Party to honor CC's NFR qualifiers

The Clarendon College rodeo team has been gaining some incredible momentum over the last few years, and it has only gotten better

The proof is in the pudding with three former Bulldog cowboys having earned qualifications to the National Finals Rodeo, the sport's grand finale that features the top 15 contestants from the regular season in each event.

Leading the way is two-time qualifier Wyatt Casper of Miami, Texas, who finished the 2020 season as the reserve world champion. He became the first national champion

in Clarendon history when he won 2016. He will be joined by fellow bronc rider Tegan Smith of Winterset, Iowa, who finished third at the 2019 College National Finals Rodeo; Smith finished the 2021 PRCA regular season in 10th place, one spot behind Casper.

Cole Franks rounds out the trio of qualifiers, earning his spot by finishing 12th in the bareback riding world standings. Franks, the son of Clarendon College rodeo coach Bret Franks, is coming off a tremendous 2021 campaign; he was named the PRCA Bareback Riding Rookie of the Year.

All that came after being one the saddle bronc riding crown in of the guiding forces behind Clarendon's men's team title at the college finals this past June. He dominated bareback riding to claim that national title, then added to it by qualifying for the championship round at the CNFR in saddle bronc riding, securing the all-around national title, too.

All three will be recognized and honored during an NFR Sendoff Party and Prime Rib Dinner, set for 7 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 20, at the Donley County Activity Center. Tickets are \$100 (for two people), and proceeds will go to the Clarendon College rodeo team.

"I think it's a pretty special deal that we have three NFR qualifiers from our little college, so we wanted to put something together to honor them," Bret Franks said. "We also want to put something together to raise awareness and money for the rodeo program. Every ticket will be entered into a \$1,000 cash drawing.

'We will also have live music and a silent auction, so we hope it's a lot of fun for everyone and gives them a chance to wish our cowboys luck in Las Vegas."

County sets new precinct borders

Donley County Commissioners gave the green light last Friday to new precinct boundaries that may set the stage for fewer polling places during future elections.

Judge John Howard said no citizens were present for the public hearing held before the meeting Friday.

The county is required to adjust precinct lines following a federal census if there is a population disparity of more than 10 percent among the precincts. Howard said the 2020 Census showed a maximum deviation of about 23 percent among commissioner precincts, with Precinct 1 having 803 residents, Percent 2 with 903, Precinct 3 with 713, and Precinct 4 with 839.

Commissioners had previously met in called session November 3 with John Redington of the legal firm Allison, Bass, & Magee, to consider possible changes to the commissioner precinct boundaries as well as election and justice of the peace boundaries.

Howard said the commissioner boundaries approved Friday have all four precincts coming together at the courthouse square, which will give the county the option to consolidate voting locations. The new map, which will be published later, moves part of Precinct 2 into Precinct 3 in order to reduce the population deviation to less than four percent between the four precincts.

Countywide elections currently have six voting precincts. Commissioners have not yet voted on election precinct boundaries, but the approval of the commissioner precinct boundaries will let the county consider have all voting take place at the Courthouse, which could save on election costs and reduce the number of election judges needed.

Howard said consolidating voting places might be a good option for elections like the November 2 constitutional amendment election, which had a predictably low turnout.

Commissioners also still need to consider boundaries for justices of the peace precincts.

Also last week, county commissioners met in regular session Monday, November 8, and approved a motion to elect Lon Adams and Jacob Fangman to the Donley County Appraisal District Board. Commissioners also named Fangman and Lynn Like as election judges for the county.

The court voted to name Ochiltree County Sheriff Terry Bouchard to the Texas Panhandle Centers Board of Directors. Bouchard will take the voting seat previously held by Clarendon's Sharron Braddock, who recently retired from the board.

Officials approved match projects for TxDOT bridge repairs on county road. Howard said the state will work on the CR 20 bridge over Lake Creek, and the county agreed to 20 percent match work on other county roads totaling about \$26,000.

A bid from CTSI was approved to improve internet access and wireless connections in the Courthouse and Courthouse Annex with the cost not to exceed \$2,000.

Commissioners selected Hutson Gallagher as the architects to develop plans for a new courthouse restoration grant application with the Texas Historical Commission. The firm is currently developing plans for repairing damage the 1890 Courthouse sustained during the winter storm in February. Howard said that project is ready to get bids from general contractors.

The new grant application would address spalling stonework, installing a fire suppression system, and upgrading courthouse lighting to LED fixtures.

History of religion in government

I am inspired this week by an assignment my wife is doing for a Law in Education class. Her assignment was to write about religion in school and particularly release time for religious classes. It is an interesting assignment for her because, unlike most of her class, she grew up in a state that actually does have release time in the high school. Religion, in general, is an interesting subject and historically speaking I have found most people are confused about what the Con-

When I teach classes on the Constitution, after I cover the checks and balances and go over how the

Constitution protects the people from the government and the government from the people, I then like to throw out some interesting questions to my students. First, I ask what the Constitution says about political parties, hint it says nothing. Then I like to ask, which article covers the separation between by dr. james find church and state. This is a



historically speaking

trick question because even though the vast majority of Americans believe this line is in our founding document it is not. In actuality, the original Constitution said nothing at all about religion or God. You cannot argue for or against religion using the original document, there is simply nothing there to support your claims. Now after the Constitution was ratified, the first Congress amended the Constitution with the First Amendment which contains the Establishment Clause that states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." You can interpret that for yourself if that clause restricts religious influence on government or just whether government cannot interfere with the practicing of religion. If you are wonder where the wall between church and state comes from, it was in a letter Thomas Jefferson sent to the Danbury Baptist Association.

If you are so inclined to see the Constitution as a Christian document, there are two good arguments. First, all the framers of the document were Christians, not all active church goers, but all would profess a belief in Christianity. Secondly, the Supreme court will not take up a case about religion until 1878. So, for eighty-nine years the courts, nor the government had any problem with some blending between church and state. The state simply could not interfere with how people practiced their own faith. That is until the government decided to crack down on polygamy in Utah in 1878. The courts really did not start taking up religious cases until the 1940s. If you are inclined to believe there should be a wall between the two, the best historical ground is simply if the Founders wanted to protect Christianity, they could have done so. Almost every state Constitution in 1789 had religious protections. The Founders did not just forget to add it.

However, while not everyone reads the Establishment Clause the same way, what is important is how the courts have interpreted it and the Supreme Court today has seen it as a wall. Today, whenever the courts have to decide a religious issue they apply what is known as the Lemon Test. In 1971, the Supreme Court struck down a practice in Pennsylvania where the schools were helping to pay for teacher's salaries and books at religious schools. Alton Lemon led the charge against Pennsylvania for violating the Establishment Clause. Acknowledging the First Amendment's language is vague, the Court determined a simple three question test to determine if any government is running afoul of the Constitution. The Lemon Test asks, 1) the primary purpose of the assistance is secular, (2) the assistance must neither promote nor inhibit religion, and (3) there is no excessive entanglement between church and state.

For my wife's assignment, the Lemon Law had not come into effect when the Supreme Court originally denied an Illinois school board the ability to allow release time in 1948. The case, McCollum V. Board of Education said that since the school was allowing religious education on school grounds that it was unconstitutional. However, four years later the Court saw things differently in the case of Zorach V. Clauson in 1953. In this case, New York was allowing students release time for religious instruction off campus. They saw the difference in schools supporting religion as opposed to just accommodating it. Though it was not a unanimous decision Justice William Douglas wrote in favor of release time, "The First Amendment, however, does not say that in every and all respects there shall be a separation of Church and State. Rather, it studiously defines the manner, the specific ways, in which there shall be no concert or union or dependency one on the other. That is the common sense of the matter. Otherwise, the state and religion would be aliens to each other - hostile, suspicious, and even unfriendly." In other words, Douglas was arguing that the government does not need to be hostile to religion to be separate.

Though release time from schools is still allowed by law, the Lemon Test since 1971, though controversial, has moved government more towards a wall of separation. The controversial part of the test is "excessive entanglement" and what that means. The test was supposed to clarify the Establishment Clause and yet in some ways has only made it more confusing. With conservatives now the majority on the bench the question is will the Lemon Test continue to apply or might the Court swing the other direction and protect religious rights as we have seen with Hobby Lobby in Burwell v. Hobby Lobby.

Chinese rail workers made their mark

The first Chinese who came to Texas in any significant numbers were brought in as railroad workers. They came in three separate groups.

The first group worked on the Houston and Texas Central Railroad in central Texas, in and near Calvert. The second group labored on the Texas and Pacific Railroad building west from Texarkana. The third group was brought to west Texas to work on the Southern Pacific Railroad building into and beyond EI Paso.

It is well known that the Chinese were industrious and productive workers laboring for minimum wages. It should also be pointed out that they were considered to be an inferior class of people, not eligible for citizenship, not able to own property, and not eligible to vote. After completing their railroad work, those who chose to stay operated launnese on the railroad gangs were easily identifiable by their clothing and hair, as well as by their size and the slant of their eyes. Their

typical appearance included light cotton blouses, loose fitting pants, plaited hair, and conical straw hats. In addition, they used their last names first, read from top to bottom and from right to left, mounted their horses from the "wrong" side, and oriented their maps and compasses to

One unnamed observer made the following comment after observing a group of Chinese at work laying track.

"They were working like bees

were gathered to loose fitting cuffs. Their shirts hung loose over their trousers. Some of them had their queues wound around the top of their heads under their stiff hats, but most let them hang down their backs."

This same observer was then intrigued by a particular Chinaman who carne roaring down the track on a flat handcar, pumping the handbar up and down as fast as he could. "The wind puffed out his sleeves like two huge white balloons and blew his black queue almost straight out behind."

The Chinese were different – different in appearance and different in their work ethics. To their credit, they held tenaciously to their standards and their heritage. Unfortunately, these visible differences also left them open to a considerable amount of ill-treatment and discrimination.

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Legend creates national historic site

The historic military fort in Fort Davis has a legend about an Indian woman who was left behind during an attack on the fort by Apache Indians. She was sort of adopted by a military family and given the name Emily. Over time she fell in love with a young officer. But the officer had his own girl friend and didn't pay any attention to Emily. Eventually she ended up going back with the Indians.

When the Apaches were planning another attack on the fort, so goes the legend, Emily went to the Fort to warn the young officer and the family that had cared for her. As she neared the fort, a guard saw this Indian girl, so goes the legend, and asked for the password. She didn't know what it was so he shot her.

Larry Francell, historian and former county judge in Fort Davis, has spent years researching the legend and came up with some startling information about Indian Emily.

"Fort Davis was never directly attacked by Indians," he says. "I think I have proved conclusively there was no Indian Emily."

says the legend began when Carl Raht mentioned it in his 1919 book, Romance of the Davis Muntains



by tumbleweed smith and Big Bend Country. At one time there was a café in delegation wanted Point Reyes to be a Fort Davis named Indian Emily. Years ago the fort had a historical marker on a grave where legend says Indian Emily was buried. It was quite a tourist attraction and visitors drove out to see it. In the sixties, some researchers did some digging only to reveal the gravesite was empty.

Larry has written a book titled *How* Indian Emily Saved Fort Davis.

"What is interesting is how the fort became a National Historic Site. Our representative at the time was JT Rutherford. He was a friend to both Lyndon Johnson and John Kennedy. Congressman Rutherford was head of

the National Parks Committee in the House of Representatives. He was in Fort Davis for the fort's centennial celebration since Fort Davis was part of his constituency. He believed in the legend of Indian Emily and told about it on the floor of Congress.

"There is a file at Fort Davis that shows how John Kennedy, when he was President, wanted Cape Cod made a national seashore. The California national seashore. So Rutherford, being in sort of the driver's seat, brokered a deal where he got California to support the east coast and the east coast to support the west coast and made both of those entities national seashores. In doing so he just kind of put little old Fort Davis underneath and made it a National Historic Site."

Larry says the legend served its purpose.

"I don't necessarily want the legged to go away. I want people to understand that the legend had an important role in saving Fort Davis."
