"A Doll House" is set in the Helmer family home at Christmas time and is performed in three acts. The play questions the traditional roles of men and women in 19th-century marriage and is the most important play of the nineteenth century. Henrik Ibsen was the "father" of realism. While certain plays had realistic elements before 1878, "A Doll House" cemented realism as the dominant form of entertainment, and it is still the dominant form of entertainment 140 years later.

The cast includes Jenna Faye Wilson, Ethan Cole Shipman, Adley Gilmer, Orian Neal, and Jaci Claxton.



Courthouse trees need replacing

Trees on the courthouse lawn will be the focus of Donley County Commissioners when they meet on Monday, December 10, as officials work to develop a long range plan.

During the regular meeting November 13, commissioners approved a proposal from Arbor Solutions to remove and replace certain trees around the 1890 Courthouse.

"We have dead and dying trees that present a safety concern," County Judge John Howard said this week. "Some of them are hollow or full of water, and they could fall or loose big branches."

Howard said the big trees outlining the square between the sidewalk and curb are Siberian Elm trees, many of which are suffering from disease and insects and are just at the end of their natural lifespan. Most trees in the lawn inside the sidewalks are American Elms, which are more insect resistant but also have some problems.

The lighting committee recently was not allowed to light two large trees because they are not safe, the judge said.

"We want to take a comprehensive approach to tree planning." Howard said, including removals and replacements.

Trees on the north side of the square, along Third Street, are presenting a particular problem due to a telephone line running through them. Howard said the county may take those trees out and replace them with trees that will not get as tall but would add some color, such as red bud or white bud trees. Tallergrowing trees would then be added inside the sidewalks. A similar approach would be taken along Sully Street, with a possibly a variety of pear trees between the sidewalk and curb and lacebark elm or similar trees planted inside the sidewalk.

The judge said Jeremy Hogan of Arbor Solutions will address the commissioners at 1:30 p.m. on December 10 to discuss more details about the tree plan.

In other news, commissioners on November 12 appointed Chancy Cruse and Chris Schollenbarger to the city-county airport board; re-appointed Dr. Matt Halsey as the county rabies authority; discussed maintenance to be done on the JA Ranch Road with the JA providing road material; and approved an agreement with the city regarding trust properties that have not sold and sheriff's sales. The court also agreed to obtain an easement at Precinct 3&4 JP office to accommodate an air-conditioning unit and approved a plan for constructing a handicapped ramp at that office for about \$10,000.

Saudi Arabia is in no way a good ally

President Donald Trump doesn't understand his chief responsibility as president. It is not to make deals and create jobs. It is to protect the security and liberty of Americans. By that standard, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia is not a "truly spectacular ally," as he claimed.

Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, the kingdom's de facto ruler, is a brutal, even sadistic, murderer. Worse for Washington is the affront to the

America protects the corrupt, licentious and oppressive Saudi royal family. Yet Riyadh did not hesitate to ostentatiously murder Jamal Khashoggi, who had taken refuge in the U.S.

Rated unfree by Freedom House, the kingdom allows not even a hint of political or religious liberty. There is not one church, synagogue, or temple in Saudi Arabia. Iran is a beacon of religious toleration in comparison.

Moreover, MbS has tightened political controls even as he has relaxed social strictures. Personally a big spender on yachts and chalets, he launched a supposed crusade against corruption, which turned out to be a revenue-raising expedition targeting potential critics among Saudi Arabia's elite.

Historically the kingdom has been a dangerous breeding ground for terrorists, funding fundamentalist Wahhabism around the globe and providing 15 of 19 9/11 hijackers. Saudi money enriched al-Qaida and other radical groups; the regime backed jihadists in Syria and through its invasion of Yemen freed up radical groups, including al-Qaida, in the Arabian

Riyadh's brutal aggression against Yemen created a humanitarian catastrophe and empowered Iran. Kidnapping Lebanon's prime minister benefited Hezbollah. Attempting to isolate, and then threatening to attack, Qatar pushed the latter toward both Tehran

In Syria, Riyadh backed radical forces which came to dominate the opposition. As for Iran, U.S. interests would be best served by a balance of power, not hegemony as sought by MbS.

Rarely has an assassination been carried out so incompetently yet ostentatiously. Even President

Trump was forced to admit that the journalist was murdered, by a massive hit squad, in a brutal manner, by the Saudi government, in its diplomatic facilities.

Nevertheless, the president decided it does not matter if MbS was involved in Khashoggi's murder. Apparently based on the belief that the kingdom is a "truly spectacular ally," by which President Trump means it buys U.S. weapons and other products.

Yet America's chief executive is a pitiful negotiator. Saudi Arabia needs America far more than America needs the kingdom.

The Saudis' supposed \$110 billion weapons buy has yielded little more than a 10th as much cash. In any case, the purpose of alliances should be to enhance U.S. security, not boost arms sales.

Still, Riyadh is going to continue purchasing American weapons for its own reasons. It could diversify suppliers, but for logistical reasons the kingdom has reason to continue its relationship with the Pentagon.

If nothing else the royal regime needs spare parts and training to maintain its forces. That need will only grow if Riyadh can no longer count on America to protect it from its own folly.

Commercial sales beyond weapons are even less important to America's \$20 trillion economy. If MbS is serious about reforming his nation's energydependent economy, he is going to deal with American companies. Anyway, a presidential desire that the Saudis buy products as well as lobbyists and think tanks is not a good reason to insulate a murderous, irresponsible and reckless regime.

The administration should stop acting like it is beholden to MbS. The U.S. should end all support for the Yemen war. Weapons sales should be placed on

This doesn't mean the administration need treat Saudi Arabia as an enemy and refuse to deal with MbS. After all, American presidents engaged Joseph Stalin, Mao Zedong and Kim Jong-un.

In dealing with ugly, brutal and authoritarian regimes the president's transactional approach makes some foreign policy sense. However, there should be no exaggerated expressions of fervent friendship, no illusions about shared values, and no attempt to sugarcoat Riyadh's sustained assault on human rights and American interests.

In particular, the U.S. should indicate that while Washington recognizes the Saudis will choose their own leadership, the U.S. will be forced to look to its own interests. That means confronting MbS' irresponsible actions and aggressive reach for hegemony, which are destabilizing the region.

The kingdom is not a U.S. or Western ally in any real sense. Working together when appropriate should never be confused with endorsing or even accepting such a malodorous regime.

Mired in a culture where too much information bombards daily, we're "running out of respites," even during holidays. Such observances formerly provided temporary "fixes." Even the millions who place their world on pause to soak up a tub of "feel-good" – perhaps while again viewing It's A Wonderful Life – may have a hard time putting aside ever-growing fears. They're stacking up faster than the wood piled high for fire-stoking when snow makes the world white.

Now, we are warned that even Christmas cards may be hazardous to our health. Does anything remain sacred?...

Yes, Facebook – as well as other social media tag-alongs – warns that "glitter greetings" heralding the birth of Jesus Christ may be fraught with danger. We are thus warned that cards with glitter affixed may do us in. What if children figure this is a "scratch and sniff" deal?

Trouble is, we are told, that such glitter often becomes "unfixed." They're lining up "second-hand glitter" with "second-hand smoke." It's tempting to go back to bed and pull up the covers, wishing the world to go away.

If additional potential dangers are to be listed, we may have to buy another Big Chief tablet. Who would have dreamed that Christmas glitter - long thought to be joyous and festive - would

Historically, "glittery cards" have been extraspecial. They've warranted the extra cost; we have "chug-

a-lugged" Hallmark's Kool-Aid that urges us to send "the very best."

Folks who take on social media "stuff" in deep breaths may have smothering spells. One "wiseacre" (or perhaps "wise-half-acre") reports that the State of California has announced that glitter causes cancer.

Another says, "Every glitter bit hurts." One warns that persons sending him (her?) glittery cards should not expect "warm fuzzy" cards in return. Instead, "glitter-senders" will "get back cards containing a year's worth of toenail clippings." That's worse than coal-stuffed stockings!...

Some folks look for reasons to shorten lists of Christmas card recipients. Look for a substantial number to remove "glitter bombers" from their lists.

More news from migrant caravan

On Sunday and Monday of this week, the famous caravan traveling through Central America made it to the United States border. Videos have surfaced on the internet of the migrants running through the border into places such as California. Some videos even show young men climbing the border wall. Others are planning to stampede across the border in the short future. While these efforts are under way, the caravan is stationed in Tijuana, Mexico. However, this massive group of people have and can cause many problems.

Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen said in a statement that some migrants 'attempted to breach legacy fence infrastructure along the border and sought to harm CBP personnel by throwing projectiles at them."

The seventh grade Lady Colts jumped on Memphis early taking a 29-5 lead after the first half of play and stormed through the second half.


