

Congress overrides veto of Thornberry defense bill

By Abby Livingston, Texas Tribune In a rare holiday week vote, members of the US House returned to Washington on December 28 to override President Trump's veto of a bill that handles the budget and spending of the Department of Defense. The Senate followed suit on New Year's Day to confirm the first Congressional veto override of the Trump administration.

The National Defense Authorization Act is a \$740 billion bill that dates back to 1961 it is one of the few annual bipartisan pieces of legislation left in Congress. House Democrats named this year's NDAA in honor of a Texas Republican, US Rep. Mac Thornberry of Clarendon. Thornberry is a former chairman of the House Armed Services Committee and retired on January 3.

Even though it easily passed the House and the Senate earlier this month, Trump followed through on a long-threatened veto last Wednesday, complaining most frequently about a provision that would begin the process of renaming military bases named for Confederate leaders and for not including a repeal of a liability shield for internet companies.

Thornberry advocated December 28 for the bill in one of his final appearances – if not his last appearance – on the US House floor.

"I continue to support this bill, as more than 80 percent of the House did just 20 days ago," he said. "It's the exact same bill. Not a comma has changed."

"The president has exercised his constitutional prerogative now...It's up to up to us," he added. "Our troops the country, indeed the world is watching to see what we will do, whether we can tune out other differences and still come together to support the men and women of the military and American national security."

This is the first time Congress has overridden a Trump veto, which involves two-thirds of each chamber voting in favor of the vetoed legislation.

The clinic is encouraging people to get on its waiting list if they want the vaccine. Bruce said there are currently more than 200 people on the waiting list, and it's not yet clear when the next

for a Downtown Revitalization grant following action taken by the city council January 14.

If awarded, the Texas Department of Agriculture grant would provide up to \$350.000 for downtown improvements. The city's match would be \$52,500 for a project total of \$402,500, according to a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, which will draft and administer the grant.

At least 50 percent of the grant funds would have to be spent to address accessible sidewalks downtown. Lighting is also an eligible expense under the grant.

The Jewel of the Plains suffered greatly last week when the artic storm caused a water leak that flooded parts of the Donley County Courthouse.





However, the protocol does allow those students or staff exhibiting no symptoms after five days to be tested and return to school early.

Students and staff who are fully vaccinated do not need to quarantine after a close contact exposure but should still get tested within five to seven days of the exposure, the protocol says.

CCISD Nurse Debbie Thompson said the school has administered about 300 tests over the last three weeks (some of those are repeat tests on the same students or staff) and has had 12 positives as of the end of last week. Five of those positives were tested again at Clarendon Family Medical Center.


