COVID-19 vaccine available this week

Clarendon Family Medical Center will be getting more COVID-19 vaccine doses this week as Donley County reports its third week with no active cases.

Donley County Judge John Howard, MD, said 306 people were vaccinated by state officials on Friday at the Bairfield Activity Center.

The local clinic has conducted 15 more tests since last Monday, but none of the tests came back positive.

Clinic spokesperson Marsha Bruce says vaccinations will be given to medical employees, those 65 and older, school teachers and staff, daycare workers, and anyone over 18 with high risk chronic medical conditions. If someone's doctor has advised them to get the vaccine, they are also eligible to get the shot.

Those interested in being vaccinated are asked to call the clinic and sign up at 874-3531. Due to storage requirements for the vaccine, doses will be given to ten patients at a time.

CC tuition staying same for 2021-22

Clarendon College will not increase its tuition for the 2021-2022 academic year following the February 18 meeting of the Board of Regents.

As the economy continues to feel the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic, the regents elected to hold the tuition and fees stable at the same rate as the current 2020-2021 academic year.

Typically, the college handles budget decisions at the end of May during odd numbered years when the state legislature meets to discuss and vote on budgets, but the board chose to be proactive on this matter, according to a college press release.

CC President Tex Buckhaults noted that it is important for the college to take a positive proactive stance to show students they are cared for and matter. This news comes at a time when budgets are tight for all stakeholders, including the public, the students, and the college itself.

The college said the board's decision is in keeping with the tradition of Clarendon College and shows that they are serious about putting the financial interest of students first.

Broncos to face Lipan for state semi

Clarendon posts wins over Christoval, Wink

The Broncos brought home two gold balls last week in their quest to become number one in the class 2A standings for the 2020-2021 season.

Only two games remain in their mission to win a State Championship. As the Enterprise went to press Monday night, the Broncos were preparing to play Lipan in Graham on March 9 to punch their ticket to the State Final game in San Antonio this weekend.

Game results will be posted on ClarendonLive.com and on [Facebook.com/TheEnterprise](https://www.facebook.com/TheEnterprise). The Mulkey Theatre will be screening the games live on the big screen with no charge for admission.

In the Wink game, Senior Donovan Thompson's 37-point game helped to propel their way to the Regional Championship in a high-scoring game that finished at 85-65 in front of at least 1,000 fans at Littlefield High School.

The Broncos played hard in the opening quarter, but only led by five when time ran out on the first eight minutes of play. They were able to regroup defensively and hold off the Wildcat offense with their strength and quickness.

The Broncos quickly put points on the board to lead by 12 about the 5-minute mark and finish the quarter with a good lead at 41-28.

The third quarter is when Thompson made his big run in the game making 16 of his point total. Overall, the Broncos' solid offensive

attack worked well all night long with each of the Broncos making a difference at just the right times. The Broncos turned in a 67 percent scoring average from the free throw line, which is huge in a big game. The Wildcats were not far behind the Broncos as they put in 62 percent of their attempts.

Joining Thompson in double figures was Cayden D'Costa with 14, Lamarus Peniger with 13 points, and Sylvester Ballard with 10.

Jordan Herndon finished with six, Lyric Smith three, and Jmaury Davis and Harrison Howard put in one each.

Earlier in the week, the Broncos flew by Christoval at 51-29 in the Regional Semi-Final game in Slaton. The Broncos had an easy go of it against the Cougars, but team realizes things will get tougher down the road. Once again, the Broncos took the early lead in the game and held the Cougars to only 10 points in the first half of play to lead by 23.

Davis was unstoppable as he put in 18 points in the game converting four for four from the bonus line. As a team, the Broncos put in 67 percent of their free shots.

Christoval was never able to make any kind of a run on the Broncos as once again their quickness on the court caused too many turnovers for their opponent.

Herndon and Ballard put in eight points each in the win, and Thompson and D'Costa added six apiece, while Peniger added five.

CC men's rodeo team takes title in Odessa

The Clarendon College Rodeo Teams competed at Odessa in the first rodeo of the semester February 25-27, and the men's team came away with several event championships as well as the team championship.

They finished with 465 points followed by Western Texas College with 400, Sul Ross University with 395 and Texas Tech University with 225 points as the top four teams.

In the bareback riding, Rickey Williams scored a 72 in both the long and short rounds to finish sixth in the average while Cole Franks was 74 in the long round for third place and 73 in the short round to finish fourth in the average.

Clarendon had four saddle bronc riders make it back to the short round with Cash Wilson winning the top spot with his rides of 80 points in the long round for first place, 74 and fourth place in the short round and first place in the average. Cole Franks was 70 points in the long round and tied for first in the short round with a 79-point ride finishing third in the average.

Keene Justesen tied for second in the long round with his 75 point ride while his 70 points in the short round earned him fourth in the average. Cauby Pennington was 70 points in the long round but bucked off in the short round. Krees Milligan and

In the bull riding, Dawson Gleaves was fourth in the long round

with his 72 point ride and won the short round with an 84-point ride putting him second in the average.

The Bulldogs held on to their top spot in the team standings while Wilson and Franks maintained the

top spots in the saddle bronc and bareback riding standings.

The team's next rodeo is scheduled for March 18-20 in Levelland and is being hosted by Eastern New Mexico University.

Closely examine Biden’s choice of Vanita Gupta

On Tuesday, the Senate Judiciary Committee will hold a nomination hearing for Vanita Gupta, President Biden’s choice for associate attorney general. If confirmed, Gupta would become the third-highest-ranking official in the Department of Justice.

Much of the questioning at Gupta’s hearing is likely to focus on her policy priorities during her previous stint in government, when she led the DOJ’s civil-rights division from 2014–2017. But senators on the committee would do well to also ask Gupta about how she came to assume that role.

Despite Gupta’s multi-year tenure leading the civil-rights division, a job that normally requires Senate confirmation, Tuesday’s hearing represents the first time she has ever appeared before the Senate as a nominee for any position. That’s because the Obama administration used aggressive interpretations of the Federal Vacancies Reform Act to both install her as the acting head of the division and keep her in charge when her statutory time limit ran out. The successful use of both strategies set questionable precedents that have significantly weakened the Senate’s role in vetting executive branch officials.

At her confirmation hearing tomorrow, Vanita Gupta should be asked about her abuse of the Vacancies Act while working for Obama.

First, consider Gupta’s appointment. The Vacancies Act is intended to allow placeholders to temporarily fill executive offices during the interregnum period after one officer leaves and before another can be confirmed by the Senate. These placeholders are called “acting officers,” and the Act allows them to begin serving immediately without Senate approval. Because they are meant to be only placeholders, all acting officers must have already been serving somewhere in government: either in the high-ranking civil service, in some other Senate-confirmed job, or in the “first-assistant” position to the vacant office itself.

Yet when President Obama wanted to appoint Gupta as acting civil-rights head, she wasn’t in government at all: She was working at the ACLU. So Obama took advantage of an ambiguity in the text of the Vacancies Act, appointing Gupta to the vacant position of deputy civil-rights head and then instantaneously elevating her to the acting-head position.

Gupta’s appointment clearly went against the spirit of the Vacancies Act, which permits first assistants to assume acting roles, presuming they will have relevant experience from serving as second-in-command — experience Gupta did not have. Even the National Task Force on Rule of Law & Democracy, housed in the left-leaning Brennan Center for Justice, characterized the move as “exploit[ing]” a “loophole.”

But, in fact, Gupta’s appointment may not have been a true loophole, because it may not have been legal at all. When the Trump administration later attempted a similar maneuver to install Ken Cuccinelli as acting head of Citizenship and Immigration Services, a federal court invalidated the appointment. The court cabined its holding to situations in which the first-assistant position was created solely for the purpose of elevating someone to acting officer, but the court suggested that in a future case it might consider a broader ruling. As the court noted, there is strong evidence that when the Vacancies Act was passed, the understood meaning of “first assistant” did not “encompass those appointed to the first-assistant position after the vacancy arose.”

There is similar legal ambiguity surrounding the length of Gupta’s service as civil-rights head. To encourage permanent nominations, an acting officer may only serve for seven months unless the president puts forward a permanent nominee (which, with rare exceptions, cannot be the acting officer herself). Although it was at first presumed that Obama would nominate Gupta — which would have immediately ended her tenure as acting head — he never did. Indeed, Obama never nominated anyone, meaning Gupta’s statutory time limit expired after seven months in early 2015.

How, then, did Gupta continue to lead the division until Obama left office? Through exploitation of yet another loophole in the Act, which allows a non-Senate-confirmed person who is not officially an “acting officer” to nonetheless perform all the “non-exclusive” (i.e., shared or delegable) duties of an office indefinitely. When Gupta’s time limit expired, Attorney General Loretta Lynch simply purported to delegate to her all the duties of the civil-rights head position, arguing that they were all nonexclusive.

When the DOJ attempted this strategy, Ilya Shapiro and I predicted that parties subject to Gupta-authorized enforcement actions would challenge her authority in court. Some did, indeed. But courts accepted Gupta’s argument that all of the powers she exercised must be presumed nonexclusive absent explicit text to the contrary, and all of the challenges failed.

Nonetheless, the legality of this strategy is still not settled. A federal court recently struck down a similar move by the Trump administration, remarking that performing the nonexclusive duties of an office while being barred from using the “acting officer” title constitutes “a distinction without a difference.”

Ironically, Gupta’s tenure helped establish two strategies that would be used to an even greater extent by the Trump administration in its attempts to avoid Senate advice and consent. Perhaps, then, it would be worth asking her whether she would still support the use of similar strategies to install those serving below her should she finally be confirmed.

What happens if metal grows weary

What can be done when mere mortals are caught in the crossfire of “stuff-we-don’t-understand-at-all?” And what if our understanding better “fits” bygone days when basic transportation centered on riding horses or depending on them to pull conveyances? There wasn’t an awful lot to understand when either horses or wagons failed us.

Even then, there were probably a few “breakdowns” caused by “metal fatigue,” but the one word “broke” usually sufficed. “Metal fatigue” covers many failures these days; now, there is so much more metal to put pedals to. (I’m surprised that COVID-19 isn’t blamed, at least in part, on metal giving way.)

For most of us—when things break—few details are understood. “Metal fatigue” suffices. We are favored if details are spared....

Two recent happenings—one known around the world and the other limited to our garage—can be attributed to “metal fatigue.” The one warranting big newspaper headlines and providing lead stories for national newscasts occurred in skies over Colorado. A United Airlines flight headed from Denver to Honolulu sustained an engine failure that no doubt had 241 folks contorted into whatever “prayer positions” best suited them. Varying-sized “pieces” of the Boeing 777 fell, some of it landing uncomfortably close to people and their possessions.

Upon learning that pilots skillfully returned to Denver International Airport without fatalities or serious injury, folks breathed king-size sighs of relief. Initial

findings suggest engine “metal fatigue.”

I need no additional details as may be determined by the National Transportation Safety Board. (This incident reminds us of the “miracle landing” on NYC’s Hudson River a dozen years ago.)....

Within days of the Colorado incident, we experienced “metal fatigue” in our garage. Most details will be spared, and thankfully, neighbor B. J. Ford recommended Kevin (“the spring man”) Bailey, who has a garage door repair service in Arlington.

Kevin sent technician Jesus Crisostomo. He arrived promptly, and in a scant hour did much. He cleaned up our mess, fixed up our garage door opener, and lightened up our mood. Gone was our mental picture of Brenda pushing the “down” button, a nanosecond before her chilling screams. The garage door seemed to be exploding. Had I pressed the button, there’d have been screams, too, maybe both louder and longer. What happened next included a door half-closed, springs sprung, cables amuck, and rollers asunder on the garage floor. Luckily, our car was parked on the driveway, our dog was in the house and Brenda’s fright was brief.

It was the first failure of our almost 20-year-old garage door mechanism. I

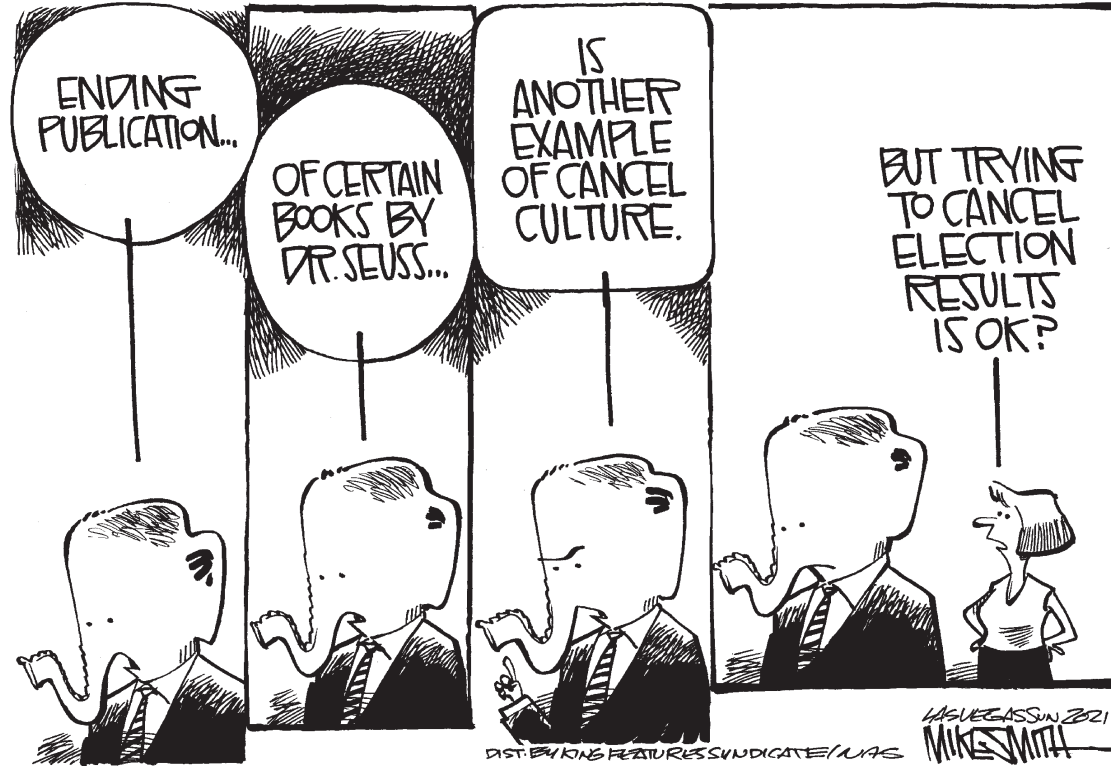
feared that the repair guy would shake his head and whisper last rites....

Painful experiences have taught me to call on professional help when I am in the “tall weeds” of home repair. (For me, anything beyond changing light bulbs, tending to the lawnmower, and replacing air filters warrant calling in the experts.)

Conversely, four decades ago—when I thought anything concerning household repair deserved do-it-yourself efforts first—I “fecklessly” took on a similar break-down. Thankfully, a neighbor—perhaps equally “feckless”—agreed to help. The “spring had sprung,” and “we” (okay, specifically “I”) thought it could easily be replaced. I hurried to the parts place to purchase a new spring. Unfortunately, it had no instructions for installation. Somehow, “we” failed, big time. As things quickly went south, the door “wanted” to rise at record speed. My neighbor and I “held it down,” yelling for additional neighborhood assistance. Had there been fewer helpers, the door might have sprung skyward, winding up three houses away, perhaps coming to rest on a roof. A professional was called, saving the day.

The current repair was made at a fair price. I wrote “metal fatigue” on the receipt. That’s all. For no good reason, I thought of that “cylinder-like” metal object that commercial pilots said “whooshed” past their plane over New Mexico the other day. It didn’t seem to be tired at all....

How the Teddy Bear got its name

It is generally agreed that the Teddy Bear is so named in honor of President Theodore (Teddy) Roosevelt. There is disagreement, however, as to when and where the name originated. Both Colorado and Mississippi claim this distinction. It is quite possible that both may be right.

In 1902, Roosevelt visited Mississippi to help settle a land dispute between Mississippi and Louisiana. Taking time for a hunting excursion for bears, Roosevelt exhibited great disappointment at not finding any in the wild. Hoping to soften the President’s disappointment, some of the hunting party separated from the main group, and they found an old, lean bear which they lassoed and tied to a tree. They summoned Roosevelt to the scene and told him that here was a bear he could shoot.

One look was enough, and Roosevelt turned away saying that it would be unsportsmanlike to shoot a bear in that situation.

The next day, the Washington Post immortalized the episode with a front page editorial cartoon. Morris Michtom, a shopkeeper in Brooklyn, New York, saw the cartoon, and he immediately petitioned Roosevelt for permission to call two toy bears made by Michtom’s wife “Teddy’s Bears.” Teddy Roosevelt granted the permission.

Three years later, in 1905, while on a bear hunting expedition in Colorado,

Roosevelt stayed at the Hotel Colorado in Glenwood Springs. The Colorado story has partial similarity to the Mississippi story. Sitting at dinner in the Hotel Colorado’s restaurant after a day of fruitless hunting, Roosevelt’s disappointment at not seeing a bear that day was evident to all. In an effort to help the President feel better, some of the waitresses gathered pieces of cloth and fashioned them into a doll that looked like a cuddly bear. They presented their creation to Roosevelt, telling him that he now had at least one bear for the day. The staff at the Hotel Colorado claims this event to have been the origin of the Teddy Bear.

Although the Mississippi claim is better documented and occurred first, it is quite possible that both events actually took place. George U. Hubbard is an author and resident of Clarendon.

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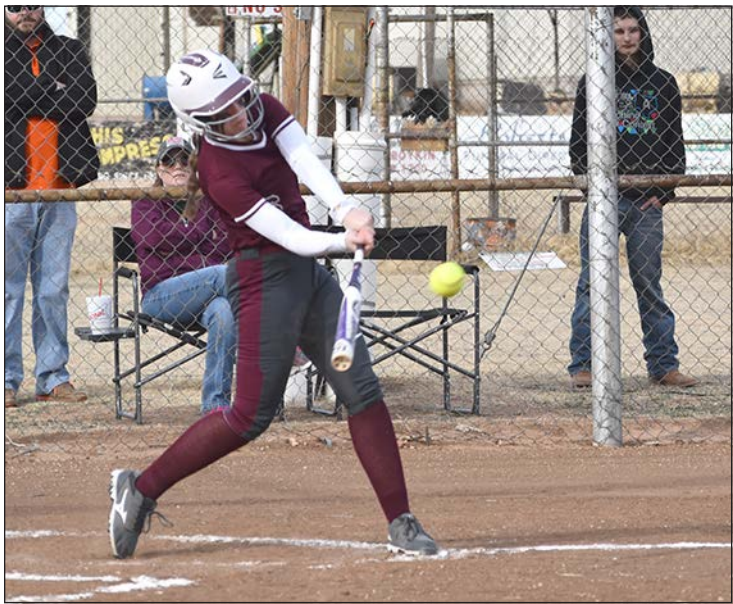
