gone, and we won't be interrupted. Maybe you both want to take me on at the same time," Proctor further challenged.


Needless to say, Frank and John continued in silence as they felt themselves becoming weaker and more limp by the minute.

Having made his point, Superintendent Proctor then picked up the phone and asked the school principal to come open the door and take the boys back to class.


Frank and John continued as students and as football players, and they now had the utmost respect for their superintendent and his discipline. They became numbered among his staunchest supporters.

Some obstacle courses feature electrical shocks.

"They look like you're running through a long hallway or a tunnel, but hanging down from the ceiling are electrical wires. I'm not sure how much voltage they carry but the first one I ran across threw me to the ground."

Miles says anyone can start a running program. It just takes determination and confidence. He has lost 20 pounds since he started running.

City denies two changes to new aquatic center

The Clarendon City Council denied two change orders for the new aquatic center during its regular meeting October 8.

City Administrator David Dock-

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ery said the council felt the change orders totaling almost \$15,000 and dealing with an accessible sidewalk and a control for the spray ground area were too expensive. The city is seeking more cost effective solutions to those needs, he said.

In his administrator's report, Dockery said the aquatic center is now 93 percent complete and the USDA water infrastructure project is 90 percent complete. He also reported continuing success with the code compliance issues and said that one month into the city's new sanitation contract with Diversified Waste, City Hall has received very few complaints. Dockery also reported Emzy Harris as a new employee in the city's street department. ACY WELLINESS GENTER

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


Broncos lose to Wellington By Sandy Anderberg
