County turns down District Nine request

Donley County Commissioners this week made a final determination on a repeated request by the District Nine Volunteer Fire Department to be recognized and dispatched for fires in the northwestern part of the county.

County Judge John Howard said District Nine volunteers first approached commissioners in August of 2019 about having a designated service area and to be dispatched by 911 to respond to incidents in that area. County officials, however, had questions about the department's equipment and their ability to respond.

Howard said the county did eventually designate a service area for District Nine, north of Howardwick, so that the department could apply for a grant, which he says they did not get.

"That area is already covered by the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department as well as by mutual aid agreements with Groom and McLean," Howard said. "The City of Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department covers that municipal area and a little bit outside of it as well, and Clarendon is dispatched to assist them."

City offers passes for new aquatic center

The grand opening of the Clarendon Aquatic Center is just over two weeks away, and City Hall says annual passes will go on sale to the public next week.

Annual passes will allow frequent users of the facility to save money over the course of the summer. Day passes will cost \$5 for everyone over the age of 17, \$4 for ages 4-17, and free for ages three and under. Annual passes are \$100 per individual and \$250 for a family of up to four members and \$50 for each additional household family member.

City Administrator David Dockery also encourages anyone wishing to plan a birthday party or other event after regular hours to please call City Hall right away at 806-874-3438 to get on the calendar so that lifeguards can be scheduled appropriately. Parties can be scheduled at the aquatic center after hours at a rate of \$125 per hour.

City turns focus to street improvements

With the new aquatic center set to open and the USDA-funded water system improvements largely completed, the Clarendon City Council turned its attention to street improvements during its regular meeting last Thursday, May 13.

City engineer Che Shadle with OJD Engineering met with the board and discussed long-term plans as well as immediate priorities for the city's thoroughfares.

City Administrator David Dockery said Shadle had evaluated the streets and presented the council with a map showing the types of surfaces and condition of each street. Dockery said resurfacing all of the streets would cost an estimated \$13-15 million, and discussions about financing and phasing were held.

"Che recommended we act immediately to preserve our current paved streets," Dockery said. "The proposal is to spend \$300,000 to \$325,000 to immediately resurface the paved streets we have."

Car thieves land in jail after chase

Female crime partners drove off in a ravine south of Clarendon Saturday in a lightweight “Thelma & Louise” moment as they tried to evade capture by the law. Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the saga started Friday morning when his office was called to Allsup’s at about 1:30 a.m. on a report that someone had grabbed the car keys of a store clerk and took off with their vehicle.

A local deputy later located the vehicle on the opposite end of town behind West Texas Gas, Blackburn said. Four individuals were there along with another stolen vehicle, a white Honda Accord stolen from Amarillo earlier that night.

While the lone deputy attempted to apprehend the gang of two women and two men, the women jumped in the Accord and sped off with the deputy shooting out one of the rear tires as they made their getaway.

The male suspects – Ruben Campos, 37, and Alan Moore, 36, both of Amarillo – were placed under arrest and charged with Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity. Campos was also charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance.

Still on the lam and having replaced their shot-out tire with a spare donut, the female suspects were spotted in Brice on Saturday afternoon about 4:36, Blackburn said. A game warden noticed the women in the parked Accord there and called the Hall County Sheriff for backup. As the game warden and sheriff approached the vehicle, the women sped off again, northbound on SH 70 towards Clarendon, Blackburn said.

Before they made it to town, however, Blackburn said the pair drove the Accord off the highway into a ravine, striking a tree before fleeing the scene on foot.

Zero COVID cases reported since 4-23

COVID-19 continues to be held at bay in Donley County as vaccination rates rise, according to the Clarendon Family Medical Center.

Clinic spokesperson Marsha Bruce said Tuesday the clinic has not had a positive case of the virus since April 23.

The clinic gave 27 COVID-19 tests during the month of May, Bruce reported.

Total tests given for the disease now number 1,448 at the clinic with 1,082 negatives. Positive tests since the beginning of the pandemic at the clinic number 366; and when combined with tests given elsewhere total 409.

Thirteen Donley County residents have died from the COVID-19 virus.

New COVID-19 case confirmed in Donley

COVID-19 was again confirmed in Donley County last week with one new positive case of the virus.

Clarendon Family Medical Center spokesperson Marsha Bruce said Tuesday the case tested positive last week and was still active this week.

The new case is the first positive case in Donley County since April 23, but it underscores that the first has not disappeared.

City sales tax hits record high in June

The City of Clarendon set a new record last week when Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar distributed June allocations of sales tax revenues to local governments.

Clarendon brought in \$38,368.27 for the month setting a record for June revenues for the city. The month’s revenue came in at 23.02 percent above the same time in 2020 when the city received \$31,187.08.

The city is now running 13.82 percent ahead for the calendar year-to-date total for sales tax revenues compared to 2020.

Farmer’s market set

A new farmer’s market is being planned to connect Donley County producers and consumers starting next month, hosted by Cornell’s Country Store.

Donley County Farm 2 Table will begin on July 17 and is planned for the first and third Saturdays and will run through September, and applications are being accepted through June 25 for those who are interested in selling their goods, according to store owner Deanna Cornell.

“I have always had a heart for small business and especially for Texas grown,” Cornell said. “Our mission is simple – we want to offer our community and surrounding area a way to sell their home-grown goods and offer consumers fresh, local, goods. I think it has great potential.”

Aldermen okay \$255k bid for streets

The City of Clarendon took action to preserve currently paved streets when the city council met June 10 in regular session.

Aldermen approved a bid of \$255,350 from Lipham Asphalt & Paving to seal coat 83,448 square yards of street surfaces, according to City Administrator David Dockery.

“City workers will begin to level up some of these areas prior to the single course chip seal,” Dockery said. “This work will be done this summer.”

Of all the awards and accolades he received last week at the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, one sticks out more than the rest.

CEDC grant helps save landmark

A historic Phillips 66 station has been saved thanks to the interest of a local businessman and a grant from the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation.

Chuck Robertson received the first Historic Façade Grant awarded by the CEDC, which provided a total of \$4,200 for the \$24,000 project.

The Phillips station located near the Donley County Courthouse at Third and Jefferson was constructed on the site of the former A.M. Beville home in 1930. Construction by contractor Joe Humphrey, Jr., started on the Type B Phillips station in April 1930, and the business opened in May of that year under the direction of local Phillips distributor Henry D. Tomb. The Donley County Leader reported that during the opening day, 3,400 gallons of gasoline were sold and 505 cars were serviced.

September 1, 2021

Bright days ahead for old Texaco station

An old building that once pulled people off of US 287 will soon have new life and a new purpose for travelers to the area.

For the past few weeks, curious passers-by have noticed work being done at the old Petty Texaco service station at the corner of US 287 and Gorst Street. The lot is being cleaned. The weeds are being cleared. Old tires are being removed. And there's activity inside the old building itself once again.

The building's new owners Nikki and Dusty Green, Donley County residents and producers of the nationally-broadcast PBS travel show "Two for the Road," have a vision that involves a restoration of the old building, a re-invention of the tourism model in the Panhandle, and what they hope will be an exciting new breath of life in historic downtown Clarendon.

September 8, 2021

COVID-19 cases total 27 in August

A total of 27 cases of COVID-19 were confirmed in Donley County during the month of August, three times the 9 cases confirmed in July and almost seven times the total of four cases for June.

"Almost all of our new cases are people who are unvaccinated, and some have had COVID before," said Donley County Judge John Howard, MD. "If you are unvaccinated, you are at risk of contracting the disease, spreading the disease, and, under the right circumstances, winding up in the hospital."

September 15, 2021

COVID surging in Donley County

COVID-19 is surging in Donley County with 37 active cases reported Tuesday, up from 20 just last Wednesday, and almost 70 percent of Donley County residents are not vaccinated.

Officials with the Clarendon Family Medical Center say the active cases are mostly all unvaccinated patients, and local health officials urge everyone to protect themselves.

September 22, 2021

Clarendon water rates go up Oct. 1

Clarendon residents will see water rate increases next month following action taken by the City Council September 6.

City Administrator David Dockery said water and sewer rates will go up six percent starting October 1.

"We haven't gone up on our utility rates in some time, and our costs of doing business in terms of supplies, labor, and water from Greenbelt Water Authority have gone up," Dockery said.

September 22, 2021

COVID takes toll on CC's fall numbers

Clarendon College's enrollment continues to feel the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic as reflected by a decline in headcount this semester, according to CC President Tex Buckhaults.

CC's total fall headcount settled at 1,399 following the census date on September 8. That's a drop of about 2.6 percent from 1,436 one year ago, and a decline of 12 percent from the pre-pandemic figure of 1,589 in the fall of 2019.

Buckhaults points out that contact hours – a key factor in the college's state funding – are up slightly this semester compared to the pre-pandemic at 304,864, an increase of about one percent.

September 22, 2021

CFMC reports 30 active COVID cases

Donley County continues to see high numbers of COVID-19 cases this

week, according to the Clarendon Family Medical Center.

Clinic spokesperson Marsha Bruce said Tuesday that there are 30 active cases under the care of CFMC, down from 37 a week ago.

The total positive cases at the clinic for September was 56 as of the end of the day Monday, and Clarendon CISD reported positive tests of a separate seven cases in staff and/or students there in the last several days. Raising the total of new cases known about to 63.

September 22, 2021

CCISD sets updated COVID protocols

Clarendon CISD released updated protocols related to COVID-19 following a meeting of the Board of Trustees on September 13.

Among the updated protocols is language for students and staff who are exposed to a COVID positive person in the home highly encouraging them to stay home for the physician's recommended stay-at-home time. However, the protocol does allow those students or staff exhibiting no symptoms after five days to be tested and return to school early.

Students and staff who are fully vaccinated do not need to quarantine after a close contact exposure but should still get tested within five to seven days of the exposure, the protocol says.

CCISD Nurse Debbie Thompson said the school has administered about 300 tests over the last three weeks (some of those are repeat tests on the same students or staff) and has had 12 positives as of the end of last week. Five of those positives were tested again at Clarendon Family Medical Center.

September 29, 2021

Crosstimmer team repeats cookoff win

The Crosstimmer Ranch team from Mustang, Okla., repeated its performance as the overall champion of the 27th annual Col. Charles Goodnight Chuckwagon Cookoff last Saturday, September 25, at the Saints' Roost Museum.

Returning from its championship win in 2020, the Crosstimmer team competed against seven other wagons at this year's cookoff. Ten wagons were originally scheduled to compete, but two had to pull out prior to the event. The wagons served 465 people this year, down from 615 last year when 15 wagons competed.

September 29, 2021

TCU inducts Williams into Hall of Fame

Clarendon native Roy Williams III was inducted into the 2021 Hall of Fame Class last week at Texas Christian University.

The TCU Block T Association announced this year's honorees, the 53rd class to be inducted, were Williams '01 (men's track and field) along with Michael Cannon '86 (men's track and field), Jamie MacCurdy Kizer '02 (women's swimming and diving), and Victor Payne '02 (football).

October 6, 2021

Experts examining courthouse damage

Stone conservators were in Clarendon this week to examine deposits left on brick and tile following flooding in the 1890 Donley County Courthouse in February when a winter storm froze water lines in the building's attic.

Casey Jordan and Fran Gale, working for the architecture firm Hudson-Gallagher, spent Monday and Tuesday trying different solvents and cleaners to see which will work best to clean the damage.

Gale said it is unclear what the black deposits are on brick following the flood of water that came down the walls near the front door of the courthouse. It is not mold, but she said it could be water that came through a fireplace and chimney flue, which would be either ancient soot or perhaps a chimney waterproofing material from the building's construction.

October 6, 2021

Howardwick Baptist to mark 50th year

The First Baptist Church of Howardwick will celebrate its 50th year of worshiping together this this Saturday and Sunday.

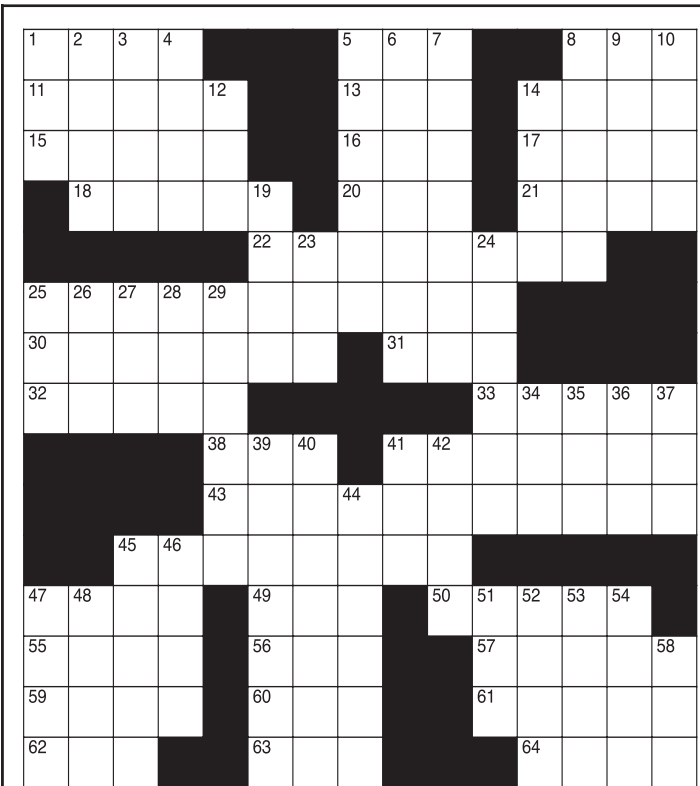

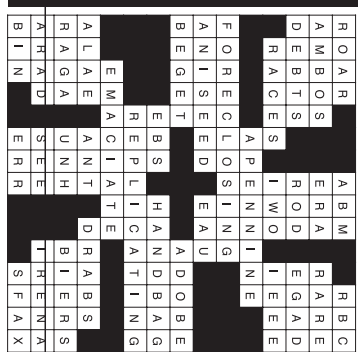

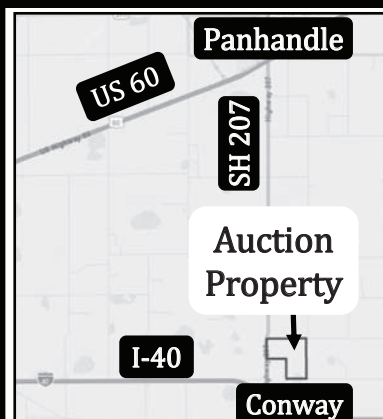
