## Local parties seek candidates for tax assessor

Both local political parties are looking for potential candidates interested in running for Donley County Tax Assessor / Collector after the lone candidate for the job withdrew.

Tammy Morrow, running as a Republican, had been the only candidate for the upcoming November election but withdrew from race for medical and personal reasons last month.

Filling Morrow's spot on the ballot is the responsibility of Donley County Republican Party Chairman Bill Word; however, Morrow's withdrawal also gives Donley County Democratic Chair Jean Taylor the opportunity to place a candidate for her party on the ballot as well.

The party chairs must name candidates by August 21, and Word has set a deadline of August 9 at 8 p.m. for expressions of interest from potential Republican candidates. Word can be reached at 806-277-0246.

Those interested in being a Democratic candidate for the office can call Taylor at 806-856-5961 or 806-677-4242.

The office is currently held by Linda Crump who plans to retire when her term expires at the end of this year.

## Fund set up to help Weatherton family

A fund has been established at the Donley County State Bank for Loyd Weatherton's medical expenses following a one-vehicle accident last Thursday evening, July 30.

DPS Trooper Lynn Mays said Weatherton was going north on SH 70 below the Greenbelt Dam when he went off the right side of the rode, apparently steered back left and rolled his vehicle.

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department extracted Weatherton and his passenger, Clemmon Weatherton, from the wreck. A third passenger, a minor female, was up and walking at the accident, the trooper said.

Mays said the cause of the accident remains under investigation. A family member says both Loyd and Clemmon Weatherton remain hospitalized, but Loyd is in much worse condition.

# Local schools re-opening next Thursday

Clarendon and Hedley schools are moving forward with plans to welcome students back next Thursday, August 13, while working to keep kids safe amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

School officials say they are doing their best to follow state guidelines, which have been constantly changing, as well as staying in contact with Donley County Judge John Howard, MD, to make sure they are in compliance with what is expected.

"Judge Howard has been a tremendous resource," Hedley Superintendent Garrett Bains said.

Clarendon CISD released a twelve-page Guide to Reopening Campuses on Tuesday, which can be accessed on ClarendonLive.com,

and Hedley ISD last week published an eight-point document answering frequent questions about their reopening plans. That document is also available at ClarendonLive.com

Both schools have moved to have registration online, although Clarendon students may still have some campus-specific packets that will go home with the kids the first day of school.

"Also if anyone has trouble with the online registration, they can set up a campus appointment to register face to face," Clarendon Superintendent Jarod Bellar said.

For Hedley's part, most of their registration was already online because so many kids live outside the district, Bains said.

"We've been doing this already," Bains said, "but parents can also come in person from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. to register. They have to wear a mask, and we can only have one parent per kid at a time."

Masks will be a big deal as school gets underway with both Clarendon and Hedley saying they will follow the orders of Gov. Greg Abbott. Hedley will require masks of everyone ages ten and up, and Clarendon, noting that different ages exists within grades, will require masks in grades five through 12.

"Students in lower grades can wear masks if their parents want them to," Bellar said.

Bellar also noted that Clarendon CISD doesn't expect students to

wear masks all day but will encourage them between classes especially.

Both schools also will be trying to practice social distancing as much as possible, which Bains says is easy for Hedley since most classes don't have more than ten people in a room.

Clarendon and Hedley both will be following disinfection practices, and Hedley has even purchased new tables for its cafeteria to allow for better separation during lunch time.

Both schools will be participating in UIL extracurricular activities approved by the state, but Clarendon and Hedley both also have taken the position that students who do not enroll in on-campus instruction cannot participate in extracurricular activities.

"It just makes sense," Bains said. "If you're at risk or worried about being around people, why would you want to be in an activity with close contact?"

School officials realize that this is a challenging time. Bains says most of his parents have been very supportive of the school so far, understanding that some of the decisions are not his or the school's but rather the state's.

Schools are also looking forward to classes starting.

"My people are just ready to get back to work and see the kids," Bains said.

"We're just looking forward to having a great year," Bellar said. "We're all excited."

# Louisiana man faces charges for burglary

A Louisiana man was still in the Donley County jail this week on after entering a rural home here on July 20.

Lanie Drinion Thomisee, age 41, is being held on \$50,000 bond and facing a charge of Burglary of a Habitation.

According to the Donley County Sheriff's Office, Thomisee entered the remote rural home of a

woman in the northwest part of the county.

The woman reported that she saw a truck pull up in her driveway. The man walked by her front window and went to the back of the house and entered without permission.

The many eventually left the residence without incident and was later located in Armstrong County

and arrested by a Donley County deputy.


Thomisee also faces a charge of Evading Arrest out of Armstrong County and is wanted out of Louisiana on a parole warrant.

In an unrelated case, the Donley County Sheriff's Office also recently arrested 59-year-old Roger West, formerly of Memphis.

West was picked up on July

23 at First and Kearney by Sheriff Butch Blackburn and arrested on a Hall County warrant for a Motion to Adjudicate / Possession of Controlled Substance.

West was filed on for stealing a garden hose from a local business and was later transported to Memphis where he remained in the Hall County Jail this week, Sheriff Blackburn said.



## Sunday wreck

Emergency personnel respond to a Sunday evening accident at Third and Kearney involving two vehicles. The Associated Ambulance Authority treated victims on the scene, but no one was transported. The Donley County Sheriff's Office said a 2016 Chrysler driven by 22-year-old Austin Miranda was traveling west on Third and did not yield at the stop sign. Miranda's vehicle struck the side of a 2004 Ford sport utility vehicle, driven by 22-year-old Keandre Cortez, going south on Kearney, causing the Ford to spin around 180 degrees and come to rest facing north. Miranda told the deputy the sun was in his eyes. He received a citation for failing to yield at the stop sign.

# Woman dies after battle with COVID

An elderly local woman has died while battling the COVID-19 virus, and two new cases of the disease have been confirmed in Donley County this week.

A family member of Eunice Ward told the Enterprise they have not been given an official cause of the July 28 death of the 97-year-old Hedley resident but said she had been living at home with family and doing well for her age before she was hospitalized June 27 and tested positive for COVID-19.

"I think it's safe to say that it put her on a downward spiral," Ward's daughter-in-law Carole Ward said.

Carole Ward said her mother-in-law spent a week in the hospital before being moved to a skilled nursing facility. She was later moved back to the hospital for a time before returning home under hospice care.

"She was still testing positive when she came home," Carole Ward said.

An official cause of death is expected later this week.

County officials say they have known anecdotally about Ward's COVID-19 status, but the Donley County Judge's office has yet to be notified by the state that the woman tested positive for the disease even though more than a month has passed since she was first tested.

Since her official notice of her condition has not been received, Ward's case of COVID-19 is still not included in the running tally published by the Enterprise.

Meanwhile, the Clarendon Family Medical Center this week reported two new cases of COVID-19 in Donley County.

That brings the official total number of confirmed cases locally to 45 with 42 of those listed as recovered and three cases still active.

# State sales tax revenue increases

State sales tax revenue totaled \$2.98 billion in July, 4.3 percent more than in July 2019, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said Monday.

The majority of July sales tax revenue is based on sales made in June and remitted to the agency in July. Widespread social distancing requirements were more relaxed across the state in June than in previous months.

Local municipal sales tax figures for July will not be released until later this month.

"State sales tax collections in July were better than expected, increasing despite the high unemployment due to the pandemic," Hegar said. "The increase was due to a surge in collections from the retail trade sector; receipts from other

# A season opener like none other

They tried ever so hard to make major league baseball’s opening day seem as normal as possible, for the radio listener or TV viewer anyway.

Globe Life Field in Arlington--the \$1.2 billion enclosed structure barely completed for the scheduled home opener in March--languished for almost four months. When it finally opened, fans were denied admission. So, it was up to “describers” behind microphones and cameras to showcase the goings on of the delayed first game.

For the Texas Rangers, seasoned media veterans came through, thanks to the creative genius of public address announcer/sound effects maestro Chuck Morgan and hall-of-fame broadcaster Eric Nadel. Their combined experience spans 80 years....

We fans in radio and TV land had to settle for “virtual.” Do things get much more “virtual” than Governor Greg Abbott’s ceremonial first pitch in Austin winding up in a catcher’s mitt a couple of hundred miles away?

There were sounds from old broadcasts, organ music from Abilene and Morgan’s patented annual season opener: “It’s baseball time in Texas!”

“All” of this for radio and TV fans, since the only “live folks” at the stadium were players, game officials, emergency personnel, stadium employees, media reps and camera guys. Wayda minute! There were three fans who were special guests of the Ranger organization....

The trio included Dr. and Mrs. Jim Hilliard as well as their son Samuel’s fiancé.

Sam, 26, grew up in Mansfield and is left fielder for the Colorado Rockies. Growing up, he attended dozens of Ranger games with his dad, who was diagnosed with ALS (Lou Gehrig’s Disease) two years ago. The trio was invited to attend all five games, including the two preliminary exhibitions. Their highlight was seeing Sam make a sliding catch in left field in the season opener.

Kudos to Rangers’ brass for welcoming these special guests....

Now, about the organ music from Abilene. Dustin Tatro’s music had to travel even further than the governor’s opening pitch.

Thanks to technology, the 26-year-old EMT and organist “played the pipes” as he does each Sunday at St. Paul United Methodist Church.

He provided some 500 baseball melodies, sending them to that mysterious cloud “storage bin” in the sky. So, when music is called for, Morgan and the Fox Sports guys can extract it from the cloud in a few button-pushing seconds. (He’ll commute from Abilene for “live” play when fans are allowed to attend.)....

Dustin gave up baseball as a six-year-old Little Leaguer, thus allowing more time to practice on keyboards.

He doesn’t regret it. “At least I made it to the majors, even if as an organist,” he joked....

Too bad Gordon McLendon, “the old Scotsman,” isn’t still around to toss in ideas about techniques for broadcasting games “in absentia.”

For about a decade in the 1940s and 1950s, he depended on a partner transmitting data from major league parks via teletype. Up to 400 radio stations linked to his Liberty Broadcasting System carried the games.

Generally, his techniques worked well. If foul-ups occurred, McLendon concocted yarns, such as repeated foul balls, players taking extra time outside the batter’s box and sometimes “rain delays,” despite cloudless skies on the sunniest of days....

We yearn for such sunny days. And seeing a sparkling new ballpark where the thermostat doesn’t vary from 72 degrees. And providing real cheering sounds for what is happening in real time. Let’s hope that soon there’ll be “walk ins” by fans and “walk offs” by Rangers.

I miss the peanuts, but don’t remember ballpark Cracker Jacks.

Yes, it will be special to be present. I believe players are truthful in saying they really do miss fans. If pressed, even umpires might make the same admission. They’ve developed thick skin, generally subscribing to the theory that “sticks and stones may break their bones, but words will never harm them.” (This adage predates umpires, first appearing in print almost two centuries ago, but that’s another story.)...

# The mask makers in Seminole

Tina Siemens works with the Heritage Project in Seminole. It’s a group that does research on the history of the Mennonites. Tina wrote a book titled SEMINOLE about the immigration of Mennonites to Seminole. Tina says the group was looking for ways to help out during the Corona crisis. They looked into making masks for medical personnel and first responders.

“I know a lot of people who have sewing machines. All of the Mennonite ladies can sew. On our Facebook page I posted a message that said if anyone with a sewing machine would be interested in making masks, be at my house at 4 PM tomorrow.”

Ten women were at her door at 4 PM the next day. Eventually the number of women making masks in Seminole was seven times that.

“I have coordinated seventy plus women. Two of them were non-Mennonites and the others were all Mennonite ladies. The number included many grandmas, daughters, daughters in law and granddaughters. Mostly they make the masks individually at their homes.

But I went into one home and around a large table six women were at the sewing machines making masks.”

Tina made a sample mask as a pattern. She got it from the Internet. She added one special feature.

“I came up with the idea of having a slit in the face side so you can insert a panty liner as a moisture barrier as well as a filter. I heard that in China ladies were using a feminine napkin as a mask. I didn’t think that was appropriate.”

The project has been going on 4 months now. The ladies have created 2,363 masks so far. Tina is a pro now and can make a mask in ten minutes. She has sent them all over the country, some to elected officials in Austin and Washington D.C.

Tina did some research and found out cotton was the preferred material

to use. The pastor of the First Baptist Church in Seminole helped out.


“He announced to his congregation that anybody that has cotton material please get it to Tina Siemens. I now have bags and bags of cotton material that has been donated. We can make lots of masks.”

Tina’s 74-year-old father got involved.

“He saw me being busy with the masks and said he wanted to try it. So he got out his sewing machine that he had bought at an estate sale in Canyon years ago. He said he had it tuned and asked me to show him how to make a mask. So I have pictures and videos of my dad sewing masks for this project at age 74 “

Tine says there are other women in Seminole making masks. They just wanted to help. It seemed like the natural I thing to do.

“It has been such a great experience to see the community come together. When our country is in need there are always people to step up to the plate and help.”

## Cornyn offers Juneteenth bill

WASHINGTON – US Senator John Cornyn (R-Texas) last Thursday again offered his bill to make Juneteenth a federal holiday on the Senate floor, before it was blocked by another Senator.

Cornyn previously tried to call up and pass this bill a week earlier, also, but it was blocked.

Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wisconsin) is opposed to the idea because he says he does not support giving federal workers another paid day off.

“We previously had offered this unanimous consent request and my friend from Wisconsin has his reasons for objecting... and so I’m coming to the floor to reoffer it,” Cornyn said.

“If we don’t remember our history, we will not learn from our mistakes. We will commit those mistakes over, and over, and over again. The tragic and brutal killing of George Floyd earlier this year has shone a light on the injustices that still exist in our society.

“One way we could attempt to make a small step toward that reconciliation and continue to remind ourselves on an annual basis of how far we’ve come but how far we still have to go, it would be to take up this bill, pass it, and get it to the President’s desk.”

Sen. Johnson has proposed eliminating Columbus Day as a federal holiday in exchange for Juneteenth.

# TxDOT urges work zone safety

At any given time, the Texas Department of Transportation has as many as 3,000 active work zones on the 80,000 miles of roadway it maintains across the state.

I-35 is a major transportation artery and one of the largest active work zones in Texas. In 2019, a total of 20,488 traffic crashes occurred along the I-35 corridor, resulting in 141 deaths and 523 serious injuries. As the summer travel season continues, TxDOT encourages all motorists to make sure they take precautions when driving on I-35, especially through construction and maintenance areas.

TxDOT offers the following tips to help motorists stay safe this summer when traveling the state's highways.

Be safe as you navigate through a work zone.

Slow down and always follow

the posted speed limit. Remember, traffic fines double in work zones when workers are present.

Pay attention. Avoid distractions, keep your mind on the road and put your phone away.

Watch out for road crews. The only protective gear they wear is a vest, a hardhat and safety boots. Their bodies are no match for your vehicle.

Don't tailgate. Give yourself room to stop in a hurry if you have to. Rear-end collisions are the most common type of work zone crash.

Allow extra time. Road construction slows things down. Count on it, and plan for it.

Check DriveTexas.org before hitting the road. The website contains information about highway and road conditions throughout the state.

"Move over or slow down." It's the law. When approaching a stopped

emergency vehicle, TxDOT vehicle, tow truck or utility vehicle with flashing blue or amber lights on the side of the road, drivers must move over a lane or reduce their speed to 20 mph below the posted speed limit. Violations of the law can result in a fine of up to \$2,000.

"Be Safe. Drive Smart." is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel such as wearing a seat belt, driving the speed limit, never texting and driving and never driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.

Nov. 7, 2000 was the last deathless day on Texas roadways. #EndTheStreakTX asks all Texans to commit to driving safely to help end the streak of daily deaths on Texas roadways.

# SWEPSCO offers payment options for those impacted by COVID-19

# Six arrests following May protests

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) obtained arrest warrants for six individuals who were wanted for crimes – ranging from felony criminal mischief to riot – that were committed during the protests that occurred at the Texas State Capitol on May 30 and May 31.

During the riots in May, numerous officers were assaulted and property was damaged.

These arrests come as the result of an extensive investigation by DPS Special Agents who have worked to identify subjects involved in violent and destructive behavior during these protests. Those facing charges include:

Syed Imran Ali, 24, of Spring, Texas, was arrested on July 21 for misdemeanor riot for pushing into a restricted area on Capitol grounds during a protest and refusing to leave after repeated requests from law enforcement.

Ali was arrested without incident during a traffic stop and booked into the Harris County Jail. In addition to the riot charge, Ali was previ-

ously arrested for criminal trespass stemming from the riots.

Cassidy Julia Nordstrom, 26, of Austin, Texas, was arrested on July 23 for two misdemeanor counts, one for riot and another for obstruction of a roadway for throwing water bottles at Troopers and illegally blocking Interstate 35. Nordstrom was booked into the Travis County Jail.

Gabriel Brett Krug, 22, of Temple, Texas, was arrested on July 24 by the Temple Police Department for one count each of felony criminal mischief and misdemeanor riot for damaging DPS property on Capitol grounds and at the Governor's Mansion during the protest. He was booked into the Bell County Jail.

Bryan Becerril, 17, of Pflugerville, Texas, was arrested on July 24 for one misdemeanor count each of criminal mischief and participating in a riot in connection with vandalizing an unmarked DPS patrol vehicle at the Texas State Capitol. He was booked into the Travis County Jail.

Nickia Kasha Hunt, 25, of Austin, Texas, was arrested on July 25 for one misdemeanor count each

of criminal mischief and participating in a riot in connection with damaging DPS property at the Texas State Capitol and at the Governor's Mansion. Hunt was booked into the Travis County Jail.

Jordan Chance Teal, 18, of Austin, turned himself in on July 29 after an arrest warrant was obtained for one felony count of assault on a public servant in connection with a riot during which a DPS Trooper was injured. Teal was booked into the Travis County Jail.

As a reminder, DPS is asking for the public's help in finding a number of individuals who were involved in other crimes during the protests at the Capitol in May. The Texas Crime Stoppers is now offering cash rewards of up to \$1,000 for information that leads to the identification and arrest of any of these individuals charged with a felony, or up to \$500 for information that leads to the identification and arrest of any individual charged with a misdemeanor.

major sectors – including mining, construction, wholesale trade, services and restaurants – showed significant declines.

"Collections from e-commerce were up sharply, as many consumers chose to shop online rather than at brick-and-mortar stores. Also, more online marketplace and remote vendors are required to collect and remit Texas tax following the Wayfair decision and subsequent legislation passed last session. Increased time spent at home both for teleworking and staycations, in lieu of leisure travel, spurred sharply higher spending for home improvements.

"Collections from food and beverage stores also were up strongly, as consumers replaced purchases of alcohol from restaurants and bars with alcohol purchased for off-premise consumption (alcohol sales at bars and restaurants are subject to mixed beverage taxes, not sales and use tax)," Hegar said. "Collections from sporting goods stores also rose significantly, as consumers turned to home workouts, bicycling, boating, camping and other forms of outdoor

recreation consistent with social distancing.

"With about 1.3 million Texans with continued claims for insured unemployment and another 184,000 receiving benefits under the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance program in June, it's likely that consumer spending was significantly supported by enhanced benefits provided by the federal CARES Act and related legislation enacted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. With the expiration of these benefits at the end of July, consumer spending and sales tax collections may decline in coming months."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in July 2020 was down 5.3 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections. The effects of the economic slowdown and low oil prices were more evident in other sources of revenue in July 2020, though most were improved compared to previous months.

Texas collected the following

revenue from other major taxes:

Motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$466 million, down 3.7 percent from July 2019;

Motor fuel taxes — \$304 million, down 2.2 percent from July 2019;

Oil production tax — \$187 million, down 40 percent from July 2019;

Natural gas production tax — \$37 million, down 71 percent from July 2019;

Hotel occupancy tax — \$34 million, down 42 percent from July 2019; and

Alcoholic beverage taxes — \$110 million, down 6.2 percent from July 2019. These collections were inflated by a delay in liquor tax remittances, resulting in the July receipt of four months' worth of remittances in liquor taxes due to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Mixed beverage gross receipts and sales taxes, which typically make up the bulk of monthly alcoholic beverage tax collections, were down 41 percent compared to July 2019.





### Wildfire preparation, recovery topic of August 6 webinar

Wildfire preparation and recovery will be the topic of an Aug. 6 Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Rangeland, Wildlife and Fisheries Management Unit range webinar.

The “Wildfire Preparation, Effects and Recovery” webinar is part of the Texas Range Webinar Series, scheduled the first Thursday of each month from noon to 1 p.m., said Megan Clayton, AgriLife Extension range specialist and webinar coordinator, Corpus Christi.

Tim Steffens, Ph.D., range specialist with AgriLife Extension and West Texas A&M University in Canyon, will be the speaker.

“Much of the state is still suffering under dry conditions with occasional high winds that are perfect for carrying a wildfire,” Steffens said. “Dry lightning can be a trigger, as can human caused fire. It is certainly something to respect and be prepared for.”

Information presented will include factors affecting fire behavior, safeguarding homesteads and headquarters for fire season, preparations and responses to wildfire, safety and rangeland recovery considerations following wildfire.

There will be no Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education offered, Clayton said, so it is a free webinar for all.
