## CC Regents extend president's contract

Clarendon College Regents voted to extend the contract of President Robert Riza last Thursday, April 19, after a tense discussion about how the board had handled the same subject just two months ago.

The president's evaluation and contract were considered at a called meeting on February 26. At that time, the board met behind closed doors for almost two hours before returning to open session and voting to give Dr. Riza a raise, but no mention was made about the term of his

contract, which was set to expire in 2019.

Last week, Riza asked for the matter to be considered in open session, and Chairman Lon Adams drew the board's attention to the term of contract. Regent Jack Moreman moved, seconded by Regent Ruth Robinson, to extend the contract to 2020, at which point Regent Darlene Spier asked for clarification.

"Why are we visiting this again?" Spier asked. "Everyone voted unanimously in the minutes

for the contract the way it was. Did Dr. Riza ask that it be put on the agenda?"

"No, I asked for it to be put on the agenda; I don't mind telling you," Moreman said.

"Well, we all discussed it at that other meeting," Spier said.

"No, Darlene, we didn't discuss it," Moreman responded. "It was a private meeting down on that end of the table. I never heard half of what was going on. So, I thought about it, and I thought this was almost a vio-

lation of the Open Meetings Act. We had a meeting within the meeting."

At which point, Chief of Staff Ashlee Estlack said what was written in the minutes by Spier, who is the board's secretary, was contrary to what was actually said at the meeting. The minutes mention not extending the contract, she said, but Regent Bill Sansing never said that when he made the motion to give the president a raise.

This led to discussion about what was said in closed session in

February versus what was said in open session. Regent Jerry Woodard said he thought it was mentioned that the board was going to wait until December to see what the results of the next audit was before revisiting the term of the contract. Others said that was never mentioned in open session.

Moreman wanted to know why the contract couldn't be extended now instead of waiting.

"We've always done that See 'Contract' on page five.

## Early votes being cast in CC election

Early voting is underway in this year's Clarendon College District election in the Donley County Courthouse Annex.

Donley County voters are casting ballots to elect three members to the CC Board of Regents. On the ballot are incumbents Edwin Campbell and Jerry Woodard and challengers Lance Wood and Tommy Waldrop, and the top three vote earners will be elected.

Early voting continues through May 3 during regular business hours. Election Day will be Saturday, May 5, 2018.

No early voting is available for the City of Howardwick's election, which will also be held on May 5.

## One Act Play to be performed May 1

Clarendon High School's One Act Play team will perform "The Elephant Man" for the public next Tuesday, May 1, at the CHS Auditorium.

The performance will begin at 6:30 p.m., and admission will be \$5.

The One Act Play advanced all the way to the regional competition this year, closing out the season in Odessa on April 12. Along the way, several CHS thespians and crew received recognitions. At the regional level, Harley Jauregui was named to the all-star cast, and Tate Parker and Orian Neal were honorable mention.

## Mandatory auxin training set May 1

Cotton producers may have heard about new EPA regulations affecting applying Dicamba herbicide products (such as Xtendimax, FeXapan, and Engenia) over Xtendflex Cotton or Xtendflex Soybeans.

These regulations require all applicators (not just the licensed applicators) including employees that apply these products to be trained annually.

Donley County Texas A&M AgriLife Extension will be conducting one more free training prior to the growing season for producers and workers that will be making applications this year on Tuesday, May 1, 10 a.m. at the Donley County Activity Center.

The training takes approximately one hour and those attending will need their Private Pesticide Applicator License number or their employers' number for whom they will be applying herbicide.

## H'wick candidates answer questions

Howardwick residents got to hear from eight of the nine people running for city council during a candidates' forum there last Tuesday, April 17.

Coy Cooper moderated the event on behalf of a group known as the Friends of Howardwick, and a large crowd was in attendance. Local citizens submitted questions beforehand, and Cooper drew those questions at random.

Candidates attending were Brice Hawley, Vol Lindsey, James Wix, and Mary Grady - all running for two full terms on the city council - and Alderman Doc Holladay, Marietta Baird, Kay Dye, and Debora Sharpton - all running for three unexpired terms. Johnny Floyd, running for a full term, was the only candidate not present due to health issues.

The opening question was why each candidate felt they should be elected.

Vol Lindsey said he is a retired English teacher who has seen a lot of undercurrents and valid issues in Howardwick and that he wants to see what he can do to improve the community.

James Wix said he would like to be a mediator and "see if we can get stuff done."

Marietta Baird said her main goals if elected would be to be fair and not be swayed by anything other than the truth.

Brice Hawley said community service is his goal and that he thought his previous experience as a trustee of a home owners' association would benefit him on the city council.

Alderman Doc Holladay, the only incumbent on the ballot, said he has constantly been involved with working to improve the city since he moved there in 1993. He also stressed the importance of mowing as a revenue source for the city and noted that less rain this year would mean less revenue. "We're going to have to live within our means," Holladay said.

Mary Grady said she would be fair if elected and would like to see the public more involved, especially on big issues.

Debora Sharpton said her honesty is most important and that the city should do nothing without the public's involvement.

Kay Dye said her main focus is to see the community come back together.

In response to a question of how to save money for the city, candidates generally had similar

answers about being good stewards of the public's funds and funding needs over wants. Searching for new revenue streams was also a common response. Holladay focused on preventive maintenance as a way to save money, and Dye said the community can work together on projects to save money.

Regarding keeping all city employees year round, candidates generally agreed on making tough choices based on revenue although some candidates, such as Dye, also felt there was plenty of work to be done year round.

In response to a question about the public's ability to comment at city council meetings, candidates generally agreed to the need to have involvement from the community and ways for the citizens to express their concerns and thoughts. Hawley did mention the need to work within the rules of the Open Meetings Act.

In a question directed specifically to Sharpton and Holladay, both candidates agreed the city should follow all appropriate municipal laws.

On the idea of unincorporating the city, Dye said she only brought that up because of the recent politics but thought the city really needed to "get it together" and enforce the

ordinances.

On the question of non-employees using city equipment as volunteers, Holladay said he had done it for years, and other candidates generally agreed that the city should look at its insurance policy to determine the liability of that issue.

Candidates responses to questions of employee hierarchy, determining issues of importance to the city, and what duties city employees should have were not far off from each other generally. Candidates all seemed to embrace the idea of some kind of event or community barbecue to bring the town together.

Among questions taken from the floor was one directed at Hawley, asking him to stop harassing Mayor Greta Byars. Hawley's said he thought his political signs, which say "Got Byars Remorse?", were just a clever play on words and that he didn't consider that harassment.

Other comments at the meeting included a desire by Holladay to see the tree limb dump re-opened for the city, and a confirmation by real estate agent Linda Naylor that unincorporating would be a decline in property values.

Election Day will be May 5.

## TxDOT begins improvement projects here

CHILDRESS - The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is starting two projects aimed at improving the highway system with specific localized improvements.

On Monday, April 23, TxDOT began work to restripe roadways within the Childress District and install new raised pavement markers.

This work is being done at various location. Work in Donley County will be done on U S 287, SH 203, SH 70, and FM 3143.

This is a rolling operation and motorists can expect delays and are urged to slow down and drive with caution through the work zone. Work is expected to be complete by mid-May, weather permitting.

Another project starting Tuesday, May 1, will be TxDOT's annual in-house seal coat project. This \$2 million maintenance project is part of a program to improve and preserve our roadways.

Approximately 90 miles of roads in the Childress District will receive a seal coat, and local the project will cover FM 2362 from US 287 SE to FM 2162.

Work is scheduled through the end of May. Motorist traveling along roadways receiving a seal coat, should slow down and be aware of construction activity, and should not drive through an area where asphalt has been applied, but rock has not yet been placed. Motorists should be prepared to stop for short durations while the work is underway.

## Second rabies case confirmed in Donley Co.

The Texas Dept. of State Health Services is reporting a second confirmed case of rabies in Donley County this week after a skunk tested positive for the disease.

TDSHS says a woman and child were playing outside at their residence northeast of Clarendon when a skunk approached the property last Friday morning. The family dog chased the skunk into an out-building but it later ran back out and sprayed the porch. The woman's husband arrived and shot the skunk, which later tested positive for rabies.

Earlier this month a horse in the western part of the county tested positive for rabies.

Residents are reminded of the importance of having their pets vaccinated for rabies and also urged again to avoid wild animals, especially normally nocturnal animals acting strange in the daytime.

Waxing biblical comes easily when one visits beautiful Colorado. If we "looketh up" - as the psalmists did - we can do them one better on the topic of elevation. In Psalm 121, they "lifted their eyes unto the hills" from which "cameth" their strength. How about gazing even higher - yea, toward the mountains, for relaxation and refreshment? (Colorado leads the nation with 53 peaks towering more than 14,000 feet, well ahead of Alaska's 29.)

On April's second weekend, my wife and I flew to Denver, then drove upward to picturesque Mt. Crested Butte. It is one of the numerous Colorado meccas that induces skiers to salivate, dreaming of silken slopes by day and cozy fireplaces by night.

As we ascended, masses of vacationers drove downward, some of them with tear-stained cheeks. After all, they were returning to the workaday world and income tax reporting deadlines. With no "regular" working hours, we were merely seeking a quiet condo to edit a book....

There was more to get biblical about as the ski season ended. What happened provided evidence that not only does it "rain on the just and unjust alike" (Matthew 5:45), the same may also be true of snow. After a season of "spotty" snowfall, the skies opened with one of the best snow blankets of the season in most locales.

Guess who benefited? First, resort workers throughout the state applauded wildly. Finally, "skis were on the other foot," so to speak. With the season

officially over for tourists, most of the employees on the slopes took advantage of "day after" benefits. On the magical day after season's end, the slopes were theirs alone for free skiing, grand rewards for their five months or so of hard work.

The biggest Andrews Mustang fan

Leland Hamilton of Andrews watches the Andrews Mustangs practice, no matter what the sport. It seems he's always on the sidelines, urging the young athletes to do their best. He is at the practices from start to finish.

"I go to volleyball practice, basketball practice, softball, baseball, and I watch track," says Leland. "Now golf, I'm out at the course some, but I can't be everywhere. I start going to football practices every August and stay with them 'til the end of the season. Summer's a pretty dull time for me 'cause there's no practice to go to."

Coaches appreciate Mr. Hamilton's giving the kids encouragement. He's been doing it so long that when the high school publishes its annual sports magazine it features a full-page color picture of him talking to players or coaches. One year the publication was dedicated to him. I visited with him during baseball season.

"I go to the ball field each evening and sit in the dugout with the players, just talk with them and visit with them as they come in and go out. If I'm in town and everything is going good, I'm up there. It's just a blessing to me to get

to do it."

He doesn't miss many practices. He's 93 years old is known as Pop Hamilton. Some people call him great grand because some of his great grandchildren are students at Andrews High School.

Mr. Hamilton had a television repair business, then sold cars. All of that came after his stint in the navy. He served on the battleship Pennsylvania during World War Two. He was a sailor from 1943 to 1946.

"We were all the way from the Aleutian Islands to Australia, New Zealand and all the islands in between. We were involved in landing troops, bombarding the shore before they went in. We'd bombard a day or two or three, depending on where it was, the Gilbert Islands, the Marshall Islands, Marianas, Peleliu or Palau. We were the only ship in the fleet that participated in every

engagement from the Aleutian Islands to the Philippines."

When he was back in states stationed at Oakland, California, he met a girl that became like a sister to him. She was from Wichita Falls originally and her dad was working out there. Leland got familiar with her family. Leland and the girl were at a dance one night when a sailor, who was not 100 percent sober, went up the girl's little brother.

"He told the boy, 'get out of my way or I'll kick your butt.' I stepped up to that sailor and said you'll have to go through me if you do that, buddy. He said, 'if I can't I've got 5 buddies and we can do it.' I said bring 'em on. We went outside and I thought to myself what in the world did I say that for, I can't whip 5 or 6 guys. But I kept going at him and he kept backing away and backing away, then he turned and took off running. I figured he wasn't as brave as he thought he was. I looked around and that girl that I was with and some of her female friends had their shoes off, holding them in their hands, ready to fight with me. The guys' buddies left pretty quick."

Does Hannity measure up as journalist?

If the burning national question of the moment is whether Fox News Channel star Sean Hannity is a "journalist" or not, let's use the long-held set of journalistic questions to investigate: The proverbial who, what, when, where, why and how?

First, the "who": Sean Patrick Hannity is a cable TV conservative talk show host and best-selling author. Most recently he is said to serve as an unpaid advisor to President Trump - some say that relationship is so close that he "has a desk" at the White House. Hannity was born in New York City, and has spent much of his broadcast career there.

Next, let's go to "when" and "where": Hannity's TV show anchors Fox prime-time lineup with an audience of about 3 million nightly. His syndicated radio show goes out via the web as well as on a host of radio stations. He spent a few early years at TV stations in Alabama and Georgia, before returning to that self-proclaimed urban liberal bastion of New York City to find conservative fame and fortune.

"How" and "why" generally are outside the realm of First Amendment consideration. The nation's founders didn't include any specific definition of a free press practitioner, and why Hannity - or any of us - speaks or writes about politics is none of the government's business.

So, what about the "what"? Hannity said that he is a journalist in a 2016 interview with The New York Times - and said that he is not a journalist ("I'm just a talk show host") in a 2016 interview with The Boston Globe. The Washington Post's Paul Farhi just wrote that in an interview with the Times earlier this year, Hannity said, "I'm a journalist. But I'm an advocacy journalist, or an opinion journalist."

As it happens, the First Amendment's protection of a free press covers any and all of those roles in terms of free expression. Objective or biased, nonpartisan or politically motivated: All protected.

But it's trickier when it comes to the professional definitions and codes of journalism, where ethical standards come into play. And yes, journalism does have ethics - and most journalists follow them, despite some people's claims to the contrary. Transparency about business relationships is a basic rule, along with the admonishment to avoid such complications if at all possible.

Did Hannity have an obligation to let viewers know of his connection to President Trump's lawyer Michael Cohen - which for some as-yet unknown reason he and Cohen reportedly sought to keep secret? Yes, but not because of politics. In plain terms, we should just know "where he's coming from."

No one has been shocked that Hannity is highly critical of federal authorities who served search warrants at Cohen's office, home and hotel room and confiscated records and computers, and that he defends Trump's privacy and attorney-client privilege. But was that defense rooted in a personal matter? There were audible gasps in the courtroom, reports say, when Hannity was revealed during a recent hearing in New York to be a client of Cohen.

Was the non-disclosure in any way connected to the fact that Cohen's two other clients (Trump and a high-ranking GOP official) apparently used the lawyer to broker financial deals with women who claim a sexual relationship with them? Or could it be just a simple defense of a friend, rather than one related to legal standards or constitutional concerns?

To some degree, the "Hannity Hassle" afflicts much of the cable talk show world, where the motivation seems focused more on generating chatter (i.e., ratings) than doing actual journalism. And then there's the larger problem that reporters from news organizations so often now appear on such shows as pundits, while the networks' hosts - often former politicians - claim at times to be reporting "breaking news."

It's not just on TV that the crossover duties have impact: In some large part, a push for a national shield law protecting journalists and their confidential sources has failed because of the difficulty of defining who is a journalist.


Making it harder for all of us to determine if the "what" we see and hear is fact or opinion, which damages the very foundations of self-governance.

When the nation's founders protected a free press, they presumed it would be part of an independent system that would keep an eye on government and society on behalf of the rest of us - not just generate ratings or circulation.

We cannot make the required decisions of a self-governing society if the facts on which we base those decisions come to us via blurry "news" sources whose role and motivations are suspect - or worse, kept secret.

And that admonition does not just apply to Sean Hannity.

## Local Masons give Clarendon first graders free dental kits

Donley County first graders were recently given free prevent tooth decay kits through the Fantastic Teeth Fan Club by members of Clarendon Masonic Lodge, led by Secretary Grett Betts.

The Masons assembled and delivered more than 45 dental hygiene kits to first graders at Clarendon Elementary and Hedley Elementary schools March 21.

The Fantastic Teeth Fan Club, sponsored by Masonic Home and School of Texas (MHS), strives to prevent suffering from toothaches, reduce missed school days due to dental problems, and cut costs for dental treatment.

Prevent tooth decay kits contain: a toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, healthy teeth sticker, two-minute timer (optimal brushing time), Tips for Healthy Teeth educational information for parents in both Spanish and English, and a summary of MHS services. Last year, Texas Masonic lodges partnered with MHS to distribute 129,113 Fantastic Teeth Fan Club dental kits and information to first graders in 1,575 schools across the state. In all, well over 500,000 of these kits have been provided to first graders by Masons since the program's inception.


According to Oral Health In

America: A Report of the Surgeon General, tooth decay is the single most common chronic childhood disease—five times more common than asthma and seven times more common than hay fever. Poor children are affected by this epidemic more frequently than other children, with nearly 12 times more restricted-activity days due to dental issues than children from higher-income families. With more than 1.5 million Texas children living in poverty, there is a great need for preventive dental care.

Dental problems also directly affect success for children, with more than 51 million school hours lost each year to dental-related illness. Teachers have judged both classroom performance and classroom behavior to be significantly poorer among children in need of dental care. # Scammers using September 11 fund to get your personal information

Hi, gang! I still worry about our volunteer first responders. There is another group who are taking a hit from the volunteer first responders. They are the people who they work for. These small businesses are contributing a lot of money in the form of salary when they are away from their job. Be sure to say thank you to the volunteers and their employers. Thank the Lord for the rain!

"Scammers target Sept. 11th Victim Compensation Fund" by Drew Johnson, FTC

Consumers are reporting a new imposter scam this time the callers are pretending to be with the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund (VCF). According to reports, the callers are telling people they may be entitled to money, and they are asking people for their personal information to determine if they are eligible. It's a scam.

Currently, the callers are using spoofed phone numbers with New York area codes. They are asking for information ranging from Social Security numbers, mailing addresses, and bank account numbers, to medical histories and proof of whether a person worked in the 9/11 exposure zone.

If you get a random call with questions about your claim with the Victim Compensation Fund or your potential for eligibility, hang up immediately. The VCF may call you, but it will never ask for your full Social Security number. If you

are uncertain whether a caller is from the VCF, hang up and call the VCF directly at 1-855-885-1555. If you encounter a similar call, hang up and report it to the FTC. And spread the word to your friends, family, and community. It may help someone avoid a scam.

"Scammers impersonate the Chinese Consulate" by Patti Poss Attorney, FTC

Have you gotten a call from someone saying they're from a Chinese Consulate office? If so, you're not alone - based on reports to the FTC and the real Chinese Consulates. But here's the thing: it's not a Chinese Consulate office calling. It's a scammer. These callers seem to be reaching people with Chinese last names but, as we know, scammers can change tactics quickly. Here's what's happening now: people across the country have reported getting a call or message saying they have to pick up a package at the Chinese Consulate office. Or, they need you to give them information to avoid being in trouble with the Chinese Consulate. Then the caller asks for your bank or credit card information, or tells you to make a bank transfer to them.

Regardless of who you are or who says they're calling, never send money to anyone who calls and asks you to send it. Never give your Social Security number, your bank or credit card number, or other sensitive information to anyone who calls

and asks for it. Same thing if they email or message you through a social media platform such as WeChat: just don't respond. That's a scam. And neither the real Chinese Consulates, nor the Chinese Embassy, will ever call you to ask for money.

If you get a call or message like this, hang up or delete it, and then tell the FTC. If you have business with the real Chinese Consulate and you're worried, contact the real Chinese Consulate by looking up your local office's number.

But, whatever you do, don't give out your information or your money to anyone who contacts you out of the blue.

"FTC Campaign to help small businesses"

The Federal Trade Commission is launching a national education campaign to help small businesses strengthen their cyber defenses and protect sensitive data that they store.

As outlined in a new Staff Perspective report, the FTC will develop and distribute reader-friendly educational materials with information about cybersecurity that small businesses need. The effort grew out of the Small Business & Cybersecurity Roundtables that the FTC hosted last

year with small business owners and non-profit organizations, employees, and managers to learn about the challenges they face when dealing with cyber threats and security and ideas for how the government can help them.

"Small businesses understand the importance of cybersecurity and the need to protect their networks and data, but many feel overwhelmed about how to address the myriad of cyber threats they face," said Tom Pahl, Acting Director of the FTC's Bureau of Consumer Protection. "Our new campaign aims to help these small businesses with targeted, plain-language advice on everything from protecting against phishing scams to tips on what to look for when choosing a cybersecurity vendor." The campaign will build on the work the FTC has already done under Acting FTC Chairman Maureen K. Ohlhausen. This includes the small business cybersecurity roundtable discussions and the launch of a website in 2017 aimed at helping small businesses avoid scams and protect their networks and data. The FTC also has developed several cybersecurity publications aimed at businesses of all sizes including our business guides Start with Security, Data Breach Response and Protecting Personal Information and our Stick with Security blog series.

Among the issues that small business owners identified during the roundtable discussions are how to avoid phishing schemes, ransomware attacks and tech support scams, as well as cybersecurity basics. Small business owners also wanted information about how to protect company mobile devices, and a list of questions they should ask vendors to ensure their systems are secure. To address these concerns, the FTC is creating up to a dozen sets of information on issues of importance to small business owners that will include training modules and videos. Potential topics include phishing, ransomware, email authentication, cloud security, tech support scams, vendor security, how to compare offers of web hosting services, understanding the National Institute of Standards and Technology cybersecurity framework, and others.

In addition, the FTC will work with other government agencies to help develop more consistent messaging about cybersecurity and expand its work with the private and non-profit sectors to help get the materials developed by the FTC to more small businesses. The Federal Trade Commission works to promote competition, and protect and educate consumers. 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# Contract: Moreman pushes for extension

[extend the contract], as far as I know, for people a lot less qualified than Dr. Riza," Moreman said. "We would add a year to them, and this time we just said, 'Well, you've got this year, and that's it.'"

Riza said Moreman had come to him the Friday before the board meeting asking for the subject to be on the agenda.

"I know I've got problems on this board," Riza said, "and very simply if you don't want me here, freaking say it, and I'll walk. You don't need to go into closed session and all the other stuff, just say it."

Moreman said looking at everything Riza has done for the college with increased enrollments and other things, he didn't see that there should even be a question about extending the contract. And yet, he said, the closed session in February had gone on for two hours.

"I'm not happy about what happened, and the more I thought about it, the more it bothered me," Moreman said. "We're not going to replace this man real quick."

Spier said replacing Riza was never talked about and said she didn't think anyone on the board wanted that.

"The message sent was 'You're done,'" Riza said. "When you don't extend the superintendent's or the president's contract, it's 'Have a good one.'"

"Yes," Robinson said agreeing with Riza, "That's right."

Spier and Woodard then both stated that was not the board's intent, but Riza said that's what "got loose in the public," and Moreman said he had had calls about it.

Moreman said, "I've had people in Panhandle say, 'What is the matter with you people over there? Are you drinking something?' to do something like this to a president who they like and who is bringing students from Panhandle like never before."

There was then more disagreement about what had been said in closed session in February before Woodard brought up the audit again, saying, "We want to see our audit fixed," referring to findings in the annual audit presented in December. Riza asserted that those issues had already been addressed.

"I told you I would quit if it's not right," Riza said. "You will not have to fire me. I will drop the keys on the table and walk off."

The board then unanimously voted to extend the contract by one year to June 2020.

In other college business last week, Regents approved bids on tax delinquent property as presented; ratified the hiring of Sherrie Denham as a nursing instructor and Lindie Willie as an administrative assistant in Pampa and the resignation of Marilyn Brandt as the horse judging coach; and approved the academic calendar for 2018-2019.


The Broncos struggled a bit on the defensive side but were able to pull it together at a crucial time.




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
