Threat notice came two weeks later

A "Threat Announcement" sent out by Clarendon CISD caused a stir last Wednesday afternoon, February 13, as school officials attempted to rumors about a situation that had already been handled.

School officials and the Donley County Sheriff's Office both said there was no threat at the school despite a "Threat Announcement" sent out by phone, text, and email.

"There is no existing threat at the school," Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Wednesday evening. "It's been handled. The subject is not even in the state, and I verified that moments ago."

Superintendent Mike Norrell told the Enterprise that the school was made aware of a threat made on social media two weeks earlier and addressed the issue at that time. Norrell said an individual, for whom the school already had a no trespass order in place, came to the high school but was denied access and turned away.

Following that incident, the individual made a potentially threatening post on social media. The school alerted the Donley County Sheriff's Office about the possible threat and the issue was handled at that time.

Both Norrell and Blackburn say their offices take any threat very seriously and that the safety of students and staff is their primary concern.

Norrell said the school decided to send out the notice last week because there was recurring talk at the school and downtown that nothing had been done about the original situation.

CC spring enrollment sets record

Clarendon College's spring enrollment is the highest spring enrollment in the school's 121-year

Total enrollment settled at 1,477 following the 12th class day this semester. That's up 1.79 percent from the spring 2018 enrollment of 1,451, and it marks the fourth spring semester in a row to show an increase.

"Our growth this semester is due to increased enrollment in our dual credit programs," CC President Dr. Robert Riza said.

The Clarendon campus saw a slight drop in enrollment of 11 students compared to one year ago. Riza said that could have been due in part to a large December graduation.

Pampa enrollment was up slightly, and Childress enrollment was down by 22. That drop is attributed to low unemployment in Childress, which typically negatively impacts college enrollment.

The number of high school students taking dual credit in Childress was up by 18.

"The Mashburn Foundation is donating money to help students take dual credit classes in Childress," Riza said.

"We hope to continue to provide opportunities for our service area and build on the success we've seen in the last few years," Riza said.

Overall, dual credit enrollment is at 631 compared to 583 in spring 2018. Enrollment at the Jordan and Roach correctional units is at 158, up from 143 last fall; and distance education is at 126, down from 139.

Enrollment on the home campus in Clarendon is 294 compared to 305 last spring.

The Clarendon College Pampa Center has an enrollment of 208, down from 199; the Childress Center is at 21 students compared to 43 last spring; and the Amarillo Center stayed flat with 39 students.

Why you should care about **SLAPP** lawsuits

Why would a law with the positive-sounding name Texas Citizens Participation Act be in danger? From whom? Should you be worried?

The short answer to the last question is yes. You should be worried unless you are insanely rich and don't value the public good above your own.

What does this law do?

Before 2011, people, businesses and other organizations with deep pockets could make their critics go away by filing frivolous lawsuits. They were frivolous because their purpose was not so much to win in court as to bury their targets in expensive, time-consuming litigation they couldn't afford. The result was that honest people and grassroots groups making legitimate complaints in the public's best interest would cease their opposition and in some cases issue a public apology. Imagine being forced to apologize for putting your nose in the way of the fist that broke it.

This kind of lawsuit is called a Strategic Lawsuit Against Public Participation, or, fittingly, a SLAPP.

SLAPPs also are a way to squelch journalistic efforts to inform the public. Left unchecked, SLAPPs could threaten the continued existence of the news media organizations they target. That's our selfish selfinterest in this topic — if you want to think of your right to know as selfish.

The Texas Citizens Participation Act went into effect in 2011, dealing a serious blow to SLAPP suits. It was so overwhelmingly popular that it passed both houses of the Legislature by more than two-thirds. It was the bipartisan work of state Rep. Todd Hunter, R-Corpus Christi, and Sens. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, and Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler.

The anti-SLAPP law allows the targets of SLAPP suits to seek a ruling within 60 days on whether all they were doing was exercising their right to speak, organize and petition freely. The bar they need to clear is low by design because the First Amendment is number one in importance.

Likewise, the bar that plaintiffs must clear in asserting that they have a legitimate complaint is high, to protect not only free speech but also our judicial system from junk lawsuits aimed mainly at bleeding defendants dry.

And then, if the plaintiffs don't clear that deliberately high bar, they have to pay the defendants' legal fees and court costs, taking a further sting out of SLAPPs.

The anti-SLAPP law is one of those rare birds in that the courts have made it stronger and more effective in protecting David from Goliath. Usually it's the other way around. By the end of 2018, the Texas Supreme Court had issued 15 opinions and the state's appeals courts had issued 270 related to the anti-SLAPP law.

Who'd want to end it? Why?

Irony of ironies, one of the most effective frivolous-lawsuit-killing reforms in history faces an existential threat from Texans for Lawsuit Reform, whose mission is to stop frivolous lawsuits.

Texans for Lawsuit Reform has sent every member of the Legislature a memo detailing its objections to a law it helped pass in 2011. It's a long memo, 25 pages not counting the cover letter, with lots of legalese. It's the kind of thing House or Senate members, even the ones who are lawyers, make their staffs read and summarize for them.

It all but guarantees that legislators will focus more on the messenger than the message. And why not? Texans for Lawsuit Reform is powerful and feared, like the NRA. The temptation for members of the Legislature will be to care more about what TLR wants than about what's right.

Will your senator and representative succumb to this temptation? It's in your best interest to ask them.

TLR wants the Legislature to narrow what's protected by the Citizens Participation Act and remove the mandatory attorney fee and court cost reimbursements. TLR also wants to end the law's moratorium on discovery during a defendant's appeal.

The upshot is that the law no longer would have its teeth, claws, or guts.

As of this writing, no bill has been filed, but the table has been set. News organizations in Texas, including this one, stand ready to oppose it.

TLR's opposition isn't really all that ironic if you consider that historically its efforts have been more about protecting Goliath from David than the other way around. In fairness, Goliath isn't always the villain. The term "slip and fall" wasn't invented for no good reason.

But it's in the public's best interest for the protections afforded by the Citizens Participation Act to err on the side of the defendant in a SLAPP suit, even at the expense of a plaintiff whose suit has merit. It's like protecting the innocent at the expense of letting some criminals go free.

For most of my adult life, I've bought into the "balance of nature" thing, perhaps ignited by reasonable absorption of elementary school "book learnin" about plants, oxygen, carbon dioxide, tides and other stuff.

Now, I'm ready to "sell back" a long-held supposition that squirrels and acorns come out generally even on matters of supply and demand.

Hogwash. When we moved to our Burleson, Texas, home 17 years ago, we gave little thought to the name of our neighborhood: Oak Valley. My wife of 52 years whimpers mostly about our acorns. She fears that they'll become full-grown trees, and that maybe we'll be the first victims of outdoor suffocation. Additionally, there'll be yet another reason for our neighbors to laugh at us.

Thankfully, yard maintenance was provided during half of our professional years, and here lately, our 15-year-old grandson Jonah has provided mowing and edging. On yard work, I've been pretty much "home free" – until now. I feel the pressure; it's up to me to dispose of the dreaded leaves and acorns. I'm coming out of retirement to take on this dastardly debris....





Beto O'Rourke versus border wall

On Thursday, former Democratic candidate for Texas senate Beto O'Rourke stated that he not only disapproves of President Trump's border wall proposal, but he would also tear down the existing border barriers on the southern border at the moment.

This was in response to MSNBC's Chris Hayes question "If you could, would you take the [existing southern border barriers] down now?" Beto's response was "Yes, absolutely. I would take the wall down."

Beto also claimed after his rally in El Paso on Monday night that walls kill people. He stated that El Paso is one of America's safest cities despite of the wall put in place there. "With the eyes of the country upon us, all of us together are going to make our stand, here in one of the safest cities in the United States of America -- safe not because of walls,

but in spite of walls. We treat each other with dignity and respect. That is the way we make our community and our country safe. Walls do not save lives. They end lives."

He is pandering to the Democratic base in those responses. However, he is disagreeing with a structure that does what it's intended to do. The Hill reports that "Since [the wall's] construction in 2005, it has yielded better than a 90 percent drop in illegal traffic. Similar numbers have been registered at other physical barriers in San Diego, El Paso, Texas, and Tucson, Arizona, since their construction."

In these places, the Republican National Committee presents that since these barriers were constructed, illegal traffic has dropped by over 90 percent. In 2018, the US Border Patrol was involved in the seizing of 282,000 pounds of cocaine, 248,000 pounds of

methamphetamine, 6,500 pounds of heroin, and 2,400 pounds of fentanyl. Over 17,000 illegal adults who were arrested in 2018 at the border had prior criminal records.

Israel has even gotten involved in the discussion. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu tweeted, "President Trump is right. I built a wall along Israel's southern border. It stopped all illegal immigration. Great success. Great idea." He is right. After it's wall was built, illegal immigration rates in Israel dropped 99 percent.

In fact, in 2013, all 54 Democratic Senator voted to pass legislation that gave \$46 billion to build some sort of physical barrier at the border. Yet they protest when 1/9th of that is requested by someone other than a Democrat. That's because it's partisan politics and always is no matter the issue. Noab Elam is a senior at Clarendon High

Lion Tex Buckhaults reported on the college, where the softball team is on winning streak, the livestock team is competing in San Antonio, and the president is in Austin.


Lion Lambert gave a brief program on protective orders in the legal world.

There being no further business, we were dismissed to spread Lionism and good cheer throughout our fair county.

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

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

In this application, SWEPCO seeks to recover its transmission capital investments from July 1, 2016 through September 30, 2018. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

This notice is being published in accordance with PURA § 36.103 and 16 TAC § 22.51(a)(1).

SWEPCO requests that the Commission approve an increase of \$12,579,246 above the revenue requirement approved by the Commission in SWEPCO's last base rate case, Docket No. 46449 (as reduced to reflect the reduction in federal corporate income taxes resulting from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017). This amounts to a 3.58 percent increase in SWEPCO's overall annualized Texas retail revenue requirement. SWEPCO proposes that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission.

All customers in SWEPCO's Texas retail rate classes will be affected by this change. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.






