SH 203 intersection in Hedley to close

The Childress District of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) announced a temporary closure of the SH 203 intersection in Hedley in conjunction with the rehabilitation project currently underway on the northbound lanes of US 287 in Hedley.

The exit is expected to be closed on December 16 and will be closed for around three weeks, weather permitting.

"During the closure drivers can access Hedley via North Bailey Street and McDougal Street," stated Childress Area Engineer Matt Herbstritt. Both roads can also be used by drivers in Hedley needing access to US 287.

The \$8 million highway rehab project is making significant improvements to US 287 through the city limits of Hedley and is expected to be complete by the end of March 2020.

Mulkey to host Big Band Christmas

The Mulkey Theatre will present a "Big Band Christmas" concert in a live performance on Saturday, December 14, at 7 p.m.

The South Plains Dance Orchestra will return to the Mulkey stage to entertain everyone with popular holiday songs.

General admission for this Christmas concert is \$15 per person, and VIP balcony seating packages are available for \$150 for a set of four recliner seats with special refreshments and wait service.

CCISD names Bellar as lone finalist

Clarendon new school superintendent will be no stranger to the community after beginning his education career here.

Jarod Bellar was named December 4 as the lone finalist for the top school position during a called meeting of the Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees.

Bellar, who is currently the superintendent of Baird ISD east of Abilene, began his career as a junior high social studies teacher and coach in Clarendon in 1994.

"It's a great time to reconnect," Bellar said of coming back to Clarendon this week.

After spending two years at Clarendon Junior High, Bellar

returned to his hometown of Sudan for three years and then moved to Olton. He later spent four years teaching at Springlake-Earth before moving up to the high school principal's position for another four years.

Bellar and his family then moved to Baird in 2008, where he began as an elementary and middle school principal before taking the superintendent's position there in 2011.

"I've kept up with Clarendon from a distance," Bellar said. "The school has done well academically and athletically."

The school's reputation along with the close proximity to Canyon,

where his son now plays football for West Texas A&M University, made it attractive for Bellar to apply for the superintendent's position in Clarendon. He also said he believes the school will be a good fit for his daughter, who is a high school sophomore.

Bellar's wife, Jenifer, is a school counselor and federal programs coordinator in Baird. She and their daughter will move to Clarendon after this school year is over.

"I just want to get to know everyone and learn the inner workings of the school and move forward as an even better district," Bellar said. "The people here seem very welcoming and supportive."

High school principal Larry Jeffers and elementary principal Mike Word were also here when Bellar was here in the 1990s, he said.

Last week's unanimous board decision followed the third and final interview in a second round of meetings with top applicants, according to Interim Superintendent Mike Jackson.

"I think his prior experience here was a factor in his selection," Jackson said. "When you have someone who knows the community, it says a lot."

Bellar says January 6 is his tentative start date. School trustees must wait 21 days from last Wednesday to formally hire Bellar.

Alert system glitch causes confusion

A computer malfunction activated a regional Emergency Management Warning System last Saturday night, confusing citizens and resulting in Donley County's 911 system being overwhelmed.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the trouble began at about 6:45 p.m. when the PARIS alert system operated by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) was triggered to activate all of the programmed alert templates. Donley County Judge John Howard said the error was later determined to have been caused by a software update that had been installed six hours

earlier.

During the malfunction, residents in Donley County began receiving multiple phone calls and messages from the office of emergency management but with no details of the supposed emergency.

The malfunction also impacted the Clarendon College alert system, activating templated messages for various emergency situations, and alerts were activated in Ochiltree, Swisher, Gray, and Hansford counties as well, according to Howard.

Blackburn said confused citizens then began calling

911 and the direct line to the sheriff's office. Three people were answering calls, but the volume still overloaded the 911 system, which began diverting calls to dispatchers in neighboring counties.

PRPC shut down the system, which was repaired and brought back online this week, officials said.

"This had nothing to do with anything that was done here, but I apologize to the citizens for the concern and confusion this caused," Blackburn said.

Blackburn said residents should be aware in the future

that actual emergency alerts will contain details of the emergency as well as any instructions for how residents should respond to that emergency.

The sheriff also said that in an actual emergency his office will work with The Clarendon Enterprise to get information out to citizens quickly through the web and social media.

Also in case of an actual emergency, Blackburn urges people to not call 911 or the sheriff's office direct line unless they are in actual distress to avoid overloading the system and emergency personnel.

Three in custody after high-speed chase

Three Little Rock, Arkansas, men are being held in the Donley County Jail this week following a high speed chase that early Sunday morning.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the Texas Highway Patrol alerted his office about 1:45 a.m. December 8 that a dark, four-door Nissan was not pulling over for DPS and was headed south on SH 70 into Clarendon.

The vehicle was pursued on US 287 through the city to Carhart Street where it turned south and

then came back around to head back toward SH 70.

"They went through the Medical Center parking lot and threw out a loaded pistol at that point," Blackburn said.

Heading north again on SH 70, the chase reached sustained speeds of 118 miles per hour and then went eastbound on Interstate 40 before the pursuit ended at McLean.

Carson County and Gray County officers joined Donley and DPS officers in the pursuit.

Wheeler County officers were ready in case the subjects got that far.

Damien Hearn was arrested on charges of Unlawful Possession of a Firearm, Tampering with Physical Evidence, Possession of a Controlled Substance, Failure to Identify a Fugitive (with intent to give false information), Possession of Marijuana, and Evading Arrest.

Bralen Austin was charged with Aggravated Assault on a Peace Officer, Evading in a Motor Vehicle, Tampering with

Physical Evidence, Possession of a Controlled Substance, Unlawful Possession of a Firearm, and Possession of Marijuana.

Derrick Smith was charged with Evading in a Motor Vehicle, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of a Controlled Substance, Tampering with Physical Evidence, and Unlawful Possession of a Firearm.

All three men were arraigned by Justice of the Peace Pat White on Monday, and all were still in jail here at press time Tuesday.

CC Regents take new vote on president

The Clarendon College Board of Regents this week rescinded a November 21 vote to end the contract of Dr. Robert Riza as president and voted to put him on administrative leave instead.

During a called meeting Monday, December 9, the board without discussion approved a motion reversing their action on November 21, which would have ended the president's contract by December 31. That was followed by a new motion from Regent Carey Wann to place Riza on administrative leave effective immediately "due to some things that have been brought to light recently." That motion was also approved with no discussion.

Last week, the regents met in another called session and met behind closed doors for more than an hour with the college's attorney for an agenda item labeled as "Report from attorney concerning personnel." Earlier in the week, Board Chairman Tommy Waldrop had told the Enterprise the board would receive a report from the attorney concerning Riza's contract. In which case, that agenda item should have been more specific, according to court rulings under the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Don R. Richards, a Lubbock attorney serving as an Advisory Director of the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas, told the Enterprise the wording of last Thursday's agenda item should have specified that regents were going to talk about the president.

"The simple use of 'personnel' in the [November 27] agenda clearly appears to me to violate the 'Cox Enterprises' court opinion requiring such specificity with a high-level employee such as college president/superintendent, etc.," Richards said.

Waldrop said at last week's meeting that the board was going into closed session to discuss legal liability matters facing the college and did not mention personnel as indicated on the agenda.

In other board action last week, regents approved giving full time employees a \$500 stipend.

"We're in a state of flux and turmoil, and if they don't get their annual stipend, they may worry," Waldrop said.

On Monday, the regents also revisited the position of interim president. At a called meeting on November 27, the regents had named Vice President Tex Buckhaults as the "part time interim president." This week the regents named Buckhaults as the "full time interim president" with compensation of \$17,000 and rights to a vehicle leased by the college.

The board also approved updated bank resolutions Monday in a 6-0-2 vote with Jerry Woodard and Ruth Robinson abstaining.

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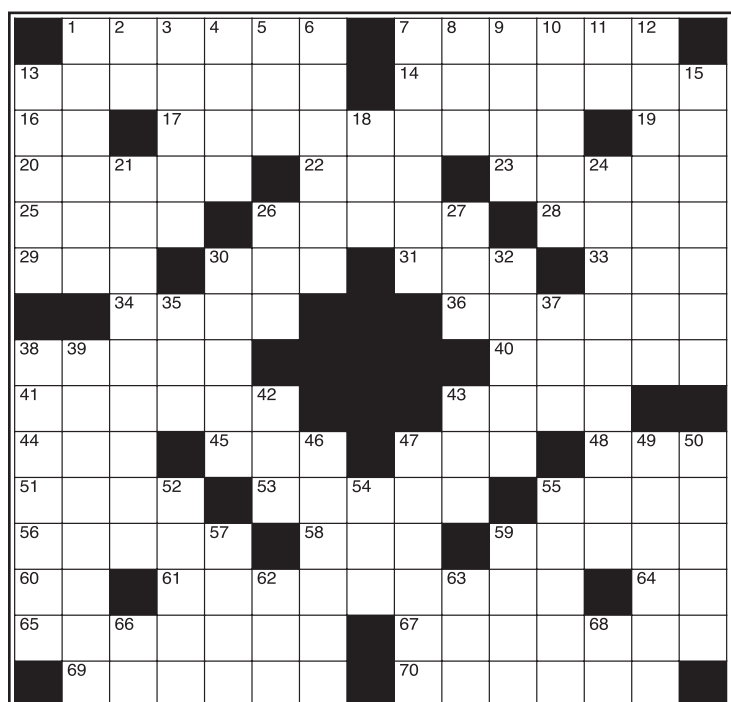

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Memories of Christmases past

I was born in 1937 which means I am old and have lived through many Christmases. I was born during the Dust Bowl and Great Depression followed by WWII, and I have seen some scant Christmases.

Usually my sister, Patsy, and I had one present each from Santa. I loved baby dolls made from rubber and many times that was my gift except during WWII. During that time, all rubber was imported from the rubber trees of the tropics and what got through the blockades in the Pacific was rationed strictly for military use. The year 1943 was a particularly bad year for ready-made toys, and I remember Mother, beginning in the months leading up to Christmas, starting her campaign for doll clothes to fit our old dolls. After all, any dolls Santa had should go to the little girls in England and France where the war was really bad.

I was so excited to find clothes

under the tree that not only fit my doll but were made from the same fabric as my own dress. Mothers have always been smart, usually

knowing exactly what each child would like to have for Christmas, but now the selection is huge, and they seem to want more, more, more.

We each received an apple and orange, Christmas candy with a tiny tree or snowman in the middle and ribbon candy, each one large peppermint candy cane. There was also a bowl of nuts to crack. We had a few Shiny Brite ornaments for the tree, but most decorations were homemade, and, because of the war and rationing, we saved the icicles

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from the tree from year to year.

I think icicles were about the first thing I began throwing away, the kids refused to hang the used ones. Christmas was a magical time for me, I think it is the same for children today. I'm not sure they would be happy with only homemade clothes for their baby doll, but I was.

Both were off Pampa Street, the first at Olita and Pampa and the second at Carroll Creek Acres and Pampa. Photos showed tall, dry weeds and grass. Overview of Medicaid STAR+PLUS

Whether or not a person has health care coverage throughout their life can impact their health and related expenses as they age. Most older adults receive health care coverage through Medicare when they become eligible. However, people who were uninsured before their Medicare eligibility can have higher health care costs and more frequent hospital and doctor visits than those with coverage before Medicare. Medicaid, a jointly funded health care program administered by states, provides health care coverage to vulnerable Texans, including low-income adults, children and people with disabilities.

In Texas, managed care health plans contract with the state to deliver Medicaid to beneficiaries. Managed care is a health care delivery system

designed to manage quality of care, performance and costs.

STAR+PLUS is a Medicaid managed care program that offers basic health and long-term services and supports for adults 21 and older who meet the following criteria: Have a disability and qualify for Medicaid because of low income; Qualify for Supplemental Security Income benefits; or Qualify for Medicaid because they meet a nursing facility-level of care and need STAR+PLUS Home and Community Based waiver services because they have an intellectual and developmental disability or related condition.

STAR+PLUS provides traditional Medicaid benefits as well as non-medical benefits, such as personal assistance services, day activity and health services, and

service coordination.

Other benefits include: Access to a primary care provider; Unlimited prescriptions; Value-added services or extra benefits offered through the managed care organization; and Nursing facility services.

To apply for Medicaid benefits, visit the Your Texas Benefits website or contact your local HHS benefits office.

To connect with your local benefits office, call the 2-1-1 information and referral hotline. You can apply in person or mail a completed paper application to HHSC, P.O. Box 149027, Austin, TX 78714-0927.

Your local Area Agency on Aging can help you apply and determine if you are eligible for benefits. To find your local AAA, call 800-252-9240.

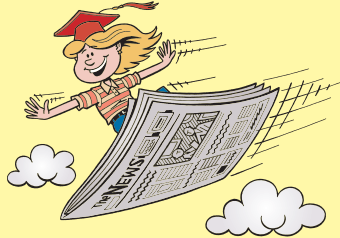

National Newspaper Association applauds postal bill

National Newspaper Association President Matt Adelman, publisher of the Douglas (Wyoming) Budget, today announced that a postal reform bill supported by NNA has achieved a sufficient number of both Democrats and Republicans as sponsors and action has been recommended to Speaker Nancy Pelosi. Adelman thanked Rep. Peter DeFazio, D-Ore., for his leadership in moving HR 2382 to possible action on the House consensus calendar, which is a streamlined process for quick passage of legislation.

“We have worked for more than a decade to lift the burden of prefunding retiree health benefits from the U.S. Postal Service. This one requirement, unique among federal government agencies, has led to the most staggering debt by USPS of any measure we have seen in the more than 100 years that NNA has worked on postal policy. Congress took a big risk in 2006 when it decided to impose this burden. USPS has been unable to pay the obligation, so the debt just keeps mounting.

“Now a wide majority of House members recognize that it is time to rethink the requirement,” Adelman said. “NNA appreciates their attention to the plight of our nation’s universal service network. Community newspapers need for USPS to be stable and effective.”

The obligation imposed in 2006 was for prefunding about \$72 billion in anticipated retiree health benefits covering a 75-year time span into the future. The fund has nearly \$40 billion in it now, which achieves a higher level of prefunding than the rest of the federal government and more than most private sector businesses with health fund obligations. But USPS announced a decade ago that it could not continue adding to the fund as required if it was to continue delivering the mail.

Adelman noted that some members of Congress have been concerned about the perception that HR 2382 is a bailout of the retiree fund. He said that, on the contrary, the reverse is true.

“I know many in Congress are rightfully concerned about fiscal accountability and about the wide gaps in private sector retirement funding coverage. Some have told our members that they worry the government is going to have to pick up the tab. But this bill won’t create that problem. Rather, it will help to avoid it by helping USPS to keep rates stable and protecting the mail business that it presently has. If we let this problem drift on, it will lead to much higher rates, drive away more mail and put the USPS into an even deeper hole.”

With the assistance of NNA’s Congressional Action Team, HR 2382 now has 292 co-sponsors, from both sides of the aisle.

A companion Senate bill by Sens. Steve Daines (R-Mont.) and Brian Schatz (D-Hawaii) has been introduced this week. The bill is identical to the House bill and is numbered S 2965.

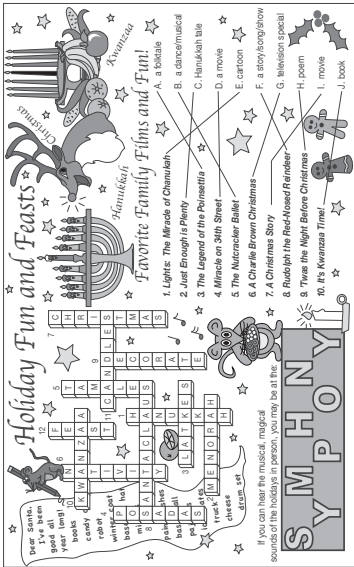
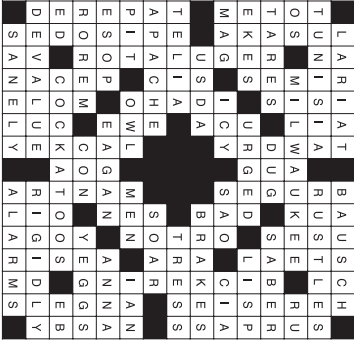
