Lions plan severe weather discussion

The Clarendon Lions Club will host a Severe Weather presentation April 21, which will feature a look back at the deadly 1970 tornado that struck what is now Howardwick.

Pantex Staff Meteorologist and former Amarillo weatherman Steve Kersh will describe the conditions that existed on April 18, 1970, when a deadly tornado ripped through the Panhandle and hit the former Sherwood Shores community at Lake Greenbelt, killing 17 people.

The presentation will feature a tribute to the storm's victims, and the Lions are asking for anyone with personal stories of survival from any tornado to share those by calling Lion Mary Green at 580-380-8069 for a brief interview.

Kersh will also describe what weather conditions to be on the look-out for; how to prepare for severe weather; and what this year's storm season might bring.

Admission to the event is free, and the Lions will be giving away Storm Preparedness kits as door prizes.

New voter cards going out Friday

Voter registration problems that hampered last month's primary elections are believed to be fixed now, according to Donley County Tax Assessor/Collector Kristy Christopher.

Speaking at Monday's regular meeting of county commissioners, Christopher said her office had done a review of all precinct lines and she believes all problems have been resolved.

New voter registration cards were printed Tuesday morning, Christopher told the Enterprise. Her office will go through each card to assure that person is listed in the correct county precinct, school district, and municipality where applicable. She then plans to have the cards in the mail to voters by this Friday, April 15.

"If you see anything wrong with your card, please call me immediately and let's get it fixed before early voting starts," Christopher said.

Early voting in the Clarendon city and school board elections will start April 25. The tax assessor/ collector's office number is 806-874-2193

In other county business, commissioners met with Randy Bond, who is the Republican candidate for constable in Precincts 3&4. With no opposition on the November ballot, Bond will be elected and subsequently take office in January. County officials met with the candidate to discuss his plans and expectations for the office as they begin work on the FY 2023 county budget.

According to Judge John Howard, Bond stated he expects a salary similar to that of a sheriff's deputy, a county vehicle, and county health insurance.

The constable's office has been vacant since the end of January 2021 when former constable Doug Wright resigned. The current FY 2022 county budget has a salary for the office of \$100 per month and a \$50 per month car allowance. Commissioners also agreed in principle to granting right-of-way access for a gas line on County Road P from the intersection at FM 2695. County officials want to see more details from the company making the request before giving formal approval, Howard said. A resolution authorizing a grant application for courthouse restoration funds from the Texas Historical Commission was approved. The grant would address continued stone spalling around the base of the 1890 Courthouse and other issues identified by the county's architect. Motions were approved to combine and consolidate voting precincts 301 and 303 for the May 7 and May 24 elections where appropriate.

Almost everyone with personal property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms, and the deadline is fast approaching to get those turned in.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district listing all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1 of this vear. Deadline to file is April 15: however, the DAD office will be closed April 15, so the deadline for filing for 2022 will be extended through Monday, April 18.

All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the previous year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, motorcycles, travel trailers, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business-related equipment. Separate rendition forms have been mailed to business owners. Business owners not filing renditions by the deadline will be assessed a penalty of 15 percent.

Renditions must be signed, and you may, although it is not required, list an opinion of market value. If you give your opinion of your property's value and the appraisal district believes the value is higher, you will be notified in writing of the higher value and told how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

File your rendition with the appraisal district at 304 S Kearney or mail to P.O. Box 1220, Clarendon TX 79226.

Looking back on censorship

One of the hot news stories is the bill in Florida banning discussion of sexual orientation or gender identity in elementary schools. The bill is called "Parental Rights in Education Bill" but has been dubbed the "Don't say gay" bill. This, of course, has led to a national debate about censorship, decency, and age appropriateness. This is not the first of this discussion as schools are passing similar laws against issues like "Critical Race Theory" and taking books off school library shelves deemed inappropriate. As always, this column does not propose to answer any of these debates, but, historically speaking, censorship

is not new and looking at historical examples may help us make more informed decisions today.

Actual laws allowing for censorship are in no way new. President John Adams signed the Alien and Sedition Acts into law which fined or arrested anyone speaking out against the government. President Woodrow Wilson

historically

signed a similar Sedition Act. Lincoln did not sign a sedition law. He just locked everyone up who spoke out against him, claiming it as a war measure. Yet, I want to focus on a particularly difficult time when censorship was rampant and consider how one particular President handled the situation.

The year was 1950 and America was embroiled in the Red Scare, where we were suspecting communists were hiding under our beds and in our closets. Granted, this was not just paranoia, as communists had infiltrated American agencies and organizations. Before 1950, The House Un-American Activities Committee had already held trials to stamp out communists in the movie business and created the infamous blacklists. In this same year a littleknown senator from Wisconsin gave a speech in West Virginia, claiming to have a list of communists who were working for the State Department. Overnight, Joseph McCarthy became famous, and McCarthyism was born. McCarthyism is often compared to a witch hunt, especially after the release of "The Crucible," but there is one stark difference: there were no ghosts in Salem but there were communists in government. However, what McCarthy did was greatly exaggerate the situation for personal gain and created a frenzy in this nation to rid all aspects of communism from everywhere.


One area where McCarthyism focused its attacks were libraries, especially the State Department's oversees libraries. In April 1953, two of McCarthy's chief staffers, Roy Cohn and David Schine, took a tour of Europe, attacking the books in the libraries and the State Department officials who ran them. After the tour, the State Department issued a list of which books were appropriate and which were not. While some of these books were overtly communist, most were not. Some were banned simply because an author who was not a communist would not publicly reject communism.

President Eisenhower was in a tough position. He did not agree with McCarthy, but they were in the same party and McCarthy held a great deal of power. Eisenhower refused to tangle with McCarthy publicly, as it was his policy not to debate any opponent publicly possibly his greatest character trait and on I wish modern presidents could mimic. Yet finally the President had had enough. On June 14, 1953, while speaking at Dartmouth College, he took up the idea of censorship. After speaking about having fun and joy in life, he spoke about courage. He ended that part of his speech with: "Don't join the book burners. Don't think you are going to conceal faults by concealing evidence that they ever existed. Don't be afraid to go in your library and read every book, as long as that document does not offend our own ideas of decency. That should be the only censorship.

Rio Grande RR builds into Rollinsville

Celebrations were usually in order whenever a railroad built into an existing town, and the Denver and Rio Grande's 1904 entry into Rollinsville, Colorado, was no exception. The arrival of a railroad meant prosperity for a frontier town, and it meant another measure of accomplishment for the railroaders. The Rio Grande's work crew had built up through rugged Boulder Canyon, had fought snowstorms and snowdrifts, and had crossed the Continental Divide by tunneling under it. They overcame incredible difficulties, and they maintained their schedule while doing it. When they arrived in Rollinsville, they were ready to celebrate.

The last spike was scheduled to be driven on a Saturday evening, but when the Rio Grande crew learned that two barrels of whiskey were on hand and that twenty ladies of "assorted ages" had arrived from Denver, they got renewed energy and the work schedule was suddenly accelerated. With their renewed vigor, they hammered the last spike into place six hours early. Taking the town by surprise, the brass



town's men were vignettes still at work in tales of the old west by george u. hubbard the mines. But the celebration

began anyway, and it was a celebration to beat all celebrations.

Only three gallons of whiskey could be found, but that was enough until the two barrels could be located. The work crew lined up and politely passed the jugs from mouth to mouth, but the politeness didn't last much longer than that. They broke into singing and dancing, speech-making and yelling. One of the crew, John Christiansen, wanted to do a parachute jump, so he climbed a 50 foot precipice behind the saloon and with a yell, leaped into the air. Although he was not critically injured, his fellow celebrants hauled him to Dr. Baughman's in a wheelbarrow for


temporary repairs.

Every celebration needs explosions, so the work crew located the gunpowder supply, and in a couple of hours there was not an ounce left in town. Then someone thought of the gasoline, and in spite of its scarcity, two drums were set off with appropriate ceremony.

Darkness finally came, and fireworks from Denver were set off to finish the day. For fifteen minutes the air was filled with displays of all colors. But not very many of the work crew were in any condition to appreciate the sight.

The Denver Post summed up the celebration as follows: "The rails are laid and the casualties can be summed up as follows: One man in hospital. Eighty-seven men who should be there. All the liquor in town consumed. Not an ounce of powder to explode and probably all the gasoline gone up in smoke." Rollinsville had had its celebration.

"How will we defeat communism unless we know what it is, and what it teaches, and why does it have such an appeal for men? Why are so many people swearing allegiance to it?"

"And we have got to fight it with something better, not try to conceal the thinking of our own people. They are part of America. And even if they think ideas that are contrary to ours, their right to say them, their right to record them, and their right to have them at places where they are accessible to others is unquestioned, or it isn't America."

When asked about his statements a couple of days later at a press conference, Ike added, "When I talk about books or the right of dissemination of knowledge, am I [not] talking about any document or any other kind of thing that attempts to persuade or propagandize America into communism? Indeed, our courts found 11 communists guilty of practically traitorous action; they pointed out that these men were dedicated to the destruction of the United States form of government by force, and that they took orders from a foreign government. So, manifestly, I am not talking about that kind of thing when I talk about free access to knowledge."

As an academic, I agree with President Eisenhower that information should not scare us. He went on to say that if more Americans had read Mein Kompf, we might have been better prepared to stop Hitler, so reading more about why people were attracted to communism might not be a bad thing. But notice that Ike did make two exemptions: those that "offend our own ideas of decency" and those that "persuade or propagandize." For myself I would add "age appropriateness." Think about our movie ratings. Most things that are PG 13 movies are not bad but are not age appropriate for younger children to learn about yet or without parents' approval. I know this is a difficult subject. We have been fighting it for years. when it comes to our children, we will probably never stop fighting it. Eisenhower warned us against censorship, but he also believed there were certain things that should not be read.

The big business of raising yucca

Hoven Riley spent ten years as a wildlife guide in Alaska. "I took people on an eight-hour tour, showed them grizzly bears, wolves, moose, elk and whatever else we were lucky enough to see, including the largest mountain in North America which is McKinley Peak."

He returned home to some family land southwest of Fort Stockton and started raising yucca, something he got involved with while studying landscape architecture at the University of Arizona.

"I've always had a passion for yucca," he says. "I remember going out with my brother and digging up a yucca that we used as a Christmas tree one year when the family was short on money. Then we dug up some more and I just fell in love with yucca."

He searched and found a good strain of yucca in Mexico and started planting seeds. They're smaller than watermelon seeds.



planting of 25,000 seeds. Hoven has had soft and flexible. No upward pointing a wholesale yucca business for years.

"Our customers are nurseries and landscapers. They come in with big semi trucks and I load them up and send them out. I've rigged up a loading area to make it easy to put the yucca plants into the trailers. I'll do that all summer long and into the fall. November is usually when I stop harvesting the yucca."

He has just started selling yucca online to the general public through his business, The Big Bend Yucca Company.



The leaves on his yucca plants are sword-like leaves. He says yucca is low maintenance.

"This plant, which is native to the Chihuahuan Desert, can actually handle a temperature down to a negative 20. Of course they're heat and drought tolerant and require little water. They have a blossom that is absolutely stunning. It's a real show-stopper." Hoven has a herd of mule deer that helps with weed control.



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

Coffee Memorial Blood Center has less than half of the blood supply needed, threatening a critical blood shortage for local patients, and creating an immediate need for blood donors.

The national blood supply has stayed near emergency levels for months, having never recovered from COVID-related challenges. The High Plains region's supply has faced similar challenges, as well as blood drive cancellations after multiple winter weather events in February and March. Hospital demand has surged past pre-pandemic levels, exacerbating the issues caused by lower donation levels.

In response to the current situation, Coffee Memorial Blood Center has extended its donor room hours to expand giving opportunities: Monday - Friday: 7:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. and Saturday: 7:30 – 4:00 p.m.
