Howardwick voters elect **Clemishire Robinson joins CISD**; City okays street tax

Tony Clemishire will be the new mayor of Howardwick, a new face will join the Clarendon school board, and Clarendon residents approved a tax measure during voting last Saturday, May 4.

A total of 148 votes were cast in the race to determine who would succeed Howardwick Mayor Greta Byars. Clemishire easily carried the election with 105 votes followed by Alderman Brice Hawley 32, Coy Cooper 9, and J.D. Kindle 2.

Alderman Johnny Floyd won re-election to the Howardwick City Council with 130 votes, and former code officer Jerry Mulanax was also elected to the council with 89 votes. Others running for City Council were Beverly McCaskill 29, Tammy Jordan 12, and Ericka Mills 9.

Howardwick residents also voted in favor of reauthorizing a quarter-cent sales tax that raises money for street maintenance but a margin of 133-11.

Street maintenance was also before Clarendon voters, who voted 60-12 to abolish a half-cent sales tax that went towards property tax reduction and replace it with a quartercent sales tax for street maintenance and a quarter-cent tax for general revenue. The property tax reduction sales tax had been lowering the city's ad valorem rate by about 20 cents per \$100. The new tax will raise about \$50,000 for street maintenance and \$50,000 for general revenue.

A total of 126 ballots were cast in the city election, but only 72 people voted on the tax question.

Also on the city ballot, Mayor Sandy Skelton and Aldermen Jacob Fangman, Nathan Floyd, and Eulaine McIntosh were all up for re-election but faced no opposition.

A very close election added challenger Zack Robinson to the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees. In the four-person race for three seats on the school board, Robinson received 117 votes and incumbents Chuck Robertson and Robin Ellis were returned to the board with 114 and 112 votes respectively. Incumbent Will Thompson fell just short of re-election with 111.

Will the new NAFTA boost digital trade?

Earlier this month, the International Trade Commission (ITC) issued its assessment of the renegotiated NAFTA. The ITC concluded that the new NAFTA would have a moderately positive impact on the U.S. economy, with GDP increasing by \$68.2 billion after six years. Much of this gain was due to "reduced policy uncertainty about digital trade," as NAFTA's new rules in this area are supposed to deter burdensome regulations, thereby paving the way for growth.

The reality of international rules on digital trade is likely to be very different, however. It took decades for the equivalent rules on trade in goods to take shape, and while innovations in digital trade governance are important, a burst of growth from the new NAFTA's digital trade rules is unlikely.

International trade rules related to domestic regulation of goods have been around since the start of the world trading system. When the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) took effect in 1948, one of its core obligations was that governments could not use taxes and regulation to discriminate against for-

However, there was uncertainty about how such rules would apply. For example, sometimes domestic regulations relied on ostensibly objective criteria, but were actually intended to pursue disguised protectionism. How could the line be drawn between protectionist and legitimate regulations?

In a series of cases over the ensuing years, at the GATT and then the World Trade Organization (WTO), its successor organization, the nuances of this issue were sorted out. With decades of experience and case law in hand, there is now a fair amount of certainty as to how domestic regulations should be constructed to avoid creating protectionist barriers to trade in goods and to operate in accordance with international trade

The ITC expects something similar from the new NAFTA's rules on digital trade. It says these rules would maintain "current regulatory conditions," and "deter future trade and investment barriers" in the form of more restrictive regulations and standards. Up to now, the ITC explains, "firms have largely been able to transfer data freely between the countries," and the new NAFTA commitments provide "assurance to firms that current conditions will be maintained into the future."

But the absence of any experience with applying these new commitments should give everyone pause. It is true that there are broad obligations in the new NAFTA related to data flows, such as this one: "No Party shall prohibit or restrict the cross-border transfer of information, including personal information, by electronic means if this activity is for the conduct of the business of a covered person." But there are also multiple exceptions to this obligation: There is a specific exception directly following the cross-border data transfer obligation, for government measures that are "necessary to achieve a legitimate public policy objective"; there are general exceptions for certain designated public policy objectives, which apply to all obligations in the agreement; and there are extremely deferential "security" exceptions that could come up if governments restrict data flows due to concerns about

The GATT/WTO cases gave governments a chance to flesh out the rules through litigation and gave everyone a better understanding of how the rules applied. But that process has not even begun with digital trade, and at this point we simply do not know how the new NAFTA's rules on digital trade, and the various exceptions, will affect domestic regulation in

The Trump administration has taken a mixed approach to regulation: It has been hands off in some areas, while being more active in others. But a future Democratic president, such as Sen. Elizabeth Warren, would likely be a lot more active, especially in the tech sector. Would the new NAFTA's rules on digital trade act as a constraint for any such regulation? It is hard to imagine that they would. A U.S. administration that wanted to regulate digital trade would simply invoke one of the various exceptions, and if the U.S. regulation was nevertheless found to violate the agreement, it is doubtful that the government would change its policies.

That is not to say that digital trade rules in trade agreements have no value, however. We are in the beginning stages of a technological revolution, with wide-ranging implications for personal privacy, business practices, and security matters. Regulation in this area is evolving, and there is a strong possibility that protectionist regulation, excessive regulation, or simply regulations that differ across countries, will interfere with trade.

But the ITC's projections are speculative, and the new NAFTA rules are unlikely to lead to an economic boost anytime soon. At the GATT/WTO, governments eventually figured out what the rules meant, and protectionist regulations faced international constraints. Data is more complicated than the average physical product, however, from both a technology and a regulatory perspective, and it could take even longer to sort out where to draw the line between protectionist regulation and legitimate policies. Experience is needed here. Governments will have to register concerns about specific policies, and complaints will have to be filed, in order to establish what exactly the digital trade rules mean and how they constrain domestic regulation of data. With the new NAFTA, this important work has begun, but the multibillion-dollar economic gains may be a ways off.

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

Trump to empower border patrol

A new variable is coming to the illegal immigration stage. President Trump is reported to now be considering a procedure that would empower the United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officials to determine whether asylum seekers can enter the next phase of immigration control after an interview.

According to The Washington Examiner, the Department of Homeland Security is hurrying towards a new policy that would "give federal law enforcement on the border the authority to conduct interviews with asylum seekers who fear returning to their home countries."

These interviews, called "fear interviews", are actually the first official step for asylum seekers trying to gain temporary citizenship status in the United States. In 2019 alone, there has been a bevy of asylum seekers arriving at the

border, usually in the form of "migrant

This new policy is supposedly going to help take some of the weight off Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) by lowering the numbers of requests ICE agents have to attend to.

Given the policy is actually pronounced and put into action, CBP would make the decisions regarding asylum seekers. ICE would then manage those allowed by CBP. President Trump's new plan would effectively change the way CBP and ICE process these individuals. Currently, CBP and ICE process each claim into the country one-by-one.

Sure that process works when the crossing rates are limited to a couple thousand a month. However, the recent appearances of migrant caravans have made it too overwhelming to approach it in that manner due to the border patrol custody holding time of 72 days. ICE simply cannot move fast enough to get

immigrants out within the 72-day time limit. And if these immigrants reach the 72-day mark, they are released into the United States for two to five years until their hearing date, which many do not even attend.

While the proposed immigration policy could help these measures, there is some clear disadvantages. An example is that one interview makes it hard to determine intent of a person. Some would even say that allowing illegal immigrants into the immigration process before people looking to enter the country legally is unfair, and they would be right. Some would also say our aid should be focused on people in our own country, and they would be right. However, I believe that, as a country founded on Christian values, it is our duty as a country to help others. Given that, it is definitely a hard situation to manage.

The Boss Lion and Lion Russell Estlack gave a brief but impressive program, which in summary said, "Dieting and exercising both work."


There being no further business, we were adjourned to spread Lionism and good cheer throughout our fair county.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

Property owners have the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern

- the appraised (market) value of your property
- the unequal value of your property compared with other properties the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxing units taxing your property the property ownership
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal failure of the chief appraiser or appraisal review board (ARB)
- to send a required notice any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district (CAD) or ARB that applies to and adversely affects you.

For information about informal review and obtaining property tax records, call your appraisal district at the number listed on the Notice of Appraised Value.

f you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you may file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device (such as a CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to properly submit evidence on a small portable electronic device must be reviewed

To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person or you may by telephone conference call or submission of written affidavit to present your evidence, facts and

If you decide to participate by telephone conference call, you m st provide your evidence to the ARB with a written affidavit before 283, Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for the hearing by affidavit.

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present

evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented by both parties. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required sign-an affidavits aying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you chose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you choose to appeal to the SOAH. you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must payeither the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at the address and telephone number shown on the Notice of Appraised Value. You can get Comptroller forms and additional information on how to prepare a protest from the Comptroller's website at comptroller.texas.gov/taxes/property-tax/

Deadline for Filing Protest with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

Not later than May 15 (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later)

Late protests are allowed for good cause if you miss the usual deadline. The ARB decides whether you have a good cause. Late protests are not allowed

after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the $30^{\rm th}$ day after the notice of the determination was delivered

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that

increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the $30^{\rm th}{\rm day}$ after the notice of the change was delivered to you

If you believe the CAD or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before axes become delinquent (usually February I) or no later than the 125 day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.
