Clarendon City Hall move starts Friday

The City of Clarendon will begin moving this Friday from his historic offices to the new City Hall in the former Lowe Office Building at 313 S. Sully across from the Courthouse

City Administrator David Dockery hopes to complete the move Monday, January 27, and says communication services with the city will be disrupted both Friday and Monday as the appropriate utility companies make the necessary changes. The new City Hall is expected to be fully capable of receiving calls and emails on Tuesday, January 28.

City officials are planning an open house event at the new location on February 3.

VFW plans to take Valentines to vets

The Donley County VFW Auxiliary is asking folks to remember those who served America by making a Valentine for a veteran.

Valentines can be dropped off at the Burton Memorial Library by February 6, and the VFW and Auxiliary will distribute them at homes and other facilities for Valentine's Day.

Deadline this week for chamber awards

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce is seeking nominations for its annual community awards banquet, which is scheduled for Thursday, February 13.

Nominations are being sought for Man of the Year and Woman of the Year, and the Saints' Roost Award – honoring an individual for a lifetime of service to the community.

Nominations can be mailed to the Chamber of Commerce at PO Box 986, Clarendon, TX 79226, or delivered to the Visitor Center. Nominations must be received by noon on January 23.

Stagecoach return planned for spring

The stagecoach Journey will make a return to the Texas Panhandle this spring, according to information from Rick and Bev Hamby.

The Journey, an original 1880 Butterfield Overland Stage, visited Clarendon in 2016 and made a run to Matador. Now the Missouri-based stagecoach will make a trip through Palo Duro Canyon May 22 through June 1.

More information will be coming out soon about this fantastic ride.

City aldermen to consider enacting noise ordinance

The Clarendon City Council will consider adopting a noise ordinance when it meets in regular session Thursday night, January 23.

City Administrator David Dockery said three residents attended last week's called meeting and brought up the idea. Carol Braddock, Cathy Marable, and Sara SoRelle spoke in favor of enacting an ordinance to govern excessive noise.

Aldermen will consider that request this week along with how such an ordinance might be worded and enforced.

During last week's meeting, the council renewed the city's curfew ordinance. That regulation on how late minors can be out must be reauthorized every three years. Generally, minors cannot be out between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. Sunday through

Thursday or between midnight and 6 a.m. on Friday and Saturday. The ordinance does allow several exceptions for the curfew.

The council approved a job description for the city aquatics center manager, and Dockery says that position will be posted in the next two weeks. The firm that has designed the aquatics center helped the city draft the description for the

manager's position.

Three members were appointed to the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors. Brandon Frausto, Steve Hall, and Taylor Shelton will each serve two-year terms on that board.

No action was taken on a bid on six lots in north Clarendon after county commissioners rejected the bid earlier.

In his administrator's report, Dockery said several more trust properties will be coming up for sale by Texas Communities Group and reported that the USDA project has run over its term and the contractor is in liquidated damages now. Dockery also reported that the city has been recognized for having a Superior Water System by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

Two candidates file for local offices

With 21 local offices up for election this spring, only two candidates have stepped forward in the first week of sign-ups.

Kyle Davis threw his hat into the ring to run for a position on the Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees. Two positions are up for election on that board this year with Reneé Mott and Weldon Sears being the incumbents.

In Howardwick, Jeremy Kindle became the first person to sign up for one of three positions on the city council there. The terms of Aldermen Mary Grady, Johnny

Hubbard, and Marietta Baird are expiring.

As of Tuesday afternoon, five of the seven local governments scheduled to hold elections this spring were reporting they had no candidates signed up as yet.

Filing for local offices started last Wednesday, January 15, and continues through Friday, February 14.

In Clarendon, the two-year terms of Aldermen John Lockhart, Larry Jeffers, and Eulaine McIntosh are up this year.

Hedley has two aldermen's

seats and the mayor's position up this year. Those are two-year terms and are currently held by Mayor Carrie Butler and Aldermen Dustin Shatswell and Danny Russell.

Hedley ISD has three full three-year terms up this year. Those seats are held by Troy Monroe, Cindy Lambert, and Susan Cosby.

Three positions are up this year on the Clarendon College Board of Regents, which serve for six years. Darlene Spier and Carey Wann hold two of those seats, and the third is currently vacant.

The Donley County Hospital District Board of Directors has four two-year terms up this year. Those are currently held by Jan Farris – Place 4, Nikki Adams – Place 5, Mark C. White – Place 6, and Lori Howard – Place 7.

All local boards are elected at-large, but hospital board candidates must file for a specific place on the ballot.

Candidate applications are available from the administrative offices of each entity. Elections are scheduled to be held Saturday, May 2, 2020.

Clarendon school board recognized for service

Also enjoying the meal were Jarod Bellar, Superintendent; Travis Victory, Junior High Principal; Jenae Ashbrook, Counselor; Jen Bellar, Federal and Special Programs Director; and Clint Conkin, Athletic Director.

They were joined by Cheryl Johnson, Sarah Emerson, Tiffany Campbell, Tashia Duncan, Tommye Duncan, Gracie Ellis, Bryce Williams, Jayden Monds,

Following the meal, the board convened in regular session at the technology building where Richard Blankenship of Johnson and Sheldon, P.C., presented an audit report for the year ending August 31, 2019. The board approved the audit as presented.

Administrative reports were presented by Mr. Bellar, Coach

Conkin, Mr. Victory, Mrs. Ashbrook, and Mrs. Bellar.

The board approved a motion for the tax deed for property described as Lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 in block 12 of the original town of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas (R3653) to Miguel Carias as set out in Section 34.05 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

The board was notified about the Donley County Appraisal District board election results.

Regents name committee to review policies

Clarendon College Regents appointed a committee to make policy recommendation to the board when they met in regular session last Thursday, January 16.

CC Interim President Tex Buckhaults said the committee will be looking at policies related to conflicts of interest of board members and other issues with the board's governance of the college that is concerning to the Southern Association of Colleges & Schools Commission on Colleges (SACS-COC).

A special SACS-COC committee is expected to conduct an on-site evaluation of the college this spring after the accrediting body determined last summer that CC had "failed to demonstrate compliance" with a core requirement and three standards set by the agency.

Regents Darlene Spier, Susie Shields, and Carey Wann will serve on the board's policy committee, and Buckhaults said the committee will have to follow the requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act, including posting an agenda 72 hours before meeting, holding discussions in public, and keeping minutes of its proceedings.

In other business, regents ratified the hiring of Julissa Morrow as an administrative assistant in Clarendon and Tessa Hoffman as an administrative assistant in Childress as well as the reassignments of Cindy Lambert as assistant to the president, Michael Metcalf as accountant, Spencer Shields as bookstore manager, and Donna Smith as librarian/webmaster/social media.

Property taxes are due now

The Donley County Appraisal District is issuing a notice to those who have not paid their 2019 taxes that it is time to pay up.

Taxes not paid on or before January 31 will incur penalty and interest of 7 percent if paid in February. The amount increases each month thereafter until the tax is paid. Accounts unpaid on July 1 will incur an additional 20 percent collection penalty in addition to the regular penalty and interest of 18 percent. Texas state law prescribes the penalty and interest amounts.

There is a Quarter Payment Plan available on Homestead property. If you have an over 65 or disabled exemption or are the surviving spouse of a disabled veteran, you may request to pay your property tax in four equal payments without penalty and interest. To apply, you must pay one-fourth of the total tax due before February 1.

Delinquent notices will be mailed in May to those who still owe 2019 tax at that time. Partial payments will be accepted. Tax payments may be mailed to the Donley Appraisal District at PO Box 1220, Clarendon TX 79226.

USMCA big win for Lone Star State

More than a quarter-century ago, the North America Free Trade Agreement was signed right here in San Antonio. This innovative trade deal made sweeping changes to the way we do business with our northern and southern neighbors by giving us duty-free access to Mexican and Canadian markets. It also gave the I-35 corridor – and San Antonio – a starring role in North American trade.

By virtually any measure, NAFTA has been a huge success, leading to more than triple the trade with Mexico and Canada since it took effect. During that time, though, a lot has changed. Back then, the internet was in its infancy, smartphones didn't exist, and the only shopping you did was at brick-and-mortar stores. The way we do business has evolved significantly, and the once-revolutionary policies of NAFTA can no longer keep up.

More than a year ago, President Donald Trump reached a deal with the leaders of Mexico and Canada to bring our trade into the 21st century, and this week, it received the green light from the US Senate. With strong bipartisan support, we passed the US-Mexico-Canada Agreement, which will take bold steps to modernize our trade with our northern and southern neighbors, and continue the prosperity Texas' economy has experienced through NAFTA.

Since the deal was announced, I've heard from countless Texans about the need to get the USMCA ratified, and some of its most vocal supporters are here in San Antonio. Community leaders, including elected officials, business owners and local Chambers of Commerce, have been clear: We need the USMCA.

This trade agreement preserves the hallmark provisions of NAFTA, while making changes to account for our ever-evolving economy. The USMCA includes strong protections for intellectual property, which is critical to safeguarding the incredible innovation we see at home. It cuts the red tape that has prevented small businesses from tapping into foreign markets. And it accounts for e-commerce and digital products as these products continue to make up a larger portion of our economy.

Some of the most significant changes will provide serious benefits to the auto industry. For cars to be imported duty-free, the original NAFTA required at least 62.5 percent of the parts automakers used in their vehicles to be North American-made. The USMCA will increase that threshold to 75 percent by 2023. It's a huge incentive for automakers to keep manufacturing and jobs right here in Texas, rather than sending them overseas.

The USMCA will also protect market access for the agriculture industry, which experienced tremendous growth in exports under NAFTA. We have more farms and ranches than any other state, and the annual economic impact of Texas agriculture totals about \$100 billion. The USMCA will build on NAFTA's success, and ensure Canada and Mexico remain our top customers for agricultural products. It's expected to lead to a \$2.2 billion increase in US agriculture and food exports, and we're sure to reap many of those benefits here in Texas.

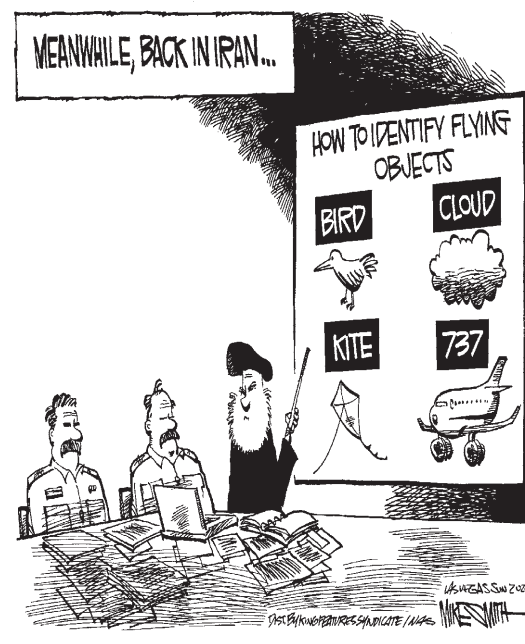
Texas has the 10th-largest economy in the world, and is the engine behind much of our country's trade. In 2018, we exported more than \$137 billion in goods and services to Mexico and Canada, and with the passage of the USMCA, that number is expected to go up.

Experts say the USMCA will lead to increased wealth for the United States and 176,000 new American jobs. It's expected to have a positive impact on every industry sector of the US economy and result in an increase of more than \$33 billion in exports. It's a sign of even more good news to come for our national economy.

I was proud to vote in support of the USMCA, and I'm eager for this agreement to finally take effect. Less than three weeks into 2020, we've already notched a major win for Texas farmers, ranchers, manufacturers and consumers.

More than 27 years after NAFTA was signed in San Antonio, the Alamo City can once again celebrate the start of a new chapter in North American trade, this time through the USMCA.

We wish you a Merry Christmas

'Tis not the first time an error of my own doing has diverted me from the tedious freeways of everyday life to side roads with uncharted curves adorned by snagging brambles that seemed to warn, "Go back."

I stumble forward, discovering yet another column topic, one that likely should remain at barrel's bottom and marked "obscure."

Anyway, there I was, standing way back in the customer service line at Sam's Club, wondering why some customers were yelling at sympathetic "associates" who didn't hire out for such. I soon learned that they were patiently listening to "poor me" accounts, from mid-December until well into the New Year....

"Where are my Christmas cards?" I had the same question, remembering difficulty at Thanksgiving to round up three generations of kin, some who have grown weary of these annual "photo shoots." Young'uns care not a whit about how much others think they've grown, if they "favor" certain uncles or aunts or care for mentions of their attire – or whatever. And old-timers don't need reminders about how much they've aged, or hear trite comments about "failure to winter well," or being "ridden hard and put up wet."

If only I'd listened more carefully to my wife. She asked me to place an order for 150 Christmas cards. I learned that Sam's no longer has an in house photo department, so, as suggested, I ordered online.

They arrived, as promised, "within 5-7 business days." However, I mistakenly had ordered 125 cards....

Turns out, 25 more cards were needed. It was still early December, and I received the same assurance of delivery within "5-7 business days."

A bullet had been dodged, thought I. I was wrong....

The most jolting of numerous emails came on Dec. 20. In boldface, I was advised "that your photo card order will not arrive by Sunday, Dec. 22." I am sure "corporate Sams" meant well, explaining how Fuji Film Printing Services, "had higher than anticipated volumes this year, and thus is unable to process orders on time." I was told that when my cards arrived – no later than Christmas Eve – there would be no charge, and – for my trouble and inconvenience – I'd receive a \$50 gift card via email that same afternoon.

Sadly, my cards didn't arrive until after New Year's, and the gift card still hasn't arrived....

I made numerous attempts to speak to media relations people at Sam's headquarters, but so far, I've heard from no one.

Local Sam's personnel are in no way blamed, since it was not their decision to "hand off" Christmas card printing to Fuji.

We shop Sam's often. The person-

nel are friendly, well trained and eager to help. They've sometimes descended ladders to help me find items at eye level on main aisles....

I picked up cards on January 3, standing in a much shorter line and hearing no raised voices.

Probably my experience can reasonably be multiplied by thousands of others, particularly if they, too, were promised gift cards.

I scribbled notes on cards tardy to recipients that I was trying to get ahead on Christmas, 2020....

My guess is that Sam's decision-makers may re-think farming out Christmas card printing, and start taking queries seriously that aren't satisfied in routine surveys.

One size DOES NOT fit all as seems to be suggested on all those "evaluation" emails we've received from Sam's over the years. Everything doesn't work on the "one to ten" scale. They might even consider making phone numbers available for media questions.

Me? I'll continue to value visits to our local Sam's. I'm glad customer service is generally "back to normal." Soon, I may quit wishing "associates" a "Merry Christmas," even if corporate fails to come through with the promised gift card. I made at least a half-dozen trips, languishing in long customer service lines. I felt like I was standing in line for my driver's license renewal....

Texas smokehouse with a history

"I like to think of Bear Creek as a boutique style smokehouse," says Robbie Shoults, a member of a five generation family that owns and operates Bear Creek Smokehouse in a scenic rural area north of Marshall. Robbie's mother Brenda Shoults lives in the old home place. Her husband's parents started the business 76 years ago.

"They were raising cotton and couldn't make a living doing that, so someone suggested they start raising turkeys," says Brenda. "So they did. These hills were covered in turkeys. They dressed them in the back yard and scalded them in iron wash pots. They didn't have a telephone. The county agent took orders in town and he would drive the orders out here. They would dress the turkeys and deliver them in town, house to house. That's how it began."

There are several "most popular" items in the Bear Creek Catalogue; among them a smoked peppered pork tenderloin and a smoked boneless turkey breast. "It just developed," says Brenda. "One thing led to another. We added to

the inventory ham, smoked chicken, bacon and salt pork. We send out truckloads of salt pork year-round."

Last year the business moved into a 10,000 square feet building with a ceiling 42 feet high and a front porch that's 100 feet wide. A general store has a bridal registry, Texas souvenirs and high-end gifts. "We design and make our own t-shirts," says Robbie. "One of them reads 'Bacon America Great Again.' These soups in jars have been real popular for us. We private label these for Neiman-Marcus and Dillard's."

Robbie has had lots of television exposure. He has judged on Bobby Flay's Food Network show 4 times and has cooked on the Today Show with Al Roker. He was on QVC with Martha Stewart. "Television helps quite a bit with brand recognition," he says. The

smokehouse has become a destination. Big name bands play there (Asleep At The Wheel was to perform there the week after I did this interview). It's a wedding venue and event center in a rustic setting complete with a windmill, turkeys an longhorns. "We want it to be a place where families can come and enjoy the same place where we grew up. Some folks come to sit on the porch and enjoy the view. It's just fun being up here. We love what we do."

Bear Creek products go all over the country and beyond. Some customers take them in their luggage when they travel overseas. Bear Creek doesn't raise turkeys. They get them in by the truckloads already processed, then add what Robbie calls "the Bear Creek Magic" before shipping them out. Bear Creek has 25 employees. The number doubles around Christmas.

Robbie does most of the marketing. If you dial 800-950 2327 after hours you'll hear his distinctive East Texas voice on the answering machine.
