## Memorial Day plans set for next Monday

Two Donley County services have been planned for Memorial Day next Monday, May 27.

The Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion will host Memorial Day services at Rowe Cemetery at 10 a.m. The speaker will be Judge John Howard.

Prior to Monday's service, the post will place flags on 235 veterans' graves there on Friday, May 24, as well as on graves at the Jericho Cemetery.

Also on Monday, a service will be held at the Donley County War Memorial on the Courthouse Lawn in Clarendon at 11 a.m. to remember all servicemen and servicewomen. In case of bad weather, the service will be moved to the VFW Hall.

A free hamburger lunch will be served at the VFW Hall immediately following the ceremony.

# Mulkey Theatre opening this weekend

The Mulkey Theatre will re-open for the first time in more than 30 years this weekend following 11 years of rehabilitation work costing \$1 million.

Workers this week are putting the finishing touches on the 1946 theatre as it prepares to host three days of opening activities, starting with a gala event this Saturday, May 25.

Some advance tickets are still

available for the opening night. General admission for the event is \$50 per person each for a full evening of entertainment. The doors will open at 5 p.m., and the entertainment will start at 6 p.m.

In addition to a red carpet entrance and food and refreshments, organizers have planned a program to take attendees back in time to the opening of the 1946 theatre while also demonstrating the theatre's new

capabilities.

The Mulkey's first live musical performance will be the South Plains Jazz Orchestra playing big band hits from the 1940s, and the artistic director from the outdoor musical "TEXAS" is preparing a live theatre act to follow the band.

The featured motion picture presentation for the grand opening will be a 1946 John Wayne and Claudette Colbert movie, "Without

Reservations."

Mulkey organizers encourage folks to get tickets ahead of time for Saturday's grand opening. Tickets are available at the Clarendon Visitor Center or by calling 874-SHOW.

Following Saturday night's grand opening, the Mulkey will hold four free admission matinees on Sunday, May 27, and Monday, May 28, at 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. each day. There will be no admission

charge on a first come, first served basis. Movies scheduled for those matinees are "Greece" followed by "The Majestic" on Sunday and "Despicable Me" followed by "The Cowboys" on Monday.

The Mulkey will begin scheduling new movies, classic movies, and live events beginning June 7.

## Clemishire takes over as Howardwick mayor

### Council names Grady to fill vacancy

Tony Clemishire took the reins as Howardwick's new mayor last Tuesday, May 14, and was sworn in along with two new members of the city council.

Outgoing Mayor Greta Byars opened the meeting and presided through the canvassing of May 4 election.

Clemishire expressed his appreciation for those who elected him and asked for patience as the new council gets to business. The mayor also said he intends to bring citizens' comments back to the end of regular council meetings so long as folks remain respectful.

Mayor Clemishire also brought up the community effort to fund a SchoolNet weather station at the Howardwick City Hall. Within a few minutes, donations from those in attendance totaled about \$800, which when added to the monies already donated and pledged was enough to secure that equipment.

The council also discussed the upcoming Howardwick Hoe-Down that will raise funds for street repairs.

Aldermen approved spending \$745 for hoe-down related expenses, some of which – t-shirts and caps to sell, for example – is expected to recoup that money for the city. The Hoe-Down will be held June 8.

Also taking the oath of office last week was Alderman Johnny Floyd, who was reelected to his position and newly elected Alderman Jerry Mulanax. The council accepted the resignation of Alderman Debbora Sharpton and voted to appoint Mary Grady to take her place. Alderman Grady was also sworn in and took her seat at the council table.

In other city business, the council accepted bids for properties through Texas Communities Group. City Hall said later that 37 properties were sold in that one motion through TCG.

The council also approved the sale of three lots in the Country Club North section and three lots in the Country Club Central section.

Alderman Johnny Hubbard was elected as mayor pro-tem by his fellow council members.

## County lifts burn ban

Donley County Commissioners lifted the county-wide burn ban during their regular meeting last Monday, May 13.

Plentiful rains have considerably greened up the country since commissioners enacted the ban back in March.

Commissioners also had several other agenda items to deal with, including approved \$500 to sponsor the annual Chuckwagon Cookoff and purchasing flowers from the Donley County 4H for the courthouse flower pots.

Bids for properties in Howardwick and Hedley were

approved, and commissioners approved contracting with Purple Wave, Inc., to hold an online auction for surplus equipment next month.

The commissioners' court approved purchase of a new computer for Prct. 3&4 Constable Doug Wright and considered but took no action on a request for funds for the Clarendon airport.

The status of the tree removal work was discussed. Rain and parked cars during court proceedings have hindered the progress of the project, but Judge John Howard reports that it is expected to be finished by the end of May.

# Clarendon students qualify for THSR state finals

Clarendon High School seniors Brandalyn Ellis and Cole Franks will be traveling to Abilene, Texas, June 8-15 to compete in the Texas High School Rodeo Association State Finals.

The state finals rodeo is an annual, week-long event where high school students across Texas and surrounding states come and compete. Numerous awards, scholarships and the opportunity to represent Texas at the National High School Finals Rodeo held each July are all up for grabs.

Contestants compete in rodeos throughout the year in one of 10 regions across the state. At the last rodeo of regional level competition, the top 10 competitors in each event are announced. These contestants are then given the opportunity to represent their region on the state level at the THSRA state finals.

Brandalyn and Cole, both CHS seniors and members of the THSRA Regions 1 & 3 respectively, will be competing on the state level in the Pole Bending (Brandalyn) and Bareback and Saddle Bronc (Cole) events.

Rodeo performances, as well as, other events held throughout the week are open to the public each morning and afternoon. # Trump fans don’t want war with Iran

Supporters of Donald Trump who hoped that he would adopt a new, less interventionist foreign policy for the United States have ample reasons to feel disappointed. The administration’s increasingly belligerent policy toward Iran, which may lead to war, is just the most recent case in which the president has betrayed those supporters.

During his presidential campaign in 2016, Trump repeatedly condemned Washington’s regime-change wars and nation-building crusades. Much to the shock and fury of the other Republican candidates, he did not confine his criticism to policies that Barack Obama’s administration pursued; instead he excoriated George W Bush for the Iraq war and the seemingly endless military mission in Afghanistan.

An increasingly war-weary American public seemed receptive to Trump’s message. Even a sizable faction of Republican voters broke with the party’s more conventional presidential candidates, who continued to express rote endorsements of Bush’s actions and the underlying policy rationale. Those voters also reacted favorably to Trump’s demands for greater burden-sharing by Washington’s allies in Europe and east Asia.

It is hard to measure just how large a factor Trump’s break with the bipartisan orthodoxy on foreign policy was in his demolition of opponents in the Republican primaries and his upset victory over Hillary Clinton in the general election. But it certainly was a factor. Even voters who were wary about some of Trump’s other policy views — and questions about his character and demeanor- were uneasy about Clinton’s hawkish record.

As secretary of state, she had been a key architect of the Obama administration’s ill-advised military intervention to unseat Libya’s Muammar Qaddafi — a move that created chaos in that country. After she left office, Clinton lobbied heavily for a similar US intervention to help rebels overthrow the Syrian leader, Bashar al-Assad. Perhaps most troubling, she pushed for a highly confrontational policy toward Russia, even comparing President Vladimir Putin to Adolf Hitler. Antagonizing a nuclear-armed power did not seem like a prudent strategy to worried voters who then gravitated toward Trump’s call for improved US relations with Moscow.

Once in office, though, it was not long before Trump’s actions contrasted sharply with his campaign rhetoric. Vice-President Mike Pence and the secretary of defense, Jim Mattis, quickly assured the European allies of Washington’s undying devotion to its Nato commitments. Trump himself voiced similar sentiments. Although he also continued making brusque demands for greater burden-sharing, such comments undercut the latter message.

The continuation of Washington’s military meddling in the Middle East and central Asia constituted an even greater betrayal of hopes for a more realistic, restrained US foreign policy. Despite his campaign promise to end the intervention in Afghanistan, Trump reneged on that pledge and even increased the number of troops deployed. A similar pattern emerged with the mission in Syria. Indeed, US conduct became even more proactive.

Following allegations that the Assad regime had used chemical weapons on a rebel-held village, Trump ordered missile strikes on the airbase where the attacks supposedly originated. US military involvement with Kurdish rebels fighting both Isis and the Syrian government also increased. And despite Trump’s statement in December 2018 that he intended to pull all US troops out of Syria, he soon diluted that pledge. Several thousand troops now seem poised to remain in Syria indefinitely.

Thus far, Trump’s supporters and other advocates of a more restrained foreign policy seem inclined to blame the president’s advisers more than they do the president himself. W James Antle III, editor of the American Conservative, notes that “let Trump be Trump” is a battle cry of the 45th president’s populist admirers. They especially direct their fire at the ultra-hawkish John Bolton with respect to policy toward Iran and Syria. That complaint is understandable. Bolton and the secretary of state, Mike Pompeo, clearly seek to push the president in a more hawkish, confrontational orientation. In addition to their influence on Middle East policy, they appear to have had a malignant effect on Trump’s negotiating stance at the Hanoi summit with the North Korean leader, Kim Jong-un, when at least a limited agreement to reduce tensions on the Korean peninsula seemed within reach.

Even before the appointments of Bolton and Pompeo, though, the president often showed signs of being swayed by his foreign policy advisers. In his address to the nation announcing his decision to continue the Afghanistan intervention, Trump stated that his initial intention had been to terminate the mission, but that Mattis and other advisers had convinced him to change his mind.

Trump’s supporters should exhibit no patience for such excuses. The president has nearly unfettered ability to choose his advisers. It was Trump’s decision to surround himself with a mixture of stale, conventional thinkers and extreme hawks. As Antle emphasizes, “the buck does ultimately stop with the president, as Harry Truman said.” Neither faction was ever inclined to support his call for a more restrained, selective foreign policy. Yet Trump ignored the roster of available policy experts who would have supported such a change. If he continues to betray his war-weary supporters, they may well abandon him in the 2020 presidential election, and they would be fully justified in doing so.

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Nervous titters loudened– and no doubt many pints raised– by our across-the-pond friends– prior to the birth of Archie Harrison Mountbatten-Windsor to Prince Harry and his wife, Meghan, the Duke and Duchess of Sussex.

Early on, there was “clatter and chatter” about what the sex of the baby would be. Gambling odds were posted, mostly concerning the new baby’s name.

It wouldn’t have surprised me if smoke– wafting in colors of blue or pink from the castle– had silently announced the baby’s sex....

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When I heard the new baby’s full name, I thought the smallest type available will be required if he ever needs a business card. If such card were actually to be read, magnification would be required. (Okay, life might be simpler to consider shortening his name.)

When my 106-year-old Uncle Mort heard of the commotion in Britain prior to Archie’s birth, he misunderstood the news report.

Instead of “Sussex,” he thought the newsman said “Suffix.”...

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“That was okay by me,” he said. “After all, the baby was overdue, right?”

When Mort tears into a topic, it’s like a Rottweiler snaring a T-bone off a meat wagon. His conclusions often confound.

If the baby had been early, he wondered if ‘Prefix’ would have been used. I didn’t attempt to answer. To have done so would have meant his traversing rabbit trails even further....

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News commentators have revealed that “Archie”– while seemingly a commoner’s moniker– actually is shortened from “Archibald.”

They say that “Archie” means genuine, and that “bald” stands for “bold” or “brave.”

Uncle Mort will speculate for a long time about the “Archie” part, and he may even take in after the “bald” syllable....

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He will center on the “whys” and “what ifs.”

Mort will scour the Internet, perhaps learning that “Prince Archie of Riverdale” already has been invited to join Archie Comics’ Facebook bunch.

You remember comic figure Archie, right? Pep Comics introduced him in December 1941, the same month that Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. (Comic books’ popularity soared in the 1940s, offering diversion from horrifying World War II news.)....

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Back then, we turned pages instead of pushing game buttons on phones and iPads, and often engaged in trading the comic books.

Anyways, Archie Andrews had friends named “Jughead” Jones, and then there were friends named Betty and Veronica, and the Riverdale school principal, Mr. Weatherbee.

Mort might also be thankful that England’s famous new infant wasn’t somehow named “Jughead.”...

Bunker was the unquestioned star of “All in the Family,” a Friday night “must see” sitcom that ruled TV viewing during most of the 70s. He sparred each week with son-in-law “Meathead” and wife Edith, whom he was always warning to “dummy up.”

The show was awash, of course, in “political incorrectness.”...

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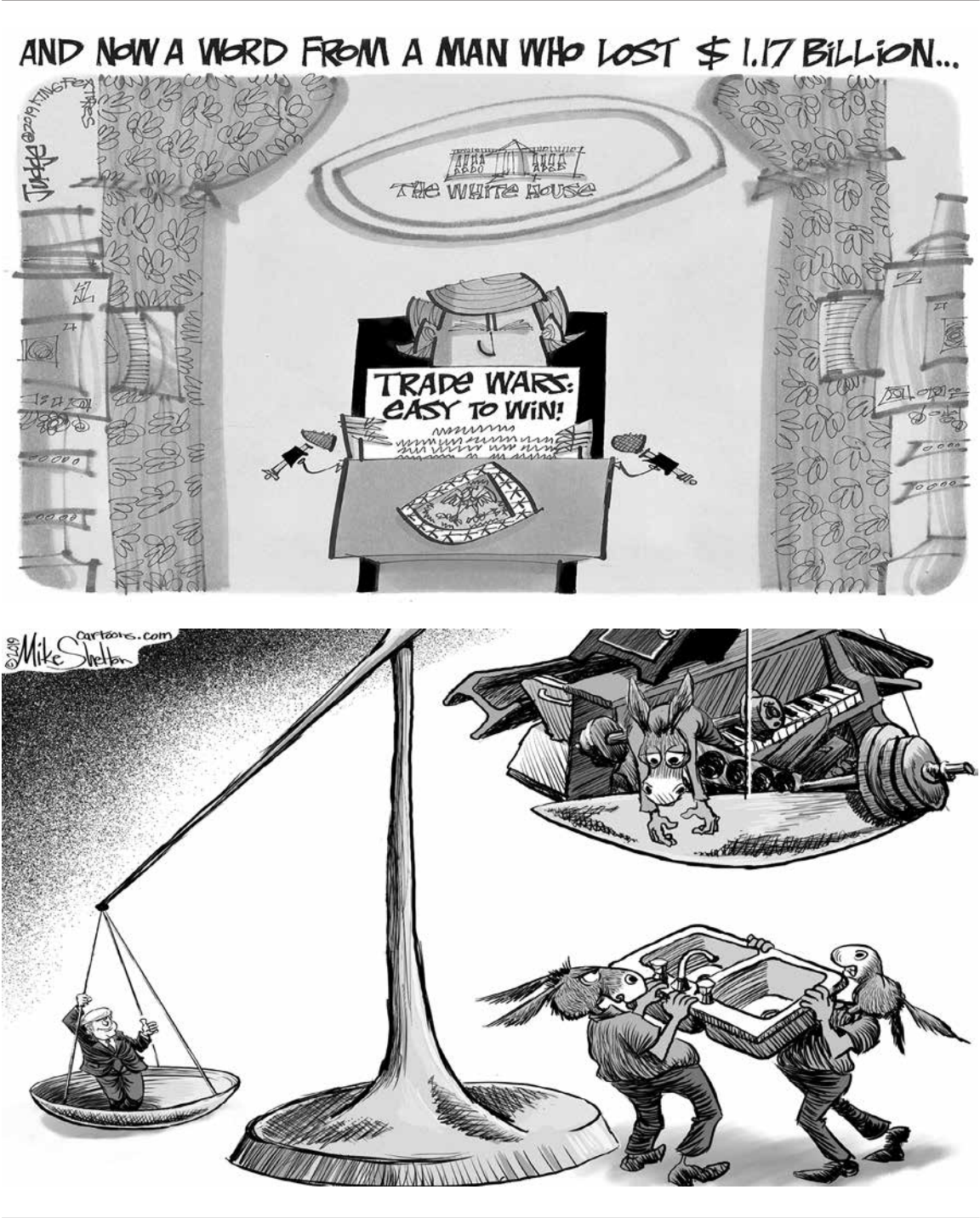
At least Harry and Meghan likely gave much thought to naming their son.

# Abortion making the news again

Honestly, she is flat out wrong.

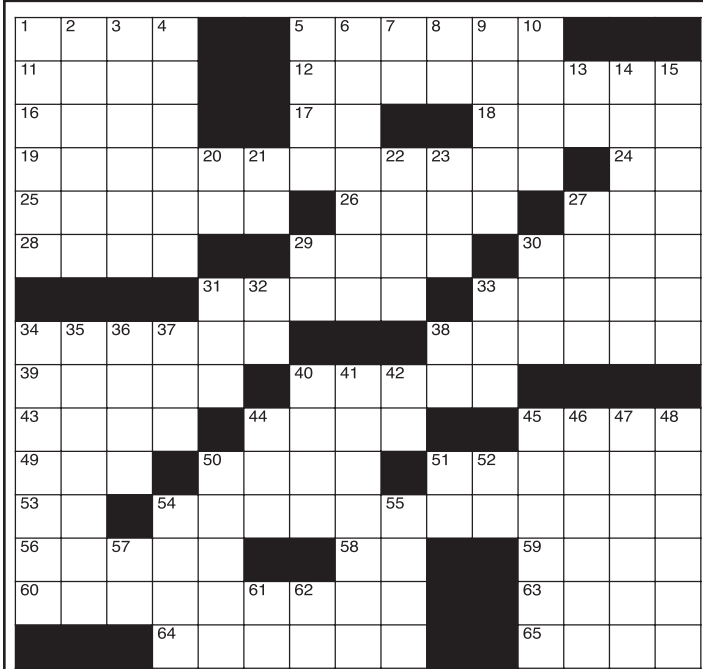

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Funding available for Texas conservation projects

Even in today’s modern world, there are areas of the US that don’t have easy access to affordable, fresh foods that make up a healthy diet. These areas are considered food deserts.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) is accepting applications to establish gardens, rainwater harvesting systems and seasonal high tunnels through the Texas NRCS Urban and Rural Conservation Projects.

These projects will help establish gardens to grow healthy produce in areas of need and to educate urban and rural youth, organizations, and communities about the importance of conservation, urban agriculture and growing healthy fresh vegetables.

The Texas NRCS Urban and Rural Conservation Project will provide technical and financial assistance to eligible entities to establish or improve gardens for

food production, for attracting and maintaining pollinator habitat including monarch butterflies, to install rainwater harvesting systems, and to establish high tunnels to extend the growing season of fruits and vegetables.

Addressing hunger with an urban garden can bring communities together and initiate other positive outcomes.

The Texas NRCS Urban and Rural Conservation Project is an effort to challenge community organizations, educational institutions and Native American tribes to establish community and school gardens across Texas. Pollinator habitat planted with urban gardens can provide an increase in harvest potential while providing food and habitat for declining insect communities in Texas.

“The simple act of planning a garden can help unite neighbors in a common effort and inspire locally-led solutions to challenges facing our state,” said Salvador Salinas, Texas

NRCS state conservationist. “These challenges can be addressed with locally-led diverse solutions in urban and rural settings.”

Grants are available up to \$4,000 for a vegetable garden, \$3,000 for a pollinator garden, \$5,000 for a rainwater harvesting system and \$6,500 for a seasonal high tunnel.

Applications for the Urban and Rural Conservation Project are due by June 7, 2019. The Notice of Funding Opportunity is available at <https://www.grants.gov/>. The Opportunity number is USDA-NRCS-TX-UCP-19-01 and USDA-NRCS-TX-RCP-19-02, and the title is Texas NRCS Urban Conservation Project and Texas NRCS Rural Conservation Project. 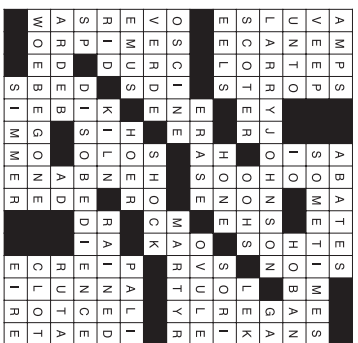

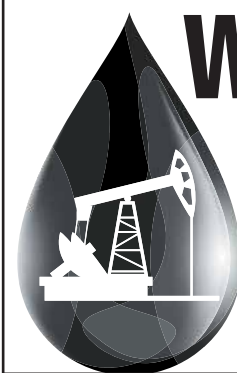
