Have regard for others

Social groups, from two people to two million, are joined together by earnestly regarding others. As old as humanity, this natural law is infused in the hearts of Panhandle people. Colonel Charles Goodnight, known for saving the plains bison herd, valued treating others with respect. According to biographer Monti Goodin, "It didn't matter who you were; he invited all in." Regard for others, local citizenship, mutual respect, the Golden Rule and the law of reciprocity are forces of nature in the Panhandle, building blocks of regard for others.

The definition of citizenship is "the relationship between an individual and a state to which the individual owes allegiance and, in turn, is entitled to its protection. Citizenship implies the status of freedom with accompanying responsibilities." It is granted to an individual in a sovereign nation by birth, earned through legal immigration or another legislatively prescribed path. While such action is typically initiated at the federal level, citizenship is exercised and given life in local communities, or not at all. This is why school boards, city councils, county commissions and other manifestations of republican forms of government are acted upon compellingly at the local level. Amarillo residents are closer to the capitals of five other states than Austin. The importance of local citizenship, elected representation, pervasive regard for the process by which people come to serve and mutual respect for those operated cannot be overstated. In communities that lack mutual respect, cynicism abounds and republican governance is kaput.

One example of mutual regard is evidenced in the Grange movement. In 1867 the Grange gained strength as a response to falling crop prices, the diminishment in value of paper money and rapidly increasing transportation costs. Agriculture producers banded together to fight for progress, in addition to family and farm prosperity. The objectives were fundamental. The objectives were fundamental to the Grange, "We shall earnestly endeavor to suppress personal, local, sectional, and national prejudices, all unhealthy rivalry and all selfish ambition." This spirit of "regard for others" is merely what's good for one can be good for all. A utopian chimera? No, an economic and social reality.

The Golden Rule is the ultimate expression of how one person treats another. Jesus Christ expressed it in the sixth chapter of the Gospel of Luke: "Do to others as you would have them do to you." Its' pithiness and simplicity belies its power in guiding day-to-day behavior. Its origins can be traced back to the Analects of Confucius in the 6th and 5th centuries BC. According to Science, The Law of Reciprocity is an agnostic expression of the Golden Rule. It is explained as, "The reciprocity principle is one of the basic laws of social psychology: It says that in social situations, we pay back what we receive from others. In other words, if John does you a favor, you will likely return it to him."

The values of the Panhandle are real. The American Farm Bureau Federation works to build a "sustainable future for food, fiber and fuel for our nation and world." The Farm Bureau recognizes the power of farming and ranching in the American west. Zippy Duvall said in a recent Zipline post, "Even the smallest contribution of time, talent, or treasure could be the difference between an elected official who understands the challenges you face and one who doesn't."

Family life is important because it nourishes us. Geography requires cooperation. The production of food, fuel and fiber in our nation's breadbasket demands it. All of this rests on the simple concept that regard for others is embedded in the consciousness of the people that live and work in the Texas Panhandle. Our University needs to value, appreciate and trumpet regard for others.

Choctaw deaths had mourning rules

When Choctaw Indians died, they were buried near their homes, and their families would sit by their graves from one to three months. These Indians buried their dead without shedding a tear. A specified time for tears would come later.

These families would go through a mournful ritual called "Indian Cries," after the period of quietness was over.., and from the time of burial to the date set for the cry, the relatives would never greet others. But the women relatives would throw their shawls over their heads and take the outsiders to the grave, or graves; then return to the house. On the day set for the "Indian Cry," the relatives and friends of the deceased would gather at the nearest relative's home, and all of them would go to the

burying place together. At the head and foot of the grave, or graves, poles would be driven in the ground. There would be a captain appointed, and

when all had been assembled properly, there would be weeping and wailing. At a given signal, it would be the duty of this captain to remove the poles. That was the signal for the end of the "ai akshucki," as the Choctaws called this ceremony, "the time of doing away."

Then the group of mourners would all return to the nearest relative's home where a big dinner was served

amid much merry making. The captain would take a stick and go among the group. Those he touched with the stick were the ones to eat at the first table. Then to-fula would be served. The Choctaw dish to-fula is composed of dinner were La'sh pishofa (hogshead and hominy cooked together) and brnaha

beaten corn which is put into water, mixed with a little lye, and cooked thoroughly all day; then this preparation is set aside for souring purposes. Often this liquid is fed to the sick. Other dishes served at this "ai akshucki" or shuck bread (corn beaten into meal mixed with water, whole beans, and ashes of bean pods). George U. Going back to the Magic Valley

For many decades, football-loving men gathered in coffee shops to dissect the previous Friday night's schoolboy football games. There was more dissecting than coffee-drinking.

Many may not have realized it, but those games--won, lost or tied--helped to unify community spirit.

For the most part, high school sports were kept in perspective, unlike major university programs today. Currently, mighty television moguls call the shots, the NCAA goes along and major institutions buy in, thus greatly tilting football and basketball away from their initial purposes. Never mind that governing boards give their blessings, and for a couple of dozen universities or so, clearly the "tail is wagging the dog."...

My aged Uncle Mort - who remembers the early days of football when participants wore scruffy uniforms and leather helmets – gets few laughs each season when the "haves" are upset by the "have nots." Such results leave fans bewildered, coaches embarrassed and oddsmakers frustrated.

A current example is Texas A&M's loss to visiting Appalachian State University, which was paid some \$1.5 million to play the Aggies in College Station.

"Toss in Coach Jimbo Fisher's salary of some \$800,000 per game and you've got an outlay of more than \$2 million, a lot of greenbacks to spend for a loss," he added....

Such topics are frequently discussed at coffee gatherings today, particularly by retired coaches. Four who coached high school football in the Rio Grande Valley served a total of more than 150 years, mostly in public schools. I was privileged to have two of them – Luz Pedraza and Poppy

Ross State University, 1963-1967. Luz played pro ball for eight years in the Texas Football League and Poppy - with a Master's Degree from the University of Texas – was the first head football coach/athletic coordinator at McAllen's Memorial High School before students from the Rio Grande Valley his promotion to McAllen ISD athletic director for 27 years. John Lerma played for Baylor University and Julio Ayala for This gets my vote as I think of this Wharton Junior College.

All members of this foursome starred as players in Rio Grande Valley high schools. Each of them served in coaching capacities in or near the valley, and all four are now retired there....

Quarterback Luz set numerous football records at Sul Ross, which scored a notable upset of New Mexico State University in 1963.

It was no fluke. The Lobos prevailed, 42-15. Luz and Poppy – a scrappy running back - were leaders of the team that took on Goliath and won.

SRSU received \$25,000 for providing opposition for that seasonclosing Thanksgiving Day game in Las Cruces. Naturally, fans at New Mexico State – a school some ten times larger – didn't see it coming. Sul Ross – named for a Confederate general – continues to serve a sparsely-populated area of West Texas, rarely enrolling more than 1,200-1,500 students...

I recall that Luz and Poppy contended that Spanish is "God's language." Decades later, I attended a church service conducted in Spanish. I had never done so before.

The hymns, sung in Spanish, were indeed beautiful.

Subsequently, I have agreed – for hymns anyway – that Spanish may be God's language. If I can track them down, I'll admit that they were excellent football players AND proponents of the Spanish language....

During my Sul Ross years, most returned there.

Maybe it is the "Magic Valley." foursome of coffee-drinking buddies who molded many, many lives.

It should be noted that men like these didn't coach for the money. They love the game, realize how much it has done for them, and gladly invested in young lives....

My alma mater, Howard Payne University, scored an upset over Texas A&M almost exactly one century ago.

The Yellow Jackets took down the Aggies 13-7 on September 30, 1922.

I'm sure HPU was paid nothing, but the win fueled "bragging rights" for Yellow Jacket fans, even today.



Columbian Mammoths roamed the plains skeletal remains of three to five adult Columbian Mammoths and one baby mammoth. They determined the place was, at one time, a playa lake where animals often drank, and ancient peoples would hunt.

The Miami Mammoth Kill Site was determined to be around 11,000 to 12,000 years old. Before the discoveries at Blackwater Draw in Clovis, NM, and the site in Miami, Texas, it was believed people were here in America for only 2,000 years before the modern era.

Several of these bones from the site, including a couple of tusks, can be viewed at the Roberts County

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
