# Outpost to close pharmacy service Oct. 18

The Clarendon Outpost announced this week that its pharmacy will be close after more than 25 years of service.

Owners of the business said in a statement that the pharmacy's last day will be October 18, 2022. Efforts are being made to transfer customers' information to Mike's Pharmacy in Clarendon or to any other pharmacy of a customer's choice.

The Outpost says closing the pharmacy was due to losses in that department, and owners plan to focus

their services on the business' diner and convenience store departments.

"We tried every way possible to run the pharmacy and looked for every option available just to sustain it," the owners said.

The pharmacy had operated in its current location under the Outpost name since 1996 but originally operated as Bivens Pharmacy and dated back to 1976 when Paul and Elmonette Bivens bought out Tunnell's Pharmacy.

Employees at Mike's Pharmacy

were busy this week transferring customers from the Outpost and answering a lot of questions from their new customers.

"We're trying to make the transition as smooth as possible," pharmacist Brandon Frausto said.

Frausto is one of four full time employees at Mike's Pharmacy, which is owned by Clarendon native Mark Land of Panhandle. The business dates back about 40 years to its original owner, Mike Butts.

Frausto said Mike's is

negotiating with the owners of the Outpost to purchase their inventory. He also asks for patience from customers during the transition.

"If possible, if people could call a day or two before they need their medication, it would really help during the transition," Frausto said.

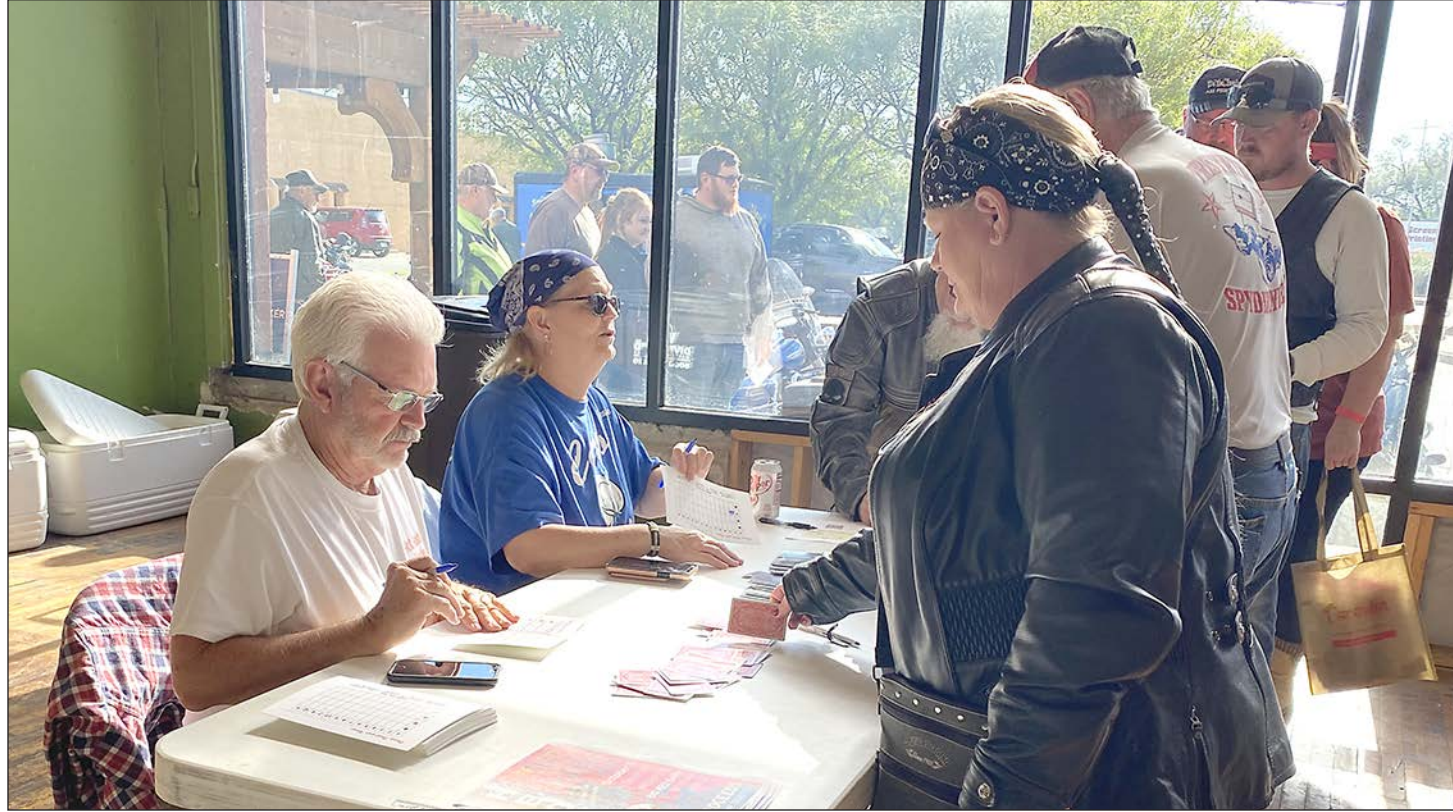
Mike's does not offer durable medical equipment services like the Outpost has done, but Frausto said Mike's is in the process of setting up to carry some of the Part B drugs.

Frausto also said some Navitus

insurance customers may have received a letter saying Mike's does not take that coverage, but that is not the case. Those customers will be able to use Mike's services.

Mike's Pharmacy can be contacted at 806-874-3554, and they are open Monday-Friday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. They offer a drive-up window as well as delivery services within the city limits of Clarendon.

"We will do our best to accommodate everyone," Frausto said.

# CC, WTAMU partner to expand degree access

Clarendon College announced partnership with West Texas A&M University on Monday to bring the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree to each community they serve.

Using the extensive online course capabilities of WTAMU, Clarendon College will establish local cohorts of students pursuing their bachelor's degrees and provide support services while earning the degree.

Students can take a number of their courses from Clarendon College and West Texas A&M University will provide the

remaining credits and grant the degree.

"Now there is an option for adults needing to complete their bachelor degree, but who cannot commute to Canyon and yet want more than an online degree alone will offer," CC President Tex Buckhaults said.

The BGS program, named for the Bachelor of General Studies degree, will incorporate prior college credit and all credit that is available through Clarendon College, enabling students the fastest and most cost-effective path to their degree.

Students will begin in a Career Pathways course that will help them identify their post-graduate goals and tailor their remaining courses to meet those goals. At the end of their studies, students will take a capstone course that will equip them to use their degree to accomplish their aspirations.

All courses will be delivered online and students can major in General Studies or any one of more than a dozen other undergraduate online degrees.

To support these students, a localized cohort of similar students will be established. Through

regular meetings, study hall options, and coaching by others living in their own communities, students will enjoy enhanced professional development and personal enrichment that online-only programs cannot deliver.

State Sen. Charles Perry (R-Lubbock) is hosting a town hall meeting at Clarendon College in the Bairfield Activity Center from 9:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. on October 19.

The Texas legislative districts have changed through redistricting and take effect when the Texas legislature convenes in January. Senator Perry is pleased that he will be representing Donley County.

The 88th Legislative Session begins January 10, 2023. Sen. Perry currently chairs the Senate Committee on Water, Agriculture, & Rural Affairs and is Vice-Chair of the Senate Health & Human Services Committee. He also sits

on the Senate Committees for Education, Finance, Transportation, and Redistricting. He is also a member on the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission.

At the town hall, Sen. Perry will discuss the upcoming 88th Legislative Session, and most importantly, answer questions from the community.

Sen. Charles Perry, a practicing CPA from Lubbock, was elected to the Texas Senate in 2014 and currently represents 51 counties in West Texas.

# Have regard for others

Social groups, from two people to two million, are joined together by earnestly regarding others. As old as humanity, this natural law is infused in the hearts of Panhandle people. Colonel Charles Goodnight, known for saving the plains bison herd, valued treating others with respect. According to biographer Monti Goodin, "It didn't matter who you were; he invited all in." Regard for others, local citizenship, mutual respect, the Golden Rule and the law of reciprocity are forces of nature in the Panhandle, building blocks of regard for others.

The definition of citizenship is "the relationship between an individual and a state to which the individual owes allegiance and, in turn, is entitled to its protection. Citizenship implies the status of freedom with accompanying responsibilities." It is granted to an individual in a sovereign nation by birth, earned through legal immigration or another legislatively prescribed path. While such action is typically initiated at the federal level, citizenship is exercised and given life in local communities, or not at all. This is why school boards, city councils, county commissions and other manifestations of republican forms of government are acted upon compellingly at the local level. Amarillo residents are closer to the capitals of five other states than Austin. The importance of local citizenship, elected representation, pervasive regard for the process by which people come to serve and mutual respect for those operated cannot be overstated. In communities that lack mutual respect, cynicism abounds and republican governance is kaput.

One example of mutual regard is evidenced in the Grange movement. In 1867 the Grange gained strength as a response to falling crop prices, the diminishment in value of paper money and rapidly increasing transportation costs. Agriculture producers banded together to fight for progress, in addition to family and farm prosperity. The objectives were fundamental. The objectives were fundamental to the Grange, "We shall earnestly endeavor to suppress personal, local, sectional, and national prejudices, all unhealthy rivalry and all selfish ambition." This spirit of "regard for others" is merely what's good for one can be good for all. A utopian chimera? No, an economic and social reality.

The Golden Rule is the ultimate expression of how one person treats another. Jesus Christ expressed it in the sixth chapter of the Gospel of Luke: "Do to others as you would have them do to you." Its pithiness and simplicity belies its power in guiding day-to-day behavior. Its origins can be traced back to the Analects of Confucius in the 6th and 5th centuries BC. According to Science, The Law of Reciprocity is an agnostic expression of the Golden Rule. It is explained as, "The reciprocity principle is one of the basic laws of social psychology: It says that in social situations, we pay back what we receive from others. In other words, if John does you a favor, you will likely return it to him."

The values of the Panhandle are real. The American Farm Bureau Federation works to build a "sustainable future for food, fiber and fuel for our nation and world." The Farm Bureau recognizes the power of farming and ranching in the American west. Zippy Duvall said in a recent Zipline post, "Even the smallest contribution of time, talent, or treasure could be the difference between an elected official who understands the challenges you face and one who doesn't."

Family life is important because it nourishes us. Geography requires cooperation. The production of food, fuel and fiber in our nation's breadbasket demands it. All of this rests on the simple concept that regard for others is embedded in the consciousness of the people that live and work in the Texas Panhandle. Our University needs to value, appreciate and trumpet regard for others.

# Choctaw deaths had mourning rules

When Choctaw Indians died, they were buried near their homes, and their families would sit by their graves from one to three months. These Indians buried their dead without shedding a tear. A specified time for tears would come later.

These families would go through a mournful ritual called "Indian Cries," after the period of quietness was over, and from the time of burial to the date set for the cry, the relatives would never greet others. But the women relatives would throw their shawls over their heads and take the outsiders to the grave, or graves; then return to the house. On the day set for the "Indian Cry," the relatives and friends of the deceased would gather at the nearest relative's home, and all of them would go to the

burying place together. At the head and foot of the grave, or graves, poles would be driven in the ground. There would be a captain appointed, and when all had been assembled properly, there would be weeping and wailing. At a given signal, it would be the duty of this captain to remove the poles. That was the signal for the end of the "ai akshucki," as the Choctaws called this ceremony, "the time of doing away."

Then the group of mourners would all return to the nearest relative's home where a big dinner was served

amid much merry making. The captain would take a stick and go among the group. Those he touched with the stick were the ones to eat at the first table. Then to-fula would be served. The Choctaw dish to-fula is composed of beaten corn which is put into water, mixed with a little lye, and cooked thoroughly all day; then this preparation is set aside for souring purposes. Often this liquid is fed to the sick. Other dishes served at this "ai akshucki" dinner were La'sh pishofa (hogshead and hominy cooked together) and brnaha or shuck bread (corn beaten into meal mixed with water, whole beans, and ashes of bean pods).

# Going back to the Magic Valley

For many decades, football-loving men gathered in coffee shops to dissect the previous Friday night's schoolboy football games. There was more dissecting than coffee-drinking.

Many may not have realized it, but those games--won, lost or tied--helped to unify community spirit.

For the most part, high school sports were kept in perspective, unlike major university programs today. Currently, mighty television moguls call the shots, the NCAA goes along and major institutions buy in, thus greatly tilting football and basketball away from their initial purposes. Never mind that governing boards give their blessings, and for a couple of dozen universities or so, clearly the "tail is wagging the dog."...

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My aged Uncle Mort -- who remembers the early days of football when participants wore scuffy uniforms and leather helmets -- gets few laughs each season when the "haves" are upset by the "have nots." Such results leave fans bewildered, coaches embarrassed and oddsmakers frustrated.

A current example is Texas A&M's loss to visiting Appalachian State University, which was paid some \$1.5 million to play the Aggies in College Station.

"Toss in Coach Jimbo Fisher's salary of some \$800,000 per game and you've got an outlay of more than \$2 million, a lot of greenbacks to spend for a loss," he added....

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Such topics are frequently discussed at coffee gatherings today, particularly by retired coaches. Four who coached high school football in the Rio Grande Valley served a total of

more than 150 years, mostly in public schools. I was privileged to have two of them -- Luz Pedraza and Poppy Rodriguez -- in my class during teaching years at Sul Ross State University, 1963-1967.

Luz played pro ball for eight years in the Texas Football League and Poppy -- with a Master's Degree from the University of Texas -- was the first head football coach/athletic coordinator at McAllen's Memorial High School before his promotion to McAllen ISD athletic director for 27 years. John Lerma played for Baylor University and Julio Ayala for Wharton Junior College.

All members of this foursome starred as players in Rio Grande Valley high schools. Each of them served in coaching capacities in or near the valley, and all four are now retired there....

Quarterback Luz set numerous football records at Sul Ross, which scored a notable upset of New Mexico State University in 1963.

It was no fluke. The Lobos prevailed, 42-15. Luz and Poppy -- a scrappy running back -- were leaders of the team that took on Goliath and won. SRSU received \$25,000 for providing opposition for that season-closing Thanksgiving Day game in Las Cruces. Naturally, fans at New Mexico State -- a school some ten times larger -- didn't see it coming. Sul Ross -- named for a Confederate general -- continues to

serve a sparsely-populated area of West Texas, rarely enrolling more than 1,200-1,500 students....

I recall that Luz and Poppy contended that Spanish is "God's language." Decades later, I attended a church service conducted in Spanish. I had never done so before.

The hymns, sung in Spanish, were indeed beautiful. Subsequently, I have agreed -- for hymns anyway -- that Spanish may be God's language. If I can track them down, I'll admit that they were excellent football players AND proponents of the Spanish language....

During my Sul Ross years, most students from the Rio Grande Valley returned there.

Maybe it is the "Magic Valley." This gets my vote as I think of this foursome of coffee-drinking buddies who molded many, many lives.

It should be noted that men like these didn't coach for the money. They love the game, realize how much it has done for them, and gladly invested in young lives....

My alma mater, Howard Payne University, scored an upset over Texas A&M almost exactly one century ago.

The Yellow Jackets took down the Aggies 13-7 on September 30, 1922.

I'm sure HPU was paid nothing, but the win fueled "bragging rights" for Yellow Jacket fans, even today.

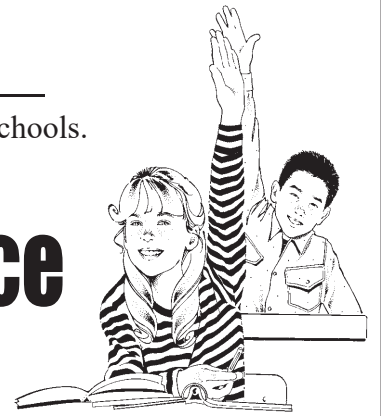

## Columbian Mammoths roamed the plains

Columbian Mammoths used to roam the Texas Plains thousands of years ago. They were larger and less hairy than the Woolly Mammoths of the north.

At the Lubbock Lake landmark in Lubbock, bones from these mammoths were found in 1936 alongside flint arrowheads and spear points from ancient peoples of the plains. They hunted Columbian Mammoths for food and made useful materials from their organs and bones; much like the Plains tribes used everything on a bison. There was even a large stone found with a shattered mammoth femur bone, showing evidence that ancient peoples crushed the huge bones to extract its marrow for food. Many of these artifacts can be seen at the Lubbock Lake Landmark museum.

In 1933, in Roberts County near the city of Miami, a farmer was plowing a wheat field when the plow pulled up some bones. They were too large to be a bison or a cow, so the farmer consulted county judge J.A. Mead, who was also an amateur archeologist. He determined them to be Columbian Mammoth bones, and he also discovered "Clovis" flint points and tools with the remains.

In 1937, an excavation led by E.H. Sellards of the University of Texas and funded by the Works Progress Administration (WPA) was underway. They discovered the

skeletal remains of three to five adult Columbian Mammoths and one baby mammoth. They also found more Clovis points with the bones, including a flint spear point three inches from the atlas vertebra of one of the mammoths. They determined the place was, at one time, a playa lake where animals often drank, and ancient peoples would hunt.

The Miami Mammoth Kill Site was determined to be around 11,000 to 12,000 years old. Before the discoveries at Blackwater Draw in Clovis, NM, and the site in Miami, Texas, it was believed people were here in America for only 2,000 years before the modern era.

Several of these bones from the site, including a couple of tusks, can be viewed at the Roberts County Museum in Miami.

## Scholars to share work on Coronado Expedition

Curiosity over an old footnote in 1980 led one couple to become leading authorities on Francisco Vázquez de Coronado's expedition through this region. Award-winning authors Richard and Shirley Flint will share their findings from research in archives and archaeological sites in Spain, Mexico and the Southwestern United States for the Garry L. Wall Lecture in Western Studies for West Texas A&M University's Center for the Study of the American West and the WT Distinguished Lecture Series.

The Flints will present "To and Fro without a Road Map: Which Way the Coronado Expedition Chose to Go, and Why" at 7 p.m. Oct. 6 in the Hazlewood Lecture Room at Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, 2503 Fourth Ave. in Canyon. The presentation also will be accessible via Zoom: bit.ly/NallFlint. "We are pleased to have Richard and Shirley Flint to give us the latest and best word on the route and activities of the Coronado expedition in the Texas Panhandle—a truly significant event in our regional history," said Dr. Alex Hunt, CSAW director, Regents

Professor of English and Vincent-Haley Professor of Western Studies. This free event is the second of six lectures featured as part of WT's DLS fall schedule.

"We will discuss results of our 40-plus years of archival research and fieldwork concerning the Coronado expedition," the Flints said. "Specifically, we outline factors that influenced the route the expedition took to travel from Pecos Pueblo in New Mexico to a Native Teya village in Blanco Canyon in the Texas South Plains and back." The Coronado expedition took place from 1540 to 1542, across what is now New Mexico, the Texas Panhandle, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and into Central Kansas. That footnote the Flints saw in 1980 prompted a series of questions which led them to search through dozens of archives in Spain, Mexico, and elsewhere, as well as to archaeological sites throughout the Southwest. After spending so many years immersed in the language, culture, and thought of Early Modern Spain and early colonial Mexico, the Flints have a unique expertise on the Coronado expedition and have authored several

books on the subject. "For the general reader, the best one is 'No Settlement, No Conquest: A History of the Coronado Entrada,'" Richard Flint said. "For someone who wants to go more deeply into the most up-to-date research, our most recent book is by far the most appropriate: 'A Most Splendid Company:'

The Coronado Expedition in Global Perspective." Then for specialists who want to actually delve into the data, there's the free, publicly available website at coronado.unm.edu." The Flints also will participate in a student Q&A session titled "History, Archeology, Culture, with Richard and Shirley Flint" at 3 p.m. Oct. 6 in the Blackburn Room at Cornette Library. The session also is open to the public. "We are also excited to see what the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum and Floyd County Museum will show us in the way of Coronado artifacts, which will be on display during the lecture," Hunt said. The mission of the Distinguished Lecture Series is to invite nationally prominent experts to the WT campus to expose students to some of the most important issues of our times.

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### Local donors urged to give blood now

For Immediate Release – Hurricane Ian’s devastating landfall in Florida has wreaked havoc on that state’s blood supply and citizens from the rest of the country are needed to step up and provide relief.

The blood supply in Florida had approached critical levels even before Hurricane Ian’s arrival. On Monday, Coffee Memorial Blood Center sent emergency units of blood to Florida to assist its hospital shortages. Since then, Ian’s arrival has sent the blood supply there into a full-blown state of emergency.

All individuals in unaffected areas of the country are strongly urged to schedule a blood donation appointment as soon as possible, which will help other blood centers like Coffee Memorial Blood Center to help replenish Florida’s local blood supply and support Floridians as they manage through the devastation.

Please note, there is an extreme shortage of Type O blood, so donors with that blood type are especially encouraged to donate.

On average, most blood collection organizations nationwide had only had a 1–2-day supply of blood heading into the storm. Additional disruptions in blood collections, as well as transportation challenges, are likely to exacerbate already low inventories, particularly in the affected areas. The breadth and duration of the storm will likely impact large sections of Florida and the Southeast.

Donations are essential to maintain a stable and adequate supply of blood in the coming days, which can help save lives and ensure patient needs continue to be met.

“Recovery from a disaster is difficult and will require many things in the coming days, such as money, supplies, skilled workers and more,” said Armitage. “But right now, Floridians need blood. Anyone who is healthy and 16 years old or older can give blood. Blood donation typically takes only about an hour, and one donation saves up to three lives. Appointments to donate can be made online at yourbloodinstitute.org by calling 806-331-8833.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center relies solely on volunteer blood donors to meet the needs of patients at major hospitals across the region.

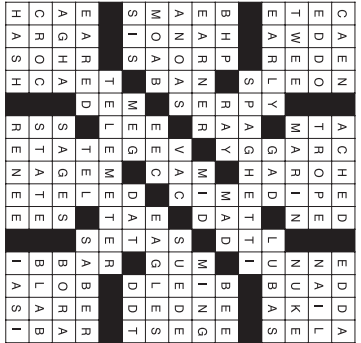

The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TCEQ.

The executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. In addition to the renewal, this permitting action includes the incorporation of changes in emission factors related to this permit. The reasons for any changes or incorporations, to the extent they are included in the renewed permit, may include the enhancement of operational control at the plant or enforceability of the permit. **The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

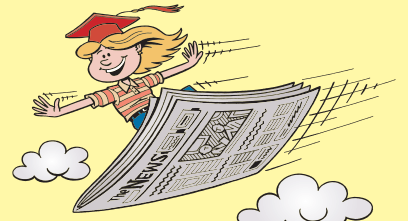


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
