City starts year with sales tax growth

Clarendon saw another month of growth in sales tax revenue when Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar distributed January allocations last week.

Sales tax revenues for January were up 4.92 percent for the month to start the year with \$31,396.35 compared to \$29,923.17 for the same period in 2018.

Hedley started the year with \$418.48 in sales tax revenue, down 47.03 percent from the previous January, and Howardwick was also down 6.62 percent at \$1,033.51.

Statewide, Hegar distributed \$734.7 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 3.6 percent more than in January 2018. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

Chamber seeking award nominations

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce is seeking nominations for its annual community awards banquet.

Honorees will be announced during the banquet, which is scheduled for February 7.

Nominations must be received by noon January 17.

DPS discovers drugs during traffic stop

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) seized 160 pounds of marijuana and four pounds of THC was last Tuesday, after a Texas Highway Patrol Trooper stopped a vehicle in Donley County.

At approximately 2:56 p.m., a DPS Trooper stopped a 2018 Chevrolet Tahoe towing a U-Haul trailer traveling east on US 287 near Clarendon for a traffic violation. A DPS Annine arrived on scene and alerted on the vehicle.

The Trooper then observed 13 boxes of vacuum-sealed packages of marijuana. Robinson, 32, and Brooks, 40, both of Bakersfield, California were transported and booked into the Donley County Jail.

The drugs allegedly were being transported from Bakersfield, Calif., to Dallas.

Local youth raise \$39k at annual livestock auction

The top animals in the Beef Division were exhibited by Koyt Tucek and Kasie Hinton when the annual annual Donley County Junior Livestock Show was held last Saturday, January 12, at the Donley County Activity Center.

Tucek showed the Grand Champion Steer, and Hinton had Mya Edwards and her Grand Champion Sheep; Izzy Craft with the Grand Champion Goat; Maloree Wann and her Grand Champion Gilt; and Hudson Howard with the Grand Champion Barrow.

Reserve Champion honors when to Hudson Howard, steers; Kaitin Ehrlert, heifers; Madison Smith, sheep; Charly Craft, goats; Caton Grain, gilts; and Koyt Tucek, barrows.

Fifty youth from the Donley County 4-H Club and local FFA chapters exhibited 80 animals during the show. Last year 61 kids showed 105 animals.

The livestock auction following the show generated an estimated \$39,050 as of Tuesday morning, and that number will increase as donations continue to be received.

The 2018 premium sale totaled about \$41,225 at this point last year.

Paul continues century of tradition

Tyler Michael Paul carried on a 100-year-old family tradition as a 4th generation Eagle Scout marked by a Court of Honor held Saturday, January 12, at the First United Methodist Church in Clarendon.

The Paul family lineage in Boy Scouts started before 1919. Tyler, getting scouting began as a Tiger Cub at the age of five years old. He continued through the Cub Scouting program, earning his Arrow of Light and later bridging over to Boy Scouts.

As he worked toward his Eagle rank, Tyler partnered with Veterans of Foreign Affairs Post 7782 to

complete his Eagle Scout Project, which not only honored veterans of this great nation but also honored the community of Clarendon, the State of Texas, and the United States of America. He partnered with Veterans of Foreign Affairs Post 7782. First, he refurbished the flag pole, repainting and restringing it so that flags could be displayed again. Next, he led Boy Scout Troop 433 by designing and building a mobile flag retirement box. This box is housed at the VFW but can be moved in town for flag collection. Finally, he led Troop 433 in a flag retirement ceremony

where 44 American flags and 17 Texas flags were respectfully retired. Tyler's project ended with 305 volunteer service hours.

During the Court of Honor on Saturday, Tyler celebrated the family tradition as the 4th generation Eagle Scout. Tyler's grand grandfather Robert Henry Paul became an Eagle Scout in 1919 as a member of Troop 26 in Drexel, Ohio. Tyler's grandfather Robert Michael Paul became an Eagle Scout in October 1954 as a member of Troop 250 in Dayton, Ohio, and Tyler's on

Haynes earns superior service honor

COLLEGE STATION – The Texas A&M AgLife Extension Service presented its Superior Service – Agent award to Leonard Haynes, agriculture and natural resources agent in Donley County.

The Superior Service awards are the highest award presented by the agency. The recipients were honored Jan. 8 with a noon luncheon.

"Leonard runs a well-rounded educational program, effectively managing his time to maximize impacts for both youth and adults," said Brandon Dukes, AgLife Extension district administrator, in his nomination.

"Serving in a single agent capacity, he continues to make a significant annual health fair, as well as many other educational programs that some might consider to be outside the scope of his responsibilities," Dukes said.

Haynes exemplifies a well-rounded AgLife Extension professional, Dukes said.

"He is able to not only wear many hats but wear them effec-

tively," Dukes said. "His programming efforts have had a major impact on ag producers in Donley County."

According to producer-completed retrospective post surveys, program attendees have incurred an economic benefit totaling \$5,551,746, the nomination stated. This equates to \$20,715.50 per producer.

"It is obvious with those kinds of numbers that programs under Leonard's leadership are making a significant impact in Donley County," Dukes said. "The economic benefit producers are enjoying is directly correlated with the

knowledge they are gaining and practices they are being exposed to through Leonard's programming."

The programs he conducts are having an impact in other areas as well, the nomination stated.

"Donley County 4-H members know they can count on Leonard to be there whenever they need him, and they know that when he has an activity planned that they will have fun doing it," Dukes said.

Also, he said, newly hired AgLife Extension county agents depend on Haynes for guidance in meeting the demands of their clientele on a day to day basis, his nomination stated.

City kills personal property taxation

Clarendon Aldermen killed the personal property tax during their regular meeting last Thursday, January 10.

The unpopular taxation of cars, trucks, recreational vehicles, and other similar property had been in place for decades, but officials believe the city can now afford to end the tax thanks to increasing sales tax revenues.

Mayor Sandy Skelton applauded the City Council's action.

"I am pleased that the City Council rejected Ordinance 281 in its meeting on January 10 which effectively eliminates the City's portion of the very unpopular personal property tax on automobiles, trucks, trailers, campers, RV's, etc.," Skelton said. "The City of Clarendon is now among the majority of Texas cities that do not impose personal property tax on its citizens. As a result of this action, citizens will realize a tax savings when they pay their city taxes in January 2019."

Last week's action does not change the tax levy for 2019, which is already in place. City Hall has said previously that Clarendon's tax on personal property generated about \$50,000 per year for the city.

Donley Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Paula Lowrie said Clarendon is now one of four local entities that do not tax personal property.

City rejects lone aquatic center bid

Clarendon's proposed water recreation facility will go back through the bidding process after the first and only bid came in last week at more than \$1 million above the funds available for the project.

Plains Builders submitted the bid of \$3,162 million, and the City Council rejected that bid during its regular meeting January 10.

Mayor Sandy Skelton said inflation and increased tariffs are largely responsible for the higher than expected bid.

"The original design of the pool was completed approximately two years ago by Waters Edge, a highly reputable pool design company from Kansas City and the estimated cost at that time was \$1,655,000," Skelton said. "While costs have gone up since then due to inflation, a more significant reason for current cost increases is directly related to the government's imposed tariffs on steel, stone, concrete and other materials. Construction officials have told us that costs have risen as much as 25 to 30 percent due to the tariffs as well as the current economic uncertainty throughout the world."

City officials are confident that rebidding the project will be beneficial, and they believe that more construction firms will put forward proposals when the project is bid again in the next month or so. Skelton also says more funds can be raised for the project as well.

"While we are disappointed with the bid received, the pool Steering Committee, City Council and Waters Edge will be looking at various options over the next couple of weeks," Skelton said. "We feel confident that additional funds can be raised and the several cost saving changes can be implemented. With continued good leadership, this budgetary dilemma will be resolved, and we will move forward with our plans to construct a nice pool for the citizens of Clarendon and Donley County."

Filing open now for 18 local board positions

Citizens wishing to serve their community can now sign up for positions at six local governments that are scheduled to hold elections this spring.

The cities of Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardsville, the Clarendon and Hedley school districts, and the Donley County Hospital District all have a total of 18 board positions available this year.

In Clarendon, the two-year terms of Mayor Sandy Skelton and Aldermen Nathan Floyd and Jacob Funguan are up as well as one of the unexpired term now held by Elaine McIntosh.

Hedley has three aldermen seats up this year. The full three-year terms of the positions held by Aldermen Tonya Metcalf and Alicia Hanes as well as one vacant seat are up.

In Howardsville the terms of Mayor Greg Byers and Aldermen Johnny Floyd and Brice Hawley are expiring. Those are all two-year terms.

Clarendon ISD Trustees serve three years, and the terms of Robin Ellis, Chuck Robertson, and Will Thompson are expiring this year. Hedley ISD has two full three-year terms up this year. Those seats are held by Michael Metcalf and

Billy Hall.

The Donley County Hospital District Board of Directors has four two-year terms up this year. Those are currently held by Wayne Tubbs – Place 1, Jeff Robertson – Place 2, and Melinda McNear – Place 3. All local boards are elected at-large, but hospital board candidates must file for a specific place on the ballot. Candidate applications are available from the administrative offices of each entity.

Filing continues through Friday, February 15. Elections are scheduled to be held Saturday, May 4, 2019.

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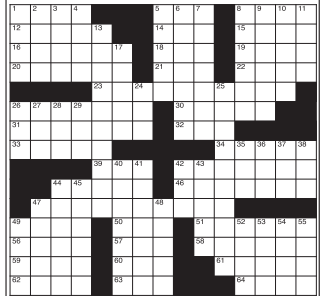

King serves on state budget board

AUSTIN — State Rep. Ken King (R-Canadian) of District 88 last attended the inaugural Legislative Budget Board (LBB) meeting for the 86th Legislative Session.

Rep. King was appointed by Speaker Dennis Bonnen to fulfill the remainder of the position the Speaker previously held as Chairman of the Ways & Means Committee. The Board's agenda included the consideration of the state's spending cap for the Biennial budget.

"Today it was my honor to attend the Legislative Budget Board meeting at the request of Speaker

Dennis Bonnen," said Rep. King. "My colleagues and I had productive conversations about the importance of taking a conservative approach to state spending while also allowing for meaningful school finance and property tax reform."

I'm confident in our Legislature's ability to accomplish these priorities and more, and we will do it while remaining faithful stewards of taxpayer dollars."

Members of the Board moved to authorize a 9.89 percent increase in the state budget cap. Senator Jane Nelson, Chair of the Senate Finance

Committee, reasoned that much of the increase will be necessary for ongoing Hurricane Harvey relief efforts along the Gulf Coast.

The LBB — a permanent joint committee of the Texas Legislature — develops budget and policy recommendations for legislative appropriations and performs fiscal analyses on legislation under consideration by the Texas Legislature.

The board is composed of ten members of the House and Senate, and is chaired by Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick and Speaker Dennis Bonnen.

erty. The other three are Clarendon CISD, the Donley County Hospital District, and the City of Howard. The county, Clarendon College, Hedley CISD, the City of Hedley, and the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District do levy taxes on personal property.

In other city business last week, aldermen also approved ballot language for an election this May that would alter the distribution of sales tax collected by the city. Currently, the city collects a two percent sales tax, which is allocated as follows: 1.0 for general revenue, 0.5 percent for economic development, and 0.5 percent for property tax reduction.

If approved by voters, the ballot measure would reallocate that two percent sales tax as follows: 1.25 percent for general revenue, 0.5 percent for economic development, and 0.25 percent for maintenance and repair of municipal streets.

The ballot measure would have no effect on the overall sales tax rate but, if approved, would dedicate a portion that could only be used for maintenance and repair of streets and sidewalks existing on the date of the election. The dedicated funds could not be used to build new streets.

More information about this ballot issue will be printed in a future issue.

Byars gives State of City address

Howardwick Mayor Gretta Byars delivered a "State of the City" address to open last Tuesday's regular city council meeting.

Byars said the city was starting the new year in a good financial position with more than \$107,000 in cash on hand and that work on a new agreement with Red River Water Authority was proceeding with a new well application submitted and repairs to the water system to be completed by April.

The mayor also pointed to the city contracting with Texas Communities Group as a positive step toward cleaning up the community and working to keep taxes down. She also said that the Planning & Zoning Committee will be working to bring zoning up to date, and she praised volunteers who have worked on city streets and helped clean up and beautify City Hall and other city facilities.

As goals for the city, Byars said she would love to see new playground equipment put in the park by

volunteers and also said she would like to see the entrance to the city improved.

Following the mayor's comments, the council met in closed session for about half an hour before returning to open session to give City Secretary Sandra Childress a raise. The council approved an order of election for the positions of mayor and two aldermen, and Childress encouraged people to run.

"We have more in common than what separates us," Childress said. "We can disagree but still work together."

Aldermen approved a motion to purchase \$1,500 worth of recycled oil for use in repairing streets.

The council also voted 4-1 to amend the city budget to move fund to cover a fine received from the state by the city's code enforcement person.

Alderman Brice Hawley opposed the measure, saying that he felt the code person should pay the fine themselves. Other aldermen

disagreed and said the council had already voted to have the city pay the fine. Hawley offered a motion to table the subject but did not receive a second.

Childress brought up the possibility of the city purchasing a seat in Clarendon's Mulkey Theatre out of neighborhood. Hawley said he was not opposed to buying the seat but felt it should be purchased through donations rather than tax dollars. The council voted 4-1 to purchase a seat for \$100, and citizens Tony and Dana Clemmish presented the council with a \$100 bill.

The council then voted to purchase a second chair at the theatre with the donated funds.

Alderman Johnny Hubbard discussed creating welcome packets for newcomers and prospective new residents, and the council approved the idea using volunteers for the effort.

City rules regarding dogs were discussed, but no action was taken until more information could be gathered.
