## Ag conference to be held January 15

The Donley County Activity Center will be the meeting place of the Southeast Texas Panhandle Ag Conference on January 15, 2020.

Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m. with the program starting promptly at 8:30 a.m. The activity center is located one mile north of Clarendon on SH 70.

A lineup of speakers from Texas A&M AgriLife Extension will present information on controlling disease through cotton variety selection, managing cotton pests, cotton disease identification, cotton weed control, preplant in cotton using herbicides to combat chemical resistant weeds, reapplying for private applicator license, Laws and Regulations, Auxin training and CEU hours.

# Accident claims two lives at Hedley

Two women lost their lives Monday night, January 6, in a two-vehicle accident on US 287 at Hedley.

DPS Sgt. Cindy Barkley said Martha Ayala-Garcia of Ft. Worth, age 30, and Samantha Petters of Arlington, also 30, were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Pam Mason.

Ayala-Garcia was driving a 2018 Nissan Rogue eastbound on US 287 in the construction zone in Hedley at about 8:20 p.m. when she veered off the road to the south, overcorrected to the left, and lost control of the vehicle.

The Nissan traveled into westbound traffic facing north and was struck on the passenger side by

a 2015 Volvo truck tractor-trailer driven by Donald Gumfory, 47, of Burleson, according to the DPS report.

Petters was a passenger in the Nissan. Another second passenger, 34-year-old Shu Wou of Arlington, was airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo with life-threatening injuries, Barkley said.

Gumfory was not injured, and everyone involved in the accident was wearing their seatbelts, the DPS reported.

While emergency personnel worked the accident, the Texas Department of Transportation reported that traffic between Clarendon and Memphis was diverted through Brice by on State

Highways 70 and 256.

Monday night's accident is still under investigation.

Late Tuesday afternoon, a second accident occurred, also in or near the the construction zone at Hedley. Official details were not available at press time, but early reports indicated three vehicles were involved.

The Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees formally hired Jarad Bellar as the new superintendent of schools during a called meeting December 30, 2019.

Trustees had named Bellar as the lone finalist for the position December 4, but the district had to wait at least 21 days before officially hiring and signing a contract with him.

The board unanimously approved a three-year contract for Bellar, whose first day at work was Monday, January 6.

The board of trustees also took action December 30 to hire Jenifer Bellar as the school district's new federal and special programs coordinator. She also started work this week.

Mr. Bellar told the Enterprise that his wife and daughter originally had planned to move to Clarendon at the end of the school year, but the whole family were able to find a house and make the move during the Christmas break instead.

The Bellars' daughter is now enrolled in the high school here as a sophomore, and the new superintendent is looking forward to getting to work.

"We're excited to be here and to take on this new semester," Bellar said.

Bellar was previously the superintendent at Baird ISD since 2011. He started his career as a junior high teacher and coach in Clarendon in 1994.

## Extension workshop will focus on marketing crops

Knowing how to grow a crop is important, but learning how to market that crop is equally vital to surviving in today's agricultural climate. That's what feed grain and cotton producers should focus on going into 2020, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

The year-long outlook and planning ahead will be the focus of AgriLife Extension's "Developing This Year's Marketing Plan for Cotton and Feed Grains" workshop Feb. 6-7 in Amarillo.

"Weather and international market forces made 2019 a volatile year," said Justin Benavidez, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo. "In fact, I would say it was a case study in how valuable a marketing plan can be. So, given that you know you can grow a crop well, we want to have a plan in place to make the most money possible on that crop."

The workshop will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd. The registration fee is \$125, which covers the cost associated with instruction, breaks, meals and materials.

Traditionally, the spring marketing workshop has focused on feed grains. This year, the workshop will cover both feed grains and cotton for the 2020 marketing year.

"We've had more than one producer ask about the fundamentals that drive cotton marketing in the Texas High Plains," Benavidez said. "As we continue to learn to produce with less water on the High Plains, producers are turning to cotton, and in turn, we want to provide education on the unique aspects of marketing cotton."

The course is limited to 50 participants. To register and pay for this course, go to <https://agriliferegister.tamu.edu/Grain> or call 979-845-2604. While this is the preferred method of registration and payment, payments also will be accepted at the door. However, all registrations must be completed by Jan. 31, either online or by phone.

"It will be critical for producers to manage costs and take advantage of marketing opportunities as they occur in order to have a successful year," Benavidez said.

### Clarendon Aquatic Center

The City Council accepted the low bid from A&S General Contractors (Amarillo) in August 2019 to construct the pool. A&S then subcontracted with Gold Medal Pools (Frisco, Texas) for assistance with the construction as that company has built hundreds of pools over the last 30 years. Today's pools are highly sophisticated and require a state-of-the art design to accommodate the numerous features of the pool. We are pleased to have the experience of these two companies.

Although the actual construction is off to a relatively slow start, Gold Medal Pools began digging two pools (one for young kids and the other for older kids/adults) in mid-December. Weather permitting, construction of the entire complex will be significantly accelerated over the next several months, with a goal of opening in the summer of 2020. Features will include a spray ground with zero depth entry, underwater bubblers, toddler slide, helio spray, water bench under sunshade, bucket trio, shallow play area, deep area with climbing wall, diving board, basketball and volleyball nets, three lap lanes, several sunshades, bathhouse, equipment room, admissions office and concessions, and concession tables under sunshades. Additionally, there will be ample parking on the south end of the property.

The aquatic center was not designed to compete with area waterparks (Wellington, Pampa, and Canyon), but rather to provide a medium size facility that Clarendon can afford. The numerous donors and City Council members are becoming more excited about this project as construction progresses. More information will be available over the next few months.

### USDA Projects

As reported earlier, two of the three projects have been completed: a new standpipe on the East side of town and the installation of over 800 electronic water meter readers. City workers can now read all city meters within an hour or less compared to several days in the past. Additionally, the new technology produces highly accurate water consumption information per customer which includes when water is being used during a 24-hour daily cycle. This information can be very helpful in determining if a customer has a possible leak and can help in resolving other issues as well.

The third USDA project, replacing several miles of old cast iron water pipes, is progressing but at a very slow pace. The project was a little less than 50 percent complete at the close of 2019. As a result of city officials complaining about the speed of the project, the Amarillo contractor (LA Fuller) has recently agreed to double their workforce until the project is complete. However, completion is not likely to occur until late summer of 2020. The City appreciates your continued patience with the water pipe replacement project.

### Street Paving

Once the water pipe replacement project is complete, City officials can then concentrate on the next street paving initiative, which will be decided by registered voters. The debt for the last paving project has been paid off; consequently, the city budget should be able to accommodate the cost of future paving if voters so choose. Potholes and rough streets are the top complaints expressed by residents.

### Abandoned & Unsightly Properties

A contract the City has with Texas Communities Group (TCG), headquartered in Lubbock, is beginning to produce positive results. Four properties have been sold recently to new owners and that trend should continue indefinitely. TCG focuses on abandoned properties that are tax delinquent for at least five years or for three years of non-payment if the property has a history of code compliance issues. The goal, of course, is to have abandoned properties brought up to code, regardless of who the owner is, and to collect taxes on each.

In addition to the good work being performed by TCG, the City Council established a Building Standards Commission during 2018 which focuses on properties that are unsafe and unsightly. Most are current on taxes, but the properties need to be brought up to code, sold or demolished. Approximately 10 properties have been demolished in recent past. The City appreciates those property owners who have stepped up to improve their properties and, in some cases, have demolished structures without City involvement.

### Taxes

The City Council has already approved a significant property tax reduction and the elimination of the unpopular personal property tax on cars, trucks, boats, trailers, RV's, and campers. However, in a previous Mayor's Message, I incorrectly stated that those tax changes would become effective when City residents pay their taxes in late December 2019 or early January of 2020. I should have said December 2020 or early January 2021 (approximately one year from now).

Keep in mind that the property tax reduction and the elimination of the personal property tax relates to the City portion only.

The current City budget is \$2,417,202 (fiscal year being October 1, 2019 - September 30, 2020). The City has 27 employee positions (17 full-time, 6 part-time and 4 seasonal). Supervisors are: David Dockery, City Administrator; Machiel Covey, City Secretary; John Molder, Public Works Director; Joe Shadle, Director of Sanitation; Jerri Shields, Librarian; Grett Betts, Code Compliance Officer.

The City Council expresses genuine appreciation to all citizens in our community for choosing to live here, for shopping locally and for supporting various events throughout the year.

# A new year at the start of the day

Time has been bought, answers have been delayed and responses have been hedged as "squirmers" have opted for the "Texas two-step" instead of crystal clear comebacks to probing inquiries.

At a time in history when transparency is touted by commoners and royalty alike, we have the chance to think about potential usage during 2020's sudden crossroads, dead ends and detours.

If we need a few seconds to process whatever is happening "rat now," let us instead think, utter, sing or hum these words: At The Start Of The Day. You can bet politicians will pounce on this probability, including, of course, their ownership of "2020 vision"....

Ditties may even include ATSOTD. Even though the letters fall woefully

short of spelling a word, beginning letters of "at the start of the day" have a nice "ring," deserving abbreviation status despite having no hope of achieving acronym status.

Please allow me to employ directness. Crystal clarity is the goal.

It may be that "2020 vision" will help, and this year can be a starting place for businesses across the land to answer. Their "hemming" may be exceeded only by their "hawing," and "throat-clearing" may muffle their responses. Count on some, however, to trot out "at-the-start-of-the-day" time-buying before truly answering questions that harbor in the minds of tens of millions of older Americans: do you or do you not offer senior discounts?...

Many stores' "front-liners" have historically been wishy-washy on such queries. "Front-liners" are the folks "in the trenches," often servers in restaurants, or other retail places, who hear the "discount question" daily.

Frequently, employees are "new here, and need to ask the manager."

Some of us are borderline embarrassed when in such situations....

What, really, do we want? We want Clarity. Firms offering such discounts should display signs proudly, on the wall, menu or front

Locally, our Chili's offers senior discounts, but the courtesy is not mentioned on menus or other where. Regrettably, one must ask, however awkward it may seem....

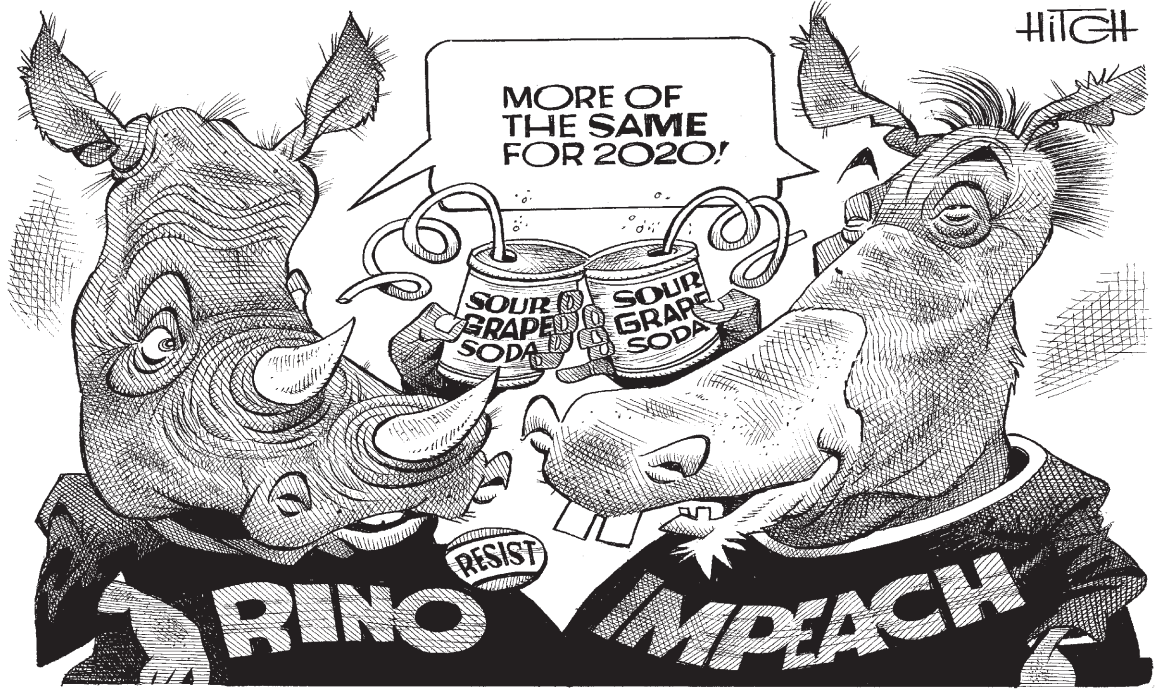

# What is it about the city of Mason

Mason is a hill country town of 2,500 residents with a courthouse square that's hard to maneuver. It has an extremely dense population of characters. Perhaps that's what makes the town so interesting. You can hardly go there without having some type of unique experience. One of my favorite eating-places is Crockett Keller's Guns and Grub restaurant on the square near the Odeon Theater. One side of his building is the restaurant. The other half is his gun store. Crockett has some of the best seafood I've ever eaten. That's right. Seafood in Mason. Crockett spends 3 days getting his oysters ready.

I spoke at the library in Mason recently and did a couple of interviews while I was in town. One was with Ethan West a barber (Square Head Barbershop) who walked the 2,200-mile Appalachian Trail. Another was with Tony Plutino a river guide who knows about the best places in Texas to go canoeing. I also interviewed Jan Appleby who heads up the group restoring the elegant Seaquist House, one of the first mansions in the hill country. It was built in the 1880s

and has 22 rooms and 15 fireplaces.

One of my early radio programs featured Mason County resident Fred Gipson, the author of *Old Yeller*. That set a pretty high standard for future interviews in Mason.

Mason is known as the gem of the hill country, maybe because topaz is found in the area. It also has an increasing number of people interested in making wine. The bat cave just out of town attracts visitors and scientists who study the nighttime scavengers. Fort Mason has created interest among people who research pioneer days. The city is a welcoming community and has many transplants from Austin and other places. They quickly assimilate and find things to do, working with the library, museum, chamber or other organizations.

The list of characters I've interviewed in or near Mason includes



stories of texas by tumbleweed smith

Bill O'Banion who hit a golf ball 30 miles from Mason to another nearby town (took him several strokes). Bill Worrell the famous sculptor lives on the Llano River south of Mason. So does Laura Lewis, an artist who does murals in office buildings for Fortune 500 companies. Spider Johnson is an accomplished saw player. Gene Zesch is well known for his woodcarvings. Tom Hadley set high standards as a professional rodeo announcer. Tommy Splitgarber acted in some Hollywood movies. Raye Carrington taught fly-fishing to hundreds of people.

I've done reports on Mason's court house clock, the Odeon Theater (where the world premiere of *Old Yeller* took place), the city's high number of tennis players, its historic homes, knife makers, storeowners, photographers, entertainers, historians, storytellers, cowboys and hunters. I interviewed one man long ago who took his pet llama for a walk around the courthouse square every evening. It just seemed like the normal thing to do. One man had a pet crow. You can be yourself in Mason.

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Voting opens Jan. 6 for Texas peanut farmers

LUBBOCK – The Texas Peanut Producers Board will hold an election for two directors’ seats. The election will be held from Jan. 9-23, 2020.

There is one seat open for the election of an At-Large TPPB board member and one seat open for election in Voting Region Three, which does not include Donley or neighboring counties. The At-Large member may be from any of the 254 counties in Texas so long as they meet the requirements below.

Voters will be voting for qualified candidates who have sought nomination within the respective TPPB voting regions where elections are to occur.

The nominee for the one seat in Voting Region Three is Larry Don Womack, Comanche County.

The nominee for the At-Large seat is Louis Grissom, Gaines County. Voters may also vote for board members by “writing in” the name of any eligible persons.

Peanut producers eligible to vote in the elections are persons, including the owner of a farm on which peanuts are produced or the owner’s tenant or sharecropper, engaged in the business of producing peanuts or causing peanuts to be produced for commercial purposes for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of this election (Jan. 23, 2020). For a producer to vote in Voting Region Three, the voter must reside within one of the counties stated above. Any qualified producer may vote for an At-Large nominee.

The elections will be held

by mail ballot. Election ballots containing the nominations of all persons who have validly filed will be mailed on Jan. 9, 2020 to a Texas peanut farmers mailing list or by requesting a ballot from TPPB. Voters will be voting for qualified candidates who have sought nomination within the respective TPPB voting regions where elections are to occur. Voters may also vote for board members by “writing in” the name of any eligible persons. All voters otherwise qualified to vote as peanut producers must reside in a county within the TPPB voting region where they seek to vote.

For a ballot to be valid, it must be mailed to the 5223 79th St., Lubbock, Texas 79403, with a postmark date of no later than Jan. 23, 2020.

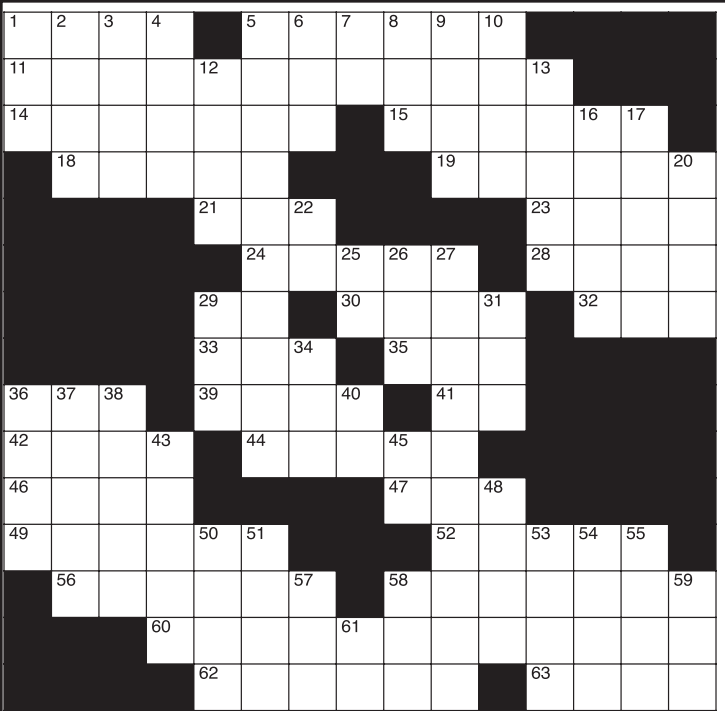

He was preceded in death by his parents, Richard and Travis Finch, and his brother Richard Floyd Finch.

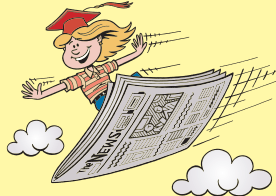

As has been said, Roger had a big heart for children.

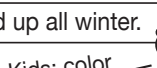

The new College of Engineering will include about 40 faculty members.

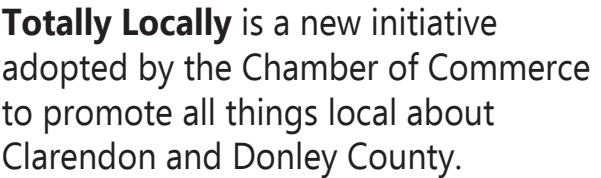
The transition to a College of Engineering underscores WT's commitment to providing research and initiatives that benefit
