No Memorial Day services this year

This year's Memorial Day services in Clarendon and at the Rowe Cemetery near Hedley will not be held so as to not put anyone at risk of COVID-19. Volunteers did, however, place flags on veterans graves in Clarendon on Monday, and flags will be set out at Rowe Cemetery on Saturday.

City 'special rules' expiring on June 1

The Clarendon City Council agreed last week not to extend the "Special Rules" for utility billing and collection, beyond June 1, 2020.

The rules were adopted to provide relief for customers during the stay-at-home order that expired on April 30., which curtailed the disconnection of service for nonpayment, waiving of credit card fees, and waiving of late fees.

The City Council hopes the temporary repeal of these fees and conditions provided some relief to customers during this trying time.

Any customer concerned about their account or the possibility of disconnection needs to contact City Hall to make proper arrangements prior to June 15, 2020, to ensure uninterrupted service.

CHS seniors earn college degrees

Harmond Drenth and Trenton Smith, members of the Clarendon High School Class of 2020, received their Associate's in Science degrees from Clarendon College on May 8, meaning these gentlemen graduated from college before high school.

The majority of their college work was completed for free thanks to the Dual Credit Peak Scholarship, which is an agreement between

Clarendon College and Clarendon CISD.

Harmond and Trenton made history by being the first CHS students to complete their high school and associate requirements at the same time.

Harmond and Trenton began this college course work while on CISD campus back in the Fall of 2018.

Harmond completed 62 hours

at CC and plans on attending Baylor University in the fall with a major in Computer Science.

Harmond said his degree at Clarendon College will allow him to directly go to upper level course work when he arrives in Waco in August.

"My most challenge course in college so far has to be Interpersonal Communication," Harm said.

Trenton worked hard during

the school year and summer terms to graduate from Clarendon College with a total of 77 hours. Trent plans to attend WTAMU and obtain his degree in Business Management.

"By completing my associates degree, I feel a sense of being stress free heading into WTAMU," Trenton stated.

Like Harmond, Trenton found a certain college class, Elementary Statistics, to be hard.

The Salutatorian for CHS is Trent Smith, son of David and Buffie Smith. He has a weighted GPA of 5.776.

He was a member of the Bronco Band his freshman and sophomore years, a member of the State UIL Basketball team his freshman year. He competed in UIL Academics all four years and advancing to regional competition in math his freshman

through junior years, was a member of the Student Council all four years serving as president his senior year, and member of the School Health Advisory Council all four years and a member of the Clarendon FFA his junior year.

Trent has been honored both in school and in our community. He was chosen as a CHS Servant Leader by his teachers all four years, he was a member of the local chapter of the National Honor Society his junior and senior years, served as president of his class his sophomore and junior years, was an A Honor Roll student his freshman and sophomore years, and an A/B Honor Roll student his junior and

senior years. He has received many Honor C's over the years and has received his Associates degree from Clarendon College in addition to being named CHS Salutatorian. Most recently he was named as Clarendon Chamber of Commerce Young Man of the Year.

Trent has also been involved in giving back to his community through community service. He participated in the American Run for the Fallen, served veterans at the school's annual Veterans Day celebration, was a participant in Shattered Dreams Alcohol and Drug Awareness program, has helped light up the courthouse at Christmas, aided in highway cleanups, helped

with the canned food drive and helped put flags out at the cemetery to honor our veterans.

Trent's hobbies include playing video games, swimming, hunting, traveling, and hanging out with friends.

Trent plans on attending West Texas A&M University where he plans to major in Business Management.

The Valedictorian for this year's graduating class is Harmond Drenth. He is the son of Tanya Bell and Jade Drenth and has a weighted GPA of 5.86.

City council proclaims Peace Officers Week

The Clarendon City Council administered the oath of office to three aldermen who faced no opposition in this year's scheduled election.

Aldermen Larry Jeffers, John Lockhart, and Eulaine McIntosh were each sworn in for a new two-year term. This is Jeffers fourth term, and Lockhart's third term. Neither man has ever drawn opposition in an election. McIntosh is starting her first full term on the council.

The council elected Alderman Jacob Fangman to serve as the city's mayor pro-tem.

In other city business, the council accepted the recommendation of the airport advisory board to approve a bid from Omega Electronics to install a security system at Smiley Johnson

Municipal Airport for \$24,100. Fifty percent of the cost will be paid for by a RAMP grant with the city picking up the remainder of the cost.

Aldermen appointed Chuck Robertson to a vacant seat on the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation.

The council voted to declare May 16-22 as Peace Officers Week as a salute to local law enforcement.

City Administrator David Dockery reported that construction on the aquatics center resumed May 1 with an expected completion date of August 21. He also said the USDA water infrastructure project is set to resume on May 26 and said that the city is actively working to acquire trust properties to put up for sale through Texas Communities Group.

New COVID case reported here Monday

One new positive case of COVID-19 has been reported in Donley County, according to Judge John Howard, MD.

Speaking Monday morning, Howard said the state had tested about 4,000 people in area meat packing plants with 1,111 positive cases reported afterward. One of those is a Donley County resident, Howard said.

Also on Monday, the judge said the Texas National Guard was in Clarendon to test more than 40 residents at the local nursing home as well as the staff at that facility. If any of those tests come back positive, the judge will be notified.

Meanwhile, the count of tests run on Donley County residents by the Clarendon Family Medical Center totaled 106 as of Monday. Three of those are pending, 20 have been positive, 83 have been negative. Six local people have now received a positive test outside the county, bringing the total local COVID cases to 26 with at least 21 of those having recovered.

On the state level, Gov. Greg Abbott announced on Monday the start of Phase II in the reopening of the Texas economy. He said gyms, child care centers, and boys' and girls' clubs could re-open with safety guidelines effective May 18 and said that restaurants could expand to 50 percent capacity starting on Friday. Rodeos, professional sports, scouting, youth camps, and other activities can also resume this month.

However, due to the spiking numbers, largely in the Amarillo area meat packing industry, the following Panhandle counties would be delayed one week in moving to Phase II – Potter, Randall, Deaf Smith, and Moore.

"We must continue to place health and safety first and foremost," Abbott said. "Be a good neighbor. Be a Texan."

A book by a back-up...

“No one is an idol to his valet.” Historian/writer Thomas Carlyle so contended two centuries ago. In one case dating back 60+ years, Carlyle would have been “dead wrong” about a couple of Brownwood High School athletes. Lawrence Elkins – the “idol” – re-wrote dozens of records in four sports, dazzled at Baylor in football and might have re-written National Football League stats if injuries hadn’t “done him in.” His “valet” – a year behind him – subbed for Elkins on the 1960 AAA State Championship football team. Ron Davis, also 76, is best known for church music ministry. Now, he’s also an author, writing about his hero....

A friend claims that about one of every 100 people who mention writing a book does so, and of that number, only a handful get around to publishing. At one of Lawrence’s eight hall of fame inductions several years ago, Ron told Lawrence he’d like to write a book about the Brownwood sports legend. Elkins answered, “Go for it!”...

For the past few years, he has conducted interviews, visited sports luminaries and researched vigorously. Published late last year, his book includes many stories and statistics. Elkins – a three-sport star at BHS – was Baylor University’s first-ever consensus All-American football player to earn the honor in successive years (1963 and 1964). It’s as much about “heart” as athletics, though. Elkins’ “ticker” is as big as the expanse of the Old West, and his Texas drawl exceeds any the Marlboro man could muster. He was the product of an asphalt-covered Central Elementary playground, a hard-scrabble childhood and races to the dinner table to “avoid being last.” There were nine other half-brothers and sisters, and he was the youngest....

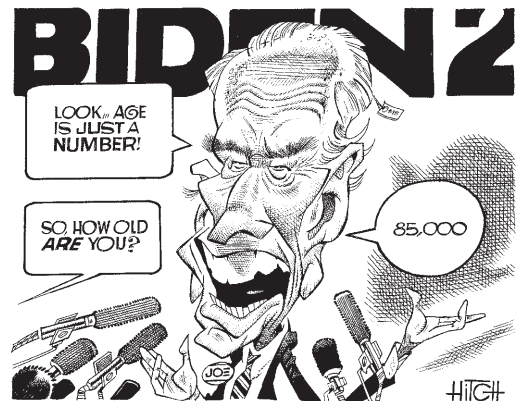
Yep, he was, as they say, “all boy.” His mother, an ardent church-goer, regularly dragged him to the Pentecostal Church of God, stationing him on the first pew. Once, a lady seated next to him accidentally blackened his eye with an errant elbow. “Momma let me sit on the second pew for a few Sundays, and called me a ‘little heathen’ less often,” he mused, admitting he was “somewhat inattentive.”...

Everyone knew he was destined to greatness, this youngster who balanced on handlebars of bicycles ridden by siblings and friends. Besides re-writing high school football, basketball and track records, he was an ace pitcher on amateur teams each summer. But, football was king. When the late Gordon Wood came to town in 1960, the Lions had beaten Breckenridge only once, back in 1941. Elkins helped the Lions beat the Buckaroos 18-14, en route to the 1960 AAA championship. (Immediately, Wood was THE town favorite, so viewed until his death in 2003. After all, he won seven BHS state football titles.)...

The Elkins’ word was their bond. After a baseball tournament in 1961, a scout offered Lawrence a \$25,000 signing bonus. Lawrence’s dad – a big baseball fan who supported his family driving trucks and later operating a bank elevator – was big-eyed. But Lawrence’s mom reminded him of his commitment to Baylor, and off to college he went. There, he set several records (none of them academic, he jokes), and fans still speak of him in reverent tones....

Upon graduation, he signed with the Houston Oilers for \$170,000, kidded a year later by Texas Tech’s Donnie Anderson, who signed with Green Bay for \$944,000. “The Oilers’ offer included the gift of a Phillips 66 service station, which Elkins claimed upon retirement. With a chunk of his bonus, he remodeled his folks’ home, bought them a new car and deposited \$2,500 in their bank account. He also funded central heating and cooling for his mom’s church. The 76-year-old Elkins – with “creaks in his get-along” – lives in Clifton with wife Becky. Elkins and Davis are “co-champions” in one category, that being for their absolute humility. Read the Amazon book, and you’ll understand why. They’re both champions....

Walking the Appalachian Trail

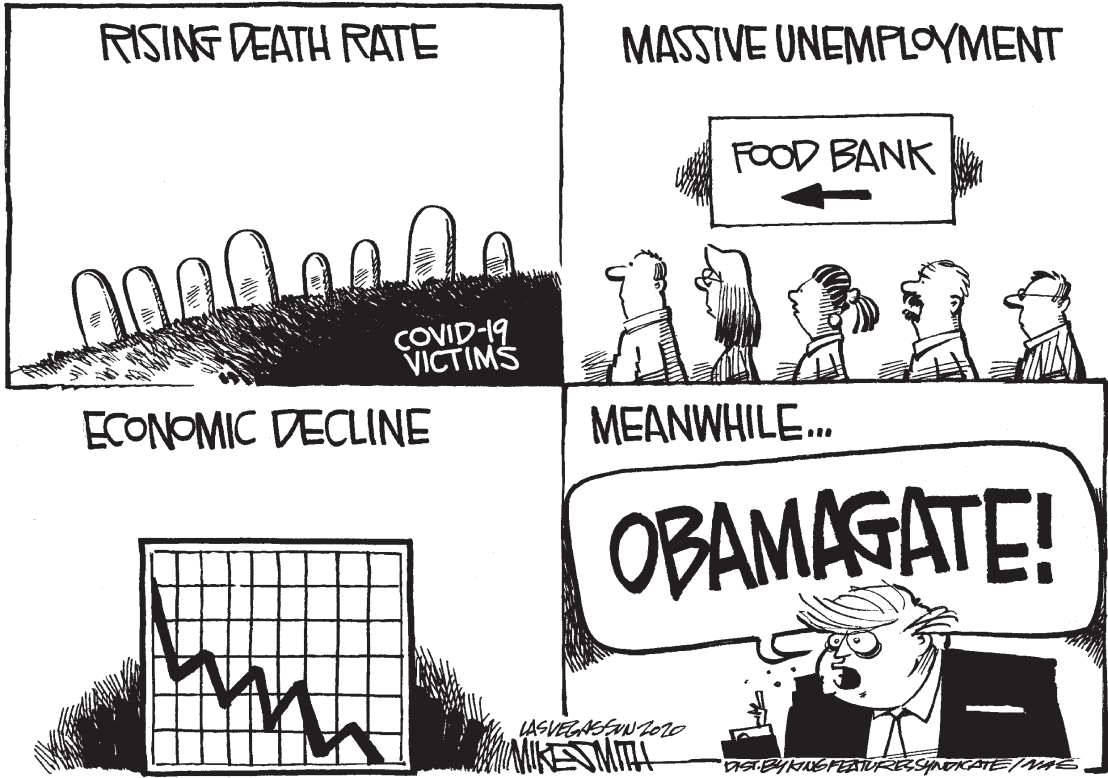
Ethan West has The Squarehead Barber Shop in Mason. He likes cutting hair, and he likes adventure. He has done 500-mile kayak trips on Texas Rivers and walked the 2,000-mile Appalachian Trail. “During my sophomore year in high school I wanted to do something significant in my life at some point. I saw a documentary on TV about the Appalachian Trail. It mentioned the 2,200-mile hiking trail starts in Georgia and goes all the way to Maine. I turned to my dad and said, ‘I’m gonna do that.’ He said he would drive me to the trailhead. That built a fire within me.” When Ethan graduated from high school he went to barber school and became a barber. Generations of his family had been barbers. “I became a barber to earn money so I could hike that trail. But I love barbering and will probably do it the rest of my life.” He walked the trail 3 years ago when he was 20. He cut hair along the way. “I had about \$200 worth of hair-cutting supplies with me. Believe it or not those hippies wanted to get their hair cut right

about midway in the hike. I cut their hair and charged for it. I made enough money to cover the cost of the equipment and made some extra for me. I gave the barbering tools away.” The walk took 145 days. “I started on April 11th and finished somewhere between September 2nd or 3rd. It’s pretty hard to plan, so I just took it a day at a time.” He averaged 22 miles a day. His longest day was around 40 miles. He had a sleeping bag, a tent and a 36-pound pack to start, but the pack got lighter as he went along. “I didn’t know anything about hiking and was carrying a lot of junk I didn’t need.” He got a motel room every 5 days so he could take a shower. That’s also when he stocked up on food. “I weighed about 190 when I

started and my body weight dropped down to about 140 at one point. But I was able to put that back on by eating a bunch. I finished at about 162.” He ate energy food during the day. “Peanuts, M & Ms Cheez-Its. Oreos, Snicker bars. But in the morning and evening is when I would cook my protein.” He faced all kinds of weather. “Snowstorms in the beginning, hot and humid in the middle, toward the end it starts getting cold. I walked from spring all the way to fall. I walked in the rain all day sometimes. The dropout rate among young people is high. Older people are usually more successful. I believe it’s because their mind set is refined. They have resolved to complete this.” There were fears. “You fear every day that you’re going to break your leg because you’re walking on rocks and different landscapes. If you hiked the trail and say you didn’t fall you’re not telling the truth. I fell on my butt a lot of times.” Ethan sent back his progress to friends and customers in Mason.



Let us appreciate our freedom

My Fellow Texans, Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the US Armed Forces. It is a day for Americans to offer tribute and honor to the heroes who laid down their lives to preserve our freedoms. 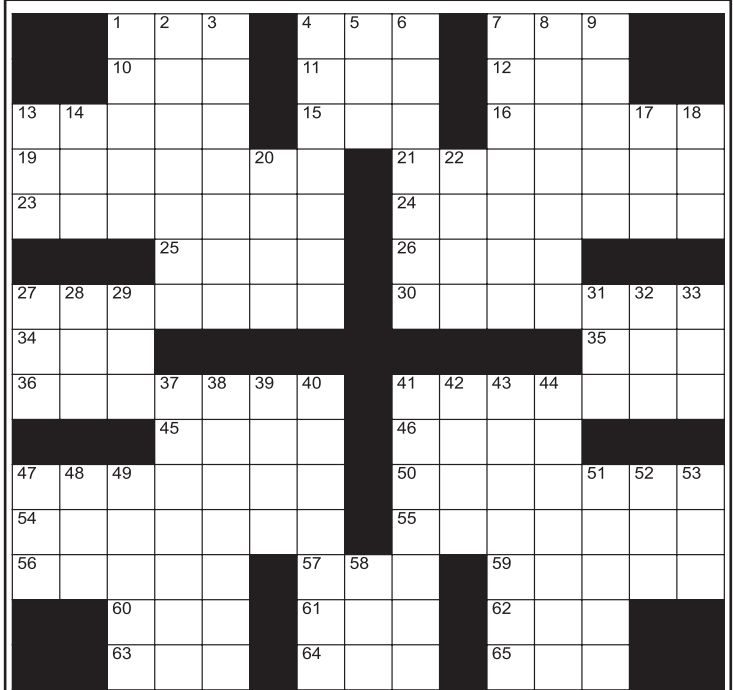
Harm was able to participate in and help organize the canned food drives at CHS to donate to the needy. He also helped with the recycling program, collecting the recycling

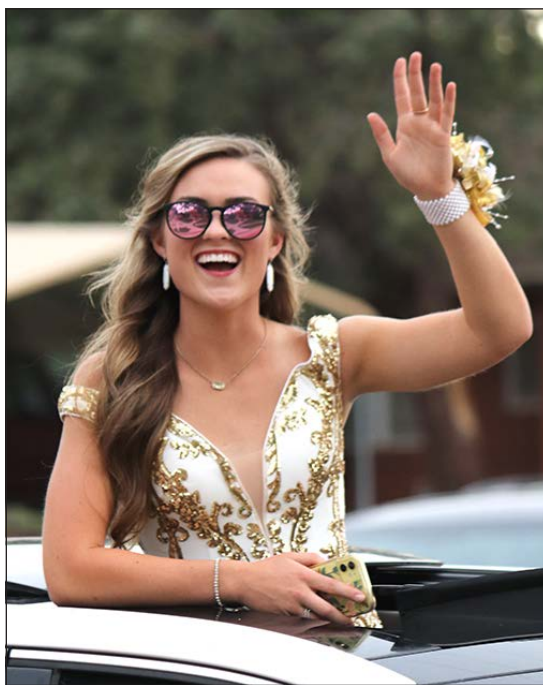

Property tax information available

The Donley Appraisal District has released information to help raise awareness of several programs and procedures related to property taxes in Texas.

This includes information about the following programs.

Property Tax Exemptions for Disabled Veterans - The law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by disabled veterans or surviving spouses and surviving children of deceased disabled veterans. Another partial exemption is for homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations at no cost or not more than 50 percent of the good faith estimate of the homestead's market value to the disabled veterans and their surviving spouses.

The exemption amount is determined according to percentage of service-connected disability. The law also provides a 100 percent homestead exemption for 100 percent disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and surviving spouses of U.S. armed service members killed in action.

Property Tax Exemptions - Non-profit organizations that meet statutory requirements may seek property tax exemptions and must apply to their county appraisal district by a specific date. Businesses that receive tax abatements granted by taxing units; ship inventory out of Texas that may be eligible for the freeport exemption; store certain goods in transit in warehouses that are moved within 175 days; construct, install or acquire pollution control property; own and operate energy storage systems; convert landfill-generated gas; or store offshore drilling equipment while

not in use may also be eligible for statutory exemptions.

Appraisal Notices - Normally, taxpayers receive a notice of appraised value from the local county appraisal district. The city, county, school districts and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set property taxes for the coming year.

Property Taxpayer Remedies - This Comptroller publication explains in detail how to protest a property appraisal, what issues the county appraisal review board (ARB) can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the options of taking a taxpayer's case to district court, the State Office of Administrative Hearings or binding arbitration if the taxpayer is dissatisfied with the outcome of the ARB hearing.

Homestead Exemptions - A homestead is generally defined as the home and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year. A homestead exemption reduces the appraised value of the home and, as a result, lowers property taxes. Applications are submitted to the local county appraisal district.

Productivity Appraisal - Property owners who use land for timberland production, agricultural purposes or wildlife management can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to their local appraisal district for an agricultural appraisal which may result in a lower appraisal of the land based on production, versus market value.

Residence Homestead Tax Deferral - Texas homeowners

may postpone paying the currently delinquent property taxes due on the appreciating value of their homes by filing a tax deferral affidavit at their local county appraisal district. This tax relief allows homeowners to pay the property taxes on 105 percent of the preceding year's appraised value of their homestead, plus the taxes on any new improvements to the homestead. The remaining taxes are postponed, but not cancelled, with interest accruing at 8 percent per year.

Property Tax Deferral for Persons Age 65 or Older or Disabled or Disabled Veteran Homeowners - Texans who are age 65 or older or disabled, as defined by law, or who qualify for a disabled veteran exemption may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their homes by signing a tax deferral affidavit. Once the affidavit is on file, taxes are deferred, but not cancelled, as long as the owner continues to own and live in the home. Interest continues to accrue at 5 percent per year on the unpaid taxes. You may obtain a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district.

Protesting Property Appraisal Values - Property owners who disagree with the appraisal district's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's ARB.

WOWW provides resources during school closure

AMARILLO – As the Texas Panhandle adjusts to the virtual shutdown of public life to slow the spread of coronavirus, parents are faced with the sudden need to provide educational support for children forced to continue their studies at home.

Window On a Wider World, which for almost 15 years has been providing learning experiences beyond the classroom for thousands of Panhandle kids, is stepping in to offer resources to weary parents doing their best to supplement their children’s education.

Clarendon Elementary has been a part of WOWW for years now. Principal Mike Word says, “It is so important our kids are exposed to experiences that they wouldn’t normally get in Clarendon. WOWW provided some of the coolest field trips I’ve ever seen.”

This current 2019-2020 school year Window On a Wider World provided 20 amazing field trips for Clarendon elementary students K-5 including: The WOWW Science Collaborative for 5th graders, bringing the Amarillo Opera to their school campus for the 3,4, & 5th graders, the WOWW Musical

Performance at the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts for the 2nd graders, and even learning song and rhythm for K-2 with Sweet Adeline’s.

“Before the middle of March, most parents had never imagined they’d be overseeing their kids’ studies,” said Catherine Meck, WOWW executive director. “While schools are doing the best they can to switch to distance learning, parents are having to fill in the gaps and keep their kids engaged. Because we have relationships with dozens of educational providers around the region, we felt we were in the best position to help.”

WOWW has compiled a resource directory of online educational resources offered by regional, state and national educational providers and posted it at www.windowonawiderworld.org/at-home-resources. The directory lists 45 educational resources ranging from the Mobeetie Jail Museum in Mobeetie, Texas, to the Smithsonian in Washington, DC

“These were existing resources that were seemingly designed for a time like this, but have been there all along,”

Meck said. “In fact, this is what WOWW and our Learning Partners do the year around – provide learning experiences kids can’t always get in the classroom.”

WOWW was formed as the educational component of the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts when it was opened in 2006, where its base remains. WOWW provides enriched educational programs through arts, science and cultural experiences beyond the classroom to support the state curriculum of students in the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Area schools provide funding of \$8 per child to receive the benefits of WOWW that include campus visits by partners such as the Citadelle Art Foundation in Canadian and field trips to locations such as Creek House Honey in Canyon, the Don Harrington Discovery Center, Palo Duro Canyon and many other area attractions. Additionally, WOWW provides student tours of the Globe-News Center and organizes both the Science Collaborative and the WOWW Factor featuring a youth art show and a performance at the Globe-News Center.
