Christopher wins tax assessor office

Donley County voters strongly backed Kristy Christopher as their choice for Tax Assessor Collector in the only contested county-wide race on last week's General Election ballot.

Running as a Republican, Christopher received 968 compared to Democrat Tony Dale's 158 votes. Write-in candidate Deedra Keen

received 44 votes. Christopher will succeed Linda Crump when her term expires at the end of this year.

On the presidential ballot, Donley voters preferred President Trump with 1,438 in favor of his re-election compared to 198 who preferred former vice president Joe Biden, who carried the national pop-

ular vote and appears to have enough electoral votes to be the next president. Mr. Trump is challenging those results in several states, however.

Some local voters preferred other candidates for president with Libertarian Jo Jorgensen getting 11 votes and one vote going to Howie Hawkins. Republican Ronny Jackson was

the strong favorite across District 13 to succeed US Rep. Mac Thornberry, who is retiring when his term expires in January.

Jackson received 1,419 votes locally compared to 178 for Democrat Gus Trujillo and 29 for Libertarian Jack Westbrook.

Several local candidates were unopposed in this year's general

election. Those returns include County Attorney Landon Lambert 1,423, Sheriff Butch Blackburn 1,436, Precinct One Commissioner Mark White 340, Precinct 3 Commissioner-elect Neil Koetting 344, Precinct 3&4 Constable Doug Wright 644, District Judge Stuart Messer 1,444, and District Attorney Luke Inman 1,407.

COVID-19 cases continue increasing

COVID-19 numbers continue to rise in Donley County and the Panhandle region with no immediate relief in sight.

The Clarendon Family Medical Center reported Tuesday afternoon that 30 active cases are under its care, which was up from 28 Monday and up from 19 one week ago.

Also as of Tuesday, the clinic has conducted 507 tests since the pandemic began with 133 cases confirmed as positive.

Donley County Judge John Howard, MD, said Tuesday that there are about five more active cases that he is aware of in the county, which would bring the overall active count up to at least 35. But Howard also discussed the difficulty

in getting accurate case counts for local residents who test outside of Donley County.

The judge's office received a state update last Wednesday, but the state then retracted the report on Friday, saying there had been data errors and that a new report would be issued that day. Then Howard later learned the state office was closed on Friday, and he still had no update as of Tuesday.

"If someone from Donley County tests positive in Amarillo, that case is first reported to Potter/Randall county officials, who then report it to the state regional office in Lubbock, who then are supposed to report it to the county and the state," Howard said.

Howard expressed frustration

with the state reporting system, not only for the time lag but also how the state is handling the results of rapid tests like those now being conducted at the local clinic. The state, Howard said, will not count a positive rapid test as a confirmed COVID-19 case unless it is backed up by the more invasive swab test.

"They will report those as 'probable' or 'pending,' but I assure you the only way you're going to get a positive rapid test is if in fact you have COVID," Howard said. The state's online dashboard, therefore, will not show the same number of "confirmed" COVID cases in Donley County as reported in the Enterprise, and Howard also said the online dashboard of the Childress Regional Medical Center is

"in no way official."

Regarding the active cases in Donley County, Howard calls it a "rolling number," noting patients who test positive for COVID-19 should come off the active list ten days after their test unless they are still showing symptoms.

"A lot of cases are going beyond ten days," he said.

Howard also said the positivity rate for the local clinic in October was 34 percent and said three of his patients are currently hospitalized.

"From September 30 through November 5, we conducted 225 tests and had 77 positives," he said. "We've had 22 positives in November alone. November 4 and 5, we performed 31 tests and had 13 positives."

Veterans Day - A time for reflection

For anyone worn-out from the election and disillusioned by the state of our politics (and that probably covers most of us), we now have the perfect antidote – Veterans Day. It is a day to honor those who have served, who had a purpose bigger than themselves, who protected what is most important, and whose service helped make our country stronger and better. Veterans Day is intended to honor them, but this year the rest of us may need it even more than they do.

Since 1973, our nation has had an all-volunteer military. Everyone who serves chooses to sign up. Less than one percent of our population protects the rest of us, and less than ten percent have ever served. We always tried to arrange a visit to the Capitol building when Congress was not in session so that I could escort the group to the House Floor. I told those veterans that many famous people had been in that chamber over the years, but no one had ever sat in those seats who were more important or more worthy of our nation's gratitude, honor, and respect than they.

Often the veterans are accompanied by a family member. During my time in Congress, I have seen more clearly that the families of service members serve our country as well, and they also deserve our appreciation.



I am afraid that most of us have

come to take for granted the many ways a strong military benefits our nation as a whole and each of us individually. The last 70 years have seen an unprecedented improvement in the condition of mankind around the world. No people have benefited more than Americans. Vignettes: How to get a good dam built

Water is essential to man's existence, and it was especially vital for establishing the LDS colonies in the Great Basin. Besides having water for drinking, cooking, washing, and bathing, the pioneers also needed it for watering crops and livestock and for turning mill wheels.

In the settlement of Cache Valley in northern Utah, a small group of pioneers attempted to form the settlement of Weston on Weston Creek between Clarkston and Oxford. Arriving at that destination in 1865, they stayed a year and then abandoned it because of Indian uprisings, but they returned permanently in 1869.

Upon their return the settlers immediately set to work building a dam across Weston Creek. They attempted to install a framework of willows in the stream. They improvised racks of small willows woven to hold dirt, which they used to carry load after load of rocks and dirt to the dam site.

It was a slow and difficult project. After working all day, the men would sleep at night and then return to the job the next morning only to find some of the previous day's work washed away. It was a very discouraging operation. They might not get water to their planted fields in time for the growing season.

Then one morning when the men returned to the job, they were surprised to find that not only was the prior day's work still there, but additional logs

and mud had been applied. Although pleased, they were mystified. How had it happened? And then they understood.

The beavers in the stream had finally gotten the idea that a dam was to be erected, and they had joined the work force. They cut willows into the appropriate lengths, wove them into the framework, and daubed them with mud. Thus with the men working the day shift and the beavers working the night shift, the dam was completed in short order. And it was a very good dam. In only four weeks, the settlers had water flowing in their irrigation ditches, and their grain was off to a good start.

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SWEPSCO to end coal operations at two plants

Southwestern Electric Power Co.'s (SWEPSCO) compliance plans for two recently revised environmental regulations include retiring the H.W. Pirkey Power Plant in Hallsville, Texas, in 2023 and ceasing coal operations at the Welsh Power Plant at Pittsburg, Texas, in 2028.

SWEPSCO, an American Electric Power company (Nasdaq: AEP), will file its compliance plans this month for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Coal Combustion Residuals (CCR) rule. The rule applies to the handling and storage of coal ash at each facility. SWEPSCO owns 580 megawatts (MW) of generating capacity at Pirkey and 1,053 MW at Welsh.

Flint Creek Power Plant in Gentry, Ark., will continue operations with installation of a dry bottom ash handling system and other facilities that meet the CCR and Efflu-

ent Limitation Guidelines (ELG) requirements in 2023. The existing ash pond at this site will be closed and the ash will be sold for beneficial reuse or moved to the plant's regulated onsite landfill. SWEPSCO owns 258 MW of the plant capacity.

The John W. Turk Jr. Power Plant (477 MW) in Fulton, Ark., currently meets CCR and ELG standards.

"Our Pirkey and Welsh employees have provided decades of safe and reliable service to SWEPSCO customers, which will continue until the transition is complete," said Malcolm Smoak, SWEPSCO president and chief operating officer. "We are committed to working with our employees, local leaders and our communities in East Texas to help them manage these transitions," Smoak said.

SWEPSCO will discuss transi-

tion options with affected employees, which include severance, educational and retraining resources, and other potential job opportunities at SWEPSCO and AEP.

"In making these difficult decisions, we have worked to balance the remaining life and economic viability of each of our coal-fueled generating units with other options for delivering power, including renewable energy and natural gas, in a resource mix that benefits our customers and the environment," Smoak said.

The analysis includes the level of investment necessary to comply with the recently revised EPA rules, each plant's remaining operating life, and potential future compliance costs. SWEPSCO will continue to evaluate options for the Welsh Plant, which will cease coal operations in 2028.

Turkey supplies down, prices up

Wholesale turkey prices are up and production is down amid looming uncertainty over how COVID-19 will impact traditional consumer trends this Thanksgiving, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

David Anderson, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension economist, Bryan-College Station, said the turkey market has been more interesting than normal going into the holidays.

Supply, demand and the subsequent pricing and marketing of turkeys in 2020 appears like it could be heavily influenced by COVID-19, Anderson said. Some aspects of the market are already being affected.

On the supply side, turkey production is down 7.7 percent for October compared to the same time last year, Anderson said. And overall production is down 2.7 percent for 2020 so far compared to 2019.

Turkeys in cold storage, which are typically stocked up for the holiday rush, were down 11.5 percent in September, he said.

Lower supplies have driven prices up this year, Anderson said. Wholesale turkeys, both tom, which are typically 16-24 pounds, and hen, which are 8-16 pounds, prices were 19 percent higher compared to last year due to tighter supplies.

Last year, wholesale turkey prices were 20 percent below the five-year average. Anderson said it would be interesting to see if retailers continue the practice of running specials on turkeys to draw shoppers.

But COVID-19 adds uncertainty to holiday gatherings and the choices consumers make.

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) applied to the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) on June 30, 2020, for authority to reconcile its eligible fuel expenses and revenues for the period of March 1, 2017, through December 31, 2019 (Reconciliation Period). SWEPCO's request, if granted, will affect all of SWEPCO's Texas retail customers who pay fixed fuel factors. The request has no effect on SWEPCO's non-fuel base rates.

During the Reconciliation Period, SWEPCO incurred a total of \$616,370,432 in eligible fuel, fuel-related expenses, and purchased-power costs to generate and purchase electric energy for its Texas retail customers, as well as expenses associated with environmental consumables and emission allowance costs incurred by SWEPCO and allocated to its Texas retail customers. As of the end of the Reconciliation Period, SWEPCO calculates that it has over-recovered its Texas retail fuel, fuel related, and purchased-power costs by \$10,041,895, excluding interest. Including interest, SWEPCO's cumulative over-recovery balance is \$10,144,696 as of December 31, 2019. SWEPCO seeks to carry over the cumulative Reconciliation Period fuel over-recovery balance into the next reconciliation period beginning January 1, 2020. SWEPCO also requests a prudence finding for certain fuel-related contracts and arrangements entered into or modified during the Reconciliation Period. Finally, SWEPCO requests recovery of its reasonable rate-case expenses associated with this fuel reconciliation proceeding and a prior fuel refund proceeding, including those expenses paid to reimburse municipalities for their participation.
