campaigns about guns and God instead of soybeans and sows?

Farm groups say they still favor elections, expressing confidence that, in this election at least, voters did fine picking former Republican state Rep. Sid Miller.

Miller will oversee a Department of Agriculture handling tasks like inspecting fuel pumps, regulating pesticides and administering a half-billion-dollar federal school lunch program. He's also promised to promote Texas agricultural products worldwide, and encourage more agricultural producers to come to Texas.

If demographic trends continue, it may get dicier to let mostly urban Texans decide who's qualified to represent agriculture, farm leaders said. Rather than fighting for rural Texas, a candidate might decide to focus on urban needs instead.

"I think we're safe right now with Sid [Miller]," said Darren



But the Canadian cattle still needed to pass through export facilities along the U.S.-Mexico border, so "Todd spoke up and said, 'They ain't coming through Texas," Bonds said.

And there's another reason aspiring politicians want to keep the office an elected one: It's an obvious starting point, and winning it gives candidates a statewide fundraising Rolodex, volunteer network and name recognition.

That was certainly true for Gov. Rick Perry, who won the office in 1990. In a campaign ad from the time, it's clear that Perry - featured in cowboy attire - had political ambitions.

'Rick Perry. A new leader from agriculture," the announcer says, "for Texas."
