Jackson bill would improve readiness

Congressman Ronny Jackson (R-13) recently introduced the Securing American Acquisitions, Readiness, and Military Stockpiles (ARMS) Act, which strengthens the Department of Defense's (DoD) ability to replenish our military's defense stocks following a transfer of lethal aid to an American ally or partner while also providing for strong Congressional oversight when the authority is used.

Dr. Howard sells local medical clinic to Pratt

Dr. John Howard has announced his retirement from medical practice and the sale of the Clarendon Family Medical Center effective November 1, 2022.

The new owner and medical supervisor of the clinic will be Dr. Dustin Pratt of Childress.

"During the forty years I have practiced medicine I have witnessed much change," Howard said. "Some of the advances in technology and therapeutics are nothing short of miraculous. One thing which has not changed, however, is our commitment to our patients and their care. With that in mind, and after a great deal of deliberation, I have come to the

conclusion that it is time to pass the reins at the clinic to a new generation."

Howard said he has been looking for a succession plan for the clinic for some time and said the continuation of the clinic has always been a top priority for him.

"It is not the Howard Medical Center," the doctor said. "It is the Clarendon Family Medical Center because I always intended it to be a lasting thing for the community."

Howard also said that the importance of the clinic to the community was made very clear over the last two years during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I believe all of this has been providential," Howard said. "I feel very comfortable with the plan. I see the need – the increasing need – for rural practitioners. I view the employees as my clinic family, and it was important to take care of them, too."

Howard said Dr. Pratt is interested in both the business side of medicine as well as the patient care side, which is rare in doctors, and he said Pratt shares his commitment to quality care for patients and West Texas values.

Looking to the future, Howard will focus his energies on what is already a full-time job – that of serving as the Donley County Judge.

"I'm on the ballot this November," he said. "I've still got several unfinished plans for the county business, and we still need improvements to the courthouse."

After 24 years in Clarendon, Howard and his wife, Lori, have no plans to move. They have enjoyed their time here and are proud to have raised their family here.

"Clarendon is home," he said.

"It has been my privilege to care for our patients and our community for the past twenty-four years. I pray for God's blessing on each of you, your families, and our community."

CC men win Stampede Rodeo

Led by a couple of event victo-ries and several other top placings, the Clarendon College men's rodeo team won its home event this past weekend.

"We had a lot of people step up and do good for us, and that's what it takes to win in our region," Clarendon College rodeo coach Bret Franks said. "I think the Southwest Region is the toughest in college rodeo, so any time you can win in this region, it's a big deal."

"Winning at home makes it even better."

Sam Petersen of Helena, Montana, won the bareback riding title, scoring 82 points to win the first round and 77 points to finish second in the championship round. His two-ride cumulative score of 159 points was good enough to claim the overall title. Petersen is now in second place in the Southwest Region's bareback riding standings.

Fellow bareback rider Weston Patterson finished fifth in the first round and also placed in fourth in steer wrestling. He earned two spots in the short round but was unable to finish because he was in a battle for the saddle bronc riding title in ProRodeo's Prairie Circuit, which had its finals this past weekend. Patterson finished the season as the circuit's champion and will advance at the national circuit finals rodeo, called the NFR Open, in July.

"When you have pro athletes that are competing at the college level, you realize they have some goals they want to meet," Franks said. "This was a good opportunity for Weston to win a PRCA champi-

onship and set himself up good for next season, and I didn't want him to miss out on that.

"I was worried our chances to win this weekend would be hurt by him not being here for the short-round, but everybody else stepped up big and helped us pull through."

Dylan Hancock of Golconda, Illinois, also walked away with a title, scoring 159 cumulative points to win saddle bronc riding. He was 75 points in the long round to advance to the short go-round, where he had the highest-marked ride of the rodeo, an 84, to win the final round and the average title.

Teammate Slade Keith of Stanfield, Arizona, won the first round

and finished in a tie for second in the championship round; he finished second, just a point behind Hancock in the aggregate. With the points he earned in Clarendon, Keith moved regional lead in the saddle bronc riding standings.

"I was really proud of how many kids we had in the short round," Franks said, noting that bull rider Hadley Miller of Boyd, Texas, competed in the final round but didn't place. "I think it says something to see that many black vests in the short-go at our hometown rodeo."

For the women, Quincy Sul-livan of Peralta, New Mexico, stopped the clock in 2.3 seconds

to finish as the runner-up in the first round of breakaway roping. She placed fifth in the final round and finished fourth overall. She is eighth in the regional standings.

The Bulldogs men finished with 495 points to outlast South-west Region leader Western Texas College. That helped Clarendon College move up to third place in the Southwest Region with seven events remaining on the 2022-23 schedule.

"We've made some good strides, but we need to keep putting ourselves in position at every rodeo if we want to win the region," Franks said. "I think we have the ability to do that."

The Clarendon Lions Club will celebrate its 100th anniversary this Saturday, October 22, with a full day of local and district Lions activities.

The day will start with the Lions District 2-T1 Fall Family Festival, beginning at the Mulkey Theatre with donuts, mimosas, and coffee at 9:30 followed by rapid fire presentations on expanding community service throughout the Panhandle.

Local and area Lions will then gather on the north side of the Antro Hotel site to recreate a picture that was taken there in 1930 with Lions founder Melvin Jones. In addition to area Lions, Past International President Jimmy Ross and International Director T.J. Tijerina are expected to attend.

City okays downtown project bid

The Clarendon City Council approved a bid for downtown revitalization work during its regular meeting October 13.

Aldermen unanimously approved a bid from Carter Sand & Gravel of Pampa for about \$314,000, which came in under the budgeted amount for the grant-funded project.

Three other bids came in higher than the budget for the project with the high bid more than \$300,000 higher than the winning bid.

City Administrator said work will likely begin in November on the project that will remove and replace all the sidewalks in the 100 block of South Kearney Street and install ramping and street lights.

The project is expected to take 90 days to complete.

The council also accepted and approved a proposal from OJD Engineering to provide a study on the availability and quality of groundwater in the city, which is seen as a first step in the consideration of possibly developing a municipally-owned water system. The study will be billed on an hourly basis for a total not to reach \$50,000.

Prior to the meeting the council met in closed session for about 45 minutes for consultation with an attorney regarding the house at 602 S. Bugbee. No action was taken following the closed session.

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Responsibility important part of free society

Freedom and the personal responsibility required for the effective functioning of a republican form of government are powerful one-two punches.

In 21st-century America, moral absolutes are fading. On many college campuses, anyone holding any view that appears to be a moral absolute is branded and denigrated as phobic, thick-skulled, uninformed, regressive and generally stupid.

The Bill of Rights Institute appropriately claims that virtues are required to sustain citizenship in a free society. James Madison, in Federalist No. 55, wrote, "There is a degree of depravity in mankind which requires a certain degree of circumspection and distrust, so there are other qualities in human nature which justify a certain portion of esteem and confidence."

These precepts are properly embedded in American thought. John Locke recognized the interdependence of freedom and responsibility by championing the idea that people are "free, equal and independent."

There is a war on personal responsibility. Interest and identity groups endeavor to absolve individuals of responsibility and instead selectively and seductively pass out praise and condemnation based on group membership rather than individual action.

Some organizations associated with rural life impact people in rural Texas, especially the Panhandle. In 1917 the Smith-Hughes Act was committed to the advancement of agricultural education.

These efforts are contagious and relevant in urban and suburban environs in the 21st-century too. The focus on personal responsibility, intellectual and moral development and accountability for one's actions are attractive everywhere.

Japanese-Americans loyal in WWII

One might think it only natural that both Federal and local officials should have concerns about the loyalty of Japanese-Americans at the beginning of World War II.

In the United States there were two categories of Japanese-American. There were the "Iessi" who were first generation Japanese who had come directly from Japan, and there were the "Nisei" who had been born here as second and third generation Japanese.

In Texas, as well as throughout the United States, the Japanese-Americans made great efforts to demonstrate their loyalty to the land in which they were living.

Japanese who ran large businesses were particularly vulnerable during this time. To show their loyalty, Kichimatsu Kishi, an Orange County rice farmer who had organized the Orange Petroleum Company, and Kaname Susujki, the president of the company, offered themselves to the police for arrest.

Their families were among a dozen other Japanese put under close surveil-

lance. Deputy sheriffs quoted one of the Japanese as saying, "They must be crazy over there. I'd rather be in jail here than free there."

On the day following the Pearl Harbor attack, Fred Chiutaro Maizumi registered at the San Antonio police station, saying, "Japan can never hope to win this war. It would be like the foolish monkey attacking the elephant."

In McAllen, Henry Kawahata, a young and successful farmer was quoted in the McAllen Daily Press as saying, "I'm ready to fight for the United States against Japan. We're for the United States 100 per cent."

He then snapped to attention and saluted the flag. (From the San Antonio Express)

Dr. Sadakazu Furagochi, arrested in El Paso, at the beginning of the war, offered his services in a humanitarian way. It is said that he could have sought release but declined to do so after noting the generally poor health of the other internees and the shortage of doctors.

Mention should also be made of the 442th Infantry regiment that served so heroically in combat in Europe. Although composed mostly of Japanese-Americans from the west coast, many Niseis from Texas were also included.

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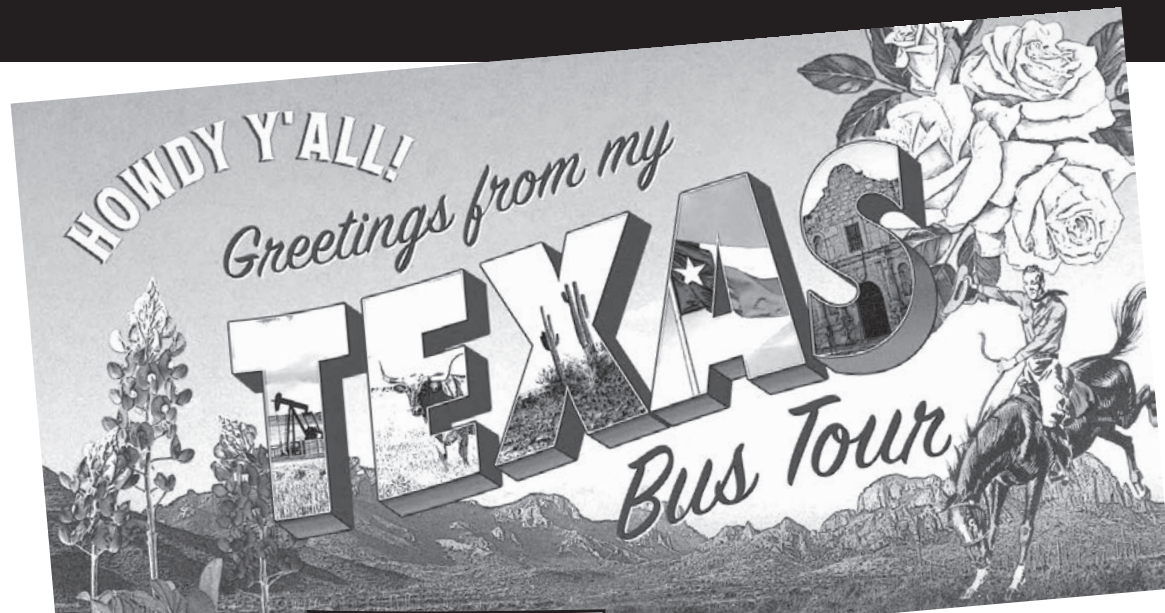
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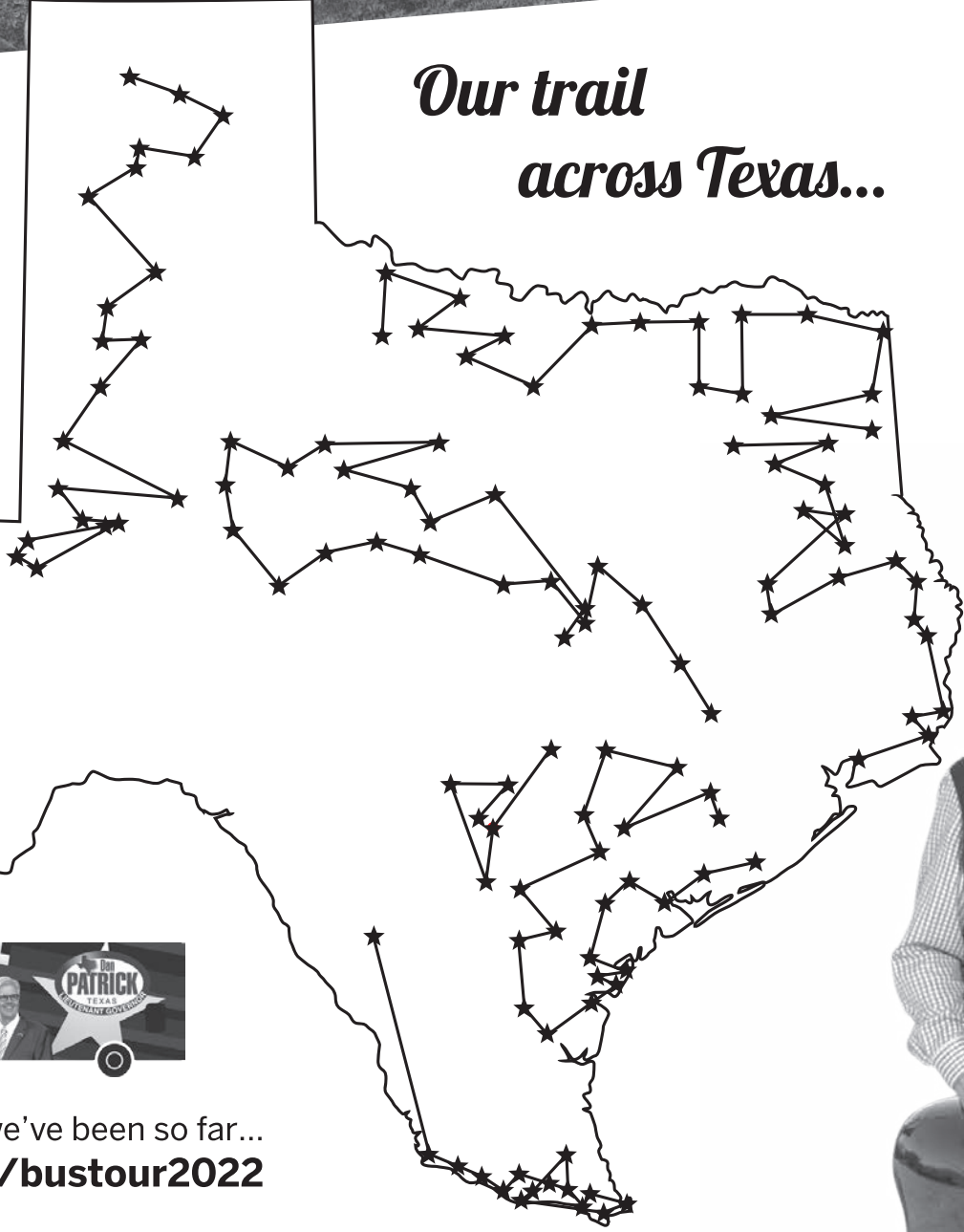

Roosevelt persevered through gun shot

One hundred and ten years ago last Friday, on October 14, 1912, on the campaign trail for a third term as president under the Progressive or Bull Moose Party, Theodore Roosevelt made a stop in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. As he got into his car outside the Gilpatrick Hotel, and stood up to wave at the crowd, a man named John Schrank shot him in the chest with a .38 caliber Colt revolver at just five feet away.

Several men, including a former Rough Rider, tackled the would-be assassin to the ground. Roosevelt coughed in his hand to be sure the bullet didn't puncture his lung. When he found his hand wasn't bloodied, he insisted on giving his

speech, despite strong caution to not do so by his peers and staff.

It was discovered the bullet punctured his metal eyeglass case and his folded, 50-page speech manuscript before entering his chest, thus slowing the bullet and saving his life.

When Roosevelt arrived, he told the crowd, "Friends, I shall ask you to be as quiet as possible. I don't know whether you fully understand that I have just been shot." Then

Roosevelt unbuttoned his coat and showed the horrified crowd his bloody white shirt and vest. Roosevelt replied as the crowd gasped, "But It takes more than that to kill a bull moose!"

Roosevelt went on to make a 84-minute speech before receiving medical attention.

The bullet had made a dime-sized hole in his chest, and the bullet remained there until his death, seven years later, in 1919.

Theodore Roosevelt was one tough president and overall American. We need more American citizens and politicians nowadays with the physical and mental strength, and virtues as Theodore Roosevelt.

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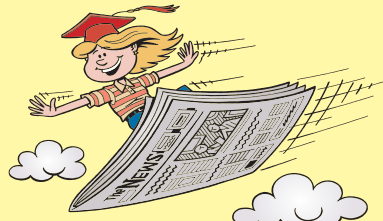
