Sales tax revenue up for local cities

Donley County cities all posted gains when Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar delivered October sales tax allocations last week.

The City of Clarendon's sales tax revenue grew 7.28 percent compared to the same period in 2019 with an allocation of \$32,698.86. The city is now up 3.01 percent for the calendar year-to-date with collections totaling \$359,213.69.

Howardwick was up 22.43 percent with a monthly revenue of \$2,415.93 and is up 26.65 percent for the year at \$15,925.95.

Hedley's October revenue grew 26.11 percent at \$549.99, and that city is now up 7.46 percent for 2020 with allocations totaling \$8,601.70.

Statewide, Hegar distributed \$751.5 million in local sales tax allocations for October, 2.8 percent less than in October 2019. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to weigh on the Texas economy and sales tax revenue.

October's allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

Several local events set for Halloween

Clarendon is hosting a fun-filled day of trick-or-treating, games, food, movies, and more on Halloween, Saturday, October 31.

Starting at 10 a.m. downtown, the Chamber of Commerce is organizing merchants and vendors who will be set up with trick-or-treating, a costume contest, food trucks, a vendor fair, face painting, and a scavenger hunt. Burton Memorial Library will also be judging their scarecrow contest that day.

That evening starting at 5:30 p.m., the Mulkey Theatre will be hosting a Trunk or Treat along with a costume contest, and concessions. There will be prizes for best costumes and best decorated vehicle.

Also at 5:30, the First United Methodist Church will also be hosting their annual trunk-or-treat in front of the church.

Howardwick will also host a trunk-or-treat and Frito pie feed at the McMorries Memorial Park Starting at 7 p.m.

Then at 7:30 p.m., the Mulkey Theatre will also have a free movie, Hocus Pocus, sponsored by Robertson Funeral Directors.

Judge enacts burn ban county wide

Donley County Judge John Howard enacted a burn ban Tuesday.

Judge Howard said Clarendon Fire Marshall Jeremy Powell had requested the burn ban due to persistently dry conditions in the region.

County commissioners are expected to meet this Friday and will likely consider ratifying the judge's action.



Clinic reports 15 active COVID-19 cases

The number COVID-19 cases in Donley County spiked upward Tuesday afternoon with 15 active cases now being reported under the care of the Clarendon Family Medical Center.

Eight new positive cases were reported as of 3 p.m. on Tuesday alone with the overall number of positives being reported by the local clinic rising by 14 over the last week. A clinic spokesperson said they are seeing cases in young school children as well as college students.

Tuesday's information brings the total confirmed cases in Donley County to 87.

The clinic also this week began using a rapid test that can return COVID-19 results in 15 minutes.

Last Friday, Clarendon CISD quarantined its fourth grade classes with 25 students in all after an individual who had been in contact with those students tested positive for the COVID-19 virus.

Superintendent Jarod Bellar said he was informed about the

positive test late Thursday afternoon, October 8, and decided to quarantine that grade level to be safe.

"We wanted to be pro-active and see if anyone developed symptoms over the long weekend," Bellar told the Enterprise.

Fourth graders who were not exhibiting symptoms were expected to be back at school Tuesday.

Clarendon CISD also announced Monday that the school was notified Saturday evening that a lower elementary grade level teacher

had a presumptive positive test for COVID-19. However, Bellar told the Enterprise that due to precautions that had been taken in the teacher's class, the school did not think it was necessary to quarantine that grade.

The school says currently grades 5-12 are the only grades required to wear masks during the day, but younger grade levels are welcome to wear masks as well.

Donley County Judge John Howard, MD, did not have an update this week from state or area officials

to add to the local clinic's count but did say officials are seeing a "mini-outbreak" among students.

"We're seeing a cluster of positive cases at the school, and I think we're responding appropriately," Howard said. "We're also seeing a predictable increase at the college."

Speaking late Tuesday, Howard said the last thing he wants to see is the school shut down, but that quarantining grades or classes is a possible course of action.

Early voting underway for November elections

Early voting began Tuesday in the 2020 General Election and local elections.

Donley County Clerk Fay Vargas said turnout was brisk for the first day of voting, and Tax Assessor / Collector Linda Crump said last week that 349 new voters had registered for this year's elections.

In addition to the presidential, congressional, and other offices on the general ballot, the Clarendon College District, the Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District, and the City of Howardwick are also holding elections this year.

Local voters will select the

successor for Crump's position as the County Tax Assessor / Collector. Crump is retiring at the end of the year. Seeking her job are Republican Kristy Christopher and Democrat Tony Dale, and Deedra Keen is running as a write-in candidate.

Also of local interest is the race to be the next person to serve in the US House of Representatives for Texas District 13 when Congressman Mac Thornberry retires in January. On the ballot are Republican Ronny Jackson, Democrat Gus Trujillo, and Libertarian Jack B. Westbrook.

Three seats are up on the Clarendon College Board of

Regents, and incumbents Darlene Spier and Carey Wann are on the ballot along with Guy Ellis, Chris Matthews, and Debbie Thompson.

Clarendon CISD's Board of Trustees has two positions available this year. Incumbent René Mott is seeking re-election, and Kyle Davis and Chrisi Tucek are also running.

Howardwick has six people running for three city council seats. Aldermen Mary Grady and Marietta Baird are seeking re-election, and other candidates are Shelly Chavira, Terry Barnes, Jeremy Kindle, and Jada Murray.

Early ballots can be cast at the

Donley County Courthouse Annex for the General Election as well as the college and school elections, during regular business hours through October 30. Howardwick ballots must be cast at Howardwick City Hall.

Voters also still have until October 23 to request an absentee ballot. Voters who choose to return those ballots in person to the clerk's office must bring an official ID and can only bring their own ballot and not a spouse's or other person's ballot with them.

The General Election will be held Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

CC hosting Stampede rodeo here

It's time to saddle up and get ready for a fun ride as the Clarendon College Stampede welcomes more than 500 contestants to its NIRA rodeo this Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, October 15-17.

With contestants from 16 colleges and universities in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association involved, qualifying events will be held all day with nightly performances being held at 7:30 p.m. each evening.

Tickets for evening performance are \$5 in advance from Clarendon College and the Clarendon Visitor Center and will be \$10 at the gate.

All activities will be held under the roof of the CC Livestock & Equine Center.

Activities will include bull riding, barrel racing, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, and more.

Clarendon College officials are excited to be hosting the NIRA rodeo, which is held here every four years.

Rodeo coach Bret Franks and nearly the entire staff at Clarendon College have been working for weeks to make sure the event comes off without a hitch.

COVID antibody tests available at health fair

The Donley County Health Fair will offer several free health care screenings, including a COVID-19 antibody test, this Thursday, October 15, but there will be no information booths this year in an effort to keep folks safe during the pandemic.

Organizers met Monday morning to finalize plans for the event and say people can still come inside for the screenings at Clarendon College's Bairfield Activity Center or they can have the option having the tests done in a drive-by style in their car.

"We will be able to have the tests available outside," said Darla Franks of the Donley County AgriLife Extension Office.

The screenings will be available from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m., Franks said.

Blood tests offered will include PSA, A1C, Lipids, Glucose, and COVID-19 antibodies.

"They will need to be fasting for eight hours to take the blood tests," Franks said.

Donley County Judge John Howard, MD, especially encourages everyone to take the blood test to check for the COVID-19 antibodies.

"I want as many people as possible to get tested," Howard said. "It's free, and it will tell if you've had the COVID-19 virus."

Free flu shots will also be available for those wanting one.

Masks and temperature checks will be required to attend the fair.

This year's health fair is sponsored by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, Clarendon Family Medical Center, Mike's Pharmacy, and the Donley County Hospital District.

All the news that’s fit to get digitized

Mike Wilson, editor of the Dallas Morning News since 2015, has resigned the position, and the almost six-year tenure probably has seemed much longer.

He was charged with what likely is an inevitability, that of converting most delivery of news from “the printed page” to digital transmission. Somehow, he has maintained excellence in both. There’s no way the assignment could have been “cushy.”

His comments to colleagues expressed well his own deep feelings as well as those of contemporaries across the land: “Running a newspaper today is like swimming across a hot fudge river. You gorge yourself on the decadent pleasure of it, but you have to kick like h... to get to the other side.” He added that he’s “full,” as well as “tired.”...

I’ve long maintained that the Morning News is one of the nation’s best newspapers. Much of the credit goes to Wilson. He emphasized the privilege of working “in the shadow of the Rock of Truth.” He was referencing the three-story inscription about journalism fairness and integrity chiseled above the entrance to the paper’s longtime headquarters, now replicated in the lobby of its current Commerce Street office.

In a final comment to his associates, he said, “... And always know that what you do is essential and worth the swim.”

I – and other graybeards – may never fully accept or utilize digital news delivery. Chris Liebrum, a valued friend who has accepted the fact that digital news is here to stay, opted to renew his DMN subscription for digital only....

Uh oh. He listened to the spiel about subscription options; there are more of them than there are flavors of Baskin-Robbins ice cream. Each one, he claims, involves a subscription for one of several print edition deliveries in order to receive news digitally.

He opted to receive a hard copy of Sunday editions.

The transaction completed, he then indicated that he would be on vacation every Sunday of the upcoming subscription period, so there would be no need to throw his newspaper – ever....

Some well-known publications aren’t pushing readers to digital reading, they’re shoving! A good example is the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette. It still offers print editions on Sunday, but for weekday subscribers, there’s digital delivery only.

Here’s the hook: To make sure weekday readers have means to view the content, the ADG is handing out free iPads with each subscription.

Before weekday print publications ceased, subscribers to digital had pulled alongside with about 100,000 subscribers in each camp. Weekenders prefer print, however, ten to one....

While lamenting, I seize this opportunity to “profess a pet peeve.” As newspaper editorial staffs have been steadily trimmed for the past decade or so, it is clear to see that proofreaders were among the first to go.

I’m hoarse from yelling about so many folks thinking the nouns “lecterns” and “podiums” can be used interchangeably. Now, I’m beating similar drums concerning “amount” and “number.”

One of my most valued mentors says “amount” is the term used for inanimate objects that can’t be counted, such as pecans, rainfall or courage, but for animate objects, such as cats or people, she says to use “number.” In an above-the-fold frontpage story in a Metroplex newspaper recently, a “small amount of firms” was referenced. (Suggestion: When all else fails, verbally use both words. Usually, one of them sounds far better than the other.)...

Finally, here’s a tale from long ago concerning two small weekly newspapers in a village that could barely afford one. Each editor tried his/her best to come up with a fresh, “catchy” headline.

One sleepy January afternoon at press time, nothing newsworthy had happened. Frantically, the editor turned out a quick headline: St. Valentine’s Day Falls On February 14 This Year.

Sadly, news was in short supply the next week, too, so the editor responded to the other’s Valentine’s Day “pronouncement” thusly: If That’s News, Poet Geoffrey Chaucer ‘Scooped’ ‘Em By Nearly Six Centuries....

The Humor and Drama of Settling the Old West

When it comes to deciding who was the “baddest” of the bad men of the American West, John Wesley Hardin’s name has to be among the leaders. He may not have achieved the fame of the likes of Jesse James or Wild Bill Hickock or Billy the Kid, but none of these people came close to Hardin’s record of killings. History says that Hardin killed about forty people during his lifetime. He was loved by a few, hated by many, and feared by all. He had a very short fuse. It is claimed that he shot a man one night whose snoring was keeping him awake.

After serving 16 years in prison for murder, Hardin was released in 1889. He attempted to practice law, but liquor and all-night card games thwarted his attempts to reform. He migrated to El Paso, the wildest gambling town in

Texas at that time.

Early in the afternoon of August 19, 1895, an eleven-year-old telegraph delivery boy found Hardin in the Acme Saloon on San Antonio Street. This young lad had delivered several telegrams to Hardin that summer, and he generally knew where to find him. And Hardin always treated the boy kindly. As the lad walked into the saloon, Hardin was at the bar raising a large glass of whiskey to his lips.

“Another telegram for you Mr. Hardin.”

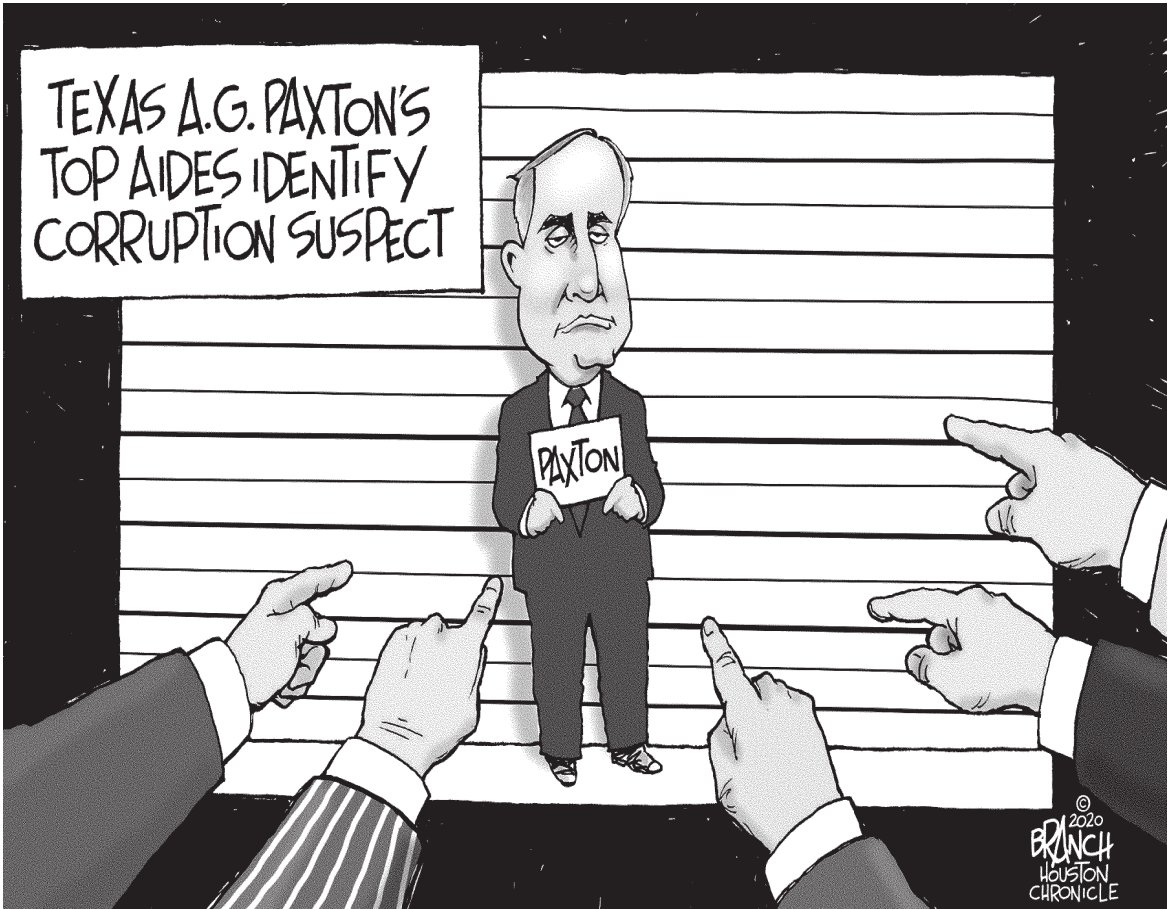
Hardin lowered the glass to the bar, put his hand on the lad’s head, and said, “Son, don’t ever do this.” He then reached into his trousers pocket, took out a dime, and gave it to the boy.

“I won’t sir,” the boy promised. “Thank you.” He turned and went on his way.

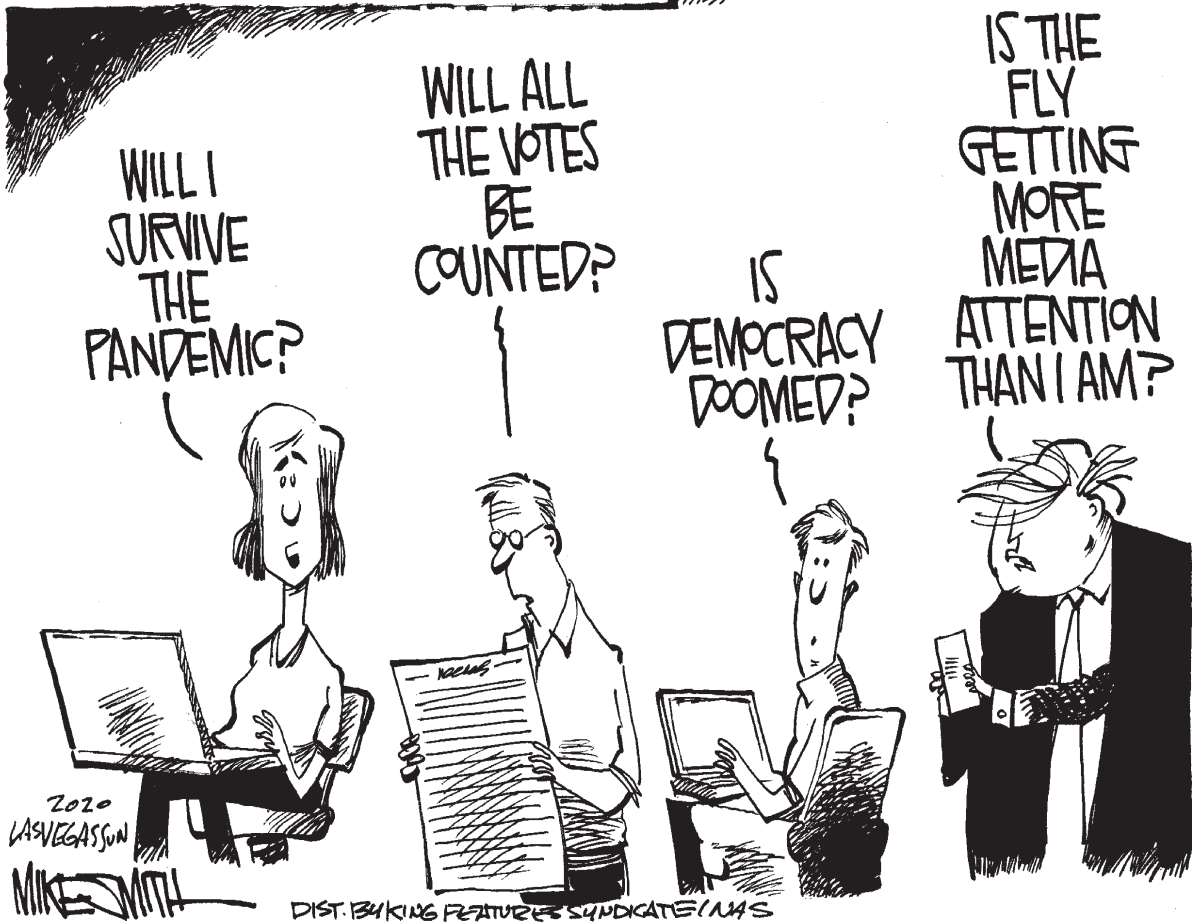
Toward midnight that evening, Hardin was in a drunken brawl in the Wigwam Saloon farther up the street, and he was shot in the back of the head and killed. The telegraph delivery boy went to the undertaker’s parlor as soon as he could get off work the next day to see Hardin’s body and to pay last respects to the man who had been kind to him.

We may never know the contents of the telegram, but we do know that the delivery boy heeded Hardin’s advice. That delivery boy grew up, married, and became my father. Whenever he would tell the story, he would usually end by saying, “Thus ended the life of a desperado who had been universally feared. Yet I received only kindnesses from him.”

This Texas mayor built fire trucks

David Abernathy is the mayor of Pittsburg, Texas. His father held the same position for 52 years.

“I made a campaign promise I wouldn’t stay here 52 years,” says David.

He started serving his city at an early age.

“I was working at the fire station by myself when I was 16. You could get a driver license back then at 14.”

He became a Justice of the Peace when he was in college.

“I became the youngest JP in the state at the time. I was still going to college and coming in and holding court. After that I was starving to death so I got into the newspaper business for about a year.”

Then he joined the Forest Service. “I was with the Texas Forest Service 34 years. Whether it’s a hurricane or wildfire we had that under our bailiwick and then also I did training and supervised providing assistance

to all the fire departments in East Texas. A lot of people don’t realize it but Texas has as large a forested area as any other southern state that’s entirely forested. We’ve got roughly 52 million acres of forested land in Texas. It’s a great agricultural commodity that comes out of East Texas in timber value.”

David and his dad built fire trucks. “We built 8 fire trucks together and gave them to the community. We literally built them from the frame up. These are fully functional fire trucks. He built 2 others besides the 8 others that he and I built “

His father was a mechanical engineer. “My father was such a perfectionist.

When I was a senior in high school we built a fire truck together. Every screw slot on that truck is straight up and down. There’s not a screw that’s turned perpendicular. They’re all straight up and down. It serves no purpose. It’s just because we could. That fire truck that he and I built when I was in high school is in service today.”

David says Pittsburg has a lot going for it. Downtown is healthy. The area produces poultry and hay and has some beautiful mansions built in the late 1890’s. Carroll Shelby, the Ford Mustang man, grew up in Pittsburg. The city is the hotlinks capital of the state and it has the Ezekiel Airship.

“It crashed on the way to the St. Louis World’s Fair but the state recognizes it as flying one year before the Wright Brothers flew their plane at Kitty Hawk. They just had all the documentation and this one didn’t.”

David is in his 53rd year of serving as a volunteer fireman.

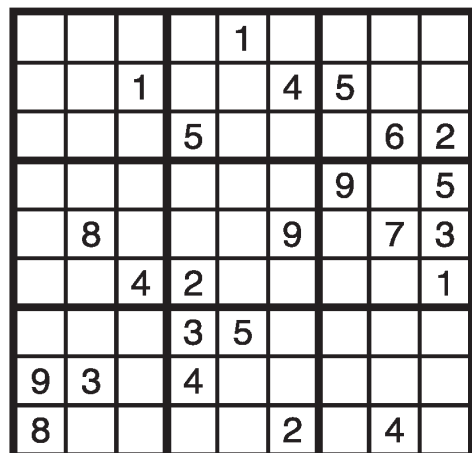

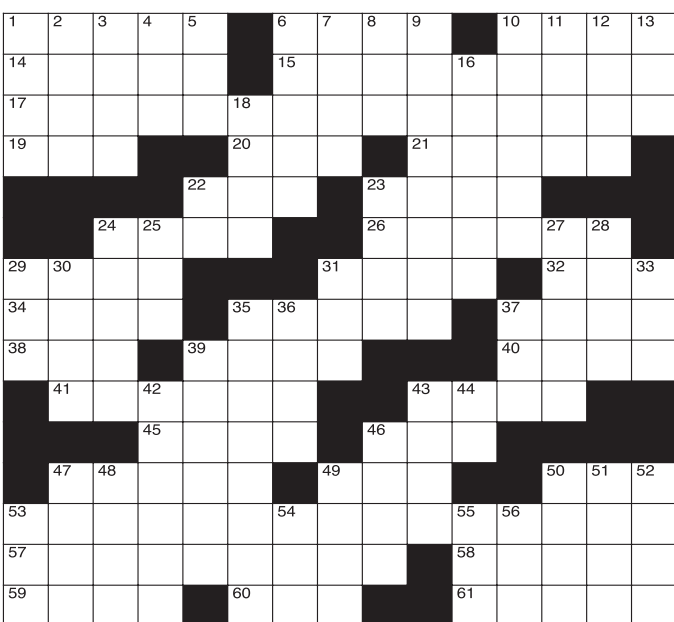

Johnson accepted to SWOSU College of Pharmacy

Carlee Inae Johnson of Clarendon has been accepted and is enrolled in the Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) College of Pharmacy in Weatherford.

Forty-two students were admitted into the Doctor of Pharmacy program for the 2020 fall semester. The class has an average cumulative grade point average of 3.51 and is composed of 20 women and 22 men.

The SWOSU College of Pharmacy admits 85 students each year to its Doctor of Pharmacy program during the fall and spring semesters.

Make sure to get out and vote

As November 3 gets closer I hope everyone is registered to vote because the last day to register was Oct 5. Voting is a right granted to the citizens of the United States and since the year 1845 that day is ‘The first Tuesday after the first Monday in November’. Why such a crazy day, you ask.

From 1788-1845 each state was allowed to set their own election days, many times the results were chaotic with the states voting early and publishing the results could sway the public in voting (remember the Bush-? Election and the so-called hanging chads). That election was finally settled by the Supreme Court. So, in 1845 congress decided to set one federal election day for the country.

How do you do that? First, decide on the month. It’s too cold to travel by horse in December, January,

February, or March; then is planting season for the population which are mostly farmers. After planting is harvest so August, September, and October are eliminated which leaves us with November. November 1 is a Roman Catholic holiday plus merchants usually tally their books and place orders on the first day of the month.

Sunday is out because of the sabbath, which also eliminates Monday as a voting date; it usually takes all day to ride from the house to the voting place, usually the county seat. Wednesday was usually market day, Thursday and Friday

did not allow enough time to vote and return home. So, for 175 years the election day date has been “The first Tuesday after the first Monday in November”; eligible voters have been casting their vote. Between 1776-1830 those eligible voters were white, male, land owners; then each state slowly changed their laws to allow white males over the age of 21 to vote. After the Civil War, the 15th amendment allowed African American males 21 and over to vote, in the early 1900 it was the women’s turn. All this time, the Native Americans were still denied the vote, fighting for the right state by state with Utah being the last state to grant that privilege in 1962.

So, as an American citizen, please honor those ancestors that fought so hard for the vote and let’s fill the ballot boxes on November 3. God bless America.

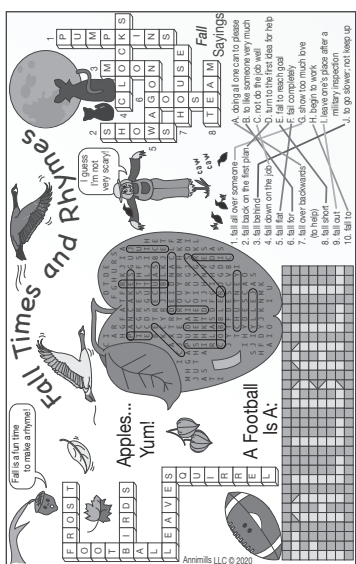
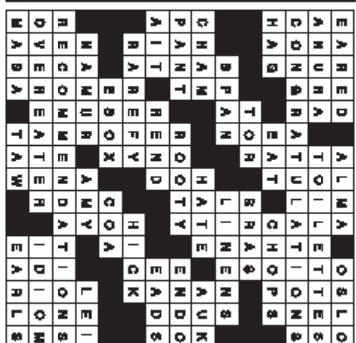
