## **District court** considers five pleas Oct. 29

The District Court heard five pleas when it met in Clarendon at the Donley County Courthouse on Friday, October 29.

District Attorney Luke Inman, along with Assistant District Attorneys Harley Caudle and Greg Buckley, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas, with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Brandie Chambless pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for two years for the third degree felony offense of possession of a controlled substance.

Chambless, 50 from Clarendon, was arrested by Donley Sheriff's Deputy Jay Logan on October 2, 2019. Chambless pleaded to an information filed by the State on October 22, 2019.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Chambless is also required to pay a \$500 fine to Donley County, \$458 in court costs, \$180 lab fee, successfully complete 200 hours of community service, and attend Concho Valley. If Chambless violates probation, she could face up to ten years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ.

Trevor Blake Hartman pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for three years for the third degree felony offense of evading arrest in a motor vehicle.

Hartman, 19 from Lelia Lake, was arrested by DPS Trooper Kelly Hill for the offense that took place on July 10, 2021. Hartman plead to an information filed by the State on October 29, 2021.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Hartman is also required to pay a \$500 fine to Donley County, \$340 in court costs, and successfully complete 200 hours of community service. If Hartman violates probation, he could face up to ten years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ.

Alexander Abarca pleaded rue and was convicted for the first degree felony offense of possession of a controlled substance. Abarca was sentenced to 30 years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ. Abarca, 31 from San Bernadino, Calif., was arrested on August 23, 2019, in Carson County by DPS Trooper Robert Bowden. Abarca pleaded to an information filed by the State.

## **Owls honor their** most faithful fans

Prior to last Thursday's kickoff, the 11 Hedley football players kneeled down in front of 20 people. The folks weren't just random Hedley fans, but the legacy of two very specific Hedley fans that had been a staple of the Owls' sidelines for decades, Buford and Geraldine Holland. The game that followed was almost an afterthought, especially when most fans knew how it was going to end.

But the game went on, with Follett downing Hedley 54-6 after three quarters due to the mercy rule in a District 1-1A Division II contest. The Panthers (10-0, 4-0) secured their undefeated mark, while the Owls (8-2, 2-2) enjoyed one of the program's best campaigns in years. Plenty of touchdowns were scored, but the loudest cheer of the night came from the home crowd as Hedley put up its only score in the final seconds of the first half. But those two very special fans were missing from the home sideline, their cheers not heard but felt. Buford Holland passed away October 15, 2021, while his wife, Geraldine, died nearly two years prior on December 8, 2019.

Both were honored for their longtime fandom and impact on the community of Hedley. It was the first home game for the Owls since Buford Holland passed away, and the final game of the Hedley season, marking the end of an era. But at the same time, a new beginning. The Owls won eight games this season, something that had never been done prior and could happen next fall with the team graduating one senior. Though barely connected to the Hollands at all, the timing may have been a sign from the universe.

Everyone knew the couple. They were always at football and basketball games, community events and were active with their neighbors and immersed in the community. The Hollands had four children, Darrell, Glyndol, Lynn and Gail, who all graduated from Hedley. They also have grandchildren and great-grandchildren who went through Hedley. They left their mark in the town of less than 300. And it will continue.

Gail Hill (formerly Holland) said after she and all her siblings graduated and moved on from Hedley, her parents found their calling in being the parents and grandparents of the Hedley community.

The state filed its motion to adjudicate on January 14, 2021, alleging 11 violations of community supervision. Abarca pleaded true to the allegations.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Abarca is also required to pay a \$25,000 fine, \$336 in court costs, and \$180 restitution.

Rene Ruben Granadoz pleaded guilty and was convicted for the third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated and was sentenced to ten years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ, but the sentence was probated for three years.

Granadoz, 37 from Childress, was arrested by DPS Trooper Jerome Ingle on September 1, 2021. Granadoz plead to an information filed by the State on October 28, 2021.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Granadoz is also required to pay a \$3,000 fine to Carson County. \$455 in court costs, \$60 lab fee, successfully complete 200 hours of community service, and all DWI requirements under Chapter 49.

Granadoz also pleaded guilty and was convicted for the second degree felony offense of aggravated assault causing serious bodily injury and was sentenced to ten years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ, but the sentence was probated for three years.

Granadoz was arrested by Collingsworth Sheriff's Deputy Billy Doss for the offense that took place on June 13, 2021. Granadoz plead to an information filed by the State on June 16, 2021.

## **Connect vets** with skilled trade positions

Each Veterans Day - this year observed on Thursday, November 11 - we are all reminded of our military Veterans and compelled to say thank you for their service. As one of the approximately 2 million Texans who have served in the United States Armed Forces and one who also did a tour in Afghanistan, here's what I want you to know about the promise our Veterans represent for our workforce.

In 2012, I was honorably discharged as a disabled combat Veteran after two enlistments in the U.S. Army as a Specialist, Chaplain Assistant from Fort Hood, following a tour in Afghanistan. Like most Veterans transitioning to civilian life and especially finding meaningful work, I struggled initially. But I found that my training and preparation made all the difference. And that's the story of so many.

Veterans possess a variety of soft skills including time management, team orientation and a strong work ethic, which are in high demand by employers. After a military career of 20 or 25 years, those transitioning also have a baseline income and benefits on which they can rely along with maturity and a high level of dependability. Yet making the transition isn't always easy.

We live in a world of cultural understanding for many differences. But given the military's unique culture and way of communicating-as well as the way their skills and job roles are titled – Veterans many attributes may not immediately be understood by recruiters who are perhaps more keyed into civilian job experience.

The irony is that in today's job market especially, employers are looking for the same kind of certainty our highly desirable Veterans are seeking. Where there's a disconnect, it is often a simple matter of retraining our service men and women how their ample skills translate.

I found my post-military calling as an electrical instructor at Skillpoint Alliance, a Central Texas nonprofit organization that offers just this kind of free, hands-on training and education programs in the skilled trades, which also include manufacturing, HVAC and plumbing. What I discovered is that as a Veteran, I had the mindset and preparation to excel in this work and to mentor others, but especially in helping them get ready to face perceptions in the interview process and on the worksite.


Something I learned is that Veterans need to learn to soften their communication style, and that their tactical experience simply needs to be explained. Also, as they are often transitioning after discharge or retirement from Military service, they have to re-orient themselves to the civilian workforce in a way that makes the best use of their maturity and skill sets. We do this type of outreach and retraining at Skillpoint, and it is so worth that little bit of extra effort to bring

## Were Bullock's pigs worth 35M francs?

In 1840, the Republic of Texas was hoping to borrow 35,000,000 francs from France until some marauding pigs initiated events that put an end to the negotiations.

Count Alphonse de Saligny came to Texas in 1839 as France's representative to the new Republic. Although he saw the economic potential of this new country, Saligny did not relate well with the rough and crude ways of the frontiersmen with whom he was now associating. And he was especially bothered by a group of pigs belonging to an Austin innkeeper, Richard Bullock.

Although the grounds and gardens of the French embassy were fenced, the pigs frequently forced their way onto the property to eat the corn reserved for the horses. Saligny reported that on one occasion, a dozen pigs burst into the stable and frightened eight horses that completely wrecked the stable in

papers. Saligny further complained that his servants spent two hours every morning repairing the fence and that 140 pounds of nails had thus far been used. But still, the pigs worked their way in.

Finally in desperation, Saligny ordered one of his servants to kill some of the pigs. Upon finding his slain pigs, Bullock became so angered that he physically attacked the servant and pounded him severely with his fists. To Saligny, such an act toward the Charge d'affaires of the King of France and his servants

was an "odious violation of the law of nations," and he demanded that Bullock be punished consistently with "the enormity of the offense."

Bullock was arrested and then released on bond, claiming that Saligny should have built a better fence. This hardly satisfied Saligny, and after his further complaints reached the Texas Secretary of State, Bullock was rearrested but again released. Because of his own failure to pay some past debts and the passing of bogus promissory notes, Saligny did not have public opinion on his side.

All this could have passed as a humorous set of occurrences except for one thing. Saligny's brother-in-law was the French Minister of Finance. The loan of 35,000,000 francs that Texas sought was not granted. George U. Hubbard is an author and a resident of Clarendon.

## Okrapalooza celebrates odd veggie

Gumbo is not the only use for okra, a vegetable brought to the US by slaves in the 1660s. Dallas has an event called Okrapalooza every year about the time okra is harvested.

Elizabeth Dry turned a trashy vacant lot into a community garden 12 years ago and named it The Promise of Peace Garden. To raise money for the rent on the property she went to her computer and googled okra festivals in Texas,

"And there were none," says Elizabeth. "So I started one. The first year there were just three chefs who prepared okra dishes on picnic tables and attendees paid \$5 to come in."

The fund-raising event has grown considerably and now attracts hundreds of people. It is an upscale event with an admission charge of \$85. Guests get to sample gourmet okra dishes and custommade wines and beers while listening to live music. They also get to hear about okra recipes and ways to eat healthy.

"We have several musical groups that play 45-minute sets. During that time guests will be tasting the okra dishes, going from chef's table to chef's




be judged on presentation, complexity, flavor and all that."

This year's event was at the Cotton Mill in McKinney. Twelve chefs were on hand producing everything from pickled okra seeds to okra ice cream.

'We've got a very diverse group of cooks. There's personal chefs, there's chefs from four-star restaurants, there's chefs that actually farm their own food."

Elizabeth says there are no big corporate sponsors. This is for the community.

"The chefs love it. It's one of the most down to earth, fun, love-filled events I've ever been to. And these chefs create masterpieces that have never for three months on Elizabeth's farm. been replicated. People told me that I

He folded okra into the flour and somehow made it sweet with a dipping sauce."

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



The ladies will host Childress on Saturday, November 13, at 5:00 and 6:00 p.m. and travel to Nazareth on November 16.

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



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

Granadoz is also required to pay \$4376 in court costs and successfully complete 300 hours of community

service. The court also met in Panhandle on Wednesday, October 27, to hear ten pleas, two of which involved a Donley County defendant. Inman, along with Caudle and Buckley, prosecuted the cases Judge Messer presiding.

Brandon Jerry Don Jackson pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for five years for the first degree felony offense of failure to comply with sex offender registration enhanced.

Jackson, 45 from Clarendon, was arrested by DPS CID Agent Jerrad Norman on December 1, 2020. Jackson pleaded to an information filed by the State on October 25, 2021.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Jackson is also required to pay a \$2,000 fine to Donley County, \$488 in court costs, and successfully complete 400 hours of community service. If Jackson violates probation, he could face up to 99 years or life in the Institutional Division of TDCJ.

Jackson also pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for five years for the first degree felony offense of failure to comply with sex offender registration enhanced.

Jackson was arrested by Norman for the offense that took

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
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place March 1, 2021. Jackson pleaded to an information filed by the State on October 25, 2021.
